#### CONTRACT Page 1 of 3

The Granite Corporation of Barre will restore the Norwell Civil War Memorial per the following specifications:

- -1- Preparing the site for access to the monument. Building a ramp over the perimeter granite coping/curbing to the lawn of the park. Laying a plywood roadway up to the Memorial site and removing same as soon as all the stone has been transported to the off premise work site (Town garage. The immediate removal is necessary to save the sod):...\$775.00
- -2- Dismantle the upright monument (red granite) transport to the provided site for further off-site work (not including the Quincy granite bottom base, which we do not want to disturb, unless we find that it is not setting relatively level: \$1,950.00
- -3- Dismantle the upper level coping/curbing immediately surrounding the memorial, transport it to the provided site for further work and installation of cramp slots to secure the vertical joints when re-set:......\$1,450.00

At this point, the structural work has been completed, the crew will leave, to return again to completely pressure wash the entire Memorial and coping once the epoxies and sealants have sufficiently cured and before any finished landscaping by the town is done. This final portion's charge will be:

\$2,700.00

The Town of Norwell will pay the Granite Corporation of Barre upon completion of the work and the acceptance of its committee, the sum of Fifteen thousand dollars; \$15,000.00.

The work will be completed in an orderly fashion, with the site's appearance being kept neat and clean to the best of our ability throughout the work day and equipment stored neatly on site during the non-working hours.

The Town of Norwell will provide over-sight of the area during the working day and non-working hours. This, for the purpose of assuring that onlookers and curious visitors will not be harmed by the disruption at the site and the possibility of injuries by the equipment on the job.

It will also furnish the GCB an area off-site within the town, where the scraping and cleaning of the old jointing compounds can be achieved without damaging the road bed or parking area with tools and cleaning compounds required for the job. They will also furnish the water, (spigot within 500 feet of the work), and electricity needed for the cleaning and restoration of the memorial.

The GCB will furnish certifications of insurance and all necessary tools, consumables and labor to achieve a first class job.

Upon acceptance by the Town of this contract and the deposit of ten percent, we will schedule the beginning of work within fourteen days, and not before the 25<sup>th</sup> day of July, for we are booked until then.

It is estimated that the work will be completed by the GCB in not more than three weeks, providing the weather conditions are favorable and there are no unexpected disturbances that could prevent us from meeting this commitment. The contract dates, from acceptance to 09-30-05...

# GOOD AFTERNOON(MORNING)

Welcome to the rededication of this monument that has been restored due to the generosity of the people of Norwell.

The monument was first dedicated on July 4, 1878, the 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg.

On the North Face, are inscribed these words: Erected in Honor of the Soldiers and Sailors of South Scituate who fell in the War of 1861 for the Preservation of the Union.

On the South Face: Liberty and Union Established by our Fathers, Preserved Unimpaired, by the Patriotism of their Sons.

The names of the 24 men who lost their lives: 12 on the East Face and 12 on the West Face.

We, who have been working on this ceremony, thought it would be appropriate to provide a brief history of the original dedication ceremony, using the notes compiled by Norwell resident, Sam Olson, who researched the archives of two of the local newspapers, which were in circulation in 1878: The Rockland Standard and The Plymouth County Advertiser.

The original project for this monument began in May 1871. GAR (Grand Army of the Republic) Post # 112, South Scituate, appointed a committee made up of one individual from each school district to solicit funds.

\$ 161.50 was raised.

The Ladies Aid Society had some left over money in their treasury and gave \$83.21.

Lectures were given in October 1871, which added \$ 75.

For the next several years, interest faded as the country was experiencing some hard times.

Interest was revived, when in Sept. 1877, the ladies in the town conducted a three-day fair and raised \$ 300.

Finally, at the town meeting of April 1, 1878, \$ 1,000 was approved to be spent to complete the work.

The total cost of the foundation, base and monument was \$ 1,719.50.

The monument is made of polished, red granite from the St. George area of New Brunswick, Canada.

The monument was originally ordered for a town in New Hampshire. They declined to buy it and it was purchased and brought to this site. The gray base may be from Quincy.

July 4, 1878 was a scorching day. Most of the citizens in the village area, had decorated their homes and grounds with flags and streamers.

The ceremonies started at 11:30AM.

Along with GAR Post # 112 of South Scituate, several other posts from surrounding towns were lined up.

These included:

Post 74, Rockland, with the Rockland band

Post 83, Hanover, with drums

Post 104, Hingham

Post 11, Pembroke

Post 127, Hanson

Post 31, Scituate, with William Henry Osborne, Commander. Osborne was a Congressional Medal of Honor recipient who had lived in South Scituate for a brief period.

Refreshments were served, first to the men from the GAR posts, then to the estimated 500 people who were present.

At 1:15 in the afternoon, Post 112 marched to The James Library and received the orator, chaplain and President of the Day.

General Horace Binney Sargent, Commander of the Massachusetts Grand Army of the Republic, was the main speaker of the day.

Miss Carrie Simmons, daughter of one of the deceased, whose name is on the West face, unveiled the monument.

There is one part of the events that took place in 1878 that we don't want to repeat. It was reported that pickpockets were active and one individual lost a valuable gold watch.
