Biography of Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

At the 140th National Encampment, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War elected Michael A. Paquette of Fredericksburg, VA as the 135th Brother to hold the office of Commander-in-Chief. Brother Paquette entered the Order as a Charter Member of the Irish Brigade Camp #4, Department of the Chesapeake in 2000.

Within the Department of the Chesapeake Brother Paquette has held the positions of Commander, SVC, JVC, Secretary-Treasurer, Patriotic Instructor and he served as Commander of Irish Brigade Camp #4. He has led the Department host committee for the National Encampment twice; first in 2011 in Reston, VA and then in 2015 in Richmond, VA. At the National Level he has served on the Council of Administration, Program



and Policy Committee, National Encampment Site Committee, National Monuments Grants Committee Chair, National Committee on Communication and Technology, the Commander-in-Chief Appointed Strategic Development Committee, and the Commander-in-Chief Appointed Committee on Headquarters and Planning. Brother Paquette is also a dual Charter member of the Col. Crowther Camp #89 in the Pennsylvania Department and a dual member of the Gen. Zenas Bliss Camp #12 in the Department of Rhode Island.

Brother Paquette grew up in Pawtucket, RI and enlisted in the United States Marine Corps after graduating high school. He learned about the SUVCW at a recruiting effort held by the Irish Brigade Camp organizer in Fredericksburg, VA in 1999. He traces his direct Civil War lineage through his GGG grandfather William G. Stratton, Wagoneer, Company H, 19th Maine Volunteer Infantry, who served from July 31, 1862 until mustered out with his company on May 31, 1865.

Brother Paquette is a 20-year Marine Corps veteran. After boot camp, he served as a bandsman at Parris Island, SC and after three years performed a lateral move to the Data Processing Military Occupation Specialty. During his military career he participated in the transition from mainframe computers to personal computers along with the implementation of the internet and network-based services across the Marine Corps. While on active duty he served various posts at Quantico, VA, Camp Pendleton, CA, and Okinawa, Japan. While stationed at Camp Pendleton he served overseas with the First Surveillance, Reconnaissance and Intelligence Group during the Persian Gulf War and later during the Somalia peace keeping mission. He retired as a Master Sergeant at Marine Corps Computer Science School in Quantico, VA in 1997.

Brother Paquette is a member of the 28th Massachusetts, Company B, Volunteer Infantry reenactment group. He is a Charter member and past president of the Fredericksburg Concert Band which was founded in 1998. He is a member of the Band of America's Few, a Marine veteran musicians' group. He is a past Pit Crew Chief and Band Parent Booster for 15 years at a

local high school in Spotsylvania County, VA. He is a former Boy Scout and Assistant Scoutmaster and led two high adventure treks to Philmont, the BSA National Scout Ranch located in Cimarron, NM. Brother Paquette is also a Third-degree Knight of Columbus.

Brother Paquette is married to the former Patricia Martin of Pocatello, ID who he met while attending the University of Utah in Salt Lake City, UT. They have four daughters and one son.



National Encampment Transcript

First Session – Friday Morning

Due to technical issues with the hotel's audio system and the SUVCW soundboard, the opening of the 141st National Encampment was not recorded until the Officers Reports were read.

The meeting was opened by Commander-in-Chief Michael A. Paquette. The following Encampment Officers were appointed; Guide: Jay Rarick Guard: Ron Shall Parliamentarian: James Pahl

The National Secretary, Alan Russ, called the roll of Officers of the Encampment. All elected National Officers were present. The National Chaplain, Jerome Kowalski, offered the opening prayer. National Patriotic Instructor, Benjamin Frail, led the encampment in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Commander-in-Chief Paquette read the Rules of the Encampment and appointed the following **Encampment Committees:** Constitution and Regulations; Edward Norris, Donald Darby, and John Huffman. Resolutions; Mark Day, Brian Pierson, and Peter Hritsko. Officers Reports; Tad Campbell, Kevin Martin, and Leo Kennedy. Rituals and Ceremonies; Stephen Michaels, Gary Gibson, and Jeffrey French. Fraternal Relations / Visitation; Michael Paquette, Mark Day, and Brian Pierson.

Transcript Begins Officers Reports

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brothers, thank you for providing me the opportunity to serve as your Commander-in-Chief for the past year. My travels to various events and Departments' Encampments have spanned the COVID imposed travel restrictions and the subsequent lifting of those restrictions. Similarly, I've seen the restrictions placed on our Department and Camp activities subside over the past six months. Based on my observations, we are once again fully engaged in meeting our sacred obligation to remember the "Boys in Blue." My compliments to our Camps and Departments for their creativity in finding ways to fulfill our mission under varying and challenging conditions these past two years. Well done.

I believe that having the ability to meet virtually in our "tool kit" has been and continues to be an asset to the Order. I remind all of you, and especially our Department and Camp Commanders, that the ability to meet virtually is just a tool. No two Departments or Camps deal with the same set of challenges. Commanders should use this tool if it applies to your specific circumstances.

We will no doubt continue to learn where to apply this tool as our experience with it continues to grow.

I had an interesting conversation with the Camp Secretary of the Lincoln-Cushing Camp in Washington D.C. after the Memorial Day event in Arlington National Cemetery. He showed me a picture of his GAR ancestor, who was also the Secretary of his GAR Post, and noted that both he and his ancestor conducted business in exactly the same manner, submitting reports and checks via snail mail. With the technologies available to us today, this is not an acceptable situation. I have spoken with a number of members this year who do not have or write physical checks. I am also concerned that potential young members will be turned off by our antiquated business practices and choose not to join our Order because of it. We are well behind in using technology to our advantage and will continue to fall further behind unless we do something about it.

Last year, I identified three specific things I intended to accomplish this year. 1) I wanted to meet with the Department Commanders on a quarterly basis through virtual means. I have met with the Department Commanders four times this year. I have received positive feedback that the information that was passed was useful and appreciated. Additionally, the meetings provided a means for Department Commanders to present their concerns and questions to their peers. I believe this provided a broader range of responses and recommendations than would have been available from a one-on-one dialogue with the Commander-in-Chief.

2) I indicated I would ask three National Officers to provide virtual training sessions for their Department level counterparts. My intent was to validate the potential benefits of making virtual training available to our Officers, especially those who may be new to their positions. To date, the National Treasurer and National Patriotic Instructor have provided this training. The Executive Director will be conducting training for Department Secretaries on 6 August. I believe this training has been well received. We should look to Memorial University for guidance on how best to apply the use of virtual training in the future and possibly expand the training opportunities to the Camp level.

3) I created a Commander-in-Chief appointed committee to investigate the Strategic Development of Information Technology within our Order. We have multiple resources: National websites; databases; et cetera that our membership relies on, which we are hard pressed to maintain. I asked the committee to identify these resources and provide some recommendations on how we can best continue to provide them to you. I believe that we have exceeded our ability to maintain these resources with a purely volunteer workforce. The committee's report and recommendations are available in this report's packet.

4) Lastly, I established a Commander-in-Chief appointed committee in March to review our membership qualifications. As some of you have guessed, the committee's job is to look specifically into transgender issues. The committee is tasked to research how current federal and state law identify an individual as being male or female. The committee is also to investigate how to deal with individuals seeking membership who identify as non-binary, neither male or

female. As you might surmise, the legal definitions vary widely between the states. Our Order's challenge is to apply a standard definition for being male that can be applied consistently across the country. We cannot have a situation where a potential member is refused membership because of gender in one location and accepted in another. We must also comply with the law or run the risk of a lawsuit. We are not in a position to make an informed decision during this National Encampment, nor should we attempt to do so. It will take time and the committee must be allowed to continue its work. In all likelihood, this will be the most critical decision we will make during this decade. We must be methodical and deliberate in our decision-making process. The activities and recommendations from the committee are also located in this report's packet.

Recommendation #1, that the Committee to Review Membership Qualifications be established as a two-year special committee appointed by this National Encampment and be expanded to five voting members. It will report its findings and recommendations to the National Encampment in 2023.

Recommendation #2, that the Memorial University Committee investigate the use of virtual collaboration programs to conduct training, both live and recorded, to SUVCW members. Recommendation 3, that our Order continues to investigate how to move our internal business processes forward in order to take advantage of the benefits that technology has to offer. In closing, let me thank you again for the opportunity to serve as your Commander-in-Chief. It has been quite an adventure and full of memories I will cherish the rest of my life. Thank you, Brothers. I will now take back the gavel and ask for the following reports.

Commander, Michael Beard, National Treasurer. My report begins on page six. ... I have some items to highlight. (Indistinguishable) recommendation to change paragraph two on form 11 instructions to read: 2. That each Camp listed on this Form 11 has forwarded to the Department Treasurer a copy of the IRS email confirming the current tax tear 990 was filed. (indistinguishable)... 501(c)(3). I.R.S. doesn't list us as a charity on the website.....On page nine, (indistinguishable)... three ways: dues, increasing membership, and increasing amount of money (indistinguishable). This is the purpose of capital campaign, is increase our endowment funds, which we (indistinguishable)... All that goes into that fund stays there. (Indistinguishable). So right now, we're averaging about \$25,000.00 a year on our investments. (Indistinguishable) improve it (indistinguishable). Our dues (indistinguishable) us \$130,000.00 a year. We want to get to a point where our investments are producing fifty or \$60,000.00 a year. That will allow us to do things we want to do in the way of websites, staff at Headquarters, bigger Headquarters, anything that we want to do, we need money to do it quick. That capital campaign is announced in your program book. Also in the program book, is one of the first things that we'll do for the capital campaigns (indistinguishable) an 1880 wedding club [check Program book]. Find that in your program book. To be a member of the 1881 club, contribute \$1,881.00. That can be done over a three-year period. To stay a member of the club, you have to contribute \$25.00 a month after you hit 1881. You will receive a neck ribbon, a nice gold medal, and we'll have special events strictly for 1881 club members as we go down the road and see how many people actually join. The Treasurer's Handbook has been updated. I want to point out that Commander Paquette when he was up in the Department of Maine, there was a Camp up there having trouble because they automatically had been suspended for the 990 problem. He has crafted a really nice letter that the Department can use to reinstate these Camps while they work out their issues so they can conduct normal business and that will be in the update to the Treasurer's Handbook.

The National Committee on Promotion and Marketing is charged with expanding the awareness and visibility of the SUVCW, its activities, and its brand to the broadest possible audience of organizations and individuals. In keeping with this mission, the Committee produces video content for deployment on special media outlets such as the National YouTube channel. Examples include Memorial Day ceremonies, the annual Gettysburg Remembrance Parade, testimonials from Brothers in a series knows as "What Makes Us Son." The National Committee on Promotion and Marketing is an excellent resource for healthy types and advice that Departments can utilize as they make plans to create their own videos of their graveside ceremonies and other public events. The Committee can advise and is willing to assist on elements such as staging, camera, selection, audio quality, and post production editing. Department C of A's, Commanders, and (indistinguishable) are encouraged to reach out to the Committee for guidance and support. Thank you. That's all.

Don Palmer, Past Commander-in-Chief, Chair of the Vision and Planning Committee. And I asked the Commander-in-Chief if I be allowed to make a few editorial comments as part of this report? So, this is the Vision and Planning Committee's report. More or less, the goals associated with the strategic plan that is being developed for 2030. And the way you look at these, you can see the categories associated with them. You'll recognize that some of these categories are very similar to what we had in the 2020 plan. Those categories are considered enduring, largely connected to the mission of our Order. We do have a number of new initiatives as set in there. But under the notes in each one of those categories, you can see the basis for setting some of these goals, largely based on the results that we realized in the 2020 plan. So, that's basically the strategy. We do have a couple of new areas we wanted to emphasize in the 2030 plan, largely connected to preservation initiatives as well as education initiatives. And those also tie in with the potential for grant pursuits. And then also the financial elements of this plan align well with report of the Treasurer. And the Treasurer has also bought into the goals associated with the financial elements. So, that's the plan as is the Committee is proposing. Also as part of this report, there will be a survey, a membership survey, coming out within the next month, largely similar to the survey that we conducted ten years ago. So, if you contributed to that survey, you'll remember what it entailed. And we're trying to measure some demographic trends and also membership perspectives on the National Organization, their Departments, and their Camps. And we're gonna use this information to help fine-tune our goals as part of the 2030 plan. We are working out the details on an electronic survey. I'd rather not go through the manual survey, data compiling results that we did ten years ago. So, we're gonna take advantage of technology. And those details will be forthcoming. So, please take advantage of that. We had about 6% of our Order contribute to the survey last time, which provided statistically relevant data, but we would like to have a larger percentage of contribution. So, we think that electronic version will help foster that. The Committee does have three recommendations. Those are on page seventy-four. Recommendation #1, that the goals associated with the 2030 strategic plan be adopted, subject to changes based on membership feedback and/or changes recommended by the Committee based on annual review.

The purpose is to have a group focused on this specific element, as the effort envisioned is too great to add to the plate of an existing Officer or committee.

Mark R. Day, Past Commander-in-Chief

I'm sorry. I keep coming up here. Past Commander-in-Chief, Mark Day. That is already

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the purpose of Memorial University. That is the education function of this Order. And that is what that Committee has been working toward for the last three years. I don't believe there's any need to reinvent the wheel. We already have a Committee in place. We already have a website in place. We already have plans to do the very things that are being discussed here. So I don't think it's necessary to recreate that wheel.

Donald D. Palmer, Jr., National Committee on Vision and Planning

And if that Committee is willing to take on that effort, then the Vision and Planning Committee will withdraw that motion, the recommendation.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Past Commander-in-Chief, Steve Michaels, speaking for the Committee. Are you good with that?

Yes, sir.

Very good. So, recommendation withdrawn.

And then recommendation #3, incoming Commander-in-Chief appoint a special committee on battlefield preservation with an end date of the 2026 National Encampment to develop the strategy for SUVCW participation in battlefield preservation as defined in the preservation element of the 2030 plan. And the same purpose as recommendation 2.

Commander-in-Chief, Don Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief. I would suggest or ask the question, "Is not this Monuments and Memorials?" It falls under them? As in the education fell under the monument or the Memorial University. This seems to me, Monuments and Memorials would be into their section under battlefield preservation.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Okay. Very good.

James B. Pahl, Past Commander-in-Chief

James Pahl, Past Commander-in-Chief, stepping out of my role as National Parliamentarian momentarily. The idea of battlefield preservation is being well covered by other organizations. We don't have the resources to devote towards helping preserve battlefields. It seems like we would be duplicating efforts of other organizations in establishing a special committee that we don't have funds to move forward with any battlefield preservation projects.

Brother Don, do you have a response?

Donald D. Palmer, Jr., National Committee on Vision and Planning

So, on the first comment there again if the Civil War Memorials and Monuments Committee is willing to take that on, then the motion will be withdrawn. On the second comment, the purpose of setting up that element of the plan was not necessarily for the SUVCW to commit resources for funding. There are a lot of opportunities out there for preservation initiatives largely from the Department of the Interior. And again as we consider grant pursuits as part of our financial strategy, that element could come into play and we would be able to participate with that. And that would be part of the task of that committee, either established as a special committee or taking on as an existing committee, to develop that.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother Busch, are you preparing to speak for or against?

I'm against but I have a reason as far as one element.

We've already had two against.

Okay.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary Walt is in the back.

Brother Walt Busch.

Walter E. Busch, Past Department Commander

Brother Walt Busch, Past Department Commander, also Civil War Memorials Officer. I don't want to speak against battlefield preservation, just that the Monuments and Memorials Committee would be (indistinguishable) of a monument on a battlefield, not the actual preservation of the battlefield.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, Brother Busch, has pointed out that the monument piece of the objection does not address the battlefield preservation itself. Brother Bruce.

Bruce D. Frail, Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief

I'm going to go at this in another angle. This was kind of split into two areas, one for monuments and memorials and then one for grant. The issue I would like to speak towards was...is grants. We just put together a committee on fundraising, which has the grant element.

That would be a duplication of work in this area. So, if we have something that we want to submit for a preservation to grants, I would suggest that it be done through the grant fundraising.

All right, Brothers. So, the original recommendation stands. It has not been amended from the Committee. Is that correct, Brother Don?

Both the near-term and far-term technology needs of the SUVCW can be addressed by hiring professional consultants to map out a strategy for both our current configuration as well as our future needs.

All right. If you'll look in your pamphlet on page forty-seven, you'll find the C&R Report.

Robert E. Grim, Nat'l Committee on Constitution and Regulations

All right, on page forty-seven of your booklet, you'll find the C&R Report. The changes made to the Regulations at the 140th National Encampment have been reviewed and incorporated into the C&R. The updated C&R, with a table of contents, has been posted on the website. The Committee presents the following proposed amendments to the Regulations for

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consideration by this Encampment. Proposed changes to the Regulations by this Encampment are noted in bold type for new language and strikethroughs of language being eliminated. Proposal #1 at the bottom of page forty-seven. This proposal is a resolution from the Department of Texas. It affects Chapter 1, Article 2, Section 1. If you have the C&R, it's on page thirty-six in the footnotes. This change will allow cousins to qualify for membership. The Department of Texas sites Article 3 of the SUVCW Constitution, which is as follows. All male descendants whether through lineage or collateral lineages specified in Article 7 of this Constitution, who are blood relatives of soldiers, sailors, Marines, or members of the Revenue Cutter Service. They also note that the Merriam-Webster dictionary defines collateral relative as belonging to the same ancestral stock but not in a direct line of descent and that blood relative is someone who has the same parents or ancestors as another person. Your sister is a blood relative. Your brotherin-law is not. The C&R does not recommend...recommendation of this proposal.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, Brothers, I have received correspondence from the Department of Texas that they wanted to withdraw this. I'm going to rule this out of order because General Order 14 issued by me reactivated the committee that reorganized the C&R a number of years ago and the missing sections that did not define the blood relation criteria in the C&R have been addressed by that committee. Brother Jim, would you like to make a comment on that?

James B. Pahl, Past Commander-in-Chief

Yes. The National Regulations reorganized at 2000...the National Regulations were reorganized since the 2014 National Encampment. Nothing was changed. Can you not hear me? (tapping on microphone)

<u>Unknown</u>

It's on.

James B. Pahl, Past Commander-in-Chief

Okay. Nothing has changed. It's just everything was reorganized. We found recently because of this, six sections that were left out inadvertently, the 2014 National Encampment authorize the Commander-in-Chief to reinstitute the special committee should this circumstance be found for the sole purpose of determining whether or not language should be reinserted into the Nash Regulations it inadvertently left out. The committee agreed. That also required the approval of the National Counselor and the full committee and Constitution and Regulations. They agreed. Therefore, we have now...found in Chapter 5, a new article for the purposes of administering Section 3 of the Congressional Charter, blood relative is defined as a direct descendant or direct descendant of a brother, sister, half-brother, half-sister of a veteran. The definition does not apply to any Brother admitted to membership prior to August 21, 1999. A Brother in good standing, a member Junior Associate, or Junior Associate whose dues are current or who possess a valid transfer card and has no outstanding indebtedness to the Order and who is not under suspension as a result of disciplinary procedure, a Brother...let me see. This is definitions. Brother. Members of all categories, Associate, Junior, or Junior Associate. Definition for honorable discharge. A certificate of voluntary separation for membership granted to a Brother in good standing. Definition of general discharge for the good of the Order. Certificate

of less than honorable discharge, but not punitive issued to a Brother who has been dropped for nonpayment of dues or is not in good standing at the time he request a discharge. And definition of dishonorable discharge. A certificate of separation from membership following a conviction of disciplinary procedures as presented in National Regulations Chapter 4. This language is now part of our current Regulations.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother National Counselor, did you issue an opinion on this situation?

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Mark Day, Past Commander-in-Chief, National Counselor. I did. This is my opinion, that number three...

... What page?

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Be found on page twenty-two of the report, book of report. Page twenty-two of the book of reports, Opinion #3. All right. I will read through it. In answer to the letter from the Commander of the Department of Texas which was forwarded to me by the Commander-in-Chief regarding membership issues arising from the inadvertent omission of a definition of a blood relative in the 2014-2022 published versions of the Charter Constitution and Regulations, Chapter 5, Article 1, Section 3. And when I provide research in here in my report as to what parts of the C&R and various things I went through. I looked at the opinion of Rich Orr. I went through and looked at all of the footnotes and relevant information with regard to Opinion #8. I also went back through the proceedings so that I could determine the intent of the body at the time that all of this went through. A couple of things were there and I put those in my final opinion which you can see at the end on page twenty-four. As a precedent had been established that the 108th National Encampment to grandfather in members who had not met the criteria for full membership as a direct blood relative. And evidence which points out that our Charter, Constitution, and Regulations have not included a definition for blood relatives for the past eight years. I believe it would be proper that a motion be made at the upcoming 141st National Encampment to allow anyone who had been brought into the Order after the 133rd Encampment and before today's Encampment under a cousin, be grandfathered into the Order and that that definition requirement of blood relative not be applied to such Brother. That just seemed to me to be the fair thing as it was our omission of the information in the actual documents which led to at least one instance and potentially other instances where Brothers may have been brought in through Camps and may not have met that blood...that description that had been omitted. It was what makes a direct blood relative. So, that's there. If there's somebody that wants to make that motion.

....No....

They are.

Okay. Go ahead.

There's a motion on the floor, Brother. We can't bring up another motion at this time. Past Commander-in-Chief Darby.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief Don Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief. Commander-in-Chief, I'm a little bit confused.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Don Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief, to the Commander-in-Chief. I'm a bit confused as I just understood you three minutes ago before Jim Pahl started talking, that you were going to call this resolution out of order because the Department of Texas withdrew it. Did you not say that?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

It was ruled out of order, yes.

Encampment

(chatter).

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So your point...your point be... this is a related issue to that motion.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Okay. But one thing that I will bring up and this is just part of the discussion. If you allow these gentlemen through our fault to become full members, what do you do to their descendants? Are they not now entitled to be full members because we screwed up and you've now... This will not end just with these three or four Brothers. This will go to cousin once removed, cousin twice removed and they'll say, "I can be full Brother because my father was."

