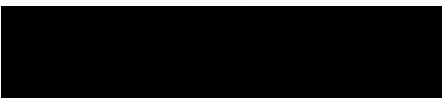

TEXT

This is an outstanding representation of a Civil War Veteran. The GAR insignia on the east and west side of the monument are identical and very well maintained. The metal is polished and the colors are crisp, as seen in the photos taken. There does appear to be some cracks in the cannon balls on the top of the pedestal, but it appears they have been there since it was erected. I notices some light corrosion on the soldiers back right side, but not extensive. The area where the monument lies is about 200 feet from a busy street that leads out to Fort George Wright and old well maintained frontier fort. The grounds are beautifully kept. There is a large fir tree to the south of the monument and a large birch tree to the east. The west and north have no such cover. I would estimate about 200 Civil War markers in the surrounding area. The people at the cemetery were very helpful and welcoming. As a retired officer it has been an honor to chronicle this memorial.

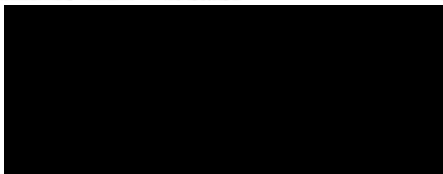

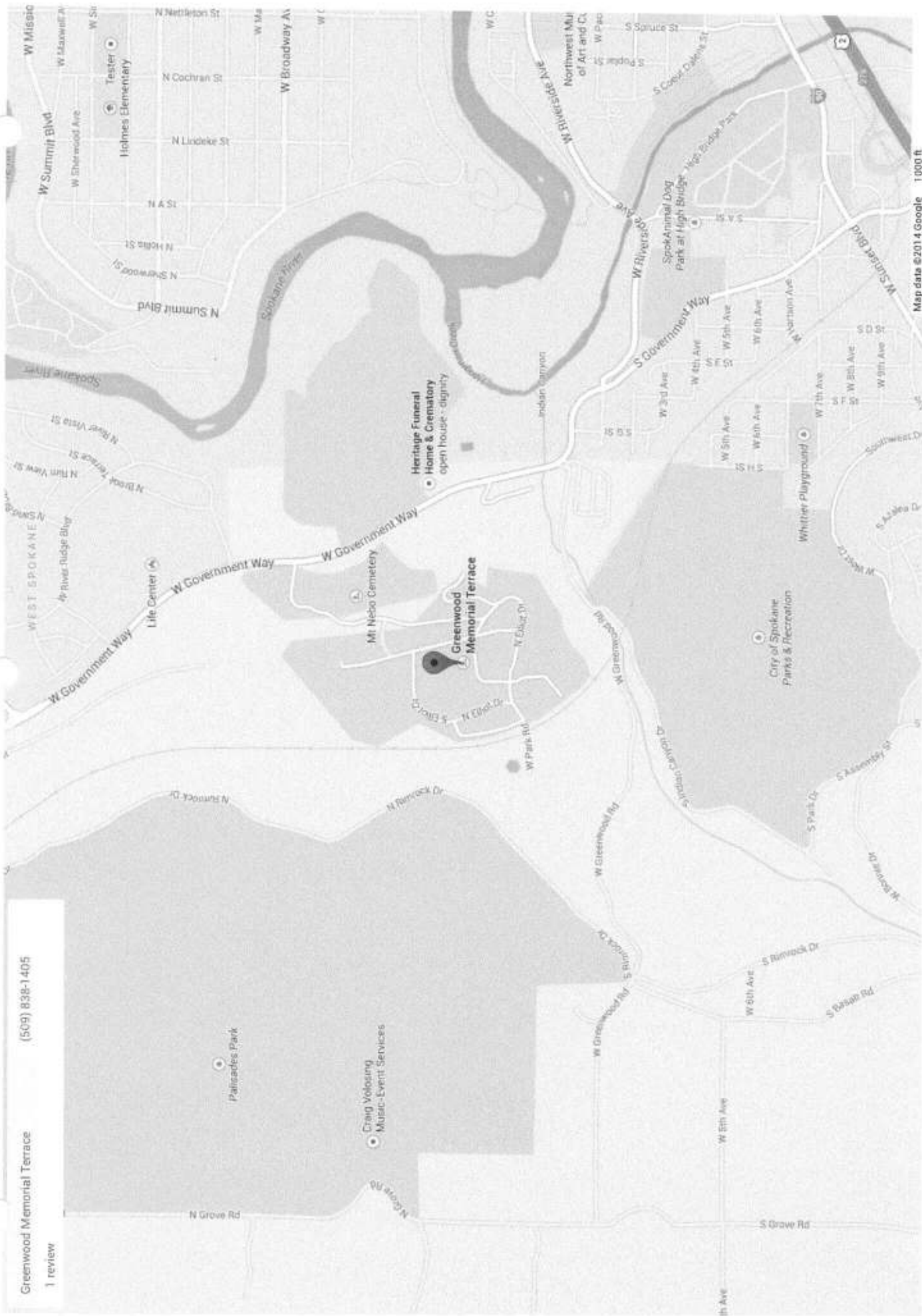

SPOKANE 60 Years Ago

From Spokane Daily Chronicle
Oct. 10, 1904

There is a movement on foot which is liable to increase the number of "pioneers" in this city to a very large extent. There are many people in the city who are not now eligible to membership in the Spokane Pioneers' society but who, if this new rule is adopted, may wake up some morning and find themselves full-fledged pioneers of the northwest.

When the Spokane Pioneer society was formed, the limit was set at 1884 and to have the honor of being a pioneer, one must prove that he came here before that date.

It is now proposed to extend that date to 1888 and thus allow many who have hitherto been barred from joining to enjoy the privileges of the society.

* * *

BETWEEN \$300 and \$400 was made by the ladies of the Women's Relief corps who conducted the lunch counter at the Interstate Fairgrounds this past week. This money has been added to the monument fund, and a monument on the G.A.R. plot at Greenwood is assured. The monument is to be dedicated to the "unknown" of the civil war and

will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,800 to \$2,000.

* * *

