Readings were given by Miss Margaret Ferguson, Miss Linnie Williams, and Mrs. Carrie DeHaven.

The patriotic pageant, in which the kiddies distinguished themselves, and Mrs. Urie's character of the Southern Mammy, were easily the star features. of the program.

A discriptive song by Mrs. D. D Rose charmingly given, found a responsive audience.

The closing number was a beautiful tableau representing the Goddess of Liberty.

The Fiftieth Reunion of the Eleventh Michigan Volunteer Infantry, held in Michigan Association Wednesday, an White Pigeon Tuesday was a pleasant invitation from White Pigeon to hold affair, and the veterans made no secret a reunion next year in White Pigeon, of the fact that they were gratified at the reception accorded them.

Luncheon was served to the visitors at noon, eighty-five partaking. At 1:30 ering place of the regiment. an auto parade was formed, under the efficient direction of Alfred Wickett, and forty-six cars, gay with red, white their wives, as well as many others, and their reunion so pleasant. a drive was made to Constantine. association. A poem written for the occasion was read by Mrs. Evelyn C. Timmis, and this the News is permitted to re-

reproduce. The program was entertaining, instructive and impressive. At its close, preceded by Mrs. J. M.