<u>Unknown</u>

No.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

That's not what you guys are looking at. You're not looking at... Because if I'm a young kid, and my dad's a full-blooded Son, or a Son because of our screw up, then I'm entitled to the same benefits as he is.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

No.

<u>Unknown</u>

No, you're not.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Yes! Because I'm going on him being a full member. You und... Am I make my...

<u>Unknown</u>

....Yes...

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Do you understand?

<u>Unknown</u>

Yeah.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

So, if you pass this, you better have a caveat that decides what that first cousin once removed can be or he is a full Brother and now we've blown the bloodline all the way out the door.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother Gates.

Donald L. Gates, Department of Texas

Can you hear me okay? Okay. Don Gates, Department of Texas, Secretary/Treasurer. I speak in favor of the motion. Commander-in-Chief, Past Commander-in-Chief Darby, well I understand his point of view on this. But I would point out to him that starting in 1952 or there abouts, this collateral definition that's being asked to be looked at for just a brief period from 2014-2022 was in fact the definition of membership. And it was not changed until 1999. In 1999, it was changed to make it tighter, not loser. It was reversing the trend that had continued from the beginning of the 20th century all the way up to 1952. It reversed that trend, to make it tighter to get in. And then it was left out accidentally in 2014. And all we're saying in 1998 or '99 when this definition was originally added, a grandfather clause was included. Obviously because there had been people joining the Order from 1952 on that were not covered by this stricture. And there certainly were a good many people who were members. There are probably some people whose fathers are members and may well have been a member under that type of a membership, of a descent. But in any case, that was a...that tidy up that occurred then and then the grandfather clause was applied. And all, I believe, the National Counselor is doing is saying that the only fair thing to do, it to apply that same...a grandfather clause to any people who joined the Order between 2014 and 2022, when there was no requirement in there that was valid that would allow...would not allow anyone to join who was a true blood relative and not just one who was descended from the veteran or as siblings.

Brother Tucker.

Kevin P. Tucker, Council of Administration

Kevin Tucker, Department of Massachusetts. I speak in support of this. But I'd like to make a friendly amendment that the grandfather applies only to the member that directly joining and not to his children, grandchildren, whatever. I think that would solve Brother Darby's issue and not punish someone for following the rules.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Brother Commander-in-Chief, Past Commander-in-Chief Mark Day. I accept the friendly amendment.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

But the motion was made by Brother Pierson. So Brother...Past Commander-in-Chief Pierson, do you accept the amendment?

Brian D. Pierson, Past Commander-in-Chief

Yes, I accept the friendly amendment.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

And Brother Ben, you seconded. Do you accept it?

Benjamin J. Frail, National Patriotic Instructor

Yes, sir, I do.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

Can I have the rewording of that?

Kevin P. Tucker, Council of Administration

Kevin Tucker, my amendment was that the grandfather only apply directly to the member applying for membership and not to his children, grandchildren, or prodigy.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

Thank you.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother, are you waiting to have dialog on this specific motion?

John C. Vander Meulen, Department of Texas

Point of clarification, sir. John Vander Meulen, Department of Texas. I just want to make sure it's clear the current motion for consideration is asking that the CC&R be amended in this section that defines...

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

...Negative.

John C. Vander Meulen, Department of Texas

Negative? Then can someone please then restate what the motion is? Thank you.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

The motion...Past Commander Day...Commander-in-Chief Day, once again. The motion is basically the opinion that is at the end of my Opinion #3 which would grandfather anyone who came in between 2014 and 2022 inadvertently because of the error made in not including the direct bloodline language in the C&R, as amended by Brother Tucker that it would only apply to

those Brothers during that period of time and not to their prodigy. That is the motion.

John C. Vander Meulen, Department of Texas

Thank you, sir. I accept that.

James B. Pahl, Assistant National Counselor C&R

James Pahl, as the Assistant National Counselor C&R. In effect, if this process what will happen is that this action will become a footnote in the C&R as action of a National Encampment. So once the proceedings of this Encampment are published, the action taken here that the grandfather language would appear as a footnote to help define what happened. So everyone's clear on what the actual rule is.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Any more discussion against? All right, Brothers. We will vote on this. All those in favor of the motion as amended, raise your cards. Lower them. Anyone against? Motion passes.

All right. Proposal #2 which is on page forty-eight of your booklet. This proposal was prepared by Past Commander-in-Chief...

Robert E. Grim, Nat'l Committee on Constitution and Regulations

...All right. On Proposal #2 on page forty-eight of your handout. This Proposal was prepared by Past Commander-in-Chief Jim Pahl, an aide to the C&R Committee of his.. General Order #18, series 2021-2022, dated 1 July 2022, which prohibits the election of a Brother as a National Officer who is not twenty-one years of age. It affects Chapter 3, Article 6, Section 6. If you have the C&R, it's on page eighty-five. This amendment adds a new Section 6 to this Article, listing the National Officers who must be twenty-one years of age to be elected or appointed. This change is necessary because of laws restricting what minors can legally do. The Committee recommends adoption. The new Section 6, Due to bonding requirements for those who handle the funds of the Order in lieu of liability and the signing of contracts, the following National Officers shall be at least twenty-one years of age at the point of their election or appointment. This provision replaces General Order #18 of the series 2021-2022. Commanderin-Chief, Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief, Junior Vice Commander-in-Chief, National Secretary and all Assistant National Secretaries, National Treasurer and all Assistant National Treasurers, National Quarter Master, National Proceedings Secretary, Executive Director, Assistant Executive Director, Banner Editor, National Signals Officer, National Membership-at-Large Coordinator, National Photographer, Chair of the National Site Selection Committee, and Chairman of the Lincoln Tomb Committee.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Discussion?

Daryl VerStreate, Assistant National Quartermaster

Daryl VerStreate, Past Department Commander, New York. I would just like to make one friendly suggestion and get clarification on one item. As Assistant National Quartermaster, I make purchases with a credit card. Without the Assistant National Quartermaster being listed on here, I would be complicit without it being listed on here, that's more or less saying I don't have the ability to spend money any money for National running the ROTC Program.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So Brother Daryl, you're asking that the Assistant Quartermaster be added to the list of Offices identified?

Daryl VerStreate, Assistant National Quartermaster

Yes, Commander.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

Secretary's, yeah, the same way.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So we have a motion to amend. Do I have a second?

Second.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Who made the second? Perley...Past Commander-in-Chief Mellor. So now we're discussing the amendment. Brother Ben, if you're not ready to speak to the amendment... We need to talk about the amendment. So, the amendment is to add the Assistant Quartermaster to the proposal by the C&R Committee. Brother Darby.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Commander, I just have a question. Don Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief. Commanderin-Chief, my question is...is this going to apply to Departments and Camps? And if so, then maybe that amendment needs to be a lot longer. I just have a question. Do we need to make a second amendment to include Department Secretaries and Camp Secretaries and Treasurers, or that whole list? You know. The ability, in Ohio, the ability not to enter into a contract with some...a minor is forever. So, I'm just asking for a Department level or a Camp level, is this gonna apply or do we need to make an amendment to that?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

The C&R proposal does not address Departments or Camps. It's just National offices.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

So, I guess we need to make an amendment to the amendment?

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Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

No.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

No, because the Assistant Quartermaster is a National Officer.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Okay.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, it sounds to me like you're suggesting that C&R may have more work to do to address this at the Department and Camp level in the future.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

May I...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

...Commander-in-Chief, each state has different...

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

...Yeah...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

...and so it's not appropriate for National to mandate how old someone should be because one state allows an eighteen year old to be an adult. Another state allows a seventeen year old to be adult. The third state allows a twenty-one year old to be an adult. This is up to the Departments to manage their affairs of who's appropriate to hold office. I don't think it's appropriate for National to do this because each state is different, so each Department is going to be different.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

But in this definition, you're referring to a minor. Am I correct? You don't have an age group.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

Yeah, there is.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

You just say minor. So a minor is...

This Proposal describes and clarifies the duties of the Executive Director. The C&R recommends adoption. In Section 16 (b), where it says dishonorable discharge, we're striking out the word he and then we're adding or changing Section (b) to Section (c) and adding new language then for Section (d). Section (d), the Executive Director shall coordinate with the National Committee on Fraternal Relations as they maintain contact and liaison with other Allied Orders of the Grand Army of the Republic, and the Sons of Confederate Veterans, and the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States, and other patriotic and military organizations including, but not limited to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion, and the Committee...as that Committee may request. And then we're adding a new Section (e), a Section (f), a Section (g), Section (h), (i), (j), (k), (l), (m), (n). And then there's a subsection to (n), (a) and (b). And then we have Section (o), a subsection (q), Section (r), Section (s), Section (t). And if you want me to read all that, I will. But if you can read it yourself, that'd be great.

Then in Section 7, we're eliminating the word personalized, where it says February 14th, and include personalized invitation. Strike out the word personalized. And then in that Section we're adding new language, such invitations may be sent electronically to the email address of the National Presidents of the Allied Orders and the Commander-in-Chief of MOLLUS. Then in Section 8, we're striking out language and reserve a charter bus for transportation of wreath bearers to the tomb from the headquarters hotel and return. And then in Section 15, striking out at the bottom language that says and a bugler to perform taps at the close of the ceremony. And in Section 17, striking out language that also includes a listing of the participating organizations presenting Memorial wreaths. And again, the Committee recommends adoption.

This proposal comes from Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief Bruce Frail as chairman of the National Headquarters Planning Committee, presented on behalf of that Committee, to make a reference in the C&R to the records and retention policy adopted by the Council of Administration rather than include the entire policy in the C&R. The C&R Committee feels that it would be more convenient for the membership to have the entire policy included in the Regulations. So, Chapter 5, Article 5, if you have the C&R, it's on page 120 or 132. This change to the Regulations replaces the current language in the C&R regarding records retention and inserts new language covering additional records that must be retained and clarifies the period of time that the records must be retained. And as you can see, we have stricken out the existing Article 5 that's already in the Regulations and the policy that has been adopted or recommend by this Committee would be inserted in its place as the new Chapter 5. And it includes new information regarding how long certain records have to be maintained and what kind of records have to be maintained. If you want me to read that whole new Section I can do that. But it would be best if you just look at it. And if you have a question, let us know.

Cancelled checks must be retained for at least three years after the close of the fiscal year. I can't remember the last time I got a check back. Mostly it comes back in your statement. So you're maintaining the statement for three years, bank account statements for three years. But I can't remember last time I got a cancelled check back.

Bruce Frail again. The only reason why it was included there is because we have canceled checks at the National Headquarters. Any records we found that were in existence, we included.

Harry W. Reineke, IV, Council of Administration

Commander-in-Chief, Harry Reineke, Council of Administration. I have a concern. And while I sympathize with the concept that it would be more convenient to the membership to have the policy contained in the C&R, my understanding is the CofA has passed a policy. Putting it in the C&R would tie the Council's hands in the future to update this policy with any sort of ease. I think that's a big concern. I think this body should really consider where this body and our governing documents have put the authority to make policy. And that is in the hands of the CofA.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, Brother Harry, I'm not speaking in defense of or against the proposal, but these Sections already existed in the C&R that had already tied, as you're calling it, the CofA's hands. So...

Harry W. Reineke, IV, Council of Administration

...Right. And I remember in the discussions of the CofA meetings that the desire was to bring it out as a standalone policy, taking it out of the C&R as a way to sort of future proof it. Make it more accessible to update, more accessible to change as the times change. Nothing's truly future proof, but our methods certainly can be. And putting something like this in a situation where it can only be updated once a year, and then with a significant amount of debate among hundreds of people, I think is a bit foolish.

So, are you making a motion?

Yes. I would move that we strike... we retain the striking of the language that is stricken, but not add the entire policy to the C&R.

Is there a second?

I believe that was Kevin Tucker seconding. Brother Bruce.

Bruce D. Frail, CinC Appointed Committee on Headquarters Planning

Bruce Frail, Chairman of the Headquarters Planning Committee. This is... this has been back and forth between being a policy and being a part of the C&R since Gettysburg. We developed it as a standalone policy so that it could be adjusted. And then we have been informed that there was desires that everything be in the C&R so that there was a one location where you could look for everything. And that's why it was converted over to a C&R inclusion because we already had an Article section there. At some point, we have to stop bouncing this thing around and put it someplace. Otherwise, it's not going to go into effect. Basically, I think we should just keep it in the C&R and leave it alone. Let's get it moving.

Mark R. Day, Past Commander-in-Chief

I'd like to speak in support of what Bruce just said.

Who are you?

Mark Day, Past Commander-in-Chief, National Counselor. I believe Bruce is right. We have to decide one way or another. But I also think that it should be in the C&R. And the rationale for that is the C&R is the go to document for regulations. And I see this list is more of a regulation or a rule rather than a policy. And so, I would be... I will vote... my vote would be that we put it in the C&R, as it's been modified.

Past Commander-in-Chief Don Darby. Commander-in-Chief, I stand in opposition to Brother Harry's making it a policy. For those of you who have been around for a while, this Organization went through... you would have to go to eighteen different places to find the answer for something and we changed it so it was one top... one-stop shopping in the C&R. There's no reason to switch horses in the middle of the stream. It should stay in the C&R.

He has saved our organization thousands and thousands of dollars in making sure that his father can continue to get things done at the National Headquarters. So, he's very deserving of this award.

Next up we have the Meritorious Service Award with Gold Star, which recognizes those Brothers for exceptionally meritorious service in...in service and significant accomplishments to the SUVCW as a whole as voted upon by the Council of Administration. The first...I'll read the name of the recipient and then I'll read the citation that was submitted. So, the first recipient is Brother David Wildermuth from the Department of Illinois. For meritorious achievement in the superior performance in the accomplishment of the ideals and principals of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War during the period of May 2021 until May 2022. Brother David Wildermuth of the Department of Illinois has for the past year worked tirelessly and made many trips from his home in Fairview, Illinois near St. Louis to work on the Dr. Benjamin Stephen Gravesite Improvement Project at Petersburg, Illinois. He has worked with the committee to the backlog of memorial bricks headquarters that were left during the transition from the city of Petersburg administration to Department of Illinois control. This period was during the last illness of Committee Chair, Past Department Commander Jerry Dyer, and the onset of the COVID pandemic. PDC Dyer's wish was for the project to continue and be successful, as he knew he wouldn't live to see it completed. Many bricks were left to be engraved and installed. And Brother David drove up to Roseville Cemetery in Petersburg to install them himself. Brother David was also on the Department Encampment Site Selection Committee and made countless calls and several trips in the last couple of years to procure suitable locations for the Department to hold its annual and midterm Encampment. Brother David, as Commander of Colonel Hecker Camp #443 has been a tireless promoter of the SUVCW and has set up many displays to promote knowledge of Civil War history and local

figures who played a part. He is also worked on several monument restorations for his Camp, most recently to recover a small damaged GAR marker in the back corner of a local cemetery in Fairview Heights and move it to a place of prominence at the city's government complex. The actions, ability, initiative, and dedication of Brother David Wildermuth will reflect great credit upon himself, his Department, and the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.

And she gets the first shot. Another MSA with Gold Star, this one to Brother Roderick Fraser, of the Department of Massachusetts. For meritorious achievement in the superior performance and the accomplishment of the ideals and principles of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War during the period of 9 September 2016 until 18 May 2022. Brother Roderick Fraser, of the Department of Massachusetts, since becoming a member of the SUVCW in September 2016, Brother Fraser, a retired Naval service warfare officer, Commander of the USS Underwood during Operation Iraqi Freedom, and former City of Boston Fire Commissioner from '06 to 2014, has dedicated himself to this Organization and has gone above and beyond his duty as a member to strengthen and improve the Order. In his first year as a member, Brother Fraser revived the Department of Massachusetts' newsletter, the Clarion Call, which he continues to edit and publish. He also maintains the Department electronic mailing list and conducts mass mailings for the Department, facilitating communication within the Department. Brother Fraser initiated and coordinated the Department's sponsorship of the Massachusetts History Bowl State Championship for high school students, advancing recruiting and branding for the Order. He was a member of the Encampment Host Committee for the 2018 National Encampment in Framingham, Massachusetts, where as some may remember, he provided the gigantic federal flag used as a backdrop at the head table. This added greatly to the patriotic atmosphere at the 2018 National Encampment. This flag was a gift from his men upon his retirement from military

service. Brother Fraser initiated and continues to coordinate and raise funds for a major ongoing project to restore the General Charles Russell Lowell GAR Post #7 burial plot at Mount Hope Cemetery in Boston. The project includes the straightening and cleaning of federal headstones, repairing vandalism on the plot's granite curbing and decorations, restoring two artillery pieces and their bases which are in static display. This project has given Brother Fraser, his Camp, and the SUVCW great recognition among Boston's city officials, local veterans groups, and the local community. Brother Fraser has referred ten Brothers for membership in the SUVCW, both in Massachusetts and Rhode Island, where he is a dual member. He continues recruiting efforts among members of military and hereditary groups to which he belongs, such as the Sons of the American Revolution and Massachusetts Military Society. Brother Rod is a graduate of Memorial University and has authored a Camp's Secretary's Handbook for the National Organization which is under review by the National Secretary. In this way, he uses his education and communication skills to lead and teach others within our Order. He is the co-founder and current Camp Commander of the Colonel Robert Gould Shaw Camp #54 in Boston and was also the author of the Camp's initial bylaws. His organizational and communicational skills are a great benefit to expanding the membership and conducting the business of SUVCW. Brother Rod found that the first African-American Union Army nurse was buried in Boston without any notation of her name and accomplishment. He conceived of, planned for, raised funding through grant requests and lobbying for matching funds, procured and coordinated the erection and engraving of a monument for Susie Baker King Taylor, the Union Army's first African-American nurse and had her name engraved on the headstone of the grave she shares with her husband. This work furthers the mission of the SUVCW to honor all veterans, and especially those who served from 1861 to 1865. Brother Rod currently serves as the Department of Massachusetts' Senior Vice Department Commander and is appointed to the National Promotions and Marketing Committee where, among his other achievements, he initiated and maintains the SUVCW's YouTube channel. Brother Fraser is a member of the First Military District SVR and serves as the District's Public Information Officer. His leadership and technical skills are a great asset to the Order and promotes the Order on the Internet. This past year, Brother Fraser organized a dedication ceremony for the Susie Baker King Taylor Monument, which included speeches by Commander-in-Chief Michel Paquette, Boston Mayor Kim Janey, and Historian Rebecca Byrd. For the public, the ceremony is as important as the monument, as public recognition for those who serve, regardless of race or sex, inspires the current generation to do the same. And with a good deal of media coverage, both on television and in print, it reinforces the SUVCW name and brand in the public's mind. Brother Fraser is currently conducting video interviews with SUVCW Brothers for the Order's What Makes Us Brothers video series on the YouTube channel. He is using his technical skill to promote fraternity and inspire others to join our Order. Brother Fraser is coordinating the First Military District participation in the rededication of the Robert Gould Shaw 54th Massachusetts Monument in Boston on June 1, which will include 54th Massachusetts Infantry reenactors, the Boston Children's Choir, and noted VIPs and speakers such as U.S. Vice-President Harris and Secretary of Defense, Lloyd J. Austin, III. This will be an historic event and Brother Fraser is determined to include the SUVCW in the public celebration. The actions, ability, initiative, and dedication of Brother Roderick Fraser reflect great credit upon himself, his Department, and the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.

Next up we have the Elmer Bud Atkinson Lifetime Achievement Award, which is awarded to Brothers with over thirty years of exceptional continuous performance and dedication to the Order. The first recipient is Brother Jerome Orton, Past Department Commander, Department of New York. Since Brother Jerry Orton joined the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War in 1970, he has committed and dedicated himself in promoting the Boys in Blue and the SUVCW. Brother Orton received his fifty-year pin in 2020. He has served in numerous positions within the David G. Caywood Camp #146 to include being the Camp Commander. He is currently the Camp Historian. Brother Orton was elected as New York Department Commander for the term 1980-81. After his term, he still to this day serves the Department. Brother Orton and Past Commander-in-Chief Wheeler developed the book at the Department 125th Encampment, showing pictures of all the existing GAR statutes in New York State and their location. Brother Orton was instrumental in preserving the GAR Highway. He currently serves on the GAR and SUVCW Property and Artifacts Committee and as the New York Historian. On the National level, Past Department Commander Orton serves on the Real Sons Committee. His tireless dedication and tracking existing Real Sons and new Sons didn't go unnoticed. National in 2000, presented him with the Meritorious Service Award with Gold Star. In 2008, the Department of New York recognized Brother Orton's dedication to our Order and presented him with the Department's highest award, the Past Commander-in-Chief Joseph S. Rippey Memorial Award for Outstanding Service. Throughout his time as a member of the SUVCW, Brother Orton supported all the Camps within the Department of New York exemplifying our motto of Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty. Brother Orton even has the Boy Scouts raise the American flag at Grant's Tomb. Just this past Memorial Day weekend in 2022, he brought the attention of the town of Volney elected officials, the significance of the 125th anniversary of the GAR Statute in Voorhees Park. The rededication ceremony was held, thanks to his efforts. In addition, Brother Orton continues to set up exhibits to promote the Order. Past Department Commander Jerry Orton is well-respected as he set a high standard of what it means to preserve and perpetuate the memory of the Boys in Blue and what a Brother in good standing should strive to achieve.