THE TOTAL paid attendance at the Interstate Fair this year is estimated at about 32,184, with an additional paid attendance of 16,966 to the grandstand.

* * *

ONE of the largest real estate deals which has been consummated in the vicinity of Sprague for some time was closed during the week, when T. N. Lynch, and his son, F. A. Lynch, sold a farm consisting of 720 acres of fine wheat to J. A. Walker of Oregon and John Brislaw of Sprague for \$22,000.

* * *

TURKEYS are very scarce, almost an unknown commodity on the market so far this season, only two or three small shipments having been received. A shipment of eastern live turkeys was received this morning. The fowls were brought to Spokane by an emigrant, in a miscellaneous car of household goods and farm implements. The farmer received 16 cents a pound for his turkeys in Spokane, while in the east, 8 cents is the price paid to the producer.

TRIBUTE TO VALOR AND TO WOMEN'S DEVOTION

Hon. C. S. Voorhees Delivers an Eloquent Address at Monument.

At the unveiling of the G. A. R. monument at Greenwood cemetery yesterday Hon. C. S. Voorhees made a most eloquent address that stirred all hearers. Owing to the fact that the street car service was not sufficient to accommodate many who might have listened to this address, the speech is published in full, at the request of the Grand Army veterans. It is as follows:

"That valor which has wrought the freedom of a race has in all ages inspired the hearts of men, and of women, too, to the erection of such memorials as shall fittingly emphasize the enduring and far-reaching results of its timely exertion.

"That patriotic magnanimity which enriches a country's history with such steadfast and unflinching resistance to disloyalty and disunion as to challenge the reverence of remotest generations, has never failed of appropriate recognition by a grateful people in its memorials of brass and marble.

"Since the very dawn of human history no service rendered by man has ever ranked with that which has bared the patriotic breast to the steel of those who would assail the institutions of a well beloved and long established government. A country's glory has ever been foremost in the hearts and minds of men, and the opportunity of guarding and preserving it, with their hearts' best blood, has ever been embraced with patriotic zeal and fervor.

