Michigan Commander McKinch Supports Kalamazoo Lincoln Statue Effort

An Abraham Lincoln statue in Edinburgh, Scotland was featured on the cover of last spring's issue of the *Banner*. This prompted Brothers Gary Swain and Cameron Brown to bring to the attention of Dept. of Michigan Commander Terry McKinch their efforts to place a privately funded bronze statue of Lincoln in Kalamazoo's Bronson Park where Mr. Lincoln spoke on August 27, 1856. Kalamazoo was the only place in Michigan where Abraham Lincoln made a public appearance, and the only time he left Illinois that year.

In addition to both being SUVCW members, Brothers Swain and Brown are members of the Kalamazoo Abraham Lincoln Institute (KLI), a 501(c)3 non-profit organization spearheading a community-wide effort to raise funds for the Kalamazoo Lincoln statue. The group has raised \$94,000 toward their goal of \$150,000 and has received approval by the Kalamazoo City Commission to place the instructional memorial statue in the city's downtown park.

In response to the efforts of the Kalamazoo group, Commander McKinch issued Department

Order #4 last August that established a special committee to help advance the statue project with
specific instruction to all Michigan camps to support this "Lincoln memorial endeavor." Brother


The broader focus of the Kalamazoo group is to use Lincoln's 1856 visit and extant speech to teach young people the value of history. In addition to the Lincoln statue, the KLI is developing educational resources and planning a biennial symposium with guest speakers and art and essay contests for area youth. "Helping young people develop leadership skills in the mold of Lincoln is one of our central goals," Brother Swain says.

Noted Lincoln scholar Louis A. Warren called Lincoln's *Kalamazoo Speech* his "transitional pronouncement" that anticipated the full rhetorical and thematic elements found in Lincoln's more famous *House Divided Speech* two years later. Brother Brown serves as the institute's president and is emphatic about the importance of the group's efforts. "Kalamazoo is an important venue for advancing the purposes and ideals of the SUVCW," Brown says. "We do understand these are trying times. All the more reason to teach children the lessons of history and the inspiring life story of Abraham Lincoln. We have found that Lincoln is often a young child's gateway to American history. Young people come to appreciate how attractive honesty can be because Lincoln is so tangible to them. Understanding the devastating cost of over 600,000 lives to save the Union and end slavery is a sobering truth of history we must teach each generation."

Kalamazoo was the only place in Michigan where Abraham Lincoln made a public appearance, and when he spoke in Kalamazoo, he was little known. The local paper even misspelled his name. Fast forward four years later, with Michigan's help, Kalamazoo's unknown visitor was elevated to the highest office in the land. The Kalamazoo Abraham Lincoln Institute believes it is time to bring Lincoln back to Kalamazoo, and they believe camp members throughout Michigan

can help make that happen. Brother Worley's committee will be reporting back to Commander McKinch with their proposal to help the SUVCW Department of Michigan promote this unique project. A Picture is Worth 2,790 Words.

Award-winning artist Richard Schlatter of Battle Creek has used the 2,790 words of Lincoln's Kalamazoo Speech to create a one-of-kind Lincoln Portrait based on Alexander Hesler's 1860 photo of presidential candidate Abraham Lincoln. Famous for his "tousled hair" Lincoln photo, Hesler took four photos of Lincoln on June 3rd, 1860 while in Springfield, Illinois—nearly four years after Lincoln spoke in Kalamazoo. The use of Hesler's photo as a template for Schlatter's "word" portrait shows a clean-shaven Lincoln as he would have appeared when he stepped off the train in Kalamazoo on August 27, 1856. When Lincoln saw Hesler's photos, he remarked, "That looks better and expresses me better than any I have ever seen; if it pleases the people I am satisfied."

Richard Schlatter is no stranger to the artistry of creating the likeness of Abraham Lincoln. Mr. Schlatter's previous Lincoln work resulted in his receiving the Grand Rapids ArtPrize 2017 Popular Vote Grand Prize Award for his 12-foot-high portrait of Lincoln made of 24,500 Lincoln pennies. This monumental work is on public display at the Battle Creek Community Foundation's downtown Battle Creek office.

Schlatter has more than an artist's eye for Lincoln, he has an appreciation for Lincoln's legacy that is contagious. He is fond of quoting author Andrew Ferguson's summation of our 16th president:


"Lincoln is an icon of the nation's founding propositions of human equality and self-governance. Statues and monuments of Lincoln dot the American landscape because of an implicit sense—or hope—that so long as he endures in our memory, so will his nation and its self-government endure."

"That, in a few words, says it all," Schlatter affirms.


And that too speaks for the Kalamazoo Abraham Lincoln

A Gift of History

On the morning of August 27, 1856, a clean-shaven 47-year-old Abraham Lincoln left Chicago on the Michigan Central Railroad bound for Kalamazoo. He had been invited to speak at a political rally that afternoon in what is now Bronson Park where upwards of 10,000 people had gathered.

Little known outside his home state of Illinois, he was one of many speakers that day, and by a stroke of good fortune, his speech was reported verbatim in the Detroit Daily Advertiser—preserving for all time what we know today as Lincoln's Kalamazoo Speech. Four years later, Michigan voters helped elect this once obscure visitor to Kalamazoo our nation's 16th president. Lincoln's Kalamazoo visit was his only public appearance in Michigan—a gift of history no other Michigan community can claim!