The next Lifetime Achievement Award goes to Brother Nicholas Kaup of the Department of Illinois. Brother Nicholas Kaup, Past Department Commander, joined the Order as a member of the General Benjamin Pritchard Camp #20, Department of Michigan on October 24, 1989. As a resident of Illinois, he works tirelessly to bring the Department of Illinois back to active status after a period of inactivity. He organized the reactivation of the General George Armstrong Custer Camp #1 in Cook County, for which he has served as Camp Commander more than six separate nonconsecutive times. He was also instrumental in the formation of the General Philip H. Sheridan Camp #2 in Aurora, General John A. McClernand Camp #4 in Springfield, and

Colonel Friedrich Hecker Camp #443 in Belleville. As Camp Organizer for the Department of Illinois, a position he has held for many years, he organized the formation and/or reactivation of Old Glory Camp 6165 in Chicago and U.S. Grant Camp 1863 in Schaumburg. Brother Kaup served two terms as Department Commander, 1991-92 and then again 1994-95. He currently holds the office of Commander of Camp 6165 while being an active member of Camps 1, 1863, and 6165. He served on the Host Committee for the last two National Encampments which were held in Springfield and continues to serve when elected to the Department Council as well as various elected and appointed roles within the Camps to which he belongs. Brother Kaup led the placement of 228 headstones and restoration of the Rock of Chickamauga Memorial at Rosehill Cemetery in Chicago, a project for which his Camp received the Abraham Lincoln Award. He has served many terms as both Department Eagle Scout Coordinator and Department ROTC Coordinator. He has served as President of the Central Region Association, National Graves Registrar, and National Color Bearer. He also currently serves on the Benjamin A. Stephen Memorial Plaza Committee and has helped plan/acquire speakers for the annual ceremony at the gravesite in Petersburg, Illinois. He continues to produce or assist with the Memorial Weekend program at Rosehill Cemetery in Chicago and honor the memory of the Boys in Blue there buried. In 2017, for all his efforts, the Council of Administration through Commander-in-Chief Donald Martin awarded Brother Kaup the Meritorious Service Award with Gold Star. In the intervening time and through the complexity of a global pandemic, Brother Kaup has neither tired nor slumbered. The Department of California and Pacific is comprised of fourteen Camps, all in good standing. We are in the process of forming a fifteenth Camp in the Central Valley of California. Our Department is proud to have over 330 Brothers, including dual members from Canada and the East Coast. With changes in the behavior of COVID, most Camps returned in person meetings. Some are still holding virtual meetings, and others are experimenting with hybrid technology. This past March, we were all excited to have our first in-person Department Encampment in three years. We were honored with the presence of Commander-in-Chief Mike Paquette. Most of our Camps participated in Memorial Day observances in one form or another this past May. These included both public and private ceremonies, placing flags on the graves of Civil War veterans, and conducting their own Camp Memorial Day services. Additionally, most Camps also participated in Independence Day events, either by marching in parades or other patriotic activities. Some Camps have also active participating with living history, school education presentations, and other public events promoting to the Order. Since in-person gatherings are less restrictive, we have been happy to resume our work on graves registration. And as a result, I am very proud to report that our own Michael Emett of General Stoneman Camp 18 has achieved the remarkable task of registering almost 500 Civil War graves this past year. 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lines 42 from 41 does not allow for manual editing. It draws its numbers from line 30, total number of Brothers subject to National per capita subtract lines 28, 29 from line 27. Brothers who are exempt from National per capita are not necessarily exempt from Department per capita. For example, the number of life numbers needs to be added back to line 43, unless exempted by Department bylaws. This results in a incorrect amount due the Department. That is our recommendation, sir.

We had an attendance of over two hundred people and a lot of relatives of Colonel Heg himself from Norway. So it was a real...it was a great event. Also, as you heard yesterday, we completed our Last Soldier Project in Wisconsin. And I just wanted to give a shout out to Brian McManus 'cause he administered most of the ordering and sending out of the stars that we had made up for the Last Soldiers. So, Kevin Tucker made the motion and Brian Pierson seconded. All those in favor? Lower your cards. Anyone opposed? Thank you, Brothers. All right. So, the topic we're going to get into this morning, I'll provide... Is it appropriate for me to talk about this?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

Yes.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Okay. So, when I took over as Commander-in-Chief last August, one of the very first items that was put on my plate was this topic that we're going to address right now. So, you can see the first copy in the hand out packet was dated July 31, 2020, and it was sent to the Chairman of our Memorials Committee, Walt Busch. And I'm just going to summarize the letter. But General Services Administration is basically been the custodian for this monument since it was... Well, since the GSA was formed. But it's been sitting on federal property since it was installed by the GAR. And the GAR specifically wanted it on federal property. So, that's why it ended up there. There's been some painting and other defacement of the monument. It's basically a monolith, a pillar. It doesn't have a likeness of Kit Carson on it. But it's a tribute to Kit Carson. Kit Carson was a member of the GAR. And Kit Carson and his brothers in the Santa Fe. New Mexico area are the ones that were the movers and the shakers behind the effort to have him memorialized with this monument. And it makes credits to him as a soldier and a patriot, and an Indian fighter. And as you can imagine, that last part about being an Indian fighter is not well received by the indigenous peoples of this country in the Santa Fe area. So there's been ongoing debate about this monument for decades. It's erupted in the 1970's and again with all of the vandalism and destructions of monuments that we've seen during COVID, there's been a resurgence of it. So the mayor of Santa Fe has requested its removal as well. But it's on federal property so the mayor and the city has no jurisdiction over it. So, if you look at the memo or the letter from General Services Administration, they're basically asking for two things for us. Number one, they believe the monument belongs to us per our Deed of Conveyance that since the Deed of Conveyance say we inherit... or at least the records... Now, we'll get to this in

clarification. But based on the Deed of Conveyance, they believe we own it. And the second point is, they wanted to know what our feelings are about having it moved. I've personally spoken with Mr. Gardia, who wrote the letter. I initially contacted him in January and I had a conversation with him this past week to see if there had been any changes to GSA's position on the monument. What he shared with me this week is they've chosen really not to pursue anything until the fall with the hopes that things have settled down some. So, they're gonna start getting serious about whatever they're gonna do come the fall. So, whether they intend to move it, whatever...whatever they intend to do. So, we are not here this morning to debate on whether or not it gets moved. We should be consistent with our monument protection policy which states that we are against moving monuments or having monuments removed. However, ultimately the decision is not ours to make because it resides on federal property. So, the discussion today should be purely constrained to do we own the monument or not. And the reason...I've waited to make a decision on this, I do not believe that this is something the Commander-in-Chief should be making a decision about. I don't think it's something that the Council of Administration should be making a decision about. This should be decided here on the floor of a National Encampment. So, just a little bit more background before we get in to discussion is... Brother Enderlin, are you out here?

Could you... So during the research on this, we actually used our GAR records database in Santa Fe, in New Mexico, and the Department of the Southwest. So, here's something that we're actually able to get some valuable information from it. Go ahead and approach the mic.

Dean A. Enderlin, National GAR Records Officer

Commander, Dean Enderlin, Past Department Commander, Department of California and Pacific, National GAR Records Officer. Yeah, I did some research on this topic to try to, first of all, track down the fate of any GAR records from the Department of New Mexico. There was a Department there. They were vibrant for a time, but as with most GAR Departments and their posts, through time they dwindled to the point where, I believe, there was only one or two posts remaining. And at that time, a decision was made at a National Encampment to consolidate the final Post with the Department of Colorado and Wyoming. So, it became a became a... (sneeze) Excuse me. It became a case of tracking down the fate of those records. Because just like us, as Departments come and go, the Grand Army of the Republic saw to it that their records were passed and the jurisdiction of Departments was passed from one to another depending upon the viability of a Department. So that's where our trail has led us. We're out of New Mexico and we're now into Colorado trying to determine whether those records are...and if they still exist. And at this point, we haven't located any...any proof that shows, you know, the ownership of that monument in document form in any Department records. And hopefully at some point, they'll turn up.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brother Dean. So, there's also been searches made in the records department

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in the city of Santa Fe to see if there's anything that the GAR Post in Santa Fe did to turn over that monument. And all the searches have turned up empty. So, there's no conclusive proof beyond the Deed of Conveyance that the monument truly belongs to Sons of Union Veterans. Brother Walt Busch, is there anything that you'd like to add, since you received this letter initially?

Walter E. Busch, National Civil War Memorials Officer

Brother Walt Busch, Past Department Commander, Department of Missouri, Civil War Memorial Officer. Nope! You did a good job.

Encampment

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brother Walt. You don't get a compliment from Brother Walt very often.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All right. So, the ultimate... not the ultimate issue but the use of our Deed of Conveyance, we have used it in the past to create, claim cemetery plots and other items located in cemeteries. But this is a departure from how we've used the Deed of Conveyance in the past. And that is the other issue because our decision here today will affect how the Order uses the Deed of Conveyance in...in the future. I'd like Brother Pahl to talk about what the Deed of Conveyance does and doesn't do.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Okay. Go ahead.

Keith G. Harrison, Past Commander-in-Chief

Keith Harrison, Past Commander-in-Chief. I noticed in the July 31st letter, it says the GSA discovered the monument was organized and erected by the Grand Army of the Republic. They must have had some sort of records to determine that. Wouldn't you think?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Repeat that please.

Keith G. Harrison, Past Commander-in-Chief

The letter from the GSA says that GSA discovered the monument was organized and erected by the Grand Army of the Republic. Don't they have some sort of records that they based that on?

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Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All they're saying as a result of the property Deed of Conveyance (indistinguishable)...

Keith G. Harrison, Past Commander-in-Chief

...(Indistinguishable)...

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

...that's what they're basing ownership on, is the Deed of Conveyance.

Keith G. Harrison, Past Commander-in-Chief

Okay, but that hasn't answered my question.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

I was... Past Commander-in-Chief, Mark Day, National Counselor. I was part of the discussion on this issue from the beginning. There is a newspaper article, Brother Keith, that indicated that the monument was erected by the GAR. That is probably the evidence that the GAO is using for this... to establish that providence.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother Pahl.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Go ahead, Brother.

Cameron S. Brown, Department of Michigan

Thank you. Cameron Brown, March to the Sea Camp #135, Department of Michigan. Was there in the Deed of Conveyance a statement of reversion? Was there a reverter clause in the Deed of Conveyance?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All right. So, Brother, I've asked Brother Pahl to provide a description of what the Deed of Conveyance does or does not do. So, let's allow him an opportunity to do that, which will probably answer your question.

Cameron S. Brown, Department of Michigan

Thank you, sir.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

James Pahl, National Parliamentarian. Also happen to be an attorney at law. The Deed of Conveyance was executed by the last surviving member of the Grand Army of the Republic deeding to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War all property of the National

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Organization, Grand Army of the Republic. What does that entail? Under laws of the Grand Army of the Republic, the local Posts were allowed to own real estate and (indistinguishable) property that did not transfer to the Department when the Post ceased to exist. The only property the Post, that belonged to the National Organization, were the record books. Those items were to be turned over to the Department by the Post and reported (indistinguishable) and the Department to National. Real estate and other personal property was of the Post to dispose of as they chose. Most of them sold or gave real estate and other items to local American Legion Posts, VFW Posts, et cetera. There's a number of ways that they disposed of property. But unlike the Sons, Grand Army real estate did not transfer to the Department. So, that's from the legal point of view. The only property conveyed by the deed of conveyance is record books.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brother Pahl. What we've...further question. In your opinion, as an attorney, what are... are there any risks with us assuming ownership of this monument?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

Yes. If there's damage to it and the GSA desires it to be repaired, that could be required of us if we assume ownership. If they order it removed, that cost could be passed on to us. If someone is injured and are near the monument and they believe that the owner of the monument is responsible, we could be liable for personal injury, the same as any other property that we own. Those are the risks that we would face.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brother Pahl. I will open it up for discussion. Brother Darby.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Don Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief. I do have a question. If we waive our Deed of Conveyance for ownership on this particular item, does it affect our Deed of Conveyance for any other properties or things that we may have to claim? In other words, if we say, "We don't own this" and we're not going to "act on our Deed of Conveyance," does that cancel that Deed of Conveyance for any other things that may arise?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

I may... James Pahl, Past Commander-in-Chief. The answer to your question is somewhat.

Encampment

(laughter).

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

The problem is we have used the Deed of Conveyance in the past when talking with various cemeteries to gain "control" of various GAR burial plots. I know of several Camps that

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are primarily responsible for maintaining those burial plots. We have a policy in place of what to do with unused GAR burial plots. So, we have "used" this Deed of Conveyance. We've kind of stretched it a little in the past, to lay claim to various items. It wouldn't be absolute if we declined. But it's precedent that could be used against us if we find something that we want to claim down the road.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

So, basically one of our things are we could possibly lose the... possibly... weakly... lose our Deed of Conveyance or we could get the living crap sued out of us if the thing falls over on somebody and he happens to be now the richest guy in the state.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

It would inhibit us in the claim of other items if they find that out. And, yeah, we would get the crap sued out of us (chuckling) if it fell over on somebody.

Brian C. Pierson, Council of Administration

Brian Pierson, Past Commander-in-Chief. We've also used the Deed of Conveyance to protect...

<u>Unknown</u>

(Indistinguishable) mic.

Brian C. Pierson, Council of Administration

...We've also used the Deed of Conveyance to protect cannons in cemeteries that people have sold off as part of monuments, so there is...there is direct precedent on that. Have we had a chance to explore, in this case, that any monument erected on federal property becomes property of the United States government? Do we know the answer to that question?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

I don't believe we do.

Brian C. Pierson, Council of Administration Okay. Thank you.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Let's go to the back.

Jeffrey French, Department of New York

Jeffrey French, New York Department Commander. Question of clarification for Past Commander-in-Chief, Brother Pahl. If we go ahead and relinquish responsibility on this statute, will it affect all GAR statues that we're involved in restoring and will we no longer have ownership of those statues?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

If we already have ownership, I don't think it's going to impact that, if there's items that

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we currently possess. It's in the future, if we wanted to acquire. That may impact that, yes.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother Frail.

Bruce D. Frail, Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief

Bruce Frail, Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief. I'm looking at it as the Deed of Conveyance limits what we can possess as far as to the records. We should really start living within that boundary. I understand what people are saying about the gravesites and the other monuments and items of that nature. As far as the gravesites go, during my term as National Graves Registration Officer, I worked with several cemeteries and successfully were able to transfer deeds to the SUVCW of GAR plots. And in most of those cases, just mentioning the Deed of Conveyance was more than enough. But in some of those cases, just having somebody willing to take over the control of those plots was satisfactory to the cemeteries involved. So, I don't see where there's going to be a major issue with cemetery graves or plots. As far as the legal liability, we need to cover our butts. This is something that we don't know if we own or not. The verbiage of the Deed of Conveyance does not transfer ownership to us. And think we should walk away from it in this instance. And we should outline that decision in this instance with the criteria at...available to us now.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brother Bruce. In the back.

Sumner G. Hunnewell, Department of Missouri

Sumner Hunnewell, Department of Missouri, Past Department Commander. I think that our policy should be consistent. I think that if we waiver in certain things, then we will end up with situations where there maybe something else that happens within the area where we have to turn around and say, "Well, yes that was an exception and this isn't." I think that we need to be consistent in our policy.

Bruce R. Kolb, Department of Indiana

Commander, Bruce Kolb, Past Department Commander, Department of Indiana, former judge, current attorney for the state of Indiana. I look at the language of the Deed of Conveyance and it says, "I, Albert Wilson, sole surviving member thereof, do hereby grant bargain, sale, convey to said Commander-in-Chief Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, all property of any and every kind and nature owned by said Grand Army of the Republic and whatsoever situate," which obviously no matter where it's located, "and all the records and archives thereof." And so I…I kind of look at that language, and so, that was what I've looked at in terms of the conveyance of, as it says, "any and all property" which may include the monuments and things of that nature.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

James Pahl. The key word there is "may." We would have to prove, if we're going to claim something, that chain, because again, under GAR rules and regs, the property did not automatically go to the Department when the Post dissolved. So, we'd have to show some kind

of conveyance that that the property remained property of the Grand Army of the Republic. So, that's the conundrum. That's the conundrum. And I should point out there wasn't a problem proving the conveyance. The Sons at the time took that Deed of Conveyance to the United States Federal District Court for the District Court of Columbia. The United States District Court Judge ruled that the Deed of Conveyance to be valid...

Bruce R. Kolb, Department of Indiana

...Um-hm...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

...and I have a certified copy of that order in my possession at home.

Bruce R. Kolb, Department of Indiana

Yes.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

But certainly, that's the conundrum. At least, that's what the deed says, but what does that consist of? And it's a stretch as to what actually remained property of the Grand Army of the Republic when the Deed of Conveyance was signed. We have to show that chain from the local Post up to the National Organization for anything other than the record books.

Bruce R. Kolb, Department of Indiana

Okay. All right. Thank you.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

In the back.

John R. Conrad, Department of the Southwest

Commander-in-Chief, John Conrad, Past Department Commander, Department of the Southwest. I was one of the people that helped Commander-in-Chief with the research on this, particularly with respect to the deed if any and the ownership of the monument itself. We've got to keep in mind that you never get to the Deed of Conveyance if there's no deed that gets it to the GAR. And we have no paperwork, nothing at all, in the land records in Santa Fe that would indicate that the GAR Post, the Carlton Post, that was last in charge of the monument, and the fundraising for the monument, that that Post ever did anything with its interests in this monument at the time of its dissolution. So, we're missing a step. We're missing a step that would have to occur of a transfer from the Post to the Department or subsequently the Department of Colorado and Wyoming, which the Department of New Mexico pulled it into in later years. There's no paperwork anywhere in there to establish that. So, we're saying if we were to take an action of taking ownership, we're saying that we would be assuming something that doesn't even exist in paper. The second point that I want to make is, Brothers, this monument is in very poor condition. It's made of sandstone. The GSA, years ago, did rehabilitative work on it. But if that monument is moved in anyway, it's probably gonna disintegrate. It's in very bad condition. So, taking ownership of it to move it somewhere else, probably is...cause incurring expense that we don't need to incur because there won't be anything left.

Brother Day.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Past Commander-in-Chief, Mark Day, National Counselor. I would like to echo what was just said by Brother Conrad. My concern is the financial responsibilities that we may face. Yes, we may have a million dollars in the bank, most of which is in trust. If we have to move this thing... I'm kind of familiar with the cost to move monuments being from Virginia where they have been moving a lot of monuments. It could cost us more than one million dollars if they told us we had to move it. If we have to restore it, it could cost us more than a million dollars to have to restore it. We...this is a no-win proposition for us. What happens here is we may upset ourselves because we'll feel we don't live up to what we believe in. Or we could physically destroy this Organization and end it in one fell swoop. And I think that's what you have to consider here today. What does this...what's the impact? What is the...what's gonna happen down the road? What is gonna be our fate? Can we live with the fact that we let this monument go or can we live with the fact that we destroyed this Organization?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

In the back.

Walter E. Busch, National Civil War Memorials Officer

Brother Walt Busch, Past Department Commander, Department of Missouri. I'm not necessarily speaking about this monument right now. I understand that there are a lot of concerns with that. My question would be to National Treasurer. We have insurance. Every couple of months, I send a request to the Treasurer to hear him say, "We need insurance for this event. We need insurance for that event." And I would certainly hope that our National Officers have some insurance to cover them in case of somebody falling (indistinguishable) or something like that. So, my question is is... can there be a... insurance policy that we can attach to maybe future monuments or other monuments or special projects that we might want to have so that these things can be covered so that we reduce the liability to our Organization.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother Beard, would you mind taking that question?

D. Michael Beard, National Treasurer

Michael Beard, National Treasurer. Our... the only property covered in our insurance policy right now is the National Headquarters and the Quartermaster supplies. They're specifically listed in the policy. There's no mention in the policy of GAR plots, cannons, or anybody... And if I recall, the Camps and Departments are required to carry their own policies on physical property. So, right now, if that statue fell over and hit somebody, I'm not sure the insurance company would pay on that particular thing because we never told them we owned a monument out in Santa Fe, New Mexico. I would just point out that the United States government says we own this; that is an official representative of the GSA saying the SUVCW owns the property. And if you want to say we don't own the property, and tell the United States government Deed of Conveyance doesn't apply. So that, to me, is a different issue.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

I'm not an insurance expert or anything, but can you insure property that you don't own?

Yeah, so like, I mean, in order to do that, you'd have...we'd have to claim ownership and then insure it.

I apologize. My name is Robert Wolz. I'm National Historian and from the Department of Ohio. And I wanted to cite a precedent. I think it was either 1972 or 1973, I was serving as either Junior Vice Commander-in-Chief or Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief and something similar... I'm not saying it's the same by any means, but something similar came up. And the way the officers handled it at that time was we fully accept our responsibility under the Deed of Conveyance, but we very quickly quit deeded the property over to the city so they got to handle the problem and not us. So, that way both of us are protected. We get to keep the deed intact without any questioning and at the same time, we can give it to the GSA and they can deal with the monument in whatever shape it's in. We don't have to deal with it.

Okay. The Kit Carson monument to the GSA?

...Don Darby. All right. So, Brothers, what I would ask for future discussion is whether you're standing in favor of or against the motion. So, when you start your discussion, please let us know if you are for or against the motion. In the back of the room.

William E. Fischer, Jr., Department of Pennsylvania

Yes, Commander, Bill Fisher, Pennsylvania Department, Senior Vice Commander. I support Brother Wolz' motion. The last year that I was in the National Park Service before retirement, I was the Park Partnership Coordinator and Agreements Technical Representative. And we were dealing for two or three years before that with an entity that claimed an inholding

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in our park but had no correct paperwork. And this is essentially... we could look at it as an inholding on a federal property. I got tired of dealing with (indistinguishable) along with my superintendent, our congressional delegation time and time again because with folks who are claiming that inholding had some powerful friends. I appreciate the GSA's due diligence in assuming our ownership of this. But I think that Brother Wolz' motion provides us with an out. I agree with Brother Frail where this will not affect our relationships with cemeteries and working with GAR plots and monuments and with other local and state governmental entities as opposed to federal government. Since there's no clear-cut agreement, if you will, or contract, regarding that monument, I think that Brother Wolz has provided our out to not have to deal with the liability of it in the future. Thank you.

A question for...

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

...First identify yourself...