Nothing of His Genius.

"It is related of Aeschylus, one of the three great tragic poets of Greece, that, having filled his time, and all time, with the splendor of his genius, he wrote the epitaph which should, from his tomb, speak of his greatest and most memorable achievement.

"In that epitaph no child of his genius was accorded a place.

"On that tomb no story of his poetic greatness was written.

"He spoke of himself as an exile from his native land, and rested his fame solely upon the part taken by him in the battle of Marathon.

"At no time in the world's history has an assault upon a country's institutions so stirred the hearts of men to such high and unselfish heroism as that which sprang from the iron jaws of the guns of disunion at Fort Sumter.

"Through four years of bloody stress marched the defenders of the Union, until, at Appomattox, the curtain fell upon the greatest tragedy in human history, from which has reared its lofty crest the giant civilization of all the ages and the blood of which has cemented and made enduring a republic, the like of which has never been known amongst men.

"Each survivor of that terrific internecine strife makes known the eminent part borne by him in his country's defense by an emblem loftier, in sentiment, than the cross of the Legion of Honor, and more eloquent far than the epitaph of Aeschylus. To whatsoever heights of material success in the paths of peace the old soldier has ascended; whatever of civic honors may have been bestowed upon him; whatever of poetic or of literary celebrity may have sought him out; whatever of renown in the arts and sciences he may have achieved; the little bronze button of the Grand Army of the Republic tells, from the veteran's coat, the story, more thrilling and lasting than all beside, of his presence at the Marathons of his country's history.

"In each of the graves which surround this beautiful memorial there rests all that is mortal of some intrepid spirit, who, emerging unscathed from the carnage of many a bloody field, has sought the fields of endeavor which line the paths of peace in this great commonwealth.

The Story of the Dead.

"Could these pulseless hearts again be quickened and these silent lips again speak the story of their heroism, might we not learn that, amongst these silent battalions are those who resolutely abided with fighting Joe Hooker above the clouds of Lookout Mountain? Might not the voices from out these narrow homes tell us that, with the Rock of Chickamagua, their inmates added imperishable luster to American arms? Would they tell us that, in striving for the preservation of their country's institutions, they stood in the 'Bloody angle' at Gettysburg? May we not hear them telling of the lost field of Chancellorsville, and hear them cheering the greatest of American commanders at the siege of Vicksburg? May we not, with attentive ear hear their tread as they are marching with Sherman to the sea?

"And from those who were a part of that great war, and who still abide upon the shores of time, come many a tale of high endeavor and of unselfish fortitude at Chattanooga, Cold Harbor, Shiloh and the Wilderness.

"Does the stupendous and outstripping advancement of this Imperial state excite any sense of surprise or wonderment when it is remembered that it is wrought by the devoted allegiance of thousands of those upon whose loyal intrepidity depended the successful issue of a war the like of which has never been known in the world's history? With the aid of such a citizenry there can be no condition of material advancement to which the state of Washington may not aspire. Men educated and trained in the hard school of war, and their descendants, necessarily move on to great achievements. High minded in their every pur-

pose, they have helped to build the state, and in all the years to come they and their descendants will guard and preserve it.

What Constitutes a State?

"What constitutes a state?

Not high-raised battlements or labored mound,

Thick wall or moated gate,

Not cities proud, with spires and turrets crowned,

Not bays and broad-armed ports

Where laughing at the storm rich navies ride;

Nor starred and spangled courts,

Where low-browed baseness wafts perfume to pride;

No! Men, high-minded men.

With powers as far above dull brutes endowed,

In forest, lake or glen

As least excel cold rocks and brambles made

Men who their duties know,

But know their rights and knowing dare maintain,

These constitute a state.

