

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
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

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THE LINCOLN MEMORIAL

The 12-foot bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln before you was dedicated on November 11, 1930. On Armistice Day of 1930, a crowd estimated at 40,000 crowded the intersection of Monroe Street and Main Avenue to watch the unveiling of the presidential statue. Because Lincoln had used the telegraph to command Union troops, organizers arranged to have President Hoover, via the White House, trigger the unveiling by pressing a golden telegraph key. At 1:05 p.m. the signal went out from the White House tripping a mechanism that released a large balloon. The balloon lifted two American flags, unveiling the statue.

The idea for the statue came from the city's numerous patriotic groups, including the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Washington, Department of Alaska and the Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic. During the unveiling, the president of the Lincoln Memorial Association told the crowd that the statue reveals "the dignity, the strength, the power and the kindly sympathy" of Lincoln. At the time, the statue was said to be the only known monument depicting the President in a standing position. Seattle sculptor Alonzo Victor Lewis was commissioned in 1923 to create the bronze statue for \$25,000. The statue was intended to honor those who fought in the Civil War. Money was slow to come in, however, and organizers turned to every citizen even schoolchildren, to contribute pennies and nickels.

Lewis spent two years etching the piece from 4 tons of clay. The model sat in the artist's studio for several years while Spokane organizers sought to raise the balance of the \$25,000 commission. It is said that Lewis could have sold the sculpture to other cities that wanted it, but he remained dedicated to his agreement with Spokane.

When this statue was erected racial discrimination held its grip over the nation. Lincoln was revered more for saving the Union than he was for freeing the slaves. In 1930, Spokane's intent for the statue was to be a focal point for Veterans Day events not a statement supporting equality. Following the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. in 1968, however, a group of residents marched from East Spokane to the Lincoln statue carrying signs condemning racism.

# SPOKANE'S FOUR-SCORE VETERANS OF GRAND ARMY AND 40,000 DEDICATE MEMORIAL TO EMANCIPATOR

Spokane's monument to Abraham Lincoln was unveiled at 1 % o clock today by Herbert Hoover The president pressed the gold telegraph key at the White House at Washington, D. C.

No greater mass of humanity had ever gathered in one place in Spokane than that which witnessed the unveiling and dedication of this statue.

It was estimated 40.000 packed the six streets which met at the monument. The crowd extended one and a half block seast on Main, a half block north onto the Monroe street bridge, part way down Main westward into Peaceful valley, and a block south on Monroe and west on Riverside.

They hung from the windows and balconies of the surrounding huildings And they all stood quietly threaghout the Fresident Hoover sent the following telegram as he pressed the golden key

"The thought of Abraham Lincoln instituely recurs on everoccasion when the conception of healing peace following conflict is in mind it is most fitting therefore that should dedicate thistatue on this day consecrated to the memories of these whose sacrifices in the World war led the memories of these whose sacri-

ceremonies, which culminated in the dedication of the monument to the Grand Army of the Republic, department of Washington and Alaska.

It was a truly colorful sight, and inspiring moment, that stirred men, women and children alike As the telegraphic impulse from the White House was received at the mechanism at the base of the memorial, the two large American flags which draped the big bronze were lifted slowly and majestically into the air by the huge captive balloon floating above.

At that moment a cheer broke from the throats of the thou ands gathered there. It rose and swelled like the tone of a mighty organ and blended with the hymnal strains of "The Star-Spangled Banner" played by the joint bands of North Central and Lewis and Clark high schools.

Senator C C. Dill opened the coremonies at 12.40 p. m

Other items regarding the dedication from that issue were obtainable and included.

At 1:05 p.m. on Nov. 11, 1930, the signal went out from the White House over Western Union Telegraph wire, tripping a mechanism that released a large Richfield Oil Company balloon brought to Spokane from Los Angeles by the company for the event. The balloon lifted two American

A band of 150 students from Lewis and Clark and North Central high schools played. Airplanes dropped colored streamers. The crowd sprawled out in four directions along intersecting streets. People spilled onto the south end of the Monroe Street Bridge.

The idea for the statue came from the city's numerous patriotic groups, including the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Washington and Alaska, a group formed after the Civil War to advocate for Union veterans, and its affiliate, the Daughters of the Grand Army of the Republic.

During the unveiling, the president of the Lincoln Memorial Association told the crowd that the statue reveals "the dignity, the strength, the power and the kindly sympathy" of Lincoln.

At the time, the statue was said to be the only known monument depicting Lincoln as commander in chief of the Union forces. An Army coat rests over his right shoulder; his stovepipe beaver hat in his left hand.

Seattle sculptor Alonzo Victor Lewis was commissioned in 1923 to create the bronze statue for \$25,000, and brought his command of historic detail to the project.

Reported to be a descendant of Meriwether Lewis, Alonzo Victor Lewis was a colorful figure.

The University of Washington art professor raised a fuss in Seattle when he created a "doughboy" bronze as a World War I memorial in Seattle. It depicted an Army soldier carrying one or two German helmets around his pack and showing what some thought was a crazed look in the

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soldier's eyes. The German helmets were mysteriously removed.

His other sculptures include a Lincoln statue in Tacoma and a "sourdough" miner in Sitka, Alaska. In 1939, the Washington Legislature declared him the state's sculptor laureate.

Statue organizers in Spokane initially hoped to unveil the monument in June 1923 during an encampment of the Grand Army veterans in Spokane that year. The statue was intended to honor those who fought in the Civil War.

Money was slow to come in, and organizers turned to schoolchildren, who contributed pennies and nickels in a fund drive that old-timers in Spokane recalled for many years afterward.

