This is the historic district of Shelton. The funding will also help provide for engraving the fallen soldiers' names on the monument.
Additionally, a brick sidewalk will be laid from other walks in the park. This walkway will be curbed in granite engraved with the
names of all of Shelton's Civil War soldiers. Lighting will be installed to illuminate the monument in the evening hours.





- •Imagine a small rural, agrarian community in the middle of the nineteenth century that was Shelton, or Huntington as it was known at that time.
- •This little community was in a State with torn emotions. There was a natural antipathy towards slavery in New England, after all Harriet Beecher Stowe was a Connecticut author. Yet nobody in Connecticut could deny that the fruit of slavery, cotton, was an important produce feeding the region's textile mills.
- •The region's factories built machinery for the South's plantations
- •Connecticut merchants and peddlers, including some from Huntington, sold a vast quantity of goods to the southern plantations.
- •And, even though most Connecticut slaves had been freed by 1821, Slavery was not formally outlawed in Connecticut until 1848.
- •Yet, as the Southern States seceded in late 1860 and early 1861, the 'Nutmeggers' were leaders in efforts to keep the nation united.
- •And, when the Civil War finally erupted, Connecticut soldiers shouldered more than their share of the burdens of this war.

- •The Civil War was the bloodiest war ever fought by this nation, the deaths are equal to the deaths of all other American wars combined.
- •And consider, Connecticut's population was one ninth of its current population.
- •Shelton's population was 1 / 25th of its current size.
- •In Shelton, 310 men were eligible to seive
- •Of these, an unprecedented number of one third (96) of the eligible served. No war including World War II saw such a high percentage of its sons serve in the armed forces.
- •Of those who went, one third were casualties, including:
 - •12 who were killed or died, and
 - •17 missing, who never returned
- •This means that <u>one out of ten</u> of Shelton's sons were gone; that would be equivalent to **750** men in today's terms.

- •These soldiers from Shelton fought in some of the most crucial battles of the Civil War.
- ·You will recognize many of these battles.
- •Fort Wagner, the assault that was made famous in the motion picture, *Glory* included Shelton men. They participated in the second wave of the Union force attempting to storm the fort.
- •During the three months of Grant's overland campaign of 1864, the Union Army's losses equaled the Army's total losses of the previous three years. Shelton men were there.
- •Shelton's men were part of the battle of Five Forks that broke the Confederate lines at Petersburg and lead to the rapid end of the Confederacy.
- •And, the first Infantry Regiment to enter Richmond was the 29th Connecticut Volunteer Colored Infantry Regiment, including two men from Shelton.

Shelton Civil War Memorial ad hoc Committee


- In January 2008, Edward Wittkofski petitioned the City to create a Civil War Memorial.
- City of Shelton established a Committee:
 - to study the possibility of a memorial
 - make a recommendation to the Board of Aldermen
- Committee Members
 - Jim Connery (Chairman), Ed Wittkofski (Vice Chairman), Marty Coughlin, Philip Jones, Guy Beardsley, Al Sabetta, John Formanek, August Firgau, Carolyn Ivanoff (ex officio), and Melissa Anglace (Clerk)

- •The small number of soldiers who returned from the war came to a town about to explode in the Industrial Revolution, and the Civil War veterans were forgotten as their town grew.
- •Finally, in 2008, a petition was given to Shelton's Mayor and Aldermen asking for the creation of an appropriate monument to its forgotten Civil War soldiers.
- •The Board of Aldermen met on March 12, 2008, at which time this Committee was established for the purpose of researching the possibility of creating a memorial to the memory of men from this community who served in the American Civil War.
- •The committee consisted of: Alphonse Sabetta, American Legion/the City of Shelton's Veteran's Affair Advisor; John Formanek, VFW; Edward Wittkofski, Petitioner/SUVCW; James Connery, Civil War Historian/ SUVCW; Guy Beardsley, VFW; Martin Coughlin, President Shelton Historical Society; Philip Jones, Respected City Elder; Augustus Firgau, VFW; Carolyn Ivanoff, Civil War Historian/CWPT Honored Teacher was named as an ex-officio member, and Melissa Anglace served as clerk.


Committee Concept

- Locate it at a place relevant to the Civil War.
- Unique design to emphasize 19th Century.
- Complementary to the Huntington Green
- Recreate the feeling of a Civil War Battlefield.
- Make the Shelton memorial a DESTINATION. for Connecticut Tourism.


- •The question quickly became, "How can we create something new, something old and yet something compatible with the existing landscape?"
- •In the study period, several committee members used their expertise concerning battlefields. Jim Connery is a Gettysburg Licensed Battlefield Guide, Carolyn Ivanoff is an expert on Antietam and the Battle of South Mountain, Ed Wittkofski is experienced concerning the Battles of Ball's Bluff, Shiloh, and Monocacy. This was instrumental in leading the concept development.