"And this stat-ly commemoration has a place in the history of our times so that, in future years, the memory of the martial and civic virtues of these men who have outlived the march and the bivouac to take an ample part in the upbuilding of a proud American state, and to aid in uncovering the as-

lounding riches of Alaska, may never be dimmed, but that as long as time shall endure, the contemplation of such virtues may stimulate and animate American citizenship.

Honor to Women.

"The honor thus conferred is multiplied many fold in the reflection that this exquisite creation springs into being at the behest of American womanhood, and owes every line of its surpassing grace and majestic beauty to the deft hands of the Woman's Relief Corps No. 14, auxiliary to the J. L. Reno Post No. 47, of the Grand Army of the Republic, department of Washington and Alaska.

"The gentle hands of the sweethearts and wives, by such artistic endeavor as was meet for them, toiled and wrought for the means requisite for the acquisition of this superb tribute to American valor, and have thus entwined it with memories which shall abide with it forever.

"Every dollar so secured and devoted to this uprearing is a jewel in the crown of Spokane's splendid womanhood, and hereafter when the significance of this achievement shall be unfolded to the children of the future, they will be told of the toll and sacrifice of the women of the Grand Army of the Republic, which thus enriched the times in which they lived, to the end that a knowledge of the sublime ideals of the past may ensure a better citizenship for the future.

"As during all the battle years of the republic, American women have ever been the hovering angels of every stricken field, and have, by their tender ministrings, smoothed the way to immortality for those who, having laid their lives upon their country's altar, lingered yet a little while, so, in the serene years of the peace of a reunited land, their gentle zeal to honor those of their country's defenders who have passed into the great blaze of eternity is constantly cheering, on their way to the last bivouac, those who yet remain.

"Women of the Grand Army of the

"Women of the Grand Army of the Republic, to you belong all the honor and the glory of this very pronounced achievement.

"May I not, with propriety, upon this occasion assume to speak for the old soldiers of Washington and Alaska in conveying to you a boundless appreciation of your noble remembrance of their comrades who are tenting on the other shore, and in invoking for you the choicest blessings of the God of battles and of peace?

"May I not, on their behalf, and in their name, lay at your feet the unending gratitude of the old soldiers' heart, and bespeak your acceptance of it?

The Confederate Gray.

"May I not particularly direct your attention to the significance of the presence here of American hearts which, beneath Confederate gray, are beating to the music of the Union, come to unite with those who wore the blue, in acknowledgment to you for thus honoring the memory of those who have passed from life's alarms, with whom, in the long ago, they contended in fratricidal strife?

"Will you not agree that their presence here is most eloquent and full of meaning, proclaiming, as it does, that the gaping wounds, inflicted by that prolonged and deadly strife, have healed and been forgotten, and that, as one country and one people, under the folds of one flag, we face one hope and one destiny?

"And now the sacred charge of this memorial is committed by its gentle architects to the veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic, to those who yet remain to tell of the times when

"The bugles sang truce to the night-clouds that lowered,
And the sentinel stars set their watch
in the sky,
While thousands sank to the ground
overpowered,
The weary to sleep and the wounded
to die"

"In all your lives no charge environed by sweeter and loftier memories has ever been committed to your keeping.

"As through all the vicissitudes of peace and war you have, with abiding patriotism, kept watch and guard of your country's honor and glory, so, in the future, you will keep such watch and guard of this consecrated charge as that all the coming years of the republic shall know the measureless appreciation in which you hold the gentle spirits whose high resolve has invoked your guardianship, and the unsounded depths of your reverence for those the memory of whose valorous deeds is thus perpetuated.

"Take it and guard it with 'your lives, your fortunes and your sacred honors.'"

