#### SULTANA MONUMENT REDEDICATED—A SESQUICENTENNIAL EVENT

On May 3rd, William A. McTeer Camp 39 re-dedicated the Sultana memorial at Knoxville's Mount Olive Cemetery. Last year, PCC George Lane committed the Camp to participate in the Blue & Gray Reunion & Freedom Jubilee. CC David McReynolds developed this into a memorial for the many "forgotten" tragic deaths, occurring when the Sultana sank on April 27, 1865.

"Dozens assembled there,...old men in then-unstylish beards and hats, but also with children, perhaps grandchildren or even great-grandchildren, with flags flying, to unveil their monument, Knoxville's last new monument to be witnessed by actual Civil War veterans—just as their nation tried to stay out of another war." (From Jack Neely's article in the April 30, 2015 edition of the Knoxville Mercury.)

The Tennessee Civil War Sesquicentennial Commission designated the combined events of "Reconstruction Tennessee" and the "Blue & Gray Reunion & Freedom Jubilee" as the state's 2015 signature sesquicentennial event. These events were held in Knoxville from April 30th through May 3rd.

The sinking of the Sultana ranks as the worst maritime disaster in U.S. military history with some 1,800 deaths. Most of the "passengers" on the steamboat were Union soldiers, recently released from Confederate prisons. Many were sick and malnourished. There were 2400 passengers on board a boat built for only 376. The overcrowding led to the explosion of the ship's four boilers that had been known to be defective and in need of repair.

There were 463 Tennesseans aboard the Sultana. Most were members of the 3rd Tenn. Cav., formed in Knoxville.

The survivors of the Sultana tragedy met in Knoxville in April each year until only one showed up in 1930. On July 4, 1916, survivors dedicated an impressive monument made of pink Tennessee marble in the Mount Olive Baptist Church Cemetery.

But over time, despite the existence of excellent books and magazine articles written about the Sultana, it became largely forgotten.

In 1987, the Association of Sultana Descendants and Friends was organized and began meeting annually.

Camp 39 committed to invite as many Sultana descendants as could be found. Over 150 attended and at least 43 were descendants of Union soldiers on the Sultana that fateful day.

The Craggy Top Brass, which includes CJVC Steve Wallace, started the event with a prelude of period music.

DC Mike Downs greeted the guests and initiated four new brothers, including two Juniors: Cub Scout Garrett Chapman and Paddy Fitzsimons, who joined the event via Skype from Belfast, Northern Ireland. Joseph McReynolds and Patrick Chapman were also initiated.

Historical background, as well as the history of the survivors and their descendants, were presented. CC David McReynolds then led a ceremony adapted from that of the GAR that included a Color Guard and Firing Detail from the Wm. Blount High School AFJROTC program. The Craggy Top Brass performed the "Star Spangled Banner" and one trumpet played "Taps" after the 21-gun salute. PCC George Lane recited a prayer of re-dedication and a benediction in song with a medley of "Tenting Tonight" and "Battle Cry of Freedom" was performed.

#### NATIONAL COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION MEETING MINUTES – APRIL 11, 2015 SPRINGFIELD, ILL.

The meeting was opened by CinC Tad D. Campbell at 8:01 P.M. Br. Pierson led the attendees in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by Chaplain Kowalski providing the invocation. CinC Campbell gave general opening comments.

The Nat: Secretary called the roll and recorded the following members and guests as present: CinC Tad Campbell, SVCinC Eugene Mortorff, JVCinC Donald Martin, Nat. Secretary Alan Russ, Nat. Treasurer Richard Orr, Nat. Quartermaster Danny Wheeler, Council Members Donald Shaw, Ed Norris, Walter Busch, Brian Pierson, and Immediate PCinC Ken Freshley. PCinCs included: Stephen Michaels (Banner Editor), Edward J. Kreiser, James B. Pahl, and Perley E. Mellor. Guests included: Exec. Dir. David Demmy Sr., MO PDC Robert Petrovic, Brs. Jerry Kowalski, (Ill.), Kevin L. Martin and Mike Paquette (Chesapeake), and Jim Crane (OH).

CofA Member Steve Hammond was excused by CinC.

Sec. Russ stated that, with regard to communications, he had received a letter, also addressed to the CinC, from Dept. of the Chesapeake, requesting to revoke three charters.

Commander-in-Chief Campbell gave a brief introductory report.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS FROM OFFICER REPORTS

#### Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief

Recommendation, Item 3, page 5

Alonzo Cushing Recognition – It is recommended the event to be an official Nat. SUVCW event to be held at the Cushing Monument at Gettysburg immediately following the parade.

B. Br. Orr moved; Br. Norris seconded for this to be a National event, and for the SVCinC to coordinate with Military Affairs Comm. Motion passed.