Lewis spent two years carving the piece from 4 tons of clay. The model sat in his studio for several years while Spokane organizers sought to raise the balance of the \$25,000 commission.

One news report said Lewis could have sold the sculpture, and that other cities wanted it, but he remained committed to his deal with Spokane, where he is said to have lived for a time before moving to Seattle.

Once the money was raised in 1930, the clay model was shipped to New York, where it was cast in bronze and returned to Spokane by rail.

In 1930, racial discrimination held its grip over the nation. Lincoln was revered more for saving the Union than he was for freeing the slaves, and the statue – a half block from Lincoln Street – had been a focal point for Veterans Day events.

Following the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. in 1968, a group of mostly young residents marched from East Spokane to the Lincoln statue carrying signs decrying racism.

Honest Abe, the Great Emancipator, holds an honored place in the heart of Spokane.

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A bronze statue of the 16th president - depicting him as commander in chief of the Union Army - towers above the boulevard between the U.S. Courthouse and public library downtown. Its unveiling in 1930 drew 40,000 people in an outpouring of patriotism.

This Thursday, on the 200th anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birth, a delegation from the Esther Reed Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution will return to the Lincoln statue for a commemorative wreath-laying at noon.

America without Lincoln would be hard to imagine. His integrity, strength, compassion and humility define American leadership.

"We wouldn't have the Union as we know it today," said Christine Durkoop Olson, historian for the DAR in Spokane.

Lincoln was born on Feb. 12, 1809, and died on April 15, 1864.

The wreath-laying will be part of a month of Lincoln Bicentennial activities in Spokane.

Among educational activities, students in the West Valley School District are holding penny drives in elementary schools and studying slavery and race relations in middle and high schools.

West Valley is also teaming up with the Spokane Symphony to teach the lessons of Lincoln. Hundreds of the district's students will view the national Lincoln teach-in at the Fox theater. The symposium later in the month is a collaboration of West Valley, the symphony and Lincoln scholars from

Eastern Washington University. It is part of the district's emerging emphasis on citizenship.

"We're trying to create a continual awareness of what it means to be civically engaged," said Assistant Superintendent Gene Sementi.

Students are focusing on two speeches – the dramatically short Gettysburg Address in 1863 and his Second Inaugural Address.

Lincoln's 200th birthday, Sementi said, is "a wonderful opportunity to get our kids down into the Fox theater," which itself is an important part of city history.

The symphony's premiere performance of "Letters from Lincoln" elevates Spokane's bicentennial observance to a national stage. It draws together the work of renowned composer Michael Daugherty with the vocals of Thomas Hampson, a Spokane native and leading opera singer in New York. Music director Eckart Preu chose Daugherty "because his music is rich with cultural and political allusions and bears the stamp of classic modernism."

At the Chase Gallery at Spokane City Hall, six artists are showing pieces in a study of Lincoln's legacy, including inkon-clayboard panels by Whitworth University associate professor Scott Kolbo.

His drawings are taken from famous portraits and photographs of the Civil War era. A pair of panels shows the contemplative Lincoln juxtaposed with cotton-picking slaves.

"The country teetered on the brink of falling apart," Kolbo said. "There was a lot of danger the country was going to split into a million different factions."

The Gettysburg Address, in particular, showed Lincoln's humility and grace during the darkness of the Civil War, Kolbo said.

That speech, honoring the Gettysburg battlefield dead, called for "a new birth of freedom" so that a nation "of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth."

Jerrelene Williamson, president of the Northwest Black Pioneers in Spokane, said Lincoln's leadership "meant new beginning for black people" that has continued with the civil rights movement under Martin Luther King Jr. and the inauguration last month of President Barack Obama as the nation's first black president.

Former U.S. Rep. George Nethercutt said he's been studying Lincoln in recent months and considers him the greatest president.

"If the South had prevailed," he said, "who knows what kind of country we would have been."

Bicentennial events honor Lincoln's life, legacy February 8, Four hundred Spokane-area schoolchildren, most of them from West Valley School District, filled the seats of the Martin Woldson Theater at the Fox on Thursday as part of a national bicentennial teach-in on Abraham Lincoln.

Thursday marked the 200th anniversary of Lincoln's birth on Feb. 12, 1809.

Three historians and a moderator answered questions from students over a live webcast from the National Archives in Washington, D.C., shown on a large video screen at the Fox.

West Valley schools over the past year have emphasized civic engagement as part of their history and social studies curriculum, and they focused this month on Lincoln because of his significance to American democracy and race relations.

"We thought it was a great opportunity for our kids to be able to come down here," said City School teacher Jason Remington. "Obviously we learn a lot about Lincoln, but never to this kind of depth or the knowledge we got today. I think they learned a lot. I think there are a lot of interesting facts here that most kids don't get from a textbook."

Erika Folmer, a seventh-grader at City School, said she was thrilled to be at the Fox and found one detail most interesting: "I didn't know he had kids, how well he was as a father."

Lincoln was devoted to the oldest of his four sons after two of the younger ones died, the children were told.

"It's a really good chance to learn, to figure out, to see a professional view of the story," Folmer said.

The event demonstrated the potential for expanding student knowledge through Web-based learning. The program used

Cathy McMorris Rodgers read a statement from the congresswoman to be entered into the Congressional Record on Thursday acknowledging the observance.

The event was organized by the Esther Reed Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. "He had honor, strength and courage," said Julie Pittman, regent of the chapter. "May we continue to remember Abraham Lincoln. May he always stand tall here in Spokane."

In an interview, Pittman said that Lincoln's decisions and his ability to define the principles of the Declaration of Independence led directly to the Civil Rights movement of the 20th Century and helped pave the way for the election of President Obama, the country's first black president.