- •Discussions at the monthly meetings quickly focused on a location, and after much discussion with historians, the public and City officials all agreed that the appropriate place would on the Huntington Green. This was the spot that Shelton's recruits gathered and marched off to war.
- •The Monument will set at the south end of the Huntington Green; across the street is the early 19c St. Paul's Episcopal Church and the St. Paul's / Huntington Center Cemetery which is the final resting place of many of Shelton's Civil War Veterans. Their graves are still marked with the original Kellogg Post 26 GAR markers.




- •All were in favor of a bronze cast figure of a civil war soldier.
- •Much of the committee visited the Polich Tallix foundry to better understand the process of creating a bronze monument
- •Many conversations were held about the presentation of the bronze figure. Should it be in a serene pose or should it be an action pose? The soldier would face to the south toward Washington.
- •The Chair met with several sculptors and escorted them around town as they sought to set their proposals in context of this community. Originally, we discussed the use of a life-sized figure, but all sculptors who visited the site agreed that the memorial should be larger than life, between seven and eight feet tall.



- •As to the presentation, the members agreed that it should be distinctive and not duplicate older Civil War memorials seen in other Connecticut towns.
- •The committee did, however, want to use some of the elements of those earlier monuments to be presented in a twenty-first century manner.
- •The design should include:
 - •A physical representation of a soldier
 - A pedestal
 - ·A list of Shelton's casualties
 - •This was later modified to include the names of all of the soldiers somewhere on the monument,




The consensus was to create a sense of urgency with an action pose seen in many of the modern war monuments. The members did not want a soldier reflecting the hardness of combat experience but did want a look of youthful innocence and eagerness yet untouched by the horrors of war.



As far as the base of the monument, the Committee agreed that the pedestal should not be quarried stone, but rather should be a natural boulder from the area. These rough rocks would be similar to what was found on many of the Civil War's battlefields. This would tie the monument to the battlefields far to the south.

Our Search for Boulders



- •To this end, there was an offer by Phillip Jones to visit his farm and personally view the boulders available, which the Jones Family would generously contribute.
- •Several candidate rocks were chosen and the Connecticut State Geologist agreed to evaluate the rocks for stability and suitability for the project. He provided a detailed report confirming the committee's choice.

Tribute to our Fallen Heroes



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The names of the casualties would be engraved on a flat boulder placed upright against the pedestal boulder. The Committee also agreed that somewhere in the overall memorial, the names of all soldiers recruited from Shelton would be recognized.



- •The committee invited five sculptors to participate. Four responded. Three of them took the time to visit Shelton before submitting their proposals.
- •The committee discussed them in February 2009, narrowed the choice and made the final determination in March of that year.
- •The committee unanimously selected the presentation by nationally recognized sculptor Gary Casteel of Lexington, Virginia, who specializes in Civil War subjects. We have included pictures of some of his sculptures so you can get an idea of the detail which he incorporates into his work.




•Gary Casteel model is a strong design that portrays a soldier who has just fired his rifle and preparing to reload. He is calling his fellow soldiers to advance. In an artistic statement, he is asking for all of us to join him.

The Shelton Civil War Memorial



- •Finally, this is a computer generated composite image designed to show how this memorial will appear on the Huntington Green. We anticipate this project to take 18 to 24 months to complete after authorization to begin.
- •This monument will consist of a bronze statue representing a Shelton soldier, in the midst of battle, calling all of us to join him. He stands on a natural rock pedestal representing the many battlefields on which Shelton's soldiers fought. There will be a walkway leading to the monument and lighting will illuminate it. The walkway will be curbed with granite with the names of the 84 survivors of the war.



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The cost break-out for this project:

- •The bronze monument will cost \$98,500 which includes its installation.
- •Moving the boulders will approximate \$15,000 (this work is being provided as a donation).
- •Granite curbing and all engraving will approximate \$20,000.
- •Walkway and lighting are estimated to be \$10,000.
- •Project reserve will be \$14,000.
- •Thus, with the donated labor we estimate the total cost to approximate \$142,500.



•As we approach the 150th anniversary of the American Civil War, we believe that it is important to remember those unsung heroes of the 19th century who helped to give birth to a nation founded on the principles espoused in the Declaration of Independence. Mr. Lincoln alluded to them in his immortal Gettysburg Address when he spoke of "...a new birth of freedom..." under a "...government of the people, by the people, and for the people..."



A Time to Remember



Shelton's Deadliest War
