Lancaster G.A.R. Cemetery Canon

Ames Manufacturing Co.: Cannon foundry at Chicopee (Springfield) Mass. operated by Nathan Peabody Ames and his brother James Tyler Ames. Between 1836, when the firm which had been organized in 1834 began casting cannon, and Nathan's death in 1847, weapons were marked "N.P. Ames, Founder, Springfield, Mass." After this date, when the younger brother became president, marks were "Ames Co., Founders, Chicopee, Mass.", "Ames Mfg. Co., Chicopee, Mass.", or "A.M.Co." with exception of certain weapons, products of this company were bronze.

Nathan Peabody Ames: (1803-1847). President of Ames Manufacturing Co. (q.v.) 1834-47.

Dear Brother Tucker,

Enclosed in this envelope should be the following: 1) an article from the Indiana Weekly Messenger, 2) an article from the Indiana County Gazette, 3) a picture of the cannons on either side of the bandstand in Blairsville, 4) pictures of the cannons as they are today, and 5) the two assessment forms. To summarize, the cannons were loaned to the G.A.R. Post 137 of Blairsville, PA that was through an Act of Congress (assisted by local Congressman Huff of the time). They were placed in the Diamond Square in Blairsville by the McKinley Monument (as depicted in the old picture). In the 1930's, they were moved to the old swimming pool on Morewood Avenue in Blairsville. Then, in the 1940's the cannons were placed in the Blairsville Cemetery in the Veteran's Circle. We are still trying to locate the other two cannons that are mentioned. The only two that anyone knows about (in talking with the elderly ladies at the local historical society) are the two at the Blairsville Cemetery. According to one of their volunteers who says she knows all the cemeteries, the other cemeteries don't either exist, or the cannons are not there. But, we will keep our eyes open.

The only discernable markings on the cannons are as follows: First, the East cannon have the anchor on top of the cannon tube, plus only the number "4" remains on the serial number. The letter "W" remains on the left trunion of the East cannon. The only distinctive marking on the west cannon is the anchor on top of the tube. Weather has taken a toll on the tubes since underneath the paint is rust. It is possible that they were melted down for the World War II scrap drive. Post 28 in Indiana, PA, originally had four cannons and fifty cannonballs. Two of those cannons were sold by the Indiana County Commissioners to the scrap drive of WWII, including the cannonballs. The remaining two cannons plus four cannon balls were restored by Camp 43, the SUVCW Department of PA, National Organization SUVCW, and private donors two years ago. We don't know if the other two Blairsville cannons were given to the scrap drive of WWII (Don't get me wrong. I am not complaining because they helped save American lives. I am merely stating a fact and plausible theory as to the fate of the other two Blairsville cannons), or if it was misreported as to the amount of cannons that was received. The only way to confirm that would be to go to the Navy records in the National Archives and Records Administration in Washington D.C. Then, we would know as to the actual amount that was loaned to the Blairsville G.A.R. Post. We do have a copy of the Navy Records for the cannons in Indiana, PA and the cannons that are in Saltsburg, PA. Indiana County has a total of six known cannons all that were on loan to the G.A.R. Posts. Our next objective (after Saltsburg) is to find the cannons in Greensburg, PA. I found the newspaper articles relating to that, but that is on our "to do" list to locate and document them.

. <u>Headstones</u>

Camp #19 in partnership with the Civil War Explorer Post 1863 have replaced 36 soldiers headstones that were not legible.

Flag pole

The G.A.R. site had an old steel, rusted, not able to be reached and roped flagpole. During 2004 and 2005 SUVCW camp #19 raised funds to have a new flagpole installed. The old flagpole was removed and replaced with a 25' powder coated 1 piece aluminum shaft at a cost of \$2,330.00

The new pole was dedicated at our Memorial Day service held on May 30, 2005

Flags

Prior to Memorial Day each year camp 19 places new flags on each headstone and replaces any damaged or missing Civil War 1861-1865/GAR flag holders.

Cannon Monument

Our current project is to replace the dilapidated concrete cannon base for esthetic and safety reasons.