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

...Mark Day, Past Commander-in-Chief, National Counselor. A question to the Parliamentarian who is our legal advisor in this particular situation. Does the GSA have to accept the transfer from us to them? I believe in reading that letter, that what the GSA is looking for is somebody to take responsibility so they don't have to have responsibility.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Is it required upon them to accept the transfer of the property or can they deny...can they turn it down? And then we are permanently stuck with the responsibility for the monument.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

That's a good question.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

I'm James Pahl and it depends upon state law in that state. It goes to what real estate law is.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Oh.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

Each state operates differently. What a quit claim deed does is we make no warranties about what we have but whatever interests we have; we are gifting or transferring to the grantee. We can file that document with the local registrar of deeds office without GSA approval and just mail them a copy. And say... here you go.

Encampment

(laughter).

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

Yeah. I think...I think it's not so much the GSA is looking for someone to blame as they're just trying to track down ownership and resolve the issues without trampling on other people's toes. If we have ownership interest, they're willing to respect that. If we surrender that, and I think our gentleman just spoke regarding his service from the Parks Service, he thinks it's a great idea. It's a similar federal entity, with you know, they accept a quit claim deed, I think it resolves some local questions and allow them to act.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

I'm fully... I'm fully in agreement with that idea. But, we have no documentation that proves we actually own it; that it was actually transferred to the National GAR. My interpretation of the Deed of Conveyance is that only the property of the National, not those people below because Albert Wilson only represented the National level of that Organization, not the individual Posts or Departments.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

That could be correct. We don't need that. (Indistinguishable)...

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

...(Indistinguishable) any document (indistinguishable)...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

...Whatever interest we have or claim that we have of any type, way, shape, or form, we give away or granting to the grantee.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Okay.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

Whatever our interest is. And it could be a...

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

...Okay...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

...I can't even trip my tongue over my own teeth. (Indistinguishable)...

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

...I have just...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

...(indistinguishable) or claim. But it's whatever claim we have, we're giving to GSA.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

All right. So, I'm just gonna ask one question. Do we know, right now today in this room, what the legals... what the laws are in that state on quit claims?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

No.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Then I would suggest that any action taken today, in the absence of that legal advice, is inadvisable. Because we could do what Brother Bob said to do, we could take that action, but if we don't know what the legal ramifications are or what the state or what the laws are without proper research, we are basically taking a risk.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

Mark, I think you're mixing apples and oranges.

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Okay.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

The only question is, Does GSA have to accept it or not?

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

Right. But you just...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

... That's the only question (indistinguishable)...

Mark R. Day, National Counselor

...But you just (indistinguishable)...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

...Everything else, you know the answer to. If they don't have to, they may choose to reject it I think is a bridge we can cross when we get to it. But that doesn't impair the ability to offer that solution and execute a quit claim deed and see if the GSA will accept it. If they don't, then Council has a problem and we'll probably talk about this in Nashua.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, I'll give a final question to the Parliamentarian if you will. Will it fall out of order in asking a question. But, if we say we own it and documentation comes up at some point in the future that someone else actually owns it, do you open yourselves up to being able to turn it over to GSA?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

No, cause we're providing a quit claim deed not a warranty deed. A warranty deed is real warranting that we have ownership interests. A quit claim deed is we are surrendering whatever claim we may have, whether it actually exists or not.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Okay. Thank you. In the back.

Jeffrey French, Department of New York

Jeffrey French, New York Department Commander. Even though this recommendation gives a way out, it's only kicking the can down the road. There's a lot of GAR statues, soldier and sailor statues we don't have the definitive proof that the GAR really owned. So, we're not really dealing with the issue at hand. Right now, we solve this issue, if we go ahead and transfer this particular statue. But what...are we gonna do, as an Organization, for future statues, GAR statues? Are we gonna seriously look at financial implications that Brother Dave brought up, the liability issues, and proceed with our mission of preserving the memories of the Boys in Blue through the GAR statues? That have not been brought up, what will be brought up in the days to come with the current climate that is going on.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, Brother French...

Jeffrey French, Department of New York

... That's the real question that we got to answer...

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

...Brother French, that's not the motion on the floor. I'm trying to limit the conversation to the motion on the floor.

Jeffrey French, Department of New York

I understand. But this motion...

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

....80....

Jeffrey French, Department of New York ...(indistinguishable)...

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

...So bring it up under the Good of the Order or at another point, if that is a concern. We're gonna limit the discussion to the Brothers that are standing right now and terminate discussion at that point. Back to the front.

Gary L. Gibson, Department of Michigan

Commander-in-Chief, Gary Gibson, Past Department Commander, Michigan. Through you to Brother Pahl. Does the fact that this actually stands on federal land and that in the recent past, the GSA or whomever has altered that monument. Does that have any effect, the fact that we do not own it? What I'm thinking of is monuments that have been placed on battlefields by the Grand Army itself, not regimentals, but Grand Army monuments and for instance, our monument at Gettysburg. We don't care for that monument. Gettysburg National Military Park cares for that monument. So doesn't that...would that case apply to what we're discussing?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

I'm not sure I understand your question.

Gary L. Gibson, Department of Michigan

No. Okay. Does the monument sit on federal property?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian Yes.

Gary L. Gibson, Department of Michigan

Okay. So does the Woolson monument.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian Yes.

Gary L. Gibson, Department of Michigan

Okay. We don't care for the... we don't take care of personally the Woolson monument. Do we have ownership of that monument?

<u>Unknown</u>

No.

Gary L. Gibson, Department of Michigan

Okay. And if we don't, why would we own this one?

<u>Unknown</u>

(Indistinguishable).

Gary L. Gibson, Department of Michigan

Not necessarily.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

That's a good question. And I have taken affirmative steps in the past to maintain the monument.

Gary L. Gibson, Department of Michigan

Yes.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

But I think what they are trying... what my opinion is what they're trying to do is see if there is any claim of ownership so they're not stepping on any toes in the future and creating problems for themselves. I think, my personal opinion, based on what I've seen and listened to other Brothers, is if we offer them a quit claim, they'll say, "Thank you." And we can move forward now however, we want to move and not worry about stepping on other people's toes.

Gary L. Gibson, Department of Michigan

Okay. Thank you.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

In the back.

Frank Tomasello, Department of New Jersey

Brother Commander, Frank Tomasello, Senior Vice Department Commander, Department of New Jersey and a retired New Jersey attorney. I have a slight problem with the current motion in that we take position that our Deed of Conveyance entitles us to all property. I think in this particular case, we should be focusing on this particular statue and not going on record saying we have now taken a position that the Deed of Conveyance entitles us to everything under the sun. I don't think that was what was meant by the motion, but that is the way it's framed.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, Brother Secretary, read us back the motion, please.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

The SUVCW fully acknowledges our Deed of Conveyance regarding all property that was not previously disposed of, and that we issue a quit claim concerning the Kit Carson monument to the GSA.

Frank Tomasello, Department of New Jersey

In my opinion, it should be limited to this particular piece of property.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, Brother Frank, what specific... I understand what you're saying. But where do you see the... Where, specifically, is your concern? Is it just because we said all?

Frank Tomasello, Department of New Jersey

Correct, sir.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, are you going to make an amendment to the motion?

Frank Tomasello, Department of New Jersey

Well, I would make... offer an amendment that we replace the word all with the Kit Carson monument in Santa Fe.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

I think the motion is properly worded the replacement.

Encampment

(chatter).

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Read the motion back one more time, National Secretary.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

The SUVCW fully acknowledges our Deed of Conveyance regarding all property that was not previously disposed of... Second part and that we issue a quit claim concerning the Kit Carson monument to the GSA.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, is the first part of that sentence necessary for this motion? Question?

Several unknowns

Yes.

Frank Tomasello, Department of New Jersey

If we eliminate that sentence, then that eliminates the issue. Also, while I'm on my feet, we should be saying quit claim deed, not just a quit claim in the second sentence.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

Thank you.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So... you're motion is to insert the word deed afterwards?

Frank Tomasello, Department of New Jersey

After quit claim, yes. And initially, I...at this point, I mean, I think I would be happier if eliminated the first sentence.

<u>Unknown</u>

You can't.

Frank Tomasello, Department of New Jersey

If it's not, then at least change the word all to the Kit Carlson monument in Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All right. So, what I'd like to do is we will hear from Brother Dean and I'll... we'll take a break here before we go to a vote. I want to hear specifically how you want to modify the motion and not try to make sausage here on our feet.

Frank Tomasello, Department of New Jersey

Okay.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

And we will do a... Say again.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

And write it down.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Write it down and we will hear a final discussion point from Brother Enderlin.

Dean A. Enderlin, National GAR Records Officer

Commander-in-Chief, Dean Enderlin, National GAR Records Officer. I support...

Multiple Brothers

Can't hear.

Dean A. Enderlin, National GAR Records Officer

Got to speak up real close here. Okay. Here we go. Dean Enderlin, National GAR Records Officer. I support the motion and I support Brother Pahl's guidance to state this is a quit claim for this particular case. I think when using the Deed of Conveyance, in my experience, going through records and cases with the GAR, the Deed of Conveyance gives us the legal clout if we need it. But each case has to be taken case by case. There's no blanket, you know, rule for this. What I have seen are a myriad of cases where the Grand Army of the Republic by different ways, conveyed their property and their records, to other entities prior to the execution of the Deed of Conveyance. And so, what we did in this particular case is do our due diligence. We started from scratch in Santa Fe to see where the Post records, if there was any records that may have indicated correspondence or anything alluding to the fact that they may have retained ownership of this monument. We searched specifically for those records. The paper trail ended in New Mexico and passed onto Colorado where it went cold. So, therefore, we have no paper trail that supports or refutes any claim and so we are stuck with keeping as it as a generality. I like the idea of simply doing a quit claim.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All right. Thank you. All right, Brothers. This concludes the discussion. We're going to

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take a fifteen-minute break. Brother Tomasello (indistinguishable)...Brother Tomasello, I'd also like a copy of your resolution so we can get to the bottom of that before we open discussion on it.

All right, Brothers. We are working on the amendment to the original motion. We should have that for you momentarily, so that we can read it back. Brother Tomasello, if you stay up here and I'll share the podium with you.

Okay.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

I do have one announcement. When you get back from lunch, a request for a photograph opportunity for me and the other Past Commanders-in-Chief that are here. The photographer has asked that we get a group shot. So, if Past Commanders-in-Chief could arrive ten minutes prior to when we need to come back for the afternoon session, we'll get that picture taken. Thank you. We're going over announcements, Brother Secretary. I'm sorry. We have an announcement from Brother Pahl.

Brothers, again, if you've got a banquet ticket you've not picked up, please see Becky back in the exhibit room by the (indistinguishable)... If they're not claimed and we can't figure out if the person's here or not, we might sell them to someone else. (chuckle) So please, pick up your tickets.

Do you have any other announcements, Alan?

The war medal got picked up. Picture... banquet ticket. Yeah, the National Guide has a

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banquet ticket...

Can't hear you, Alan. Can't hear you.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

National Guard also has a banquet ticket for sale, if you're needing one. So, that's my announcements at the moment.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, do we have the amendment?

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

We have. Okay, I will read the original motion and then the amended motion. Original motion, The SUVCW fully acknowledges our Deed of Conveyance regarding all property that was not previously disposed of, and that we issue a quit claim concerning the Kit Carson monument to the GSA. The amended motion reads, The SUVCW fully acknowledges our Deed of Conveyance regarding the Kit Carson monument in Santa Fe, New Mexico and that we issue a quit claim deed concerning the Kit Carson monument by the GSA or to the GSA.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Is there a second?

Kevin P. Tucker, Council of Administration

Second.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Kevin Tucker seconded. Any discussion on the amendment? I see no discussion, so we'll move to vote on the amendment. So, we're voting to amend the original motion to include the language that Brother Russ just read. All those in favor of the amendment, raise your cards. Cards down. All those opposed. So, the motion is amended. We will now proceed to vote on the amended motion. So, read the motion again, one more time.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

Okay. The motion now reads, The SUVCW fully acknowledges our Deed of Conveyance regarding all or pardon me, regarding the Kit Carson monument in Santa Fe, New Mexico and that we issue a quit claim deed concerning the Kit Carson monument to the GSA.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All those in favor, raise your cards. Cards down. All those opposed. Motion carries.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brothers. So, Brother Tomasello, you can stay up there for one more minute.

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So, the other item of new business I told Brother Tomasello to bring up, whereas a resolution that was submitted originally to myself and the Secretary regarding adding Sea Scouts and Venture Crew Certificates in addition to Eagle Scout Certificates. So, the Department Commander, Jay Godin, was told to also send emails to the Chairman for the C&R Committee, and the National Counselor, which he did on July 5th. We've consulted with Brother Pahl, and as this item does not affect the C&R, I am able to send it to P&P, since it basically involves the forms for the certificates. So, I will read...

...All right. So what's in front of the resolution, but the action would be for P&P. Upon motion and vote of the New Jersey Department Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War we propose the following resolution to the National Organization. Resolved that the Sons of Union Veterans, its Departments, Department Camps, be permitted to issue recognition certificates to those achieving the highest rank of Venture Scouts and Sea Scouts of the SCOUTS–BSA, similar to the existing practice of recognizing Eagle Scouts. We fully propose that this resolution be heard and decided upon at the National Encampment. So, we're asking for additional certificates for these other two groups of scouting. I'm referring it to P&P.

Thank you.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brother. Is there any other new business to be brought before the Encampment? Brother Darby.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Commander-in-Chief, Past Commander-in-Chief Don Darby. I'm kind of going to be the huckleberry.

Encampment

(Laughter).

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

You see that...right now we pay \$23.00 to National for dues. Based on the inflation rate, to have the same buying power today that we had twelve years ago when we made it \$23.00, we would need to have a dues rate of \$33.00. That's just to maintain our buying power. And I know it...the crosses are coming out and I'm being burned in effigy behind me.

Encampment

(Laughter).

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Okay. No... Again.

Encampment

(Laughter).

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

But, one other thing... I've noted the problem. I shall also produce, or at least submit, a proposal. Right now, per The Banner, last year it cost \$44,000.00 to send The Banner out. If this august body decides we can send The Banner out electronically, for about at least \$10,000.00 less...a issue. All right? So, and if we do it electronically, Brother Pahl can add more pages. It will be sent out to the National Secretary, the National Secretary to the Department Secretaries, the Department Secretaries to the Camps. The Camps can then, because they should have the up-to-date email addresses, be able to send that to the...their members or print it out if the Brother does not have email. The savings in doing this will prevent or at least slow down trying to have a dues increase. Because right now, if you had a dues increase, you could say \$5.00 a year for the next three years for a dues increase, which basically is just a gallon of gas... at least today.

Encampment

(Laughter).

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

In Ohio, it's almost two gallons of gas. But anyway, it's something to consider, you know. I...back, years ago with the then old guard, not very many people had computers. Not many people ...I don't know whether your know it, but this Organization didn't start using computers until 1996 with Brother Past Commander-in-Chief Keith Harrison... and Dave Medert dragging this Organization kicking and screaming into using computers to start with. And I have the dot matrix print to prove that.

Encampment

(Laughter).

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Okay? And he doesn't even know what a dot matrix printer is.

Encampment

(Laughter).

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

So, I would make a motion that we permit Brother Pahl to send out the majority of The Banner, I think there's a hundred copies that have to go out in print form. Is that not correct, Brother Pahl?

James B. Pahl, Banner Editor

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I can't quote the exact number, but there are a few that we will still need to print. Yes.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Okay. So, my motion is to allow Brother Pahl to send out the majority of The Banners electronically to the members so that we can have a savings of almost \$38,000.00, because the price of postage is not going to decrease. Something... And so, that's my motion.

Multiple Brothers

Second.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, the first second that I saw was from Cameron Lowery. Right? Cameron Lowery. Discussion. Go ahead, Brother Pahl. Brother Jim.

James B. Pahl, Banner Editor

James Pahl, editor of The Banner. Two questions. Number one, at what issue would that be effective? The fall issue, the deadline is 31 August, is the first issue of the next series...of four. So, is that gonna be effective immediately, if passed? Number two, do we allow Brothers who choose to do so to subscribe to National to receive a print copy and if so, do we charge them a postage fee to do that? Our printing costs will go up, if we print less. So, is there gonna be so the question is should there be a mechanism to allow Brothers who choose to receive it in a print copy to subscribe at some fee to receive it? Or is that going to be left to the Camp to print the copy for that Brother and not receive it from National?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All right. So, a point of order, Brothers. The suspension of the rules of the Encampment relating to two for and two against are back in effect.

Encampment

(laughter).

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

So, I'm seeing lines form up. Unless the Encampment calls for... But that initial suspension of the rules of the Encampment applied initially just to the Kit Carson monument. So, if... I'm seeing lines forming. I'm asking a question. If we're going to go into detail on this, I'd like a motion. Well, I can't because there's a motion on the floor, right now.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

No, you can.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief I can?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian The procedure is appropriate.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All right. So...

<u>Unknown 1</u>

...So moved.

<u>Unknown 2</u>

Second.

Jerome W. Kowalski, National Chaplain Second.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief All right. So, (indistinguishable)...

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

...Vote on that one.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Okay. So, (laughing) the vote... A procedure motion and a second. All those in favor of suspending the rules of the Encampment to discuss this topic, raise your cards. Thank you. Cards down. All those opposed. Thank you. Motion carries.

That wasn't 2/3s vote.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief I needed 2/3s?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian Nope.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief Yeah. Go ahead, Brother Darby.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief Was that question to me, Jim?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian Yeah.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

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Okay. Don Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief. In answer to your first question, when would it be effective? Do you already have the post... It will be effective the winter Banner. Does that answer your question?

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

Okay. So, for my clarification, the first issue of the next series will be print, the fall issue. The next issue will be the Number 2, which is the one we're talking about will be electronic.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

That's correct.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

Thank you. Now, is that part of your motion?

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Yes, that's part of my motion.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

I thought that's what I heard. Thank you.

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

In answer to your second question, can a Brother choose? My answer to that would be no. That it will be sent out electronically and if he wanted a paper copy, then he would get it from the Camp...to print it out in a paper version.

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian

That answers my question. Thank you.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

In the back.

Max J. Riekse, Department of Michigan

Yes, Max Riekse, Department of Michigan, Past Camp Commander. And being a member of a number of organizations, who mandated that they go electronically and do away with paper copies of their monthly/yearly subscriptions, they have very little communication with their membership when it goes out electronically. And you can put that responsibility on the Camp Secretary, on whoever, that...get the electronic copy out or print it. It's not going to happen. You're going to lose 30% maybe 40% of the membership communication by doing away with the printed copy. Now, if you put in it... I'm not going to support this motion as it is, but I will support one that prominently displays, not buried because I've seen some alternatives given, but it prominently displays where the people, the members are given the opportunity to receive a printed copy as before with no additional fees. That I can support. The present motion, I don't support. You need to communicate with these members. If you go to completely electronic, you're gonna lose 30%-40% of that communication. If you give people the option, of either electronically or printed at no additional cost, I think that... you'll save money and there's

going to be maybe 30% of the people that will go electronically immediately after that, cause they're new generation. All you old guys, okay, are dying off and the new generation use electronic. Okay? But, if you want to keep your membership of the old guys and get them enthusiastic about bringing more people on board, you know. Bring the...keep the option of going or keeping the printed copies.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

All right. Brother Max, you've made your point. Thank you. Brother Huttick.

George A. Huttick, Department of Tennessee

Commander, George Huttick, Commander, Department of...

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

...Get closer...

George A. Huttick, Department of Tennessee

George Huttick, Commander of the Department of Tennessee. Brother McCoy will testify... Brother McCoy will test I am about all things digital and social media, so I don't have a problem in this rain...realm. However, I am against this amendment or this proposal because within my own Department right now, I can't get a Department order spread out to all the Brothers by having the Camp Secretary send it out. What makes you think they're gonna send The Banner out? This assumes every Camp is healthy and every Camp is functioning as it's supposed to. That's a bad assumption.

Encampment

(laughter).

George A. Huttick, Department of Tennessee

Okay? That's a really bad assumption. If anybody in this room can tell me that their Department is perfectly functioning on every Camp to pull this off, they might change my mind. But I might say they've been drinking something strange.

Encampment

(laughter).

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brother. In the back.

Sumner G. Hunnewell, Department of Missouri

Sumner Hunnewell, Department of Missouri, prior Camp Commander, and Editor of 1812 War Cry. We have a circulation of about 2300 issues that go out. It is a tangible benefit that we give our members, one of the few touchy feely things that we kind of give out. I would prefer to opt out...version of this. If you do not want to have a copy, then you can certainly tell people you do not want a copy. But make it default that people will receive one. I would prefer dues increase rather than see a paper copy go away.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Up front.

Robert D. Boyd, II, Department of Kansas

Commander, I would suggest...

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Who are you Brother?

Robert D. Boyd, II, Department of Kansas

...I'm Robert Boyd, Kansas Camp...Department. I would suggest that we actually continue to have the National send out the communication straight to the members and it would be upon the Department Secretaries to actually request a written copy for some of the members if they need a paper copy. And then if it's a price problem, we can raise dues for \$5.00. But that only seems right cause that's what we're doing now.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Thank you, Brother. In the back.

L. Dean Lamphere, Jr., Department of Michigan

L. Dean Lamphere, Jr., Past Department Commander, Department of Michigan. Brothers, this is one of the things you give your dues to National for is for the National magazine to come down. From a bottom-up or a top-down Order, that was how the communication was. We pay our dues for that to come out. If we're deciding to make that change, just delegated it to the Camps to do and I disagree with that, the max or rare occasion where (indistinguishable). And I do agree that...the Brother from Missouri, he made the suggestion on the opt out. That's actually an excellent option. Is that... can be an amendment to the proposal?

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Are you suggesting an... do you wish... desire to make an amendment to the motion?

L. Dean Lamphere, Jr., Department of Michigan

I'm desiring to make an amendment that there's an opt out option to allow them to be emailed.

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

Okay.

L. Dean Lamphere, Jr., Department of Michigan

Let them choose to get it by emails. If not, they get it printed.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

Brother Darby, your opinion of the amendment?

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Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

(Indistinguishable).

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief (Indistinguishable).

