



O TAPS FOR MEMORIA

The Michigan War Veterans Memorial is supposed to be a monument of peace.

Instead, it looks like it has fought a long, hard battle.

Buckled sidewalks, cracked limestone, missing plaques rusted cannons, an eternal flame that has been snuffed for years.

It's even hard to spot: The monument is surrounded by five apple trees at the corner of State Fair and Woodward in Detroit. And it sits behind a white sign screaming "Michigan State Fair Exposition Center.'

Local veterans — ashamed of the monument's condition are meeting with a state official today to figure out how to raise money to fix the site and maintain it.

"It's a shame," said Vincent

Fairgrounds.

Brennan, a Navy veteran from Ferndale who spotted the problem while at the State Fair last

Embarrassed, Brennan rallied the help of his friends at American Legion Post 1 in Warren. "Patriotism has gone away," he said.

Thousands of World War I veterans and their families showed up in 1939 when the 50foot-tall monument was dedicated. Homing pigeons flew and the eternal flame flickered.

Fixing the memorial would cost between \$50,000 and \$70,000, said Chris Neijndorff, project manager with Grunwell-Cashero Co. in Detroit, a restoration firm working with the veterans.

Weather-worn mortar would be replaced and the cracked limestone ledge that surrounds the monument would be swapped for marble, Neijndorff said. The buckled sidewalk would be replaced with brick pavers - purchased and engraved by veterans and their

As for the eternal flame? It could be replaced by a lightbulb or a flagpole.

"It's disgraceful the way they let it go like this," Neijndorff said. "It's in pretty bad shape."

Maintaining veteran monuments is the responsibility of local veterans' groups and municipalities, said Hubert Hess of the Michigan Department of Military and Veterans Affairs.

He said the state only maintains its monuments, those located on the grounds of the Cap-

Dark Last Year

fter the close of the fair in 1956, Donald C. Shand, then public lighting commissioner and a VFW leader suggested a light which really would burn perpetually.

"While this idea was being put through, the monument remained dark through 1957", said Michael Whalen, Allied Veterans Council secretary. "Veterans will be happy to see it lit Thursday night, to burn day and night from then on, we hope."

Prologue

here is a reason that the veterans and patriotic citizens who comprise the State Fair Veterans Memorial Committee (SFVMC) has come together at this time to undertake this project.

September 9, 1939 Kindle Flame for War Vets

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The memorial was built from stones donated by most of the posts of veterans organizations in the state. It stands in the southwest corner of the Fair grounds. Natural gas drilled from the ground only a few feet away will furnish the fuel for the eternal flame which will burn at the top of the memorial.

The principal speeches at the dedication were made by Secretary of State Harry F. Kelly and Attorney-General Thomas Read. A representative of the G.A.R. Lighted the eternal Flame. Following the dedication, a drum and bulge corps contest was held on the Mall.

Ground Is Broken for Vet Memorial -July 19, 1939



With representatives of a score of veterans' organizations participating, ground was broken today for the Michigan War Veterans Memorial at the State Fair Grounds.

he memorial is to be a stone tower, 35 feet high built of stones contributed by 700 posts of veterans groups throughout the State, with an everburning light fed by natural gas at the top. The site chosen is at the southwest corner of the Fair Grounds, close to Woodward avenue.

Councilman

Eugene I. Van Antwerp, national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, turned the first ground for the tower, with a spade handed him by Paul W. Tara, president of the allied Veterans Council.

Iso taking part in the ceremonies were Henry G. Smith, deputy marshal of the United Spanish War Veterans; W. B. Waldrip, state commander of The American Legion; Frank Holland, state commander of the Military Order of the Purple heart; Charles Jones, commander of Harmony Post of the Canadian Legion, and C.H. Dusenberry director of musical entertainment at the Michigan State Fair who conceived the idea for the Memorial.

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

Sacha - a member of the American Legion National Executive Committee - contacted a variety of Michigan veterans organizations, including the Veterans of Foreign Wars, to gather support.


He said he hopes the groups can raise enough money to see the work done this year.



































































Michigan War Veterans Memorial

On September 10, 1939, nine days after Germany's invasion of Poland and the start of what would become World War II, the Michigan War Veterans Memorial was dedicated during a ceremony attended by 5,000 people, who were mostly veterans of the Great War and their families.

The Memorial was designed to honor Michigan's military veterans of all wars and conflicts and was dedicated "to the memory of those living or dead, who served their flag and country so unstintingly". Its four sides contain about 250 stones identifying various veterans organizations from all across the state of Michigan. Represented were organizations consisting of veterans of the Civil War, the Spanish-American War, the Great War and the Allied intervention in North Russia of 1918-1919. A full list of the contributors of the stones can be found here.

Michigan's Secretary of State, Harry F. Kelly, was the main speaker during the dedication ceremony and the eternal flame on top of the memorial was lit by Augustus F. Chappell, who was commander of the Michigan Department of the GAR.














The Michigan War Veterans Memorial (June 2006 photo)

This unique Memorial is located at the northeast corner of Woodward and State Fair Avenues in Detroit, MI. For many years, the Memorial was the scene of the annual "Veteran's Day" activities of the Michigan State Fair. More information about the history of the Memorial can be found here.

Over the years, the Memorial has been sadly neglected and is now in need of significant structural and cosmetic restoration. The eternal flame's gas supply has been shut off for decades. The foundation is settling and some of the stones have fallen off. It has been estimated that it will take about \$250,000 to restore the Memorial to all its former glory.





The "Relight the Flame" Fundraising Campaign has been established, whose objective is to raise the necessary funds so the Memorial can be restored and re-dedicated on Armed Forces Day at the 2009 Michigan State Fair - the 70th anniversary of its original dedication.

On September 10, 1939, with a prayer for peace, the Michigan War Veterans Memorial was dedicated at the Michigan State Fair. It was done in the presence of 5,000 persons most of them veterans of the World War and their Families.

Harry F. Kelly secretary of state, was the principal speaker and Augustus F. Chappell, commander of the Michigan Department of the GAR ignited the eternal flame located atop of the memorial, that was to burn 24 X 7 to honor the memories of Veterans of all wars and conflicts. 69years later, the State Fair Michigan War Veterans Memorial Committee & The Friends of The Michigan State Fair are asking all our Veterans and Patriotic citizens to help us in our goal of raising \$250,000.00 to renovate the Memorial and relight the flame.