The Plan

Lincoln's Kalamazoo visit is an untapped resource with the potential to add significant cultural and educational value to Kalamazoo. His 1856 visit and speech in Bronson Park offers the community an opportunity to transform a unique historical asset into an ongoing educational enrichment.

Moreover, Kalamazoo's Lincoln connection provides fertile ground for developing inclusive studies that encompass issues of race and equality in America, and so a three-part Lincoln-legacy plan has been proposed highlighting the placement of a Lincoln statue in Bronson Park. Here is the plan:

- 1) Place a privately-funded bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln in Bronson Park;
- 2) Promote educational programs instructive of Lincoln's 1856 visit; and
- 3) Explore ways to foster leadership development inspired by the life and legacy of Abraham Lincoln with a focus on youth.

The Value of Legacy

Abraham Lincoln's legacy of character, achievement and leadership has tremendous potential as an educational tool. His story is a safe place for kids to learn about America and her struggles for freedom. Everything from ethics and elocution to the value of literacy and the importance of hard work, honesty, and personal responsibility can be drawn from the life of Lincoln. The values of equality, fairness, and mercy are all illustrative of the Lincoln legacy.

Abraham Lincoln is common ground. He crosses all political divides. He is often a child's first introduction to American history: the log cabin, the beard, and stovepipe hat. Children can appreciate how attractive good character can be because Lincoln is tangible to them.

The Challenge

While Abraham Lincoln is most often associated with historic sites in Illinois and Washington, D.C., Kalamazoo is fortunate to be the one venue in Michigan where Mr. Lincoln made a public address. The challenge is how best to capitalize on Lincoln's historic visit in an ongoing and instructive way.

Progress Report . . . a 501(c)(3) Non-profit Corporation

In early December of 2013, the Kalamazoo City Commission approved the steering committee's request to place a privately-funded bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln in Bronson Park. Specific site location was approved by the city commission in July of 2016. Initial approval by the Kalamazoo Parks and Recreation Board added the stipulation that an endowment fund be established for the statue's maintenance.



Bringing Lincoln Back to Kalamazoo

Why place a statue of Abraham Lincoln in Bronson Park? The answer is simple: it adds value! More than a piece of statuary art, a Lincoln statue in Bronson Park will provide a visual reminder of Lincoln's historic visit, and an anchor for the Kalamazoo Lincoln-legacy plan.

Why was Mr. Lincoln in Kalamazoo? The answer is a launch pad for understanding the deep undercurrents of race in America. In studying the life of Lincoln, we can learn about America at the most transformative time in our history. Lincoln's story is America's story, and uniquely Kalamazoo's story too. We welcome Mr. Lincoln's return!

Building on Past Commemorations

The Kalamazoo Abraham Lincoln Institute builds on at least three local commemorations celebrating Abraham Lincoln's 1856 visit. The first was the 1956 centennial celebration sponsored by the Kalamazoo County Historical Society, and the Civil War Round Table of Michigan. That was followed by another commemoration in 1996 hosted by the newly opened Kalamazoo Valley Museum. A sesquicentennial celebration of Lincoln's visit was held in 2006 and was organized through the efforts of then State Senator Thomas M. George with support from the Kalamazoo Valley Museum, the City of Kalamazoo, and the Arts Council of Greater Kalamazoo. And in August 2016, the steering committee itself hosted a well-attended commemorative event at the Kalamazoo Public Library in celebration of the 160th anniversary of Lincoln's visit.

In the spring of 2017, the Kalamazoo Abraham Lincoln Project Steering Committee incorporated as a Michigan non-profit corporation and received its 501(c)(3) designation from the IRS in December of the same year. The name Kalamazoo Abraham Lincoln Institute was officially adopted in the fall of 2020.

Reaching Out and Moving Forward!

The Kalamazoo Abraham Lincoln Institute Board of Directors is reaching out to local community leaders and organizations and other area nonprofits to enlist support for its Lincoln statue project. We have reviewed the archival record of the community effort that led to the successful drive to place a statue of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. on the north side of Kalamazoo, and we hope to model the best practices that made that collaborative effort possible.

As we move forward, our Lincoln legacy plans envision a biennial Kalamazoo Lincoln Symposium with visiting scholars and speakers, and art and essay contests for local youth.

The enrichment this activity will bring to the Kalamazoo community will complement the educational and cultural benefits offered by the Air Zoo, WMU's Medieval Institute's International Congress on Medieval Studies, and the Gilmore International Keyboard Festival—all unique to Kalamazoo. Coincidentally, the Gilmore Festival was founded on the simple idea to honor the memory of one man. And now his legacy spans the globe. Success springs from small beginnings!

Additional plans include collaborating with Michigan's 37 other Lincoln-related sites such as the Henry Ford in Dearborn, and with Pure Michigan to advance Michigan's Lincoln Remembrance Trail to a state-of-the-art mobile tour using the latest technology as portals for access—building on work begun by the Michigan Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Committee.

Our Mission Statement: To enrich the cultural life of Kalamazoo by creating educational programs that model the example of Abraham Lincoln.

Our Vision Statement: Training young minds through the lens of history with instruction in leadership development inspired by the life and legacy of Abraham Lincoln.