James B. Pahl, National Parliamentarian (Indistinguishable).

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief Okay. So, is there a second? For the opt out?

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

Yeah.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

I saw a (indistinguishable).

Sumner G. Hunnewell, Department of Missouri

Second. Hunnewell.

Michael A. Paquette, Commander-in-Chief

If you do an opt out, who is gonna administer that and spend the hours and hours every week keeping the list straight of who gets a mailed copy, who gets an email copy? It will add...it will double the burden to our Executive Director.

But, it should be all or none. Simply my opinion.

Max Riekse, Department of Michigan. I'm a member of the VFW of Michigan...the United States and Michigan for over forty years. About five, six years ago, it's a very substantial, I guess, paper that is probably as large if not larger than The Banner and... About five or six years ago on the very back page in the center column, it had a very small column, said you could opt out of receiving the hard copy. You could put your stamp on the envelope and send in requesting a hard copy, which I did. I know for a fact that probably 85% of the people did not do that. They either didn't read, didn't read enough, whatever, too lazy to put a stamp on, couldn't afford a stamp. So approximately maybe ten...fifteen percent from...of the Department of Michigan people, they saved \$14,000.00 and only maybe 12% in post to get the hard copy. They continue to do it, a hard copy. People opted out. They give the chance to opt out, but most people just weren't aware of it. You know, so, I think if we do give the chance to opt out, you don't bury it, you know, like a two inch, you know, column. You put it in there prominently. Give people the option. Eventually, all your old guys will die off and you're gonna go electronic anyway.

They do not get distributed. I sent out the most recent issue of The Patriot, and I had one of our Chapter Presidents just ask me where it was. And yet, I have acknowledged emails that he received it. I would leave at least an opt out. I belong to a number of organizations including one in Canada and one that's international. They allow an opt out and I'm more than willing to pay extra...

141st National Encampment Report August 12-13, 2022 Grand Rapids, Michigan

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1.0 Preface

This is a compilation of National Elected Officers, National Appointed Officers, National Standing Committees, National Special Committees, and Department reports to the 141st National Encampment in Grand Rapids, Michigan. This document contains the bodies of the submitted reports; the headings, salutations, valedictions, and signatures have been removed.

2.0 National Elected Officers

2.1 Commander-in-Chief; Michael A. Paquette, PDC

Brothers,

Thank you for providing me the opportunity to serve as your Commander-in-Chief for the past year. My travels to various events and Departments encampments have spanned the COVID imposed travel restrictions and the subsequent lifting of those restrictions. Similarly, I've seen the restrictions placed on our Department and Camp activities subside over the past six months. Based on my observations, we are once again fully engaged in meeting our sacred obligation to remember the "Boys in Blue". My compliments to our Camps and Departments for their creativity in finding ways to fulfill our mission under varying and challenging conditions these past two years – well done!

I believe that having the ability to meet virtually in our "tool kit" has been and continues to be an asset to the Order. I remind all of you and especially our Department and Camp Commanders that the ability to meet virtually is just a tool. No two Departments or Camps deal with the same set of challenges. Commanders should use this tool if it applies to your specific circumstances. We will no doubt continue to learn where to apply this tool as our experience with it continues to grow.

I had an interesting conversation with the Camp Secretary of the Lincoln-Cushing Camp in Washington, D.C. after the Memorial Day event in Arlington National Cemetery. He showed me a picture of his GAR ancestor who also was the secretary of his GAR post and noted that both he and his ancestor conducted business in exactly the same manner - submitting reports and checks via snail mail. With the technologies available to us today, this is not an acceptable situation. I have spoken with a number of members this year who do not have or write physical checks. I am also concerned that potential young members will be turned off by our antiquated business practices and choose not to join our Order because of it. We are well behind in using technology to our advantage and will continue to fall further behind unless we do something about it.

Last year I identified three specific things I intended to accomplish this year;

1) I wanted to meet with the Department Commanders on a quarterly basis through virtual means. I have met with Department Commanders four times this year. I have received positive feedback that the information that was passed was useful and appreciated. Additionally, the meetings provided a means for Department Commanders to present their concerns and questions to their peers. I believe this provided a broader range of responses and recommendations than what would have been available from a one-on-one dialogue with only the CinC.

2) I indicated I would ask three National Officers to provide virtual training sessions for their Department level counterparts. My intent was to validate the potential benefits of making virtual training available to our officers, especially those who may be new to their positions. To date, the National Treasurer and National Patriotic Instructor have provided this training. The Executive Director will be conducting training for Department Secretaries on 6 August. I believe this training has been well received. We should look to Memorial University for guidance on how best to apply the use of virtual training in the future and possibly expand the training opportunities to the Camp level.

3) I created a CinC appointed committee to investigate the Strategic Development of Information Technology within our Order. We have multiple resources (National websites, databases, etc.) that our membership relies on, which we are hard pressed to maintain. I asked the committee to identify these resources and provide some recommendations on how we can best continue to provide them to you. I believe we have exceeded our ability to maintain these resources with a purely volunteer workforce. The committee's report and recommendations are available in this reports packet.

Lastly, I established a CinC appointed committee in March to review our Membership Qualifications. As some of you have guessed, the committee's job is to look specifically into trans-gender issues. The committee is tasked to research how current federal and state law identify an individual as being male or female. The committee is also to investigate how to deal with individuals seeking membership who identify as non-binary (neither male or female). As you might surmise, the legal definitions vary widely between states. Our Order's challenge is to apply a standard definition for being male that can be applied consistently across the country. We can't have a situation where a potential member is refused membership because of gender in one location and accepted in another. We must also comply with the law or run the risk of a lawsuit. We are not in a position to make an informed decision during this National Encampment, nor should we attempt to do so. It will take time and the committee must be allowed to continue its work. In all likelihood, this will be the most critical decision we will make during this decade. We must be methodical and deliberate in our decision-making process. The activities and recommendations from the committee are also located this reports packet.

Recommendation #1 – that the Committee to Review Membership Qualifications be established as a two-year special committee appointed by this National Encampment and be expanded to five voting members. It will report its findings and recommendations to the National Encampment in 2023.

Recommendation #2 – that the Memorial University Committee investigate the use of virtual collaboration programs to conduct training , both live and recorded to SUVCW members.

Recommendation #3 – that our Order continues to investigate how to move our internal business processes forward in order to take advantage of the benefits that technology has to offer.

In closing let me thank you again for the opportunity to serve as your Commander-in-Chief. It has been quite an adventure and full of memories I will cherish the rest of my life.

2.2 Senior Vice Commander-in Chief; Bruce D. Frail, PDC

I have had the great pleasure to meet with hundreds of Brothers of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War through Department Encampments, Camp meetings and several events throughout the country.

Some of the states that I visited I did so during my travels include Connecticut, Massachusetts, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Kentucky, North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, and Texas.

In hours of conversation with these Brothers, I have asked for and heard their comments, Negative & Positive towards the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. They have shared with me their ideas, some are very good, some may need some work, but all were and are welcome. 2.5 National Treasurer; D. Michael Beard, PDC

• Financial Statements for fiscal year ended June 30, 2021. Our auditors, Coulter & Justus, issued a clean opinion for our financial statements. I provided copies to the Council of Administration and sent two copies to the Judicially Committee of the US Congress as required by our charter. A copy of the financial statements is attached to this report. I have contracted with Coulter & Justus to audit our June 30, 2022 financial statements.

501(c)(3) Status. The IRS still lists us as a 501(c)(4) charity despite showing our 501(c)
(3) determination letter on their website. I and our accountants have called, written,
FedExed, used registered mail, and faxed. They continue to promise to fix this, but as of this writing have not. Through PCinC Brian Pierson, we engaged Congresswoman Stephanie
Bice of Oklahoma to intercede on our behalf with the IRS.

• Form 990. Coulter and Justus prepared our Form 990 for June 30, 2021. I filed the report with the IRS. We file manually as the website will not accept an online filing as the IRS computer thinks we are not a 501(c)(3). The IRS rejected the manual filing stating the law requires us to file electronically. Coulter & Justus has written the IRS pointing out we can't file electronically until they correctly list us as a 501(c)(3).

• Subordinate List. I filed our annual subordinate list on June 20th. We listed 308 subordinate departments, camps, military districts, and SVR units. Oddly, the IRS did not send us a confirmation of the subordinate list and I have written them on this. I coordinated this year's filing with the Department and Military Districts and was confident the listing was fairly correct; but found it was not. Some Departments are not checking the lists and relying on the camps. I discovered some camps thought filing the Form 11 with the Department was all they had to do and did not actually file a 990. Brother James Barker, Treasurer, Colorado/Wyoming, suggested we require the camps to forward the email the IRS sends the camp to confirm the 990 filing. I believe that is an excellent idea and I would like the Form 11 changed to require this.

Recommendation. Change Paragraph 2 on the Form 11 instructions to read: 2. That each Camp listed on this Form 11 has forwarded to the Department Treasurer a copy of the IRS email confirming the current tax year 990 was filed;

• **ZOOM Meeting.** I held a ZOOM meeting with the Department Treasurers on May 14, 2022 to discuss 990 matters and any other issues of interest to the Treasurers. I plan to make this an annual event.

• **Charity Status Letters.** I continue to provide letters to our subordinates regarding our 501(c)(3) status. They need letters from me as Treasurer, to present to potential donors needing proof of their charitable deductibility status.

• **State Registrations.** Labyrinth, Inc., has filed our annual state registrations in the 36 states that require registration for charities that raise money within the state. We do not file in the District of Columbia (too expensive). The other states either do not require us to register or we are exempt.

• **Grants.** The SUVCW awarded \$15,097 this year. At the request of the Council of Administration, I mailed a \$4,000 check to the Stephenson Memorial, Department of Illinois. At the request of the National Committee on Civil War Monuments, I sent the following Grants:

\$2,000 to Colonel Bryner Camp #67, Department of Illinois for a GAR plaque at the Moffatt Cemetery in Peoria;

 \$2,000 grant to the Colonel Robert Gould Shaw Camp for work at General Charles Russell Lowell's GAR burial plot at Mount Hope Cemetery in Boston;

• \$300 to the Custer Camp #1, Department of Illinois, for a Last Soldier

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Monument at Hickory Union Cemetery, Antioch, Illinois:

\$2,000 to the Monson Veterans Memorial in Monson, Maine (Colonel Douty Camp #11, Department of Maine);

\$797 to the Department of the Southwest for a plaque at the Citizen's

• The **General Fund**, through Brother David Hann's efforts, received \$2,592 for the Remembrance Day Parade.

• **Savings Bonds.** I established ownership of our savings bonds. The US Treasury had insisted I furnish them with a certified copy of Past National Treasurer Richard Orr's death certificate and get his Estate to state it has no ownership interest in the bonds. The executrix of Brother Orr's estate gave us the necessary documents and the Treasury transferred the bonds to our online account.

• Intern Program. An anonymous donor gave us \$5,750 to fund an intern at the National Headquarters. We hired Susan Mitchell of Harrisburg Pennsylvania to fill the intern position.

• Lincoln Tomb Ceremony. I prepared the annual report on the finances of the Lincoln Tomb Ceremony for the MOLLUS & SUVCW Commanders. This year's ceremony had revenues of \$2,370 and expenses of \$2,875 resulting in a loss of \$505.

• **Treasurer's Handbook.** I updated the Treasurer's Handbook in January. I intend to update it again when the Form 11 instructions are changed as recommended in this report. Several subordinates could not participate as the IRS has revoked their status for failure to file a 990 in three years. When the IRS revokes a camp's status, the Department has to

suspend the camp. When this occurred recently in the Department of Maine, CinC Michael Paquette provided the Department with sample letters to reinstate the camp while they pursue reinstating their IRS status. I intend to include that information in the next update to the Handbook.

• **CinC Rep.** I acted as your representative at the Florida and Tennessee Department Encampments.

• **Council of Administration.** I attended and participated in the Council meetings held in St Louis, Gettysburg, and Springfield.

• **Capital Campaign.** I have coordinated with the Promotions and Marketing Committee to start a capital campaign to increase our Permanent Fund. We will be hampered in this campaign because the IRS does not list us on their PUB 78 as a charity eligible for tax deductible donations. But anyone can still deduct donations to us on their income tax as we are a 501(c)(3). We intend to proceed in hopes that the IRS will eventually correct the PUB 78. The committee bought two ads in the National Encampment program book to announce the start of the capital campaign and its first component – *The 1881 Club*.

2.6 National Quartermaster; James L. Lyon, PDC

I have served as National Quartermaster for the last three years and it's has been a learning experience for myself, my wife, and the Brothers of the SUVCW. In the last three years I have gone to the Post Office over 200 times, the Bank 72 times, hundreds of phone calls to Brothers and Venders, and filled 2170 orders. In order to fulfill my obligation as National Quartermaster I have averaged 20 to 30 hours a week or 3120 to 4680 hours for the three years.

With the help of my wife I believe we have cleaned up and corrected many of our certificates. We have made everything 8 ½ x 11 for easy framing, shipping, and storage. I have worked with PCinC Pierson and SVCinC Frail on two different awards and Fundraising projects. Getting everything done for these projects can take a lot of back and forth with them and the manufacturer. This can take up to 6 months to a year to go through the process.

I have added a number of new items and have designed a new order sheet that puts the same items together. The QM is always looking for new items that the Brothers want.

It has been a pleasure working with Brother Beard as the National Treasurer to make sure I

meet the requirements of the IRS. Brother Demmy has been very helpful in finding those Brothers that don't supply the correct contact information for shipping. Brother Pahl has been very patient with me in getting ads ready for the "Banner".

In closing I would like to thank past Commander-in-Chiefs, Mark Day, Don Shaw, Ed Norris, Brian Pierson, and our current Commander-in-Chief Mike Paquette. All of these Brothers have been very supportive of my endeavor to provide a service to all the Brothers of the SUVCW in these uncertain times.

It is very important that the Command Staff and the CofA be supportive of the NQM and his duties.

Recommendations:

1. That the NQM should have access to the PayPal account to perform changes to the site in a timely manner. Our cost of items these days are ever changing and the NQM needs to reflect this quickly.

2. Find out why all PayPal orders are not sent directly to the NQM's email to be filled.

3. That printing of certificates that only call for a few a years be printed in house (I have been doing this). Those that we use a lot of, such as Eagle Scout & ROTC can be ordered by what was used the year before on the advice of the Committee Chairman. Other certificates that are used a lot such as New Member Certificates should be printed in lots of 50 to avoid waste.

4. Have a Brother that can work for the NQM on special projects and awards that have a history of taking a lot of time to develop. I would be willing to perform these duties if the NQM would need the help.

5. Have a committee to help the NQM set what profit margin there should be on our store items. What is our goal of profit?

6. Keep track on shipping cost as they too are changing more frequently.

7. I believe that the reimbursement should be raised to \$6,000 because of the amount of time the NQM puts in to his job. Prices of everything have gone up.

I attended every meeting that the Council of Administration had throughout the year with the exception of the very last ZOOM Meeting which I asked to be excused from because I

was working. I find the work that the Council does to be extremely important and very educational.

Mar. 19, 2022, June 18, 2022 and July 9, 2022 – In my duties as a Member of the National Encampment Site Committee, attended the Department of New Hampshire National Encampment Host Committee meetings.

Apr. 24, 2022 – As Commander of the 1st Military District, Sons of Veterans Reserve, I, along with other members and Commander-in-Chief Paquette,, joined with members of the

2nd Military District in conducting a commemoration of General Ulysses S. Grant's 200 birthday at Grant's Tomb in New York City, New York.

June 1, 2022 – As Commander of the 1st Military District, Sons of Veterans Reserve, I, along with other members, participated in the rededication of the Colonel Robert Gould Shaw/54th Massachusetts Infantry Monument in Boston, Massachusetts.

June 11, 2022 – As Commander of the 1st Military District, Sons of Veterans Reserve, I, along with other members, participated in the annual Gaspee Day Parade in Cranston, Rhode Island.

June 12, 2022 – As Commander of the 1st Military District, Sons of Veterans Reserve, I, along with other members, participated in the dedication of a plaque commemorating the service of General Josiah Pickett, and the General Josiah Pickett Grove in Worcester, Massachusetts.

June 17, 2022 – Performed a presentation on the origins of the Juneteenth National Holiday for the General Frederick W. Lander Round Table at the Lynn G.A.R. Museum in Lynn, Massachusetts.

June 29, 2022 – I conducted a virtual meeting of the Unit Commanders of the 1st Military District, Sons of Veterans Reserve via the Zoom app.

June 6, 2022 and July 11, 2022 – As an appointed member of a Hearing Council, I attended a virtual hearing via the Zoom app.

In addition, as of this report and prior to the 2022 National Encampment in Grand Rapids, I am scheduled to attend the following events:

Aug.1, 2022 – I have been invited to represent the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War at a meeting and reception of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts, the oldest chartered military organization in the Western Hemisphere, having been founded in 1638.

Aug 6, 2022 – In my duties as a Member of the National Encampment Site Committee, I will attend the Department of New Hampshire National Encampment Host Committee meeting.

I want to express my congratulations and gratitude to Brother Paquette for his service as Commander-in-Chief for the past year, and look forward to our continued collaboration and mutual support in the coming year and into the future.

2.12 Council of Administration – Brian C. Pierson, PCinC

At CinC Paquette's pleasure, I have assisted him on actions and issues that have carried over from my term as CinC, as well as a few recent issues.

I have had the honor to represent the CinC at the annual encampments for the Departments of Georgia and South Carolina, Oklahoma, and Colorado and Wyoming. I regret that I had to miss the Department of Nebraska's encampment due to an injury.

The C of A approved a project to award streamers for Departments that have hosted National Encampments in recognition of the tremendous effort required to plan and conduct these. The streamer will be of military specification material, yellow, with the following inscription embroidered in blue lettering, "SUVCW \leftrightarrow NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT HOST SUVCW \leftrightarrow NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT HOST \leftrightarrow Year". The C of A voted to procure streamers for Departments for National Encampments going back to 2000, and annually henceforth. Streamers for earlier encampments may be procured by Depts at their expense. Unfortunately, however, all of the manufacturers have had supply chain issues getting the right color (yellow) streamer. The C of A voted to wait until the yellow material is available. I will continue to follow up with manufacturers in the upcoming year.

In the June C of A Zoom meeting, National Treasurer Mike Beard reported that the IRS rejected our annual tax filing for 2022, in addition to the now 5-year delay in getting the SUVCW listed on Pub 78. Having received permission to lobby from the CinC, in early July I contacted Rep Stephanie Bice (OK-5) to request assistance in satisfactorily resolving our issues with the IRS, noting the consequent risks to our Order. Brother Beard provided the supporting documentation which I included in the request. Copies were provided to CinC Paquette, National Treasurer Beard and National Counselor Day. Rep. Bice's staff immediately replied to the request and is working the matter. I will continue to follow up on a monthly basis the first week of each month. (I also expect to get audited by the IRS for the foreseeable future.)

2.13 Banner Editor; James B. Pahl, PCinC

The Summer edition was published on schedule. All deadlines remain unchanged.

2.14 Executive Director; David W. Demmy, Sr.

It is my continued honor to submit my 14th year annual report to the 2022 Encampment. It has been an honor too to serve Commander-in-Chief, Mike Paquette.

A hardy thanks to the SUVCW brothers/committee responsible for purchasing 2 new computers for use at Headquarters. Now our Intern does not have to wait upwards to 30 minutes for the old machine to warm up.

Our first ever Intern, Susan Mitchell, has scanned forms 27, 35, and 49 as old as the 1980's. Prior to concluding her association at Headquarters, she captured those forms up to and including 2015! The next potential Intern may carry-on the project.

While earning her Master of Arts in American Studies, enthusiastic Susan set up shelving in our storage area and then relocated old Banners, old correspondence, old records, former national secretary records, and PCinC records, and old old SVR records, out of the personnel staff area and into the storage area. Photos of the storage area can readily be provided upon request. Also, Susan was instrumental in having over 10 boxes of former national treasurer's and our national quartermaster's old records shipped to an offsite shredding facility. Both sets of old records were reviewed by National Treasurer, D. Michael Beard, and he gave his blessings that the documents may be destroyed. Gee, now visitors can, once again, see the carpet!

Our National Life Membership Program reveals 24 applications completed and ID Cards and colorful Certificates issued so far for 2022. For same period for 2021, 34 were issued to the applicants.

Death notices processed to date for 2022 total 74 vs 92 for 2021; and that is a worthy claim.

Annual reports for 2022 have all been reviewed. A few Department's form 35 missed the due date; and a few reports were missing form 3s when the report revealed the individual was initiated. A number of death notices were duplicates of last year! All 31 Departments finally submitted their form 49 which have been scanned and distributed to appropriate personnel. My thanks to our volunteer department secretaries for their submissions!

Recently, the 26,000th brother was added to our national database. Unfortunately, only 6,400 of us are active brothers. Otherwise, to date, I have handled the following:

Logged hours in office: 1100.

Processed 2776 form 30s too include updates, adds, changes, and deletes among form 27s.

Processed 328 form 3s.

Delegated or shared – 3 ROTC queries and 12 Eagle Scout queries.

Earnest Suggestion: While I salute our recruiters for enabling new members, please refrain from handing-out obsolete form 3s, especially the 1990s paperback book-size version. All form 3s prior to 2021 are obsolete; please refer to the published date on the bottom of the form.

Recommendation: In recent years, too many form 3s are submitted to Headquarters without annotation of the applicant's ancestor's relationship to the applicant.

Recommend reverse the following language: Form 3, page 2, under lineage:

FROM: (Grandfather, Great Uncle, etc.,) (Ancestor's Name)

TO: (Ancestor's Name), (Grandfather, Great Uncle, etc.)

3.0 National Appointed Officers

3.1 National Chief of Staff, Harry W. Reineke IV, PDC

3.4 National Organization Expansion Officer, John R. Conrad, PDC

I reached out to the previous NOEO, Brother Eric Richhart, and received digital copies of all his files from his tenure. He mentioned the following efforts he had undertaken:

• Guam: He had reached out to the 2 brothers there but had received no response. The current roster I received indicated that there are no brothers here now.