#### **National Secretary**

Recommendation 1, page 8

It is recommended the Sesquicentennial Signature Event Comm. be instructed to no longer accept applications or submit them to the Council of Administration for approval.

Br. Orr moved, Br. Norris seconded to accept the recommendation with a caveat to accept applications for August 20, 2016. Motion passed.

Recommendation 2, page 8

It is recommended the CinC direct the C&R Committee to resolve the conflict between and within the Nat. Regulations and Job Description to show that the budget is presented for review by the Nat. Encampment and subsequently approved by the Council of Administration.

CinC to send to C&R Committee.

Recommendation 3, page 9

It is recommended the CinC direct the C&R Committee to add in Chap. III, Art. IV, Sec. 3 that the office of Campat-Large and Dept. Organizer is also excluded from appointment by the CinC.

CinC to send to C&R Committee.

Recommendation 4, page 9

It is recommended the CinC direct the C&R Comm. to amend Chap. II, Art. VI, Sec. 2 to reflect that the charter fee is to be forfeited "one year from the date of the application."

CinC to send to C&R Committee.

Nat. Graves Registration Officer

-Recommendation 1, page 23. Recommendation for a change in the Regulations, Chap. V, Art. IV, Badges, Section 2(b) as reads "All elected officers of the National Organization, while holding such office, and past elected National officers who have served a full term or who have been elected to fill an unexpired term and who served until the end of that term, a ribbon, the center a broad stripe of old gold, with a narrow border of red, white and blue on each side. All elected Department officers, while holding office or having been granted emeritus status by his Department Encampment, a ribbon with a red center, and the red, white and blue border on each side."

Should be changed to read "All elected and appointed officers of the National Organization, while holding such office, and past elected National officers who have served a full term or who have been elected to fill an un-expired term, or past appointed National officers who have served and completed more than five consecutive terms and who served until the end of that term, shall be entitled to wear a ribbon, the center a broad stripe of old gold, with a narrow border of red, white and blue on each side. All elected Department officers, while holding office or having been granted emeritus status by his Department Encampment, a ribbon with a red center, and the red, white and blue border on each side."

I have underlined the additional terminology within the changed regulation for convenience only, the underlined portions if approved would be in the regulation without being underlined. I have looked through the list of officers contained within this email and all the required officers are included who need to be notified of proposed changes in the SUVCW Regulations. I request that the Chairmen of the proper committees please present these changes to their committees for review and addition to the Nat. Encampment Agenda.

Secretary was directed to advise submitter to submit the recommendation in the proper manner, as described in the Regulations of the Order.

Pictures for Monument Database, Br. Busch. See pages 19 and 20 of officer reports. The consensus was to continue with actions being taken.

Open Items list was reviewed.

Br. Wheeler reminded the council that the Ritual is still out of date and the "pocket" size is very difficult to read. Br. Pierson will review annual proceedings for changes to be made to the ritual. Once the updates have been approved, he will convert it to the smaller size, retaining readability.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

Investment of Additional Funds. Br. Orr stated the council had previously approved investing \$400,000 in mutual funds to increase income. This has been successful. Also, the last of the certificates of deposits has matured. Br. Orr moved, Br. Russ seconded to invest \$100,000 in corporate/municipal bonds, with the intention they be held to maturity. Motion passed.

Nat. Website. Brs. Orr and Wheeler stated there is no index, and it is not user friendly. It was also agreed that it is not easily searchable. Br. Freshley suggested putting together a "punch list" with the expectations for items.



Penn. Dept. Order 9, Series 2014-2015. Br. Orr stated there are problems within the <u>Dept.</u>, <u>which may have a significant effect on the dept.</u> in the next six months. <u>Eleven of the 26 camps want to split from the Dept.</u> <u>again.</u>

Encampment Comm. update. The hotel reservation system for the Nat. Encampment at Richmond has had problems. These have been, or are being, addressed. CinC Campbell asked Br. Crane to communicate with the other Allied Orders. Cost of radios for comm. communications at encampments will be charged to comm. expenses.

Br. Orr discussed using a shirt vendor. Shirts will have to be ordered from the company. These will be on the SUVCW Facebook page. A date will be set for order cutoffs.

Br. Orr reported that PCinC Bud Atkinson had found a number of old badges in his attic, which were boxed up and given to Br. Wheeler. Nat. Historian Br. Wolz went through the badges and reconditioned ribbons which needed it. These badges will be auctioned, and include some special and rare badges. The special and rare badges will have starting minimum bids on them. The auction will be restricted to brothers of the Order.

Br. Orr addressed an issue with the Pledge of Allegiance, reminding all that it is "one Nation under God", and not "one Nation, under God."

