On November 30, 1864, Col. Joseph Conrad's and Col. John Lane's brigades of Brig. Gen. George D. Northern group funds new Franklin battlefield marker

Site of forward Federal'line will be dedicated tomorrow

FRANKLIN — A new Tennessee Historical Commission marker is going up on the Franklin battlefield, but it is being paid for by an Illinois group and will mark the Federal forward line in the battle.

Save The Franklin Battlefield Inc. (STFB) in conjunction with the Salt Creek Civil War Round Table of Wheaton, Ill., will dedicate the marker at 2 p.m. Saturday along Columbia Avenue just south of Battlefield Drive.

"So much of the battlefield has been developed that really the only way to interpret the battlefield is through historical signage," explained Joe Smyth, STFB president. "So folks can come to town and move from marker to marker and get not only a chronological feel, but the distances involved the ground that was fought over."

Brig. Gen. George D. Wagner's Division formed the Federal forward line about one-half mile south of The Carter House, ground zero for fighting in the Battle of

In the late afternoon of Nov. 30, 1864, Wagner's Division was posi-

tioned as an advance line several manded his brigades to stay in posihundred yards in front of the main Federal works, south of Carter House. Two divisions of the Confederate Army of Tennessee about 8,000 men - advanced along both sides of Columbia Pike, charging into Wagner's two brigades, which were about 4,000 men strong.

"After several volleys from both sides, the Federal position was quickly overrun and the fighting became a melee of hand-to-hand fighting, using clubbed muskets and bayonets," said Smyth, STFB. "The line gave way and the Federals broke in total disorder, running pellmell for their main earthworks.

A desperate foot race then took place as the soldiers in the center of the Confederate line pursued the fleeing Federals into the main trenches just south of Carter House, Smyth said.

The text for the marker reads:

"Federal Forward Line. On November 30, 1864, Col. Joseph Conrad's and Col. John Lane's brigades of Brig. Gen. George D. Wagner's Federal Second Division, Fourth Corps, were placed east and west of the road near this position one half mile south of the Federal main line. Acting Federal field commander Maj. Gen. Members of the Salt Creek Civil War Round Table, which provided funding for the monument, will be touring Franklin this weekend.

The tour is part of the group's "Partnership in Preservation" with STFB. "They came up with this concept of the partnership, and one of the things they were interested in was to get involved in some type of preservation," said Smyth. "A lot of them had been here and had visited in the past and I think felt a special affinity (for the Franklin battlefield).'

Reenactors and descendants of Wagner's Division and STFB members have been invited, as has the public.

Save The Franklin Battlefield Inc. is a tax-exempt nonprofit corporation dedicated to the preservation, protection, and promotion of Civil War sites in Williamson County. Members and prospective members meet at 6:30 p.m. on the second Monday of each month at the Williamson County Library in Franklin.