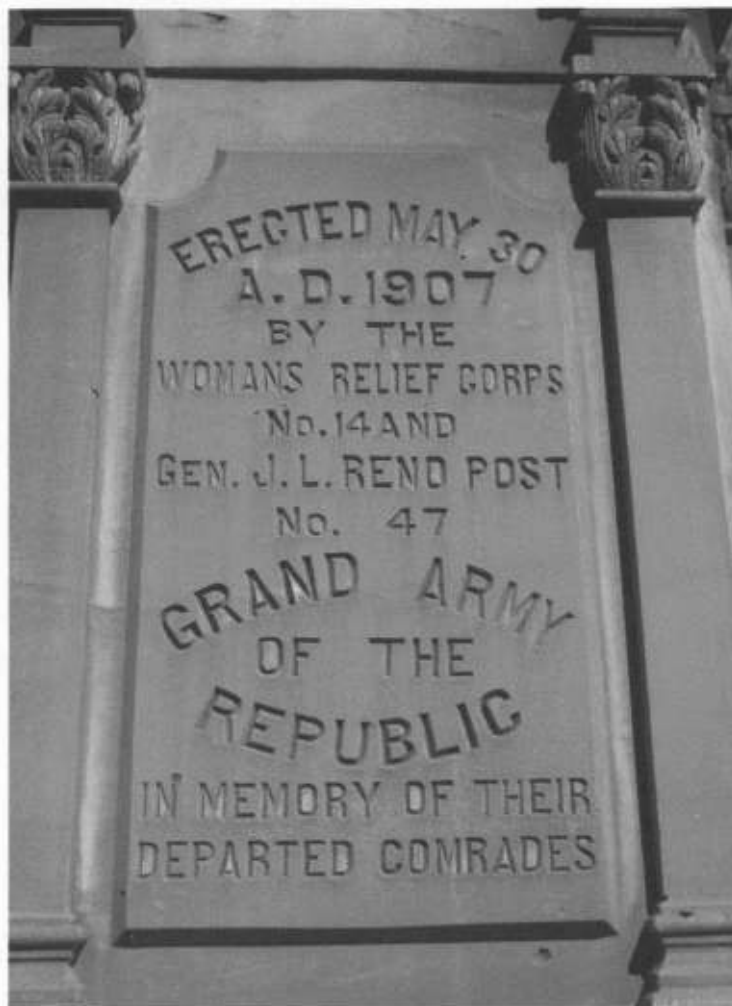

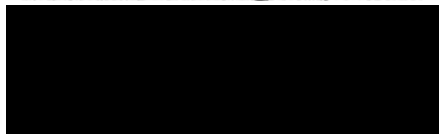

TO UNVEIL MONUMENT

**Soldiers of Grand Army
Will Commemorate Dec-
oration Day.**

Arrangements have been completed for the Memorial day ceremonies tomorrow. In the morning details from Reno and Sedgwick posts of the Grand Army accompanied by committees of ladies from the relief corps, will proceed to Greenwood and Fairmount cemetery where the graves of the dead veterans will be decorated with flowers and greenery made up in wreaths and in bulk.

Promptly at 11:30 o'clock in the afternoon the members of Reno and Sedgwick posts will report in uniform at the corner of Bernard and Riversides. The parade will be formed under the command of J. E. Clark, chief marshal of the day, who will be assisted by Dr. John G. Byrne and Peter Ruex of Guggenau college cadets. All three will be in uniform and mounted. All soldiers and marines, not affiliated with the G. A. R. Posts, have been invited to join in the parade and it is expected that a large number of them will accept the invitation.

Formation of Parade.

All military organizations are requested to be at the corner of Riverside and Bernard promptly at 1 o'clock p. m. when they will be assigned to places in the parade as follows: Platoon of elite police; the United States military from Fort Wright, headed by the United States Bugle corps; Washington National Guard; Uniform Rank of the Knights of Pythias and all other uniformed orders; two companies of Guggenau college cadets; headed by the college band; Spanish-American war veterans; department commander of Washington and Alaska with the department colors and staff; visiting posts of the G. A. R.; Sedgwick post of the G. A. R.; Reno post of the G. A. R. with drum corps. The school children prettily dressed and bearing the national colors and flowers, will bring up the rear.