Br. Pierson presented some concepts of what the Eagle Scout patch could look like. He will email the pictures to the council so they can review them in better detail. No further action was taken at this time.

Br. Petrovic discussed problems with Lincoln Tomb Ceremony. There are problems getting enough people to come to the luncheon. He inquired as to if we should consider doing away with luncheon. No action taken at this time.






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



Lincoln's second inaugural speech is quite possibly the greatest speech ever given by an American president. Using this event as a beginning to heal the nation torn by

Civil War, this oration featured the classic line "with malice toward none, and charity for all." Lincoln was portrayed by Larry Elliott of Louisville.

The camp assisted the Madison County Division of Historic Properties, the Battle of Richmond Association and the Madison County Civil War Roundtable in the occasion.

Established in 1999, Camp 5 primarily serves central Kentucky.

Sgt. Elijah P. Marrs Camp 5 helped unveil and dedicate three new Historical Markers on May 30th. The markers were located at the Battle of Richmond, Camp Dick Robinson and Camp Nelson; all three were important Civil War sites in central Kentucky.

The Richmond marker highlights the role of the "Old State Road" during the first major battle of the Confederacy's 1862 Kentucky campaign, fought on August 29 & 30, 1862, resulting in a Confederate victory.

The Camp Dick Robinson marker denotes the role of the camp in keeping Kentucky in the Union. Established by William "Bull" Nelson at the behest of Abraham Lincoln, the camp was the first violation of Kentucky's neutrality during the late summer of 1861. It trained Kentuckians and East Tennesseans, counting Geo. Thomas, Wm. Sherman, and Andrew Johnson among them.

Camp Nelson was a very large training and supply depot, and is known for the recruiting and mustering of Negro troops during the war's last two years. Established by Ambrose Burnside in late 1863, it was named for Union MG Wm. "Bull" Nelson.

#### **MISSOURI**

On April 11th, Phelps Camp 66 and Holmes Brigade, U.S.V., participated in the funeral of Union Maj. Raphael Guido Rombauer in Carthage. A native of Hungary, Rombauer served in the 1st Missouri Inf. (90 days) and Campbell's Ill. Battery, then joined the 1st Ill. Lt. Art., becoming the regiment's major in 1864. While at Cairo, Ill., in 1861, Rombauer assisted U.S. Grant by translating

messages sent in Hungarian from dept. headquarters in St. Louis. Following the war, Rombauer became a prominent businessman in southwest Missouri. He died in Kirksville in 1912, but his cremated remains remained unclaimed until 2014, when they were found by his greatgreat-granddaughter. Maj. Rombauer now rests alongside his first wife and two children.

#### **NEW YORK**



During the month of May, Capt. Ringing church bells broke the silence between thunderstorms recently at the Bethesda United Methodist Church near Patriot, Ohio. Lee's Army at Appomattox Court House, Va.

At exactly 3:15 P.M., Myers and Carter rang the bells 20 times each or 10 times for each year of the conflict which cost our nation over 1 million casualties.

The Bethesda Church was only six years old when a Union Rally was held there in 1861 to solidify support for the cause. Some 14 Civil War Veterans are buried in the adjacent cemetery.

In 1900, the Navy Dept. donated the artillery tube to Evansville's T.L. Sutphen GAR Post 41. The Post, in turn, donated the piece to the City of Evansville, which placed it on the City Hall lawn, on a stone base resembling a gun carriage.

The Evansville memorial was removed to Leonard-Leota Park in 1938 and later, suffered severe damage from vandalism.

In 2012, the Evansville Grove Society, a local historical society, and the Evansville Historic Preservation Commission started fund raising. The restoration project was completed in 2015, and has a value of \$35,000. The artillery piece was returned to its place of honor at City Hall. Baker Manufacturing Company, LLC served as a major contributor and as general contractor for the restoration work.

#### PCINC RICHARD L. GREENWALT

I spend my first National Encampment (1994), sitting next to PCinC Richard "Dick" Greenwalt, who answered my questions and explained in detail what was going on. Dick continued to be a kind and caring teacher years after he had retired from the profession.

Br. Dick joined Alliance, Ohio's McClellan Camp 91 in 1965. He was elected Camp Cmdr. in 1967, Ohio Dept. Cmdr. in 1968, and Cmdr. of the Central Region Assoc. of the

Allied Orders of the GAR in 1973. He served the Nat. Order as Patriotic Instructor, Jr. Vice Commander-in-Chief and Sr. Vice Commander-in-Chief, before being elected Commander-in-Chief at the 97th Annual Nat. Encampment in Grand Rapids, Mich., on August 13-17, 1978. He was Life Member 31.

