














IN MEMORY OF THE CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS WHO DIED IN ACTION

IT THE GREE ERST OF THIS MODUMENT ARE THE UN-MARKED GRAVES OF BOTH UNION AND CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS. HEY DIED DURING THE TWO FIERCE BRITILES FOR THE POSSESSION OF PATTERSON AND FORT BENTON: THE BATTLES WERE FOUCHT IN 863 AND 1864. THE LATTER WHS THE TURNING POINT OF THE WIRE WHICH EADED IN 1865. IT IS FITTING THAT THIS MEMORIA BE LOCATED IN THE SHADOW OF OLD FORT BOTTON AND IN THIS CEMETERY. IT IS LOCKED THAT MANY OF THESE MEN DIED IN THE SHADOW OF OLD FORT BOTTON AND IN THIS CEMETERY. IT IS NOT HAVE TO BE FOUGHT, OWER GOODOO MEN DIED BEFORE IT WAS DUEN. THIS MODUMENT IS ERECTED IN HONDRY THE STORM AS A REMINDER TO FUTURE GENERATIONS TO REALIZE THE HORRORS OF WAR AND TO DO
