

Monument Dedicated

Proud Day for the Old Veterans

Large Number Out

There were two fine addresses delivered at the dedication of the Soldier's monument last Tuesday. Hon. James O'Donnell furnished one of these, in his panegyric of the donor, Gen. W. H. Withington, in which was etched the military record of the deceased - and it was a gallant one - and his honorable and successful career as a citizen in our midst and which is yet fresh in the minds of our citizens. James O'Donnell is especially qualified to perform this duty, since he was a member of the general's first command in the great civil war and for more than forty years was an intimate friend and associate. His: effort was eloquent and touching and met with the cordial endorsement of the great throng present.

Hon. Washington Gardner's oration was masterful and although its delivery consumed and hour and a quarter it was listened to with closest attention. He analyzed and dissected the cause and influence that led up to secession, going back to the adoption of the constitution and citing Josian Quincy, of Boston and other Northern men who believed the States had the right to secede from the federal union as well as did those from the South. He did a glowing tribute to the late war governor, Austin Blair, and recalled the prominent scenes which this city presented during the four years of that great conflict, when regiment after regiment marched from Camp Blair past the spot where now stands the silent but eloquent monuments on their way to the front and later, with decimated ranks and tattered colors, marched past it to be mustered out. It was an unimpassioned address; free from any expression of politics or of sectional feeling, but one which gave due recognition to the Valor of the Southern armies as well as the Northern hosts and praised the American courage and bravery exhibited on so many fields of carnage. He embodied in this feature a portion of the oration he delivered at Chattanooga on Memorial Day and which could hardly fail to be gratifying to the Southerners. Mr. Gardner is one of the few great orators of Michigan.

Mayor Todd received the monument on behalf of the city with a pertinent speech and Chaplain NcAlpine of the State Prison made a brief and feeling speech, representing the G.A.R. of which he is a member.

Pomeroy Post, G.A.R. turned out in goodly numbers and their ranks were augmented by members from every post in the country. It is doubtful if we shall ever see again behold so many local veterans of that great war upon our streets. They were justly proud of the monument and revere the memory of the generous donor. Henceforth "Flag Day" will have a special significance for the old soldiers, and their monument will be the shrine at which they will visit and commune with the past.

Boos' full band formed a welcome feature of the dedication and the vested choir of St. Paul's Church, under direction of Miss Camper, furnished excellent vocal music.

Since the family desired only a modest demonstration the committee did not deem it advisable to invite the entire military of the city to participate and the escort to the G.A.R. was confined to the Withington Guard and the Withington Zouaves and each command made a good appearance.

The police escort of eight men, under command of Capt. Beard made an attractive front, as with their new uniforms and handsome bouquets they marched with military precision and dignity.

The ladies of the W.R.C. always with correct ideas as to the eternal fitness of things, had decorated the base and plinth of the monument

with roses and lillies and aided and assisted in looking after the comfort of the more feeble of the veterans.

There were many regrets heard expressed that Gen. Withington could not have lived to see the handsome memorial complete and in position, as he had hoped when he arranged for it and but for the delay caused by the accident which broke the bronze group this might have been permitted, since it was his intention to have it dedicated on Memorial Day, 1903. The general died last July. The monument has already been described in these columns.