Br. Greenwalt joined the SVR in 1971. By 1979, he had risen to the rank of Lt. Col. and Commander of the 3rd Military District. At various times, he also served as Nat. SVR Quartermaster, District Adjutant and Adjutant for his regiment, the 19th OVI.

Br. Dick's father was a WWI veteran and during the Civil War, his grandfather, Peter R. Greenwalt, served in Co. I, 10th West Virginia Inf. Consequently, Dick was very patriotic and served as Chair of the Alliance Memorial Day Committee for many years.

He was often seen in parades, helping carry the large U.S. Flag with Alliance's Shrine Club. He was a charter member of the Flag Unit and Past President of the Shrine Club for two different terms. He enjoyed volunteering to transport crippled children to the Shrine Hospital in Erie, Penn.

Br. Greenwalt was a 40-plus member of Conrad Masonic Lodge and served as Master twice. Prior to moving to New York, he was also a member of Council, Commandery and the Tadmore Shrine Temple of Akron. He was Past Royal Patron of Grace Court Order of the Amaranth and had been Noble Grand of the Odd Fellows.

He was an active member of the First Presbyterian Church, where he served on session and was a Sunday school teacher for the Weaver Bible Class.

Br. Dick graduated with both a bachelor's and master's degree from West Virginia University with extensive graduate work from both Ohio State and Kent State Universities. He followed a 33-year career as a teacher in the footsteps of his teacher mother. He was proud that his daughter, Nancy, and grandson, James, also are/were in the "education business."

Br. Dick was first married to Aux. PNP Jane Graham in June 1953. They had two daughters, Aux. PNP Nancy (J. Gregory) Hilton and Rebecca. He married his current wife, Aux. PNP Bea Greenwalt, in June 1980. He is further survived by stepchildren; step grandchildren; step great-grandchildren and step great-grandchildren.

#### **SVR Participates in Lincoln Funeral Reenactment**

SVR members were among hundreds who participated in a reenactment of President Lincoln's funeral, marking the sesquicentennial of the May 4, 1865, event. The 2015 Lincoln Funeral Coalition spent the past six years planning the event, which included pallbearers who were descendants of the original pallbearers in Lincoln's funeral.

From May 1st to 3rd, a variety of events were held in Springfield, Ill. About 1250 Union Civil War reenactors were encamped at Lincoln Park and on the Benedictine University campus, where they conducted military drills and provided visitors an opportunity to learn about the Civil War. Several art shows, concerts and Civil War tea presentations were held throughout the city.

On May 2nd, thousands of spectators lined the streets to see the replica President's coffin removed from the funeral train car. The coffin, covered with a 36 star flag, was transported to the Old State Capitol building in a replica 1865 hearse, drawn by six black horses. The president's horse, "Old Bob," followed the hearse.

The procession included hundreds of Civil War soldiers and civilians in period dress. The only participants in modern dress were the captain and crew of the aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln. President Lincoln's Own Band, a Civil War era reenactment group that portrays the 1865 U.S. Marine Band, played music of the era. It appeared in Steven Spiellberg's 2012 movie "Lincoln".

Several dignitaries rode in Civil War era carriages from the train station to the Old Capitol building, where a ceremony was conducted. Afterwards, the replica coffin was placed on public display near the Old State Capitol Building and an honor guard was

posted. A viewing continued until the funeral procession to the cemetery stepped off. SVR Cmdr. MG Robert E. Grim, Deputy Cmdr. BG Henry E. Shaw, Jr., and Capt. Timothy Downey, 3rd Mil. Dist. IG, all had an opportunity to serve in the honor guard.

On Sunday, the hearse carried the replica coffin in a procession from the Old State Capitol building through the streets of Springfield to Oak Ridge Cemetery, 2.7 miles away. A funeral service was held and the coffin was placed in the same receiving vault that held Lincoln's coffin in 1865. The vault is located near the tomb of Pres. Lincoln, his wife and three of his four sons.

Allied Orders 1981 Letter Opener

#### NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT SOUVENIRS

I have often advised that what one collects is strictly up to the individual. For a number of years, our female counterparts had more members and more money than we did.

Over the years, the Woman's Relief Corps (prior to 1950) presented paperweights and even a bank to all the members attending a national encampment. Our Auxiliary presented all participants an ashtray at Miami Beach in 1963 and a letter opener in 1981 for the Philadelphia encampment. Even more common, our Commander-in-Chief and National Auxiliary President presented notepads or pen sets as souvenirs. Other items have included ceramic plates, coffee cups and even a 6" high Liberty Bell for our 100th Anniversary in 1981. For some, these were disposable souvenirs that likely were thrown away. For others, they were simply dust collectors, but to those of us who love history they were mementos intended to remind us of friends, Brothers, Sisters and Comrades from days gone by.