The line of march will be from Bernard street, on Riverside, to Monroe street and the parade will pass in review before Governor Mead and staff, Mayor Moore, Col. Feibinger, Col. N. E. Lindsay, Hon. C. B. Voorhes and other speakers of the day. A special car will conduct the reviewing staff to the cemetery and cars will be run in trains of eight for the accommodation of the general public. On arrival at the cemetery the line of march will be re-formed the same as on Riverside and the parade will be continued in the plot containing the monument, the unveiling of which is to be the principal part of the ceremonies.

The United States soldiers will be drawn in a cordon around the plot containing the monument and will fire the national salute as Mrs. Frances Kirby, president of the W. R. C., draws away the veil enshrouding the memorial. Speeches will be delivered by Governor Mead, Mayor Moore, Judge A. G. Kellum, C. B. Denning, O. W. Van Osdal, and others. The Kirk's quartet will supply the vocal music.

MAYOR VETOES UTILITIES BILL

**McClellan Calls It Harmful
to Principle of Home
Rule.**

NEW YORK, May 28.—Mayor McClellan today recorded his official disapproval of the public utilities bill, which he sent back to the legislature, where, it is expected, it will be re-passed without the mayor's signature.

In a memorandum accompanying the measure the mayor explains that while he is in accord with the general principles embodied in the bill, it is as a whole so destructive of the principle of home rule that but one course was open to him. This was his basic objection, but the mayor adds, in effect, that such legislation would result inevitably in the appointment of partisan commissioners who in times of party stress would use their power to coerce the transportation companies into furnishing funds with which to corrupt the electorate. Mayor McClellan says in part:

"For the first time in the history of our state there are to be created two administrative bodies vested with power heretofore exclusively exercised by the legislature, of regulating rates and fares of steam railroads, steam and elevated railroads, gas, electric light and power companies. The combined capitalization of these companies is \$3,327,537,919; the gross earnings from operation last year were approximately \$22,000,000; the number of employees upward of 100,000, and the number of security holders not less than 100,000.

"The commissioners are to be appointed by the governor, and as they may be removed by him or his successors they will become the direct representatives and agents of each succeeding governor."

CAUSE TO REJOICE

Wives of the Veterans Were Congratulated on Their Work.

One of the features of the monumental dedicatory ceremonies at Green-Wood cemetery yesterday afternoon was an address by Melissa V. Stewart, departmental president of the Women's Relief corps. She traced briefly the work which has been done since the organization of this auxiliary of the Grand Army post. The assistance which the women had given to the other was pointed out and their hopes for the future and the objects of the organization clearly explained.

Referring to the memorial, she said that it would also serve as a monument to the women of J. L. Reno Relief corps No. 14, as, by their untiring efforts, they had succeeded in raising the necessary funds and had worked determinedly and unflinchingly until they had seen their ambitions realized.

Congratulated by the Mayor.

Mayor Moor's speech was of a congratulatory nature. He was proud of the honor done him in requesting that he should deliver an address. He reviewed briefly the events of the Civil War and was thankful that, owing to the efforts of the patriotic sons of the Union, some of whom he saw grouped around him, while others had passed in the great beyond, the country had been preserved as a united whole. The days of the war had passed and gone but the memory of those who fought in the bloody battles that would never be forgotten. By their efforts they had preserved the Union and had left for their children a glorious heritage stretching from the Canadian to the Mexican borders and from the Atlantic to the Pacific oceans, and had left it united and at peace.

He warmly congratulated the women that they had seen their efforts crowned with success in the shape of the magnificent memorial, which would serve to inspire patriotism in the hearts of future generations.

Honor to Veterans.

Judge Kellam's address was of a somewhat similar nature. He honored the gray-headed veterans whom he saw before him because, in the days when the country was threatened with permanent separation, they had rallied to the call of duty and had prevented this catastrophe. He honored even more the men who had passed to the great beyond, whose graves he saw around him, and who had received the reward of work well done. He also warmly congratulated the ladies on the memorial which they had, by their united efforts, succeeded in erecting.

By the Commander.

