Alfred and Cornelius Walters Soldiers of the Union Alfred and Cornelius Walters of Farmingdale were brothers who worked at their father's shoemaking shop. They, along with eleven others from this area, enlisted in the Union Army during the summer of 1862. As soldiers in the 145th Regiment, New York Volunteer Infantry, the men fought at the battles of Chancellorsville and Gettysburg. Later, they were transfered to the 107th Regiment, New York Volunteer Infantry and fought under General William Tecumseh Sherman in the March to the Sea. Alfred died of disease at Cumberland Hospital, Nashville, Tennessee on January 29, 1865. Cornelius was wounded during the Battle at New Hope Church, Georgia but survived until the end of the war.

Walters' headstone. The headstone is white and in good condition. The engraving is mostly worn away. The dimentions are 55"X22"X10". The second monument is in excellent condition. The dimensions are 23"X12"X4" The second monument is engraved as follows:



ALFRED AND CORNELIUS WALTERS
SOLDIERS OF THE UNION

ALFRED AND CORNELIUS WALTERS OF FARMINGDALE WERE BROTHERS WHO WORKED AT THEIR FATHER'S SHOEMAKING SHOP. THEY, ALONG WITH ELEVEN OTHERS FROM THIS AREA, ENLISTED IN THE UNION ARMY DURING THE SUMMER OF 1862. AS SOLDIERS IN THE 145TH REGIMENT, NEW YORK VOLUNTEER INFANTRY, THE MEN FOUGHT AT THE BATTLES OF CHANCELLORSVILLE AND GETTYSBURG. LATER, THEY WERE TRANSFERRED TO THE 107TH REGIMENT, NEW YORK VOLUNTEER INFANTRY AND FOUGHT UNDER GENERAL WILLIAM TECUMSEH SHERMAN IN THE MARCH TO THE SEA.

ALFRED DIED OF DISEASE AT CUMBERLAND HOSPITAL, NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE ON JANUARY 29, 1865. CORNELIUS WAS WOUNDED DURING THE BATTLE AT NEW HOPE CHURCH, GEORGIA BUT SERVED UNTIL THE END OF THE WAR.
