Stand Watie's Indian regiment were at old Fort Wayne across the line from Maysville. On Oct 21, they moved toward Maysville. Crossing the prairie they found the Confederates lined up on the edge of some timber a quarter mile from the town. Before this superior force they retreated in disorder followed by 6th Kansas Cavalry and the 3rd Cherokee regiment for seven miles.~~

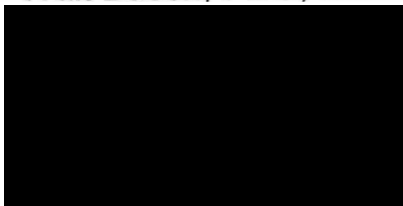