G. B. Dunning, department commander of the Grand Army for Washington and Alaska, spoke at some length of the organization in which he had the honor to hold such high office. He explained the objects of its formation and the work which it was doing in teaching lessons of patriotism to the rising generations. The members were fast passing away but their memory would, he hoped, forever remain green in the minds of future Americans. He concluded by referring to the Women's Relief corps in terms of warm praise.

The nine quartet entertained the proceedings from time to time by several well rendered selections which were much appreciated by the immense audience. Rev. Dr. O. W. Van Dusen pronounced the benediction, which was followed by the joint Devotion Day ceremonies by Reno and Sedgewick posts. This concluded, the bugle corps sounded "taps" and the proceedings came to a close.

MEMORIAL DAY PLANS ARE MANY

Governor and Mayor Central Figures in Day's Exercises.

With fair weather forecast for today, Spokane has planned to take a day off and observe Memorial day in various ways.

Governor Albert H. Mead arrived yesterday afternoon to take part in the various exercises, including the unveiling of the monument erected by Reno Post No. 11, G. A. R., and Reno, Corps No. 14, W. B. C. in Greenwood cemetery. He also will be present at the exercises on Post street bridge when the Union Veterans union will cast a floral tribute into the river in memory of the dead United States soldiers and sailors who have been drowned. This ceremony, the first of its kind in the state, will require but a few minutes' time.

Crosses of dead soldiers in Greenwood, Fairmount and Fort Wright cemeteries will be decorated with flowers during the morning. At 1 o'clock a parade will form at Riverside avenue and Broadway street and march in review of Governor Mead, Mayor Moore and a number of G. A. R. officials. The line of march will be on Riverside avenue to Lincoln street, on Lincoln street to Spokane avenue, where cars will be taken for Greenwood cemetery. At the cemetery the line will form again and march to the monument.

Unveiling Exercises at Greenwood. The unveiling of the G. A. R. monument will be attended by Archbishop Keenan, Governor Mead, Mayor Moore and many other leading citizens. The Hills stadium will sing patriotic songs. Phyllis A. Kirby, president of Reno corps No. 14, will unveil the monument with the assistance of caterpillars.

The program arranged for the Union Veterans union tribute to their dead comrades calls for a rendezvous at the Victoria hotel at 10 o'clock. Colonel Emory E. Gilbert of the commander's staff will be in charge of the column.

The formation will include troops from the Third United States Infantry, a squad from company H, Washington National guard, Denver 61st regiment by Mrs. Robert Fitzroy, Phil Sheridan regiment No. 4, the 10th Veterans union, Mayor Ed Flanagan, Phil Sheridan regiment, Governor Mead and staff in marching order, Sheriff Moore, Judge Norman Bush and Chief of Police Roy H. Day in carriage.

Decorate Memorial Monument. The line of march will be west on Post street to Sprague avenue, west on Sprague avenue to Missouri street, north on Missouri street to the Memorial monument, where the column will halt and Miss Agnes Monahan, a sister of the fallen hero, Robert Monahan, for whom the monument was erected, will place a wreath of flowers at the base of the statue and Governor Mead will make a brief address.

The column will then proceed to the Post street bridge, marching east on Riverside avenue to Post street and north on Post street in the bridge. A floral wreath will be cast into the river from the bridge. Judge Norman Bush will be in charge of the column.

Many Stores Will Close. The banks, public library, post-office, city hall and all public institutions will have closed doors today in observance of the legal holiday. The clerks in the many offices and

stores will have at least a half holiday, and so fair weather is predicted the park cars and the interurbans and the amateur ball parks and small fishing spots will do a great business.

THIS CEMETERY WAS AUTHORIZED BY THE SECRETARY OF WAR ON DECEMBER 13-1899. REMAINS OF SOLDIERS, OFFICERS AND OTHERS WERE MOVED HERE FROM FORT SPOKANE AND FORT SHERMAN NEAR COEUR D'ALENE IN 1900. THE CEMETERY IS OCCUPIED WITH THE GRAVES OF VETERANS, THEIR WIVES AND OTHER FAMILY MEMBERS. ALL BRANCHES OF THE SERVICE ARE REPRESENTED HERE THERE ARE APPROXIMATELY 650 GRAVES LOCATED HERE.



