33-HA-0006 – HAMILTON COUNTY MEMORIAL BUILDING (“MEMORIAL HALL”)

Description:

“Hamilton County Memorial Building with six military figures representing the American Revolution through the Spanish-American War on the cornice of the front exterior” (CMC, 2020)

Building-stone: “Buena Vista stone” -- fine sandstone to coarse siltstone -- quarried at Buena Vista, Ohio [for a discussion of this building-stone and a history of its use, see Hannibal and Davis, 1992, p. 15.]

Location: 1235 Elm Street Cincinnati, Ohio (northwest corner of Elm Street and Grant Street, in the “Over-the-Rhine” neighborhood; opposite Washington Park)

Comments: Built at the behest of and with the advice of the local posts of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR), including Elias Riggs Monfort, who later served as C-in-C of the GAR. For many years, various posts of the GAR met in this building.

33-HA-0007 – BUST OF FRIEDRICH HECKER

Description:

“Bust of Friedrich Hecker (1811-1881) who served as a brigadier general in the Union Army. Hecker fled Germany after the unsuccessful 1848 Revolution.” (CMC, 2020)

“Statue: marble Base: Tennessee marble” (CMC, 2020) [for a discussion of this building-stone and a history of its use, see Hannibal and Davis, 1992, p. 15.]

Location: Washington Park, Cincinnati, Ohio (in the “Over-the-Rhine” neighborhood)

Comments: “Hecker (1811-1881), a refugee from the unsuccessful democratic German revolution of 1848, was a writer and philosopher. The Cincinnati *Turngemeinde*, a social, cultural, educational, and athletic organization which he founded, was the first Turner society in the country and is now the oldest. The large Central *Turnhalle* -- Turner Hall – stood at 1409-1413 Walnut Street. Hecker served as a brigadier general in the Union army. The German inscription on the monument's base honors his fight for freedom "in the old and new Fatherlands." (Giglierano, Overmyer, and Propas, 1988, p. 100)

33-HA-0008 – COL. ROBERT L. McCOOK MONUMENT

Description:

“Col. Robert L. McCook Monument. Bust on top of three-part base.” (CMC, 2020)

“Statue: marble Base: granite” (CMC, 2020)

Location: Washington Park, Cincinnati, Ohio (in the “Over-the-Rhine” neighborhood)

Comments: “Robert McCook (1827-1862) commanded the 9th Ohio Volunteer Infantry Regiment, Cincinnati's all-German unit. He was killed when Confederate troops captured the hospital train on which he was riding.” (Gigliano, Overmyer, and Propas, 1988, p. 100; but see Warner, 1964, p. 297 – not a “train” in the modern sense).

Description:

“Monument for the 5th Ohio Volunteer Infantry Regiment, topped by a drum and eagle. It is patterned after the 5th OVI monument at Gettysburg that was erected in fall 1887. Common design elements are the flag-draped gun, owl, stars, and infantry knapsack. The Gettysburg monument does not have the drum and eagle.” (CMC, 2020)

“Gravemarker monument for General William Haines Lytle. Tall column with an eagle at the top. The base of the monument contains a bronze relief of the Battle of Chickamauga. The column is severed to represent a life cut short and the eagle's head is bowed in grief. General Lytle died at the age of 36 at the Battle of Chickamauga” (CMC, 2020)