• Hawaii: He had reached out to current brothers in Hawaii to form a Department but had not received a response yet. There are only 8 current brothers residing in Hawaii.

• Nevada: He contacted brothers in Nevada to form a 3rd camp and possibly split off into their own Department. He reached out in May 2021 to the brothers in the state, but his files show no responses from anyone.

• Northern Marianas: Apparently, he had explored the possibility of setting up a camp in the Northern Marianas, but there are no brothers residing there now.

I reached out to all Department Commanders and Junior Vice Commanders, and received

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• Alabama: The Department is aggressively recruiting new members. No need for assistance at this time.

• Arkansas: Working on splitting off from Tennessee as a new Department. The Department of Tennessee is actively recruiting new members and establishing new Camps in Arkansas to enable the formation of a new department. They have not needed my assistance.

• Florida: Department Commander Urell has asked for my assistance in forming new camps on the west coast of Florida. I will check rosters of current Brothers, try to group them geographically, and call Brother Urell for potential identification of new camp leaders.

• Georgia & South Carolina: The Department is trying to form a new camp in the Columbus, GA area. I will see if I can help.

• Illinois: The Department is looking to set up some more camps; I will see if they need my assistance.

3.8 National Counselor, Mark R. Day, PCinC

It has been my great honor to serve as National Counselor for Commander-in-Chief Michael Paquette. The many unique issues that his administration has faced were both intriguing and complex in their nature; offering many opportunities to broaden my knowledge of the Charter, Constitution and Regulations of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civile War

I would also like to take a moment to thank PCinC Jim Pahl and PCinC Don Darby whom, I often sought out to gain insight regarding various issues. Their familiarity with the actions of past National Encampments and their deep knowledge of the Charter, Constitution and Regulations made them indispensable assets.

During the past year, served the National Organization in the following manner

- I attended the Remembrance Day Ceremonies and the Gettysburg CofA Meeting
- I attended the Commander in Chief's Testimonial Dinner
- I attended the Lincoln Death Day Ceremonies and Springfield CofA Meeting

- I attended all called on-line meetings of the CofA except for the meeting on 31 July 2022
- I served as the CinC's Representative to the Department of North Carolina Annual Encampment

• I served as Chairman of the Committee to Negotiate Encampment Contracts with the Allied Orders and completed a contract for the 2023 Encampment with the Auxiliary

• I served on the Memorial University Committee

As National Counselor over the course of the year, I received many questions from the brothers throughout the Order and from all levels of Command. The answers to these questions ranged from the very simple to the very complex however, most often the answers were easily decerned from the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations. However, in several instances the C,C, and R was not clear or moot in its guidance and at the request of the At the Commander-in-Chief, I issued the following Formal Opinions:

Opinion #1

In response to a request from the Commander-in-Chief for an opinion regarding the attendance of members of the Allied Orders, who had been suspended or discharged from one Order but remained in good standing with another, at Meetings and Encampments of the SUVCW; the following is provided:

Research:

The following sections of the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations of the SUVCW were reviewed:

• Chapter I Article IV Section 3, Chapter II Article III Section 3, and Chapter III Article III Section 6 of the Charter.

Findings: The language found in all three of the cited sections of the Constitution and Regulations was generic in nature and lacked any specific direction answering the questions posed by the Commander-in Chief. As the C&R lacked clarity on the issue of attendance by a member of an allied Order who was suspended from one Order but remained in good standing in another further clarification was warranted.

Opinion: It is recommended that the Commander-in-Chief using his authority as granted by the Charter, Constitution, and regulations act to further delineate and define the regulations regarding the attendance of members of the Allied Order who are under suspension or discharge from one or more Allied Orders but remains in good standing within another.

Opinion #2

In Response to a request for an opinion originating from Brother Bobby Welch of the Department of Illinois; regarding the following questions

• Are Past Department Commander Honors awarded to a brother who resigned from that office without fully completing his elected term.

• Is it the withing the preview of the Department Council reject the resignation of an elected officer which have bee4n communicated in writing stating that his resignation from that office is to take effect immediately?

Research:

Applicable sections of the C,C,&R pertaining to the above question #1

Chapter II Article II Membership Section 1(a).

The membership of the Department Encampment shall be constituted as follows:

all Past Commanders-in-Chief, Past Department Commanders, and Past Camp Commanders, in good standing, who have served a full term or having been elected to fill a vacancy have served to the end of that term, the sitting Department Commander, and the sitting Camp Commanders.

One delegate from each Camp, whatever its membership and one additional delegate for every ten Brothers, or major fraction thereof, based upon the report for the annual report next preceding the Encampment; and its own elective officers (except Aides). Any Brother serving as Camp Secretary or Camp Treasurer continuously in office for a period of ten years may have conferred upon him the rank of Past Camp Commander with its voting privileges at Department.

Applicable sections of the C,C,&R pertaining to the above question #2

Chapter II Article VII, Section(s) 4 & 5 Section 4.

Whenever an elected officer of the Department declares to the Department Council that he is unable to discharge the duties of his office, and until he declares to them the contrary, such duties shall be discharged by the appointment of a temporary officer serving in an Acting capacity, appointed by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Department Council. The temporary appointee shall have full authority and responsibilities of that office during the

period served.

Opinion for Question #1

The section of the C&R above clearly states the requirements for being an honors delegate holding membership in the Department Encampment . Among those requirements is the completion of a full term of office states that the membership of a department encampment. As the brother resigned prior to the end of his term he clearly is not then entitled to the Honors afforded a Past Department Commander (PDC) and should not receive either the badge of a PDC or the Honors which go with that rank.

Opinion for Question #2

The section of the C&R which deals with inability of an elected officer to complete his term contains no language that supports any action on the part of the Department Council other than the acceptance of the resignation of this officer in question. Only the person submitting the resignation could rescind it and his statement that the resignation was effective immediately left no doubt as to his desired outcome. The Department Council had no authority under the rules stated in our C,C,R to reject the resignation and should have meet immediately and acted to replace the resigning Department Commander.

Opinion #3

In answer to a letter from the Commander of the Department of Texas, which was forwarded to me by the Commander-in-Chief, regarding membership issues arising from the inadvertent omission of the definition of a blood relative in the 2014 through 2022 published versions of the Charter, Constitution, and Regulation Chapter V, Article 1. Section 3, I provide the following research and opinion.

Research:

• Upon first learning of the issues brought forward by the department of Texas, I consulted with the Assistant Counselor for the Blue Book and confirmed that the following language had been omitted from Chapter V, Article I, Section 3: Definitions. "(a) For the purposes of administering Section 5 of the Articles of Incorporation, blood relative is defined as a direct descendant of a brother, sister, half-Brother, or half sister of a veteran. This definition section shall not apply to any brother admitted to membership prior to August 21, 1999"

• An opinion by then National Counselor Richard Orr was found on page 162 of the 2008 Proceedings of the 127th National Encampment, which reads as follows:

Opinion 8 Series 2007-2008

No one may be admitted to the SUVCW on the service of a cousin. The C&R and charter are very clear on this matter. The Regulations define collateral as being a direct descendant of a sibling of a veteran. While it is true that blood relative includes anyone with a common ancestor no matter who that common ancestor is, our charter also gives the Order the right to define membership and further limit it. The SUVCW originally only included the eldest son of a veteran. This was expanded to include all sons circa 1900 and further expanded to include collateral descendants in the early 1950's. (I am not providing exact dates as that material in buried in several boxes of historical data on the Sons.) Chapter V, Article I. Section 3: Definitions. (a) For purposes of administering Section 5 of the Articles of Incorporation, blood relative is defined as a direct descendent, or a direct descendent of a Brother, sister, half-Brother, or half-sister of a veteran." This definition section shall not apply to any Brother admitted to membership prior to August 21, 1999. The definition does not apply prior to adoption because some Brothers had been admitted as cousins preceding the adoption of this provision to clarify the long standing working definition of collateral. Anyone admitted as a cousin since that date is not a Member but an Associate and all restrictions on Associates apply. An error on the part of a camp in admitting a Brother as a member who does not meet these qualifications does not vacate the regulations. The status of such a Brother must be immediately changed and reported on the proper form to the Department and the Executive Director. The number of permitted associates in a camp still applies." Richard D. Orr, PCinC National Counselor 23 September 2007

• A footnote relating to Brother Orr's opinion #8, which is labeled as footnote 21, appears on page 36 of the Charter Constitution and Regulations and is attached to Chapter I (Camps) Article II (Membership) Section 1, which reads as follows "The son of a person who was a cousin of a veteran, not eligible. NC Orr, Op 8, 127th, 162."

• The following is taken from the proceedings of the 108th National; Encampment in 1999 page 29

James Pahl, Constitution and Regulations Committee Under Chapter V, general regulations, article 1, definitions, the definition of a blood relative be included for the purposes of interpreting section V of the Articles of Incorporation, a blood relative is hereby defined as being a direct or collateral descendent of a Union Veteran, as collateral is defined within these Regulations as uncle, not cousin. Moved and seconded Discussion. Richard Orr Proposes a grandfather amendment to this recently passed change, the grandfather clause means it is only operational from this day forward and has no bearing on those brought into the Order before its adoption.

Keith Harrison So moved. It is seconded.

More discussion. Commander-in-Chief Andrew M. Johnson

I call for a vote on the amendment to the Regulations. It passes.

Reasoning: Having reviewed the facts presented in the research of our records, it is evident that the intention of the 108th and 127th National Encampment was to limit full membership to only those with direct decent from a veteran of the Civil War. However, the omission of the definition of blood relative from the Charter Constitution and Regulation during the period from 2014 through 2022 may have created a situation where Brothers of the Order seeing no specific guidance in the regulations defining the blood relative requirement and not being fully cognizant of the multiple and somewhat disjointed notes that are contained in footnote 21 to Chapter I, Article I, Section 1 could have admitted members who were not fully qualified.

Opinion: As a precedent had been established at the 108th National Encampment to grandfather in members who had not meet the criteria for full membership as a direct blood relative, and with evidence which points out that our Charter, Constitution and Regulations have not included the definition for blood relatives for the past eight (8) years, I believe it would be proper that a motion be made at the upcoming 141st National Encampment to allow anyone who has been brought into the Order after the 133rd Encampment in 2014, where the reorganized National Regulations were adopted, until the 141st National Encampment of 2022; who was admitted under a cousin to be Grandfathered into the Order, and that the definition / requirement of blood relative not be applied to such brothers.

Opinion #4

In response to a request by the Commander-in-Chief regarding the eligibility of a member, who is currently 15 years of age and therefore a minor in all 50 states of the Union, to run for the office of National Quartermaster.

Research:

• The following sections of the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations are germane to

the issue and apply to contractual powers and other fiduciary roles / duties assigned to the office of National Quartermaster

Chapter III Article VIII (officer Job descriptions & duties) Section 7

The National Quartermaster shall have the responsibility of maintaining an inventory of supplies, procuring sufficient inventory to meet the needs of the National Organization, the Departments, the Camps and the brothers and the filling of all orders for supplies. He shall receive payment for inventory sold and shall forward same to the National Treasurer along with the order forms. He shall forward all bills for inventory purchased to the National Treasurer for payment. He shall take an inventory of all supplies on-hand at the close of the fiscal year and provide a written detailed list to the National Treasurer for summary and inclusion in the financial reports. He shall take supply of badges and other supplies to the National Encampment for sale to the membership.

Chapter III Article IX (Finances) Section 9, Sub section (C)

The National Quartermaster, National Proceeding Secretary and Executive Director are authorized to execute contracts on behalf of and in the name of The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (National Organization), with the approval of the Commander-in-Chief.

Chapter V 9Geneeral Regulations) Article III (Bonds)Section 1.

The bonded officers shall be as follows: The Camp Treasurer (and the Camp Secretary and Camp Council when holding funds of the Camp); Department Secretary, Department Treasurer (Department Secretary-Treasurer); National Secretary, National Treasurer (National Secretary-Treasurer), National MAL Coordinator, National Quartermaster, Jr. Vice Commander-in-Chief, Assistant National Treasurer(s), National Executive Director and National Patriotic Instructor. Also, Department Commanders if so ordered by Department bylaws.

<u>Section 2</u>. The above officers shall be bonded in amounts to be fixed by the various Council of pertaining to child abuse. the respective bodies, in some acceptable surety company, provided that Camp and Department Officers may furnish acceptable personal surety. Bonded officers shall be held liable for the funds remaining in their possessions until payment to their successors who have been properly

2. General Orders that are applicable and provide regulations for the supervision or interaction with members who fall under the various State youth protection laws

that exist throughout the Union

CinC Ken Freshly GO #22 Series 2013-14

Here are the initial objectives of the policy that all brothers should use as MINIMUM requirements for having Juniors and Junior Associates in our Camps and at our events.

A. All Brothers under the age of 18 years of age should be accompanied by a parent or person designated as a Guardian (Grandfather, Brother over the age of 18 years, or Uncle) when participating in ANY SUVCW activity.

B. At no time will a non-related Brother be permitted 'one on one' contact with a brother under the age of 18. Any interaction with a brother under the age of 18 must include at least two (2) Brothers over the age 18 at all times.

C. Any Brother who witnesses or suspects in good faith any type of physical, mental or sexual abuse of any member under the age of 18 will immediately report such suspicion to local authorities first and local Camp and Department Commanders immediately.

D. Every Brother over the age of 18 who may have contact with a brother under the age of 18 should complete training related to protecting children from abuse of any type. Free training is available from the Boy Scouts of America at http://www.myscouting.org , You will need to create an account, then select the Training, E-Training, then choose the youth protection training. It takes about 30 minutes to complete. Upon completion, you will be able to print a certificate along with a wallet-size certification card which is good for a period of 2 years. While this training is not a requirement, it is highly suggested that it is completed to be used as a tool to protect our youth and Brothers.

E. Ultimately, all brothers also need to comply with all applicable Local and State laws.

3. Other pertinent information as found in the 2014 National Encampment of the Order detailing the discussions of that body on the subject of members who had not reached the status of Maturity and still feel under the youth protection policies of the various states

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: Thank you. Child Protection. I believe that Committee was dispensed of at Springfield.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Commander-in-Chief, I know the Secretary from Pennsylvania didn't send the resolution in. There was supposed to be a resolution from Pennsylvania. Since this would require a change to the amendments, I am going to make this as a motion for Constitution and Regulations. Because of Pennsylvania law, we still find ourselves in Pennsylvania in a quandary, even after the last General Order, that you issued regarding Juniors. Pennsylvania is proposing that the ages for Juniors be changed from six to eighteen 'cause anyone under the age of eighteen still falls under the child protection laws, at least in Pennsylvania. And we feel that we need to have that in order to require that anyone under eighteen be accompanied by a parent because issue's been raised within the Department that as a full member, why are we requiring a parent to accompany them to SUVCW event. So the proposal from the Department was to change the age of Juniors to eighteen. You must be eighteen to be a full senior member. That this be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Regulations to review and develop appropriate language.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: We have a motion.

Unknown: Second.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: We have a second. Discussion. Brother Danny.

Danny L. Wheeler, Past Commander-in-Chief.

Danny Wheeler, Past Commander-in-Chief, Quartermaster. We have a little problem with that in New York also. It's in the wording that they have to be with them at all times. We have no problem with anything else. We have checked out the laws in New York and there isn't a problem with the age. It isn't a problem with them coming to things. You have to have a designated person. It doesn't matter whether it's an uncle, a father, grandfather, as long as it's a designated person. I think what we need to look at here is each Department and what their laws are because they're different in all the States. If we had that taken out that says "all times," we would be okay with it. Thank you.

Michael Paquette, Department of the Chesapeake Commander

Mike Paquette, Department of the Chesapeake: We also have another issue with full-fledged members that are between the ages of fourteen and eighteen. That proposal from the Department of Pennsylvania does not explain how we're to address those members.

Donald E. Darby, National Counselor Commander-in-Chief,

Don Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief, National Counselor: I would caution putting the age of eighteen there because in some States the age of majority is sixteen. I would suggest that rather than putting a number limit, you say from the age of sixteen to the age of majority within that Department.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: The age of majority is sixteen?

Donald E. Darby, National Counselor: Yes.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Age of consent, not age of majority. Where?

Donald E. Darby, National Counselor: South Carolina to be exact.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Okay.

Douglas Fidler, Department of Tennessee

Sir, Doug Fiddler, PDC Tennessee: Just a question. Will present Junior members who are in that gap, would they be grandfathered? Or could they be grandfathered?

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Commander-in-Chief, through you to the Brother. It would depend upon what the C&R Committee develops. In the past, when we have done things like this, we have grandfathered existing members.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: Thank you, sir.

James Locke Lyon, I, Department of Illinois

Jim Lyon, Department of Illinois: Are we not using The Boy Scouts of America's Youth Protection Certificate or their policy?

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Commander-in-Chief, through you to the Brother. It is not a requirement. It is a suggestion, and that's the rub. If we required, every Brother who had contact with a child under the age of eighteen to complete that training and keep it up to date and retrain every two years, then it would not be the same issue.

James Locke Lyon, I, Department of Illinois: Because the major thing in their policy is that you're not alone. It's either two kids and an adult or two adults and a child together at the same time, and not left alone one on one is the main crux of that training.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Right. The Commander-in-Chief's General Order which is now what we're following, they were suggestions. Not requirements.

James Locke Lyon, I, Department of Illinois: It would be a good one to look at and use.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: The whole premise behind that General Order is because there are so many different States with so many different variables. This was a suggested outline for all the different States and Camps to follow using your own local laws.

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Cause for us to try to write something that encompassed everything, I'm sorry, wasn't going to happen. So, that's why we wrote it, more of a suggested outline.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Just an informational comment. I wasn't the one who brought this up, but Pennsylvania. I'm just delivering the message because I don't think anyone else is back from lunch. There's a way to do this and it's the same as what we did with Juniors. We can empower the Departments to set the age at which a Brother becomes a full member as opposed to a Junior. And by doing that, we let each Department then comply with their individual State laws. If I'm still on the C&R Committee next year, it's certainly what I'd be working towards developing language that would basically say that a department can set the age for a Senior member between fourteen and eighteen. Requiring at eighteen and allowing as you go, as young as fourteen, but that they set it in order that they comply with their own State laws.

George A. Huttick, Department of Tennessee

Commander, George Huttick, Department of Tennessee: Standing next to me is George Michael Huttick. Believe it or not, he's fifteen. He'll be sixteen in a few months While in general we agree with the principle of what's being proposed, he's a little bit shy and he's still learning how to talk in public. But he would prefer to be grandfathered in as he is now currently a full member and is in a National Encampment. He's earned the right to be here. He doesn't want to slip back to being a Junior.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: Okay. Can you re-read the motion just to be clear?

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary Move that the following be sent to the Constitution and Regulations Committee: proposed to change the age for Juniors from six to eighteen years. And must be eighteen to be a full senior member.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: Okay.

James B. Pahl, National Regulations Committee: Commander-in-Chief, one friendly amendment. That that be the standing committee report back next year as opposed to the Encampment committee to report back today.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: Okay. Ready?

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief: Commander-in-Chief, Past Commander-in-Chief Don Darby. I think there were a couple, if they weren't, I'll make it a friendly amendment to grandfather the youth that are currently in that gap where they become members at fourteen, that they be grandfathered in and allowed to be remain as members and have the full privileges granted to a regular member.

Several: Second.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: I'll accept it as a friendly amendment. I had already alluded to that.

Loran Bures, Isaac Stevens Camp #1 at Large: Excuse me, Commander.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: Yes, sir.

Loran Bures, Isaac Stevens Camp #1 at Large: The General Order did not deal with a very important point with Juniors and with those under the age of majority. Our current membership applications do not have any place for their parent or legal guardian to give them permission for them to join this organization. We need to create a separate form for application form for those under the age of majority that will require at least one parent or legal guardian's permission for them to join the organization. Some States require both parents or legal guardians even in the case of divorce. We don't have anywhere currently because it's a combined form. And I really think that needs to be developed and part of this policy because that's part of the policy that's used by The Boy Scouts of America to help protect them and that you know the parents have approved their joining the organization or their legal guardians.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Just refer it to P and P.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: I was going to say let's go ahead and refer that to the P and P so it can be developed.

Loran Bures, Isaac Stevens Camp #1 at Large: That is fine. I just want to make sure we get that in the record that that really needs to be part of our process of members under the age of majority.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief: Do the Encampment Committees have their reports done? First one I have is Rituals and Ceremonies.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer: Commander-in-Chief, We are almost out of current printing of the Rituals. And there are updates to the Ritual that have never been incorporated in it. Actually, we did propose appointing a National policy on Minor members.

4. Current Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War National Policy Regarding Minors

323 Copyright 2023 Sons Of Union Veterans Of The Civil War, A Congressionally Chartered Corporation For purposes of this policy, the term "minor" refers to any Brother of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) under 18 years of age, regardless of their membership status within the SUVCW as a Junior, Junior Associate, Associate, or Member. Further, should a federal, state or local statute define a minor as older than this, the SUVCW will observe that older definition, and such statute shall immediately be brought to the attention of the National Counselor.

The following are the MINIMUM requirements regarding minor Brothers of the

SUVCW:

a. All minors shall be accompanied by a parent or designated guardian (e.g., a family member or friend who is 18 years of age or older) when participating in ANY SUVCW activity.

b. At no time will a non-related Brother be permitted "one-on-one" contact with a minor. Any interaction with a minor must include at least two (2) Brothers over the age of 18 years at all times.

c. Any Brother who, in good faith, witnesses or suspects any type of physical, mental or sexual abuse of any minor shall immediately report such suspicion to local authorities first, and then to the appropriate local Camp and Department Commanders immediately thereafter.

d. All Brothers shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws pertaining to child abuse and the reporting thereof.

e. While not a requirement, it is recommended that every Brother, who is 18 years or older, who may have contact with a minor, complete training related to the protection of children from abuse of any type. Free training is available from the Boy Scouts of America through their website at http://www.myscouting.org. Local Camps may wish to retain a record of those Brothers who have completed such training. Adopted by the Council of Administration as a National Policy on July 11, 2014.