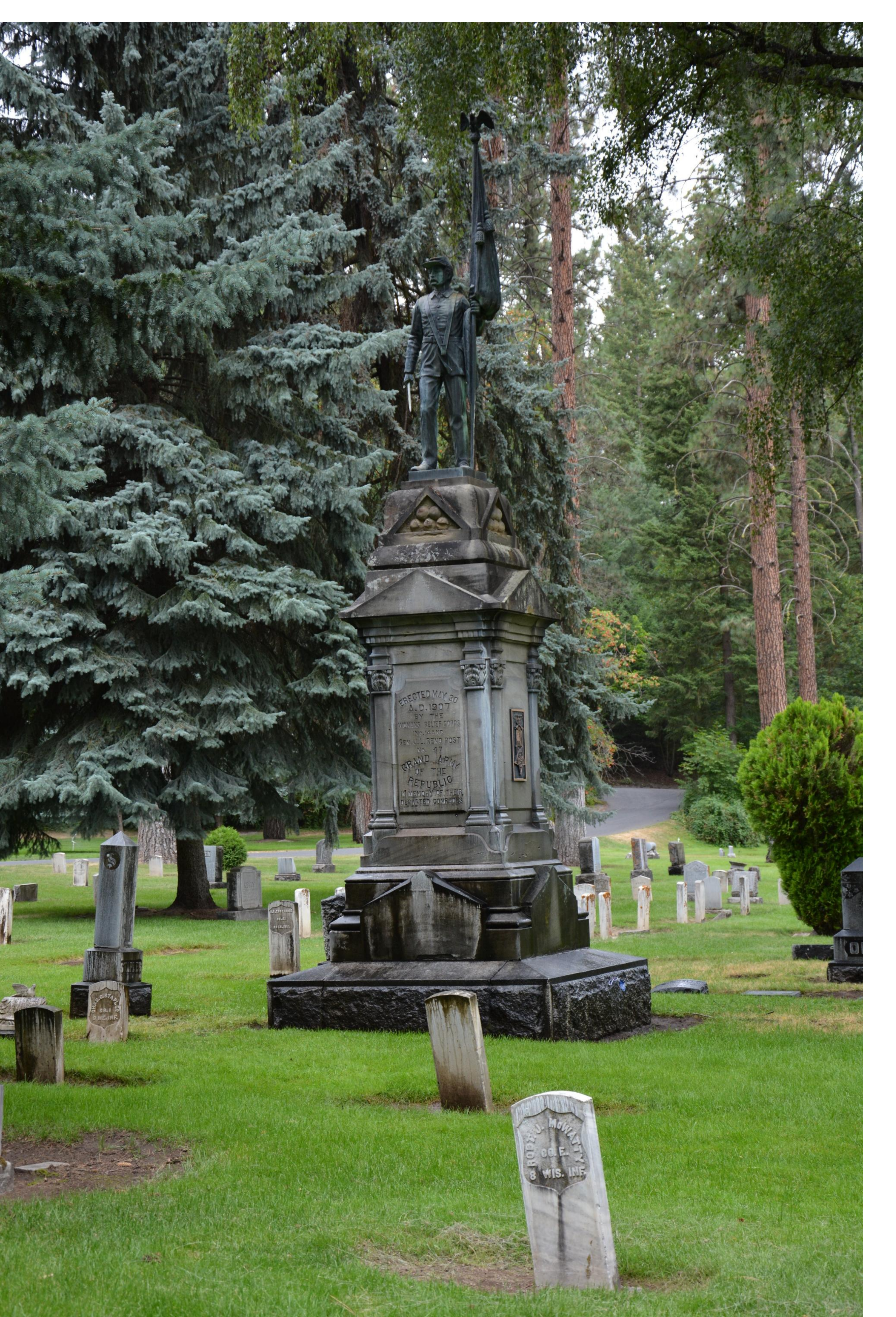
