A. R., who lie buried in the n and tendered her a surprise | Grand Army plot in Chico-cemetery, the local G. A. R. and W. R. C. posts bilowed by a delightful repast. have started a movement to secure the erection of an imposing bronze statue y. Mrs. J. W. -Rockholf-and and pedestal in the veterans' plot-in-the. local cemetery.

The trustees of Halleck Post who have taken preliminary steps in the matter estimate that the total cost of the statue would be \$1100. To launch the campaign for funds to secure the memorial, Adjutant Wm. Bundy has called a foint meeting of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. for Friday night of this week.

The sketch of the proposed memorial, as prepared by William Robbie, provides for an imposing shaft or pedestal surmounted by the figure of a soldier, of a total height of fifteen feet. It is planned to have the figure of the soldier garbed in the uniform of the Union side and standing with hands holding a rifle at rest, done in bronze. This would stand six feet six inches in height.

The shaft or pedestal supporting the figure is to be of granite and will bear the following inscription:

ERECTED BY HALLECK POST, NO. 19. G. A. R. IN MEMORY OF

OUR DEAD COMRADES 1861-1865.
