#### **BACKGROUND AND HISTORY**

Historians attribute the turning point of the Revolutionary War to the Battle of Bemis Heights, or the Second Battle of Saratoga. The battle was fought in October 1777, south of Saratoga Springs at an area known as Bemis Heights. When a Civil War infantry regiment was to be recruited from the area of Saratoga and Essex counties, the State government assigned the Regimental number 40. The organizers of the unit successfully petitioned the Governor to allow the regiment to be named for the historic Revolutionary War battle of 1777. The 77<sup>th</sup> NY Volunteer Infantry Regiment was so enumerated and nicknamed "The Bemis Heights Battalion".

A monument to honor the service of the 77<sup>th</sup> NY Volunteer Infantry Regiment was commissioned circa 1874. According to a history of Saratoga Springs written by Edward H. Fuller, an active member of G.A.R. Post 92 in Saratoga Springs, the monument was purchased and erected with funds of the 77<sup>th</sup> Regiment augmented by public subscriptions. After mustering out of service on June 27, 1865, the Regiment was issued \$500 for unpaid ration money. The veterans decided to use the money to erect a monument. The funds were invested and in ten years grew to \$1,000. On Tuesday, September 21, 1875 the new monument was unveiled in the presence of an estimated 7,000 to 10,000 people. (See dedication photograph.) The monument was originally erected in the northwest corner of Congress Park on land donated by Mr. Cornelius Sheehan, one of the park's owners. The park was bordered on the west by Broadway. Broadway was later widened and an island in Broadway was created where the monument stood. The island was called the "Monument Place". (See the period postcard photograph showing the monument in the "public square" at the new entrance to the park.) With the growing use of the motorcar, the monument was inevitably damaged by motor vehicles. The monument was moved in 1921 to its current location, back within Congress Park.

The 77<sup>TH</sup>'s monument in Saratoga Springs is said to be the only regimental monument not located on a battle field. The 77TH also has a monument at Gettysburg.

\*As the dedication of the monument was only ten years after the war, it is very likely that surviving 77<sup>th</sup> Regiment Officers and men participated and spoke at the dedication.

#### PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

The 20' high monument consists of a granite base and pedestal supporting a cast zinc sculpture of a lifesized, infantry soldier with his arms resting on his rifle. Granite Base and Pedestal: All granite in the monument is Quincy granite. Quincy granite is quarried near Quincy, Massachusetts and is recognized as one of the highest quality granites in the world, prized for its hardness and durability. Nine thousand tons of Quincy granite was used in the 221' high, Bunker Hill Monument. Characterized by its warm gray color accented with black flecks, it is known for its beauty when polished. Polishing Quincy granite provides an excellent contrast to a rough cut or a flame finished form and makes text very readable or accent features stand out.

The base is a 6'-6" square by 18" high block of granite with a sloped top. A 5'-4" square by 14" high, sloped plinth of granite transitions to a 4'-4" square by 20" high, granite coping supporting a 3'-6" square by 4' high, solid granite dye with four equal faces. The dye transitions to and supports a 2'-2" square upper dye. The upper dye is topped by two polished, raised bands with five polished, five-pointed stars between the bands on each face. The band is topped by a cornice of larger dimension which steps up to a platform supporting the zinc sculpture.

On the base coping level, of the predominant southeast face, the following text is inscribed in polished, raised letters:

#### 77 N.Y.S. VOLS.

On the southeast face of the lower dye is a 34" wide by 32" high, bronze plaque artfully accented with a leafed border. The plaque was cast by and is inscribed "The Henry-Bonnard Bronze Co., N.Y. 1889". (Note: The plaque must have been added after the 1875 dedication as it does not appear in the dedication photograph.) The Henry-Bonnard Company was a highly regarded foundry and was selected by Frederic Remington to cast his highly prized, bronze statues. The plaque is inscribed:

THE SEVENTY-SEVENTH REGIMENT,
NEW YORK VOLUNTEERS
(BEMIS HEIGHTS BATTALION)
THIRD BRIGADE, SECOND DIVISION, SIXTH CORPS,
ARMY OF THE POTOMAC
1861 -- \* -- 1865
TOOK PART IN ALL THE CAMPAIGNS OF THE
ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, ALSO IN THE BATTLE OF
FORT STEVENS AT WASHINGTON, D.C. ALSO IN THE
CAMPAIGN IN THE SHENANDOAH VALLEY

UNDER SHERIDAN.

A large Latin cross signifying the Sixth Corps of the Union Army is sculpted on the southeast face of the upper dye in raised, polished relief.

(Note: In Nathaniel Bartlett Sylvester's history of Saratoga county published in 1893, he writes that the monument was inscribed with the following words, in addition to the aforementioned text on the bronze plaque:

RECRUITED IN THE THEN FIFTEENTH CON-GRESSIONAL DISTRICT, COUNTIES OF ESSEX, FOULTON, AND SARATOGA. NO-VEMBER 23, 1861, MUSTERED INTO THE UNITED STATES SERVE AT SARA-TOGA SPRINGS.

MUSTERED OUT JUNE 27, 1865 IN THE DEFENSES OF WASHINGTON, D.C.

ITS TOTAL MEMBERSHIP 1560.

ITS CASUALTIES WERE 60 CAPTURED, 294 WOUNDED, 300 DIED. TOTAL 654.

It is unknown why this additional inscription, as recorded by Sylvester, does not currently appear on the monument.)

**SCULPTURE:** The sculpture was purchased from the J. W. Fiske Company in New York City. Fiske was a merchant of metal products and was primarily a sales organization who outsourced design and casting operations. The statuary selected for the 77<sup>th</sup> NY monument was chosen from a Fiske catalog and was a popular model found in many public, civil war monuments. The statue is assembled from many pieces of cast zinc forming the representation of the civil war soldier in hollow zinc. Typically, the assembled statue was pained brown to resemble bronze, a more expensive material. Cast zinc memorials were also an economic alternative to bronze in the cemetery trade, marketed as "White Bronze".

The statue is well detailed and depicts a Civil War infantryman clothed in a long coat with cape. His belt is properly fitted with a cartridge box, a small percussion cap pouch and bayonet scabbard. His headgear is a forage cap of a kepi or bummer design and his face sports a prominent mustache. His arms are posed resting on his percussion rifle.

#### RESTORATION

In 1986 the City of Saratoga Springs hired a conservator to repair seams in the zinc that had opened. Repairs were made and the statue received a primer coat of paint, a finish coat of deep brown and a protective coating.
