Utah and the Civil War

"The monument honors the Utah men who answered the call to protect the mail and telegraph lines along the continental route during the Civil War. April 25, 1862 acting governor of Utah, Frank Fuller called for volunteers from the Nauvoo legion. The next day twenty-four men under Col. Robert T. Burton left for their assignment. Two days later Brigham Young received an authorization from President Abraham Lincoln, through secretary of war Stanton, for a company of cavalry to serve ninty days protecting the same route. One hundred and six men responded for duty under Captain Lot Smith. Later some Utah men joined the 3rd Regiment California Volunteers stationed at Fort Douglas. Oct, 1862 - July 1866. Other pioneers served in the civil war before coming to Utah."

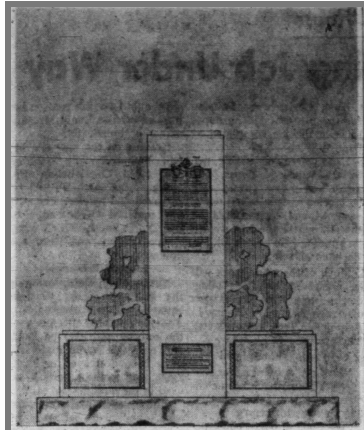

Mrs. Alma Kasler was Chairman on the Civil War Monument committee for the Daughters of Utah Pionners. It was dedicated during their National Convention on Sept 30, 1961 at 4pm. The Daughters raised money for the monument by selling books about Utah's contributions to the Civil War. The monument was described at being 8 ft tall, and the wings "2 foot by 3 foot". Mrs. Kate B. Carter, President of the Society presented the monument to the State of Utah which was accepted by Secretary of State F. Toronto.

DUP Plans To Honor Veterans Of Civil War

Utah's Civil War "Troops for the Defense of the Overland Mail" will be honored Sept. 30. The Daughters of Utah Pioneers plan to dedicate a granite monument to them and all other Utah Civil War veterans.

Mrs. Alma Kasteler, chairman of the monument committee, said the eight-foot high marker will be placed on the State Capitol grounds east of the DUP parking lot.

Cost of the project is being paid by DUP and contributions from families of the veterans, she said, and anyone wishing to donate may write to Daughters of Utah Pioneers, 300 N. Main.

The center shaft of the monument will tell the story of the 126 volunteers. They were called by President Lincoln during the summer of 1862 to guard the mail and telegraph routes from the Platte River to California. The troops furnished their own horses and equipment, and were commanded by Robert T. Burton and Lot Smith.

A two-foot by 3-foot wing on each side of the center shaft will be inscribed with the names of the Utah veterans.

Mrs. Kasteler pointed out that many of the descendants of these men are unaware of their part in the Civil War and would be interested in knowing of it. She urged descendants to contact the DUP offices.

DUP To Offer Volume On Utah In Civil War

Volume four of "Our Pioneer Heritage" will be introduced during the annual convention of the National Society, Daughters of Utah Pioneers, Saturday at Hotel Utah Motor Lodge.

Sales from the book, to be presented at the one-day semi-annual DUP convention by Irene McCullough, are responsible for maintenance of the DUP Museum, 304 N. Main.

The book will deal with pioneer life in Utah and Utah's role in the Civil War.

In connection with the Civil War portion of the book, DUP

women also are to dedicate a monument to the men of Utah who served during the Civil War to protect mail routes and telegraph lines.

The monument is located at the southwest corner of the Utah Capitol grounds. A special ceremony with Elder S. Dilworth Young of the First Council of the Seventy, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints as guest speaker, will be held at 4 p.m. Saturday.

Mrs. Kate B. Carter, president of the Central Company, DUP, will present the monument. Secretary of State Lamont F. Toronto will accept the gift on behalf of the state.

The Mormon Battalion also will participate in the dedicatory event.

Prefacing Saturday's sessions was an open house Friday afternoon at the newly restored Chase Mill in Liberty Park.

ERECTED SEPTEMBER 30, 1961

UTAH AND THE CIVIL WAR

THIS MONUMENT HONORS THE UTAH MEN WHO ANSWERED THE CALL TO PROTECT THE MAIL AND TELEGRAPH LINES ALONG THE CONTINENTAL ROUTE DURING THE CIVIL WAR. APRIL 25, 1862 ACTING GOVERNOR OF UTAH, FRANK FULLER, CALLED FOR VOLUNTEERS FROM THE MOUNTAIN LEGION. THE NEXT DAY TWENTY-FOUR MEN UNDER COL. ROBERT T. BURTON LEFT FOR THEIR ASSIGNMENT. TWO DAYS LATER BRIGHAM YOUNG RECEIVED AN AUTHORIZATION FROM PRESIDENT ABRAHAM LINCOLN, THROUGH SECRETARY OF WAR STANTON, FOR A COMPANY OF CAVALRY TO SERVE NINETY DAYS PROTECTING THE SAME ROUTE. ONE HUNDRED AND SIX MEN RESPONDED FOR DUTY UNDER CAPTAIN LOT SMITH. LATER SOME UTAH MEN JOINED THE 3RD REGIMENT, CALIFORNIA VOLUNTEERS, STATIONED AT FORT DOUGLAS, OCT. 1862 - JULY 1868. OTHER PIONEERS SERVED IN THE CIVIL WAR BEFORE COMING TO UTAH.

Utah Civil War Casualty

 Lieutenant Henry Wells Jackson (March 15, 1827 - May 27, 1864) was the only Utah casualty of the Civil War and the first-born Latter Day Saint to be killed in a U.S. national conflict. Jackson marched in the Mormon Battalion Company D, 2nd Infantry, from Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, to San Francisco, California, and used gold to pay for his passage. He and Elias Amos Drake were captured in San Mateo on February 2, 1862, by Brigham Young. Henry and Elias started a farm and helped establish settlements in Turlock, Yuba and San Bernardino, California. In 1864, Henry carried mail for George Chesapeake on the Overland Mail Route, a precursor to the West Express. Due to bad management, Henry was owed \$1,200 in back pay for his mail service. He wanted to go back East to try and collect the money. Payment was delayed, so Henry took employment as a freight master and was ultimately captured by the Confederate Army and held as prisoner for three months. He was later released in exchange for Confederate prisoners. Because of the way he was treated, he decided to fight for the Union. Henry enlisted with the 1st Regiment, District of Columbia, Volunteer Cavalry and was commissioned as a lieutenant due to his previous service in the Mormon Battalion. On May 8, 1864, Henry took part in the Battle of White Bridge near Jersey Station, Virginia, and was killed. On his selection, he died on May 27, 1864, leaving behind his wife and three children. Henry Wells Jackson is buried in Hampton National Cemetery and is remembered for his great sacrifice and love for family and country.