5. Additional factors to consider:

a. All States but 3 States have the age of majority set at 18. The exceptions being Alabama and Nebraska (19) and Mississippi (21).

b. the Uniform Transfers to Minor Act UTMA states that a person can't receive a monetary gift without a guardian and applies in every state until the individual reaches the age of 21.

c. Businesses will not execute contracts with minors.

d. State laws dealing with work permits for minors vary and as we operate in all fifty states there is no assurance that a minor would be allowed for conduct the Orders business in every state.

e. The Federal Fair Labor Act establishes limits on the use of minors that are in addition to any State Laws.

f. A minor cannot be held accountable for the loss or misappropriation of the Orders Quartermaster Store inventory, or the misuse of the income derived from the stores sales. Additionally, many States have laws which shield the Guardians of a minor from being sued to recoup the losses.

g. State and Federal Law set the ages at which a minor can be employed for example in NY you must be 16 years of age to obtain a permit.

h. Both Federal and State Laws restrict work schedules for minors both during the school year and the summer.

i. The Child Labor Laws in the state of Massachusetts state that no one under the age of 16 can be employed.

j. Can a Minor enter into a legal and binding contract? The person signing must have sufficient understanding that he's entering into a contract and the terms he's agreeing to. For most contracts, the general rule is that while it's not illegal to enter into a contract with a minor, the contract is voidable at the discretion of the minor. Voidable contracts are usually valid contracts and are binding unless the child cancels it. Therefore, when someone chooses to enter into a contract with a minor or an infant, they are doing so at their own risk. Contract laws provide minors the option to exit a contract as they desire, which is called "voiding a contract."

Findings and Reasoning:

The Charter Constitution and Regulations do not speak to a specific age requirement for an individual seeking National Office in the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War however it is reasonable to believe that a candidate should meet certain criteria for maturity, experience, ability to carry out the duties expected of an individual holding National Office. The Charter Constitution and Regulation does require that the National Quartermaster shall have the responsibility of maintaining an inventory of supplies, procuring sufficient

inventory to meet the needs of the National Organization, the Departments, the Camps, and the brothers. This requirement obviously requires the National Quartermaster to enter into contracts with our vendors for various services. Under the current laws for contracting with minors it is likely that our vendors would refuse to negotiate or engage in contracts originating with or being signed by a Minor. A second area of Concern would be the Orders ability to obtain a bond for the Quartermaster if he was a Minor and that could put the Order at risk. Current Laws around the country fail to hold a Minor accountable for any loses that the Order might incur. Lastly dealing with the various Child Labor Laws at both the State and federal Level could entangle the Order in legal issues related to the employment of Minors for example work hours, work permits, and potentially even compensation.

Opinion:

As an organization it is incumbent on us to ensure the proper stewardship and leadership expected by the brothers of the Order. As the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations are silent on the matter of an age requirement for National Officer; it is within the power of the Commander-in-Chief to provide clarification and direction in this matter. Based on the research and findings herein, any petitioner desiring to candidacy as a National Officer should be disqualified unless the individual has meet the age of 21 years at the time the petition for candidacy is presented.

Recommendations for the National Encampment

• That the Members of the Order and more specifically the Elected Officers be reminded that they have been charged with reading and familiarizing themselves with the contents of the Charter, Constitution and Regulations.

• That either the Standing National Constitution and Regulations Committee or a Special Committee authorized by the National Encampment conduct a complete and comprehensive review of the Constitution and Regulations to identify inconsistencies, ambiguities, and contradictory language within those documents.

3.9 Assistant National Counselor, James B. Pahl, PCinC

I consult frequently with the National Counselor.

3.10 Assistant National Counselor (Blue Book/C&R), James **B.** Pahl, PCinC

I have received a raw transcript of the 2020 and 2021 National Encampments, awaiting the publishing of the Proceedings, so the annotations to the C&R can be updated

3.11 National Eagle Scout Certificate Coordinator, Robert C. Seal

During the 2021-2022 term the SUVCW issued 461 Eagle Scout Certificates, with Department (DESCC) and Camp (CESCC) Eagle Scout Certificate Coordinators issuing 451 certificates, and the National Eagle Scout Certificate Coordinator (NESCC) issuing 10 certificates. This represents an increase of 50 Eagle Scout Certificates compared to the previous term.

Implementation of the SUVCW Eagle Scout Certificate Program continues to vary significantly between Departments. While some Departments demonstrate active participation in the Program others either issued no certificates or did not respond to two requests for their report. Most notable Departments are the Department of New York which issued 127 certificates, the Department of New Jersey which issued 106 (46 more than the previous term), the Department of Pennsylvania which issued 58, and the Department of Ohio which issued 33. Six Departments reported issuing 11 to 20 certificates, eight Departments reported issuing 2 to 10, four Departments reported issuing 1 certificate, and seven Departments reported not issuing a certificate or did not provide a report. The Departments of Florida, Kansas, and New Hampshire did not appoint a DESCC, however, a CESCC in Florida Camp has voluntarily accepted the task of issuing certificates to Scouts who reside within the Department of Florida.

At the request of CinC Paquette I drafted two SUVCW Eagle Scout Program pamphlets (one bifold and one tri-fold style) that can be personalized with Department/Camp contact information, printed on a home printer, and provided to Boy Scout Council offices and local units for their information and use. The pamphlets will be available to Departments and Camps in PDF format and will either be a Fillable PDF to allow contact information to be added electronically, or a PDF with a blank space to allow attaching a preprinted mailing label with contact information. The draft pamphlets sent to the Programs and Policies Committee for review and approval on February 7, 2022, but to date have not been approved.

An issue that remains to be resolved is an effective method for the NESCC to have changes made to the "Eagle Scout Program" section of the SUVCW National Website.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as the NESCC for the 2021-2022 term, it was a pleasure to represent the SUVCW in recognizing and congratulating new Eagle Scouts.

3.12 National GAR Highway Officer, Peter J. Hritsko, Jr.

Nothing to report.

3.13 National GAR Records Officer, Dean A. Enderlin, PDC

It has been an honor to serve as your National GAR Records Officer for the 2021-2022 administrative year. This is my twelfth consecutive term in this appointed office, and I am thankful for the opportunity to continue to serve.

This was a particularly busy year behind the scenes with GAR records. We received an unprecedented amount of newly discovered collection information over the course of the year. I am in the process of updating the GAR Records Catalog to include it. Particularly noteworthy is a detailed listing of GAR records in the collections of the Indiana State Archives. We have known about this large collection for a long time, but the details regarding its contents have until now been difficult to acquire. Many thanks goes to Brother Richard Blanton of Alabama for obtaining a copy of the listing and sharing it with me. Brother Blanton has located many other records, as well, which are being added to the GAR Records Catalog as time permits. Special thanks are also in order to Brother Glen Roosevelt (Dept. of California & Pacific) and Brother Loran Bures (Dept. of the Columbia) for information recently discovered in their respective Departments.

One highlight of the year was a request from a Military History Specialist with the Reference and Researcher Service Division of The Library of Congress, for permission to link our GAR Records Program website to a new guide on The Library of Congress website. By teaming up with The Library of Congress, we are hopeful that word will spread about our program, which will lead to new discoveries of both GAR history and the location of collections of GAR records. The guide, titled, "Grand Army of the Republic and Kindred Societies: A Guide to Resources in the General Collections of the Library of Congress," may be accessed by the following URL: https://guides.loc.gov/grand-army-of-the-republic

The year was not without a few glitches. In early August 2021, I discovered that my administrative access to the GAR Records website had been blocked. Also, public access to

www.GARrecords.org using various browsers returned errors, and at least one file on the site had been automatically wiped of its contents. The issues turned out to be the result of actions taken earlier in the year by IT personnel in an effort to purge a malware infection in other areas of the SUVCW server. Working with Brother Tim McCoy, we were able to identify what had happened during the purge that had caused the GAR Records website to become inaccessible. The matter required the services of a professional from our domain registrar, GoDaddy, to correct misconfigured server settings and restore GAR Records to an accessible state. The matter was resolved on August 13. A detailed explanation was provided in the November 2021 report to the CofA.

More details regarding our program are presented in the annual report of the National Committee on GAR Records.

RECOMMENDATIONS: No Recommendations.

3.14 National Graves Registration Officer, Henry Duquette, PDC

As of July 30, we have 831,154 records in the database, of which 789,288 are active and 41,866 are deleted records.

Included in that figure are the 24,020 Confederate records which have been turned over to the Sons of Confederate Veterans. Larry Hammack, Arizona Division Grave Registrar and SCV Find a Grave Coordinator, has done an outstanding job of managing the process of comparing these records to the Confederate Graves Registry and adding those records that are missing.

We are no longer allowing Confederate records into the system and a message announcing the official close of the Confederates records was sent to all Department Graves Registration Officers and the Instruction Booklet has been updated. Special thanks go to Brother David Jackson, DGRO Dept. of the Southwest, who has done Yeoman's work coordinating the effort to eliminate the Confederate records from the database.

Brother Dennis Duffy has nearly finished editing the Graves Registration Instructional Booklet which will be replacing all current versions in the next few weeks. Brother Duffy has spent many hours reviewing the current booklet for correctness and clarity and evaluating suggestions made by other committee members. Through this process it has been determined that the National Graves Registration Policy (December 1999) is badly out of date and needs to be rewritten.

I am continuing to compile notes for improvements to the database such as input-driven dropdown lists (e.g., County selection list based on State selected) and new fields such as prefix, suffix and alternate spelling for the name fields. We currently have 1,113 records with "Jr" in the First Name field, 905 in the Middle Name field and 903 in the Last Name field. There are 146 records with "Sr" in the First Name field, 189 in the Middle Name field and 114 in the Last Name field. If you search on Last Name without including Jr. or Sr. you will fail to get any results. It is obvious to me that we need a separate field for Jr., Sr. III, etc. Likewise, we have many records where an alternate spelling is noted in the Veteran Summary field. This is most often due to names being misspelled either on official military records or on headstones or burial records. We need to accommodate spelling variations to make our system more user friendly.

I regularly receive email messages asking me to add, modify or delete records or to answer questions about our system. I continue to research records that have blank fields or incorrect information and pass the information on to the appropriate DGRO for action.

In addition to committee members Dave Tschantz (Find a Grave coordinator), Tom Mueller, Rick Danes and Dennis Duffy, we have received valuable input from Brother David Jackson. All continue to provide important support and information throughout the year.

Recommendations:

• Begin the process of formally assessing our current system which will ultimately lead us to solicitating bids for a rewritten system.

• Rewrite the National Graves Registration Policy.

I have tried my best as have our committee members to answer these in a timely manner . All the responses have been positive.

My Banner column continues with over 50 submissions. Our members are always excited to learn more about our 140 years of existence.

3.20 National Membership-at-Large Coordinator, Alan L. Russ, PDC

There are currently eleven brothers, after having lost the Canadian brothers to the new camp in Ontario. This includes brothers in Austria, Australia, Germany, Spain, and Switzerland. There is one in process from the China; however, application and documents will need to be submitted electronically, as there is a question of regular mail successfully making it to the U.S.

3.21 National Parliamentarian, James B. Pahl, PCinC

Nothing new to report.

3.22 National Patriotic Instructor, Benjamin J. Frail, PDC

It is my honor to again serve as the National Patriotic Instructor for the 2021-2022 term. During this term I have issued seventeen (17) National Patriotic Instructions:

All of which have been forwarded to the National Webmaster for inclusion on the website. I have also issued fourteen (14) Memorial University certificates. We have also had fourteen (14) additional Brothers who has submitted lessons, yet to complete the program (www.suvcwmu.org). I have also forwarded nine (9) Half Mast notifications out to the Brothers of the CofA and Department Patriotic Instructors. At the Commander-in-Chiefs request I hosted a training session for Department Patriotic Instructors that was recorded and forwarded to all DPIs. This session will be the basis of a National Patriotic Instructor video that will hopefully be on both Memorial University's Job Roles course and the National Patriotic Instructors Webpage. This instruction covered how to properly fill out forms, topics for monthly instructions to Departments/Camps and feedback from Department PIs on how I can do a better job for them. I recommend that future National Patriotic Instructors utilize the technology we have available to us and set up quarterly

teleconference sessions with Department Patriotic Instructors to go over any and all topics pertaining to the job.

3.23 National Signals Officer, Timothy S. McCoy, PDC

Since the last National Encampment, the Signals Corps finalized and submitted to the National Committee on Program & Policy a proposed revised National Social Media Policy. The reviewed proposal was accepted by the Council of Administration during its meeting on July 31, 2022. The Signals Corps also finalized and submitted on February 11, 2022, to the National Committee on Program & Policy a proposed description and criteria for a new National award to recognize outstanding achievements by a Department or Camp in promoting the mission of SUVCW via social media. The Signals Corps is finalizing a draft resource guide, to be made available to all Departments and Camps on request, which will suggest optional best practices in developing and maintaining SUVCW-related websites and social media accounts.

During the past year, SUVCW's Signals Corps has continued to play a vital role in raising the public profile of the Order via our social media accounts. Collectively, through our four social media accounts, SUVCW is daily reaching nearly 12,500 followers (nearly 1000 more from the time of the 2021 National Encampment) with quality information that presents how the National organization, Departments, Camps, SVR and the Allied Orders are preserving the history and legacy of the heroes who saved the Union during the Civil War. Social media continues to demonstrate its strengths as a vehicle for attracting new members; during the past year alone, at least SUVCW 40 membership inquiries were received through our social media accounts, and other inquiries were forwarded to Allied Orders. Analysis of the followers of our Facebook account reveals that the majority are in the 55–65-year-old age bracket, information that could prove useful to the development of future membership recruitment strategies.

The National Facebook account remains our most followed social media account, at 9,219 followers. Our Instagram account has 1,575 followers, Twitter has 1,189 followers, LinkedIn has 363 followers, and YouTube has 121. The Signals Corps expresses its continued gratitude to Brother Jim Pahl for generously dedicating space in The Banner over the past year for an advertisement that encourages Brothers to follow SUVCW's social media accounts. The advertisement includes a QR code for ease of access to all five accounts.

Brothers are encouraged to like/follow "Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War – National Organization" on Facebook; "suvcw_national" on Instagram; "Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War" on LinkedIn; and "@SUVCW" on Twitter. SUVCW is on YouTube at "Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War". Brothers are also encouraged to share on their social media accounts postings found on SUVCW National's accounts. With every cross-sharing, we reach a new audience and potential new Brothers!

The National Signals Officer expresses his gratitude to the dedicated and talented group of Brothers -- Ben Frail, George Huttick, John Vander Meulen, Barrett Young, and Chris Workman -- who have served alongside me over the past year on this committee. Lastly, to Camps and Departments across our Order that have responded enthusiastically to the use of social media to accomplish our mission of honoring the Boys in Blue: Bravo and well done!

There are no recommendations.

3.24 National Legislation Officer, Daniel R Earl, PCC

The duties of the National Legislation Officer are to keep Brothers apprised of legislation affecting the welfare of the Order, or the Constitution, or welfare of the United States. To that extent, this report is an overview of relevant federal legislation.

Of special note in this report is Commander-in-Chief Paquette's authority for Department Commanders to lobby in support of the Ulysses S. Grant Bicentennial Recognition Act (House Joint Resolution 58 and Senate Joint Resolution 26, both awaiting committee action in their house of origin). Furthermore, as authorized by the Commander-in-Chief, I have added the SUVCW's "position statement," supporting these resolutions, to Govtrack.us (a government transparency website, which can be viewed at https://www.govtrack.us/congress/bills/117/hjres58 and https://www.govtrack.us/congress/bills/117/sjres26.

Below is a summary list of <u>federal legislation</u> that has been introduced during the first and second sessions of the 117th Congress (from 19 January 2021 through 30 July 2022), relevant to the purpose and objects of the Order. During this period, I have reviewed over 15,600 federal bills and resolutions. Unless otherwise noted below, each measure is awaiting action in a House or Senate Committee.

Due to the vast quantity of continuously changing legislation, a *limited amount* of State legislation is researched and reported on by Assistant National Legislative Officer Steve

Hammond (PDC). His report follows this federal legislation summary, below. Departments are encouraged to monitor legislation in their respective states and local government jurisdictions (G.O. #6 Series 2016-2017) and contact the National Legislation Officer or Assistant National Legislation Officer about issues of interest and to assist with further review and/or advice.

Brothers may be particularly interested in legislation below that is denoted with an asterisk (*) and in bold print.

BATTLEFIELDS, MONUMENTS/MEMORIALS, AND HISTORIC AREAS

• H.R. 671 – This legislation would require the Department of Interior to determine the suitability and feasibility of designating Fort Pillow Historic State Park in Henning, Tennessee, which was the site of the Battle of Fort Pillow during the Civil War, as a unit of the National Park System.

• H.R. 672 – The "Rejecting and Eliminating the Foul Use of Symbols Exulting Confederate Principles Act (REFUSE Confederate Principles Act)". This legislation would direct the NPS to establish a grant program providing funds for the removal and replacement of Confederate symbols, etc.

• H.R. 1164 – To require the Secretary of the Interior to remove the Emancipation Memorial from Lincoln Park in the District of Columbia.

• S. 366 – "Confederate Monument Removal Act." This bill would require the removal from display in the U.S. Capitol, of all statues of individuals who voluntarily served the Confederate States of America.

• *H. Res.* 731 – This House resolution would recognize the centennial of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery.

• H.R. 6130/S. 3307 – Wilson's Creek National Battlefield Boundary Revision Act of 2021. These companion bills would modify the boundary of the Wilson's Creek National Battlefield in the State of Missouri by adding approximately 624 acres of land.

• S. 3425 – A bill to extend the authorization for appropriations for certain National Heritage Areas, including the Tennessee Civil War Heritage Area.

• * H.R. 7495 * – "Civil War Defenses of Washington National Historical Park Act." This bill would designate the Civil War Defenses of Washington National Historical Park (comprised of certain National Park System lands, and more) located in the District of Columbia,

Virginia, and Maryland, that were part of the Civil War defenses of Washington and related to the Shenandoah Valley Campaign of 1864. It would also study ways in which the Civil War history of both the North and South can be assembled, arrayed, and conveyed for the benefit of the public.

MISCELLANEOUS PATRIOTIC AND OTHER LEGISLATION

• *H.R. 51 and S. 51 – "Washington, D.C. Admission Act.* This legislation would provide for the admission into the United States the State of Washington, Douglass Commonwealth, composed of most of the territory of the District of Columbia. H. R. 51 passed in the House on 22 April 2021 and was sent to the Senate, where it is awaiting action, along with S. 51.

• *H.R.* 85 – *The "Old Glory Only Act."* This bill would prohibit the flying of any flag other than the U.S. flag over United States diplomatic and consular posts.

• *H.R. 307* – Directing the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to include the KIA, MIA, and POW acronyms on headstones and markers furnished by the Department of Veterans affairs.

• *H.R. 503* – "*Woman on the Twenty Act of 2021.*" This will would require \$20 notes to include a portrait of Harriet Tubman, beginning in 2023.

• *H.R. 1320 and S. 475 – The "Juneteenth National Independence Day Act."* This bill would establish Juneteenth Independence Day as a Federal holiday. Passed by the Senate on 15 June 2021 and by the House on 16 June 2021. Signed into law by the President on 17 June 2021 (PL 117-17).

• *H.R. 1522 and S. 780* – To provide for the admission of the State of Puerto Rico into the Union.

• *H.R. 1526* – To require flags of the United States of America to be domestically made. This bill would make it a crime, punishable by a \$1,000 fine for *anyone* to purchase "a flag of the United States that has not been 100 percent manufactured in the United States...."

• *S.* 4399/H.R. 8071 – The "All-American Flag Act" would prohibit agencies from using funds to procure a U.S. flag unless such flag has been manufactured in the United States from materials that have been U.S. grown, produced, or manufactured, etc.

• *S. Res.* 148 – A resolution recognizing the importance of paying tribute to those individuals who have faithfully served and retired from the Armed Forces of the United States, designating April 18, 2021, as "Military Retiree Appreciation Day," and encouraging the people of the United States to honor the past and continued service of military retirees

to their local communities and the United States. This passed by Unanimous Consent in the Senate on 14 April 2021.

• *H. Res. 323* – Recognizing the enduring cultural and historical significance of emancipation in the Nation's capital on the anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln's signing of the District of Columbia Compensated Emancipation Act, which established the "first freed" on April 16, 1862, and calling upon the House of Representatives and Senate to pass the Washington, D.C. Admission Act.

• * *H.R. 2806* * – *Honoring All Veterans Act.* This bill would establish a mission statement of the Department of Veterans Affairs as follows: "To fulfill President Lincoln's promise to care for those 'who shall have borne the battle' and for their families, caregivers, and survivors."

• *H.R. 3005* – Among other things, this bill would require the removal of statues of individuals who voluntarily served the Confederate States of America, as well as busts of Roger Brooke Taney and others, from display in the United States Capitol. This bill passed the House 285-120 on 29 June 2021 and was sent to the Senate for action.

• *H. Res.* 441 – This resolution recognizes on Memorial Day, 31 May 2021, the denial of full participation in their government through statehood by active duty servicemembers, National Guard members, reservists, veterans, and their families who are residents of the District of Columbia.

• * *H. Con. Res.* 37 * - This concurrent resolution honors the men and women who paid the ultimate price of the Nation's freedom and recommits the people of the United States to remember and renew the legacy of Memorial Day.

• *H.R. 3818* – To modify the boundary of the Lincoln Home National Historic Site in Illinois to improve accessibility to the Lincoln home

• *H. Res. 517 – Original Slavery Remembrance Day Resolution 2021*. This resolution supports the designation of a "Slavery Remembrance Day" on August 20, 2021, and condemns slavery and its progenies. Passed on 27 July 2022.

• *H.R.* 4365 – "Chaplains Memorial Preservation Act" would preserve the memorials to chaplains at Arlington National Cemetery.

• * *H.R.* **4994** * – To prohibit the use of Federal funds for Confederate symbols. Exceptions include Confederate symbols created, maintained, or displayed in a museum or educational

exhibit.

• * *H.J. Res. 58 and S.J. Res. 26** –The "Ulysses S. Grant Bicentennial Recognition Act," which would provide for the posthumous appointment of Ulysses S. Grant to the grade of General of the Armies of the United States. The House bill as been referred to the House Committee on Armed Services (14 Sept 2021) where it is awaiting hearings and further action. As of 30 July 2022 this bill has 15 cosponsors. S.J.Res.26 was introduced in the Senate on 22 Sep 2021, when it was referred to the senate Committee on the Judiciary where it is awaiting further action. It has one cosponsor. See General Order #6 (Series 2021-2022) – Department Commanders Authorized to Lobby in Support of H. J. Res. 58 and S. J. Res. 26.

• * *H.R. 6816/S. 3702* * – Identical bills that would award a Congressional Gold Medal, collectively, to the African Americans who served with Union forces during the Civil War, in recognition of their bravery and outstanding service.

• *H.R. 7013* – The "Harriet Tubman Day Act" that would establish Harriet Tubman Day as a federal holiday.]

• *H.R. 7062* – "*Honoring Harriet Tubman Act*" – a bill to direct the Joint Committee on the Library to obtain a statue of Harriet Tubman and to place the statue in National Statuary Hall in the United States Capitol.

• *H. Res.1053* – Recognizing the enduring cultural and historical significance of emancipation in the Nation's capital on the anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln's signing of the District of Columbia Compensated Emancipation Act, which established the "first freed" on April 16, 1862, and celebrating passage of the District of Columbia statehood bill in the House of Representatives.

• * *S. Con. Res.* 36 * – A concurrent Resolution honoring the life and legacy of Ulysses S. Grant in commemoration of his 200th Birthday. Introduced and adopted by unanimous consent in the Senate on 27 Apr 2022; waiting action in the House of Representatives. (Identical to H. Con. Res. 87.)

• * *H. Con. Res.* 87 * – Identical to S. Con. Res. 36 – was introduced in the House on 28 Apr 2022 and referred to the Committee on Armed Forces.

• *H. Res. 1140* - Recognizing on Memorial Day, May 30, 2022, the denial of full participation in their Government through statehood by active duty servicemembers, National Guard members, reservists, veterans, and their families who are residents of the District of

Columbia.

• *H.R. 8290 – "Make American Flags in America Act of 2022"* would require certain flags of the U.S. to be made in the U.S.

• *H.J. Res. 90/S.J. Res. 57* – These joint resolutions would redesignate the Robert E. Lee Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery as the "Arlington House National Historic Site."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

• * *H.J. Res.* 19 and *S.J. Res.* 18 * – Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States to repeal the Twenty-third Amendment to the Constitution. This proposal would forbid residents of the District of Columbia from voting for presidential electors, who in turn vote in the electoral college for the President and Vice President.

• *H.J. Res.* 42 – This joint resolution proposes an amendment to the Constitution to provide that a new state may only be admitted into the Union upon a vote of two-thirds of each chamber of Congress.

• * *H.J. Res. 51 and S.J. Res. 20* * – Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States giving Congress the power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States.

State Legislation Report (from Assistant Legislative Officer Steve Hammond, PDC)

• In New Jersey, defiling a grave for a veteran as been increased to a third degree misdemeanor.

• In Virginia there was activity concerning creating space for Civil War Monuments in Richmond.

3.27 National Webmaster, Harry W. Reineke IV, PDC

I agreed to stay on this year as National Webmaster until such time as the new website went online, and a new webmaster could be trained to take it over. For both selfish and altruistic reasons, I really hoped that would take place by Gettysburg, but it didn't. I would be speaking dishonestly if I didn't say that I suffered from a lack of motivation for this role over the past 8 months. I have been slow to get things posted, and often required multiple reminders. I wish it wasn't the case, but it has been. I am thankful that at times, Brother Sumner Hunnewell has been able to pick up some of the slack that I've been leaving behind, and at others, I have been able to handle it myself. I am grateful to CinC Paquette, and his predecessors back to PCinC Mark Day for trusting me with the website to varying degrees. I know that the new site, whenever it is ready from the contractor, will be gorgeous and more deeply functional than our current site.

This year has been another year of "maintain, don't build", due to the redesign process that is still incomplete. Because of this, I have gotten complaints from Brothers about the "News" content of our website, where things like Encampment links are posted. This section, on the current format, works like a blog, where in order for old stuff to get "buried", new stuff must be added, it isn't properly designed to stagnate and delete, it is designed to support active news from around the Order. I would encourage any Brother who has news to send their news to signalscorps@suvcw.org for sharing on Social Media. Nothing came across my desk to be posted in that section of the website, as we have taken to using Social Media for that purpose.

I have no recommendations to put forth at this time, but I encourage the next National Webmaster to have a thick skin and reach out to me if there's any help I can provide. Lastly, I'd like to thank past National Signals Officer Jamie McGuire, and current National Signals Officer Tim McCoy for their support during these years. It has been great working with each of them, and they are each a credit to their upbringing and our Order.

3.28 National Webmaster for Quartermaster Store, Ken L. Freshley, PCinC

3.29 Asst. Natl. Secretary (Dept-at-Large Secretary/Treasurer), James B. Pahl, PCinC

We have the Ensign John Davis Camp #10 located in London, England. A new Camp at Large in Canada - Pvt Robert F Dodd Camp 4 has been issued a charter and is now operational, under the command of Brother Adam Gaines. A second Canadian camp, the Sgt William Harris Camp 2, is forming and filed form 51.

As we were instructed to forward all form changes to the Commander-in-Chief to execute, the process, while easier, also limited this committee's effectiveness because we didn't know where the task at hand was or if it had been completed. We were instructed to do so because he had purchased the Adobe Pro program himself and didn't believe any of our members could use it to change the forms.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Purchase a new copy of Adobe Pro for the SUVCW, for the use of the National Committee on Program & Policy. So, this committee can do its job.

THE EXCELLENT:

From a recent e-mail by Tom Gaard responding to a draft of this report: "I have not sent you any Form 61's in past year as I was assuming that I would be inputing them myself when this [new memorials database] project is completed. I have 32 regular 61's and 10 Last Soldier

61's completed that you don't have. I might add that we have now marked the last soldiers in all 99 Iowa counties. We did the final county on June 18...

THE GOOD:

1. The company working with National Signals Officer Tim McCoy & the Special Committee on Website Redesign (2023) on a creation of a National Civil War Memorials Database has made sufficient advancements, which makes me very happy, and I have an assurance that there will soon be a working mock-up that I can share with committee members for their reviews and comments. The good news seems to be three fold.

a) It does not negate the previous work done by the Memorials Committee in creating pdf files of Form 61s and 62s; and,

b) It allows for work done by the separate states on their individual webpages to be blended into the database until such time a form 61 or 62 is created on a particular monument; and,

c) It can allow for members and non-members to submit information, all subject to the review, editing & approval of the committee chair or members. Once the database is completed, we will attempt to train department memorials officers for entry of their individual departments monuments probably through a Zoom session.

This database will require a form change for Form 61 and most likely for the National Committee on Civil War Memorial Grant Fund's Form 62 as well (upon their review). I make a recommendation for Form 61 that follows later in this report.

2. With last year's encampment over and my responsibilities for that done, I have been able to catch up on the 30 plus submissions that have been sitting on my laptop.

THE BAD:

1. Since I took over the position of Civil War Memorials Officer for the department of Missouri back around 2005, I've been searching for a monument of Maj. General Francis Preston Blair, Jr., that was supposed to be in front of the hospital in Louisiana, MO. It was mentioned in DUVCW records.

In May, I was selling some of my brother's stuff on Craig's List and happened to be contacted by a former reporter for the local newspaper there when selling baseball cards. I asked about the monument and if it ever existed. He advised it did and then told me that one night vandals took it down and also a plaque elsewhere and chucked it into the nearby Mississippi River. It has not been found.

STILL MORE BAD:

2. Last year vandals took a tow chain and a truck and tried to pull down the GAR soldier monument in Laclede, MO (birthplace of General John J. Pershing). It's support structure was damaged, but the monument it still there, but now standing at a 45 degree angle. It has not yet been repaired.

THE UGLY:

Unfortunately, the internet is so filled with scammers that we have to go through an edit out member personal information on all form 61s and 62s as we prepare for an online monuments/memorials database. I have requested guidance on this and have received no definitive answer as to what is desired. After working with the people creating the database, I will be going through each form and attempting to leave only one type of identification on each. Committee members could help and 2, so far, said they can. E-mail addresses will be the first to go as long as there is another form of identification; then phone numbers, then physical addresses. Hopefully, any member submission will have only their name and local camp listed. Therefore, the form needs to be changed for the future.

Recommendation: That on form 61 immediately above the section covering *Inspector Identification*, the following words (or similar after legal review), be inserted into the form.

Submission of this form requires at least one form of identification so that you may be contacted regarding the information on this form. This information will most likely be in the public domain. With your name, please include one (or more) pieces of contact information.

1. If a member of an Allied Order, the name of your camp, auxiliary, tent, circle or corps; along with your department;

- 2. Physical Address;
- 3. Phone Number
- 4. E-Mail address.

By submitting this, you are allowing the posting of this information on the internet.

them. The requirement that when a new monument is given a grant by the grants committee that the grantee file a form 61 at least on completion of the monument is often not being met.

Note 2: 1992 New York SUVCW Monuments Book , Maine Monument Commission Report & 1995 Maryland Governor's Comm on Monuments Report, listing monuments are all digitized.

Note 3: Forms 61 & 62s that have been sent in and are not considered monuments are included in some of the department's records.

We have over 50 monument books digitized to help our members research particular monuments (ex. – Indiana's Andersonville Monument Dedication book). In the future most of these will be incorporated in the online database with or without a form 61 or 62.

I also try to maintain a listing of US Civil War memorials outside the US. I have compiled a list of 18 statues of Lincoln that exist or existed outside the US. They include: 1 each for Australia, Japan, Norway, Portugal, Singapore, and France; 2 Russia; 3 Cuba; 4 Mexico; 2 England; and 1 Scotland. Two of these have Form 61s in our files.

We also have 6 monument company catalogs (which shows standardized figures), list of existing Civil War cannons with markings, & guidelines for 3 other agencies for placing monuments. They are available on my Google drive and some are also on the Missouri website. Department monument officers and other necessary SUVCW officials can request access to my google drive files for all states and these books by e-mailing wbusch@suvcwmo.org or cwmemorials@suvcw.org .

Monuments & Memorials Project webpage https://suvcw.org/?page_id=872 on the

national site has the following broken links: Colorado & Wyoming, Massachusetts Facebook, Nebraska, and New York. Nebraska and New York links have been broken for over one year. They have been reported to the national webmaster and links recommended to be removed.

4.3 National Committee on Communication & Technology, Timothy S. McCoy, PDC

Since the last National Encampment, the Committee has worked closely with the Commander-in-Chief and National Executive Director to purchase new computer hardware and software for the National Headquarters. The Committee Chair expresses his gratitude to support provide by National Secretary Michael Beard and Brother Dave Demmy, Jr., in ensuring a successful completion of this process.

In order to further protect Brothers from emails scams, I worked extensively with Go Daddy, our email hosting platform, to secure 'generic' SUVCW email forwarding addresses (e.g., "CinC@suvcw.org", "CofA@suvcw.org", "SignalsOfficer@suvcw.org", etc.) for all members of the Council of Administration and all National Committee chairs.

Maintenance of the current website continues to require significant amounts of time. In July 2022, a glitch caused the National website to be offline for approximately four hours, the first time such a problem had occurred since last year. The issue was successfully resolved and a new security patch installed at the same time. I am especially grateful to Brothers Sumner Hunnewell and Harry Reineke for their support in website maintenance as we near the launch of a new SUVCW website (see report of the National Special Committee on Website Redesign).

Plans to revise and update the National Policy on Electronic Communications, which was last revised in 2008, were put on hold to allow the CinC Appointed Committee on Strategic Development of Information Technology, chaired by Brother Henry Duquette, to fulfil its mission and make relevant recommendations. As National Signals Officer, I participated in meetings of the CinC appointed committee.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The National Committee on Communications & Technology endorses the recommendations of the CinC Appointed Committee on Strategic Development of Information Technology and recommends that the National Encampment accept the same.

4.4 National Committee on Constitution and Regulations, Robert E Grim, PCinC

The changes made to the Regulations at the 140th National Encampment have been reviewed and incorporated into the C & R. The updated C&R with a Table of Contents has been posted on the web site. The Committee presents the following proposed amendments to the Regulations for consideration by this encampment. PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE REGULATIONS BY THIS ENCAMPMENT ARE NOTED IN **BOLD TYPE** for new language and-strike throughs of language being eliminated.

PROPOSAL #1

(This proposal is a Resolution from the Dept. of Texas)

Chapter I, Article II, Section 1 (See C&R page 36 footnotes)

Note: This change will allow cousins to qualify for membership. The Dept. of Texas cites Article III of the SUVCW Constitution "All male descendants, whether through lineal or collateral line of ages specified in Article VII of this Constitution who are blood relatives of soldiers, sailors, marines or members of the Revenue Cutter Service...." They also note that the Merriam Webster Dictionary defines "collateral relative" as "belonging to the same ancestral stock but not in a direct line of descent" and that "blood relative" is "someone who has the same parents or ancestors as another person// your sister is a blood relative, but your brother-in-law is not."

The C&R Committee does not recommend adoption of this proposal.

Chapter I, Article II Section 1: Delete from footnote 21 on C&R page 36 "The son of a person who was a cousin of a veteran, not eligible. NC Orr, Op 8, 127a, 162. (National Counselor Richard Orr issued this Opinion 23 Sept. 2007).

PROPOSAL #2

(This proposal was prepared by Past Commander-in-Chief Jim Pahl, and aide to the C&R Committee as a result of General Order #18 Series 2021-2022 dated 01 July 2022 which prohibits the election of a brother as a National Officer who is not 21 years of age).

Chapter III, Article VI, Section 6 (See C&R page 85)

Note: This amendment adds a section 6 to this Article listing the National Officers who must be 21 years of age to be elected or appointed. This change is necessary because of laws restricting what minors can legally do.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Section 6: Due to bonding requirements for those who handle the funds of the Order and legal liability in the signing of contracts, the following National Officers shall be at least 21 years of age at the time of their election or appointment (This provision replaces General Order 18 of the Series 2021-2022):

PROPOSAL #3

This proposal is from the SUVCW Executive Director

Chapter III, Article VII, Section 16 (See C&R page 92)

Note: This proposal describes and clarifies the duties of the Executive Director.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Chapter III, Article VII, Section 16

(b) The Executive Director shall reject the applications of individuals who have received a Dishonorable Discharge. He , shall maintain a record of Dishonorable Discharges

(**b** c) Upon notice of a new Dishonorable Discharge at National Headquarters, the Executive Director shall report such information to all departments within 30 days of notification at national headquarters.

(d) Executive Director shall coordinate with the National Committee on Fraternal Relations, as they maintain contact and liaison with the other Allied Orders of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Sons of Confederate Veterans and the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States, and other patriotic and hereditary organizations including, but not limited to, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion, as that committee may request.

(e) Executive Director shall attend meetings of the Council of Administration and the National Encampment of the Order. Shall be entitled to address the Council of Administration during their meetings as a non-voting member.

(f) Executive Director shall forward all invoices received to the National Treasurer.

(g) Executive Director shall provide the numerical strength in a membership report to the Council of Administration quarterly, and share the membership report with appropriate National Officers.

(h) Executive Director shall on June 30 each year, provide the National Treasurer with total membership for fiscal year ended June 30.

(i) Executive Director shall coordinate with the Chair of the National Program and Policy Committee and with the National Webmaster to ensure the latest edition of all forms used for reporting to the National Organization and various Departments are available on the National Website.

(j) Executive Director shall receive and process the annual reports and per capita dues of the various Departments and Camps at Large.

a. Enter data from the reports into the National Membership Database.

b. Forward per capita remittances and Form 49's to the National Treasurer.

(k) Executive Director shall on or about June 5th, provide notice to Department Secretaries who are delinquent in the submission of the annual report and per capita payment, with a copy of such notice to the Commander-in-Chief, National Treasurer, National Secretary, and the Commander of the appropriate Department(s).

(l) Executive Director shall no later than June 20th of each year, notify the Commander-in-Chief, Chief of Staff, National Secretary, and National Treasurer of all delinquent Departments and Camps-at-Large of the Order, that the Departments and Camps are not in good standing, listing the specific deficiencies for recommendation of potential department suspension.

(m) Executive Director shall receive and maintain one copy of every regular, associate, junior, junior associate, and honorary membership application entering data from the membership application into the National Membership Database.

(n) Executive Director shall process and issue all new Life Membership cards and certificates.

a. Enter data from new Life Membership applications into the Life profile of the brother within the national Membership database.

b. Quarterly, provide a list of new life members to the Editor of the Banner and the National Treasurer.

(o) Executive Director shall maintain the Banner mailing list and provide the same to the Editor, Printer/Mailing contractor each quarter at the date requested.

a. Maintain current information for each non-member subscriber as changes are received.

b. Provide replacements to Members who have received damaged copies.

c. Respond to inquiries from Members who have not received the Banner, verifying their membership status and current mailing address through the National Database and/or Department Secretary, and providing copies where appropriate.

d. Print labels and mail copies to all "out of country" Banner members and subscribers.

(p) Executive Director shall maintain the National Database of all Members and non-Members.

a. Provide timely updates to the database for changes such as, new members, address changes, dropped members, changes to member status and current offices held by members at the National level. The database information is updated/changed from various sources such as, correspondence including USPS mail from individuals, reports from Camps, Departments, etc., and from email and phone contacts.

b. Crosscheck information received from various reports (Camp Status Reports Form 30, Annual Reports Forms 27 and 35 and Form 49 etc.) against information currently in the database and information received in Department rosters thus assuring that all members are being reported and proper per capita is paid.

(q) Executive Director shall maintain communication with the appropriate officials of any subsidiary corporations of the Order.

(r) Executive Director shall prepare a report of Assistant Executive Director activities for the Council of Administration at the pre-National Encampment Council of Administration meeting each year.

(s) Executive Director shall receive and process all communications directed to the Order by way of the USPS, email, private package delivery and/or telephone and received at the National Headquarters, including change of address information received directly from a Brother of the Order.

(t) Executive Director shall provide notification of the death of a Brother (as reported by Form 30 or other suitable notice) to the National Chaplain, Editor of the Banner, and the Department as needed. Report deceased Life Members to the National Treasurer.

PROPOSAL #4

This proposal is from the SUVCW Executive Director

Chapter III, Article VII, Section 17 (See C&R page 93)

Note: This proposal describes and clarifies the duties of the Assistant Executive Director.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Chapter III, Article VII, Section 17. The Assistant Executive Director, an independent contractor, shall work with and under the direction of the Executive Director. With the permission of the Executive Director and the Commander-in-Chief, the Assistant Executive Director may act on behalf of the Executive Director should the need arise. The Assistant **Executive** Director shall, **if needed**, **assist the Executive Director with the following**:

(b) Attend meetings of the Council of Administration and the National Encampment of the Encampment of the Order. He s Shall be entitled to address the Council of Administration

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during their meetings as a non-voting member.

(q)**The Assistant Executive Director shall:**

(a) Manage and Digitize the National SUVCW Archives.

(b) Coordinate with local Universities and colleges to ensure an open Internship opportunity with the SUVCW.

(C) Create and maintain a community outreach program designed to supply a Volunteer workforce within the National SUVCW Headquarters.

PROPOSAL #5

(This proposal is from Past Commander-in-Chief Jim Pahl, Aide to the C&R Committee)

Chapter III, Article X, Section 1 (See C&R page 107)

Note: This change to the Regulations adds a new sentence to this section which requires a committee to consider only matters referred to it and to advise what action the committee has taken.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Section 1.... Committees at any level of the Order shall only consider matters properly referred to them by proper authority. Each item must be reported back to the appointing authority with the committee's recommendation to adopt, reject, refer or other appropriate action.

PROPOSAL #6

(This proposal is from Robert M. Petrovic, Chairman of the National Committee on Lincoln Tomb Observance)

Chapter III, Article X, Section 9 (See C&R page 110)

Note: This amendment to the Regulations makes some changes in the procedures for conducting the Lincoln Tomb ceremony and clarifies what date the ceremony will be held in case the date for the ceremony falls on Easter Sunday.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Section 9.... The ceremony shall be held on the Saturday closest to April 15, the date of his death in 1865. Should the ceremony fall on Easter Sunday, in that event, the committee shall move the observance to the weekend before or the weekend after.

6. Update the invitational mailing list using organizational rosters of the Allied Orders of

the Grand Army of the Republic, MOLLUS, and other patriotic and historical organizations. The acceptance form as well as other informational material sent with the invitational mailing should also be updated as needed. **Such material may be sent electronically through the web sites of these organizations.**

7. Prepare and mail invitations no later than February 14 and include personalized invitations to the National Officers of the Allied Orders of the Grand Army of the Republic, MOLLUS, and Dames of the Loyal Legion of the United States. **Such invitations may be sent electronically to the e-mail address of the National Presidents of the Allied Orders and the Commander-in-Chief of MOLLUS.**

8. Obtain the services of a band, order folding chairs for the ceremony, and reserve a chartered bus for transportation of wreath bearers to the Tomb from the headquarters hotel and return as deemed appropriate by the committee. Order the wreaths to be placed at the Tomb by the SUVCW and MOLLUS Commanders-in-Chief.

15. Contact and coordinate the participation of the 4th Military District, Sons of Veterans Reserve, and other Civil War reenactment units. Request the SVR to supply a drummer or drummers to accompany their march onto the grounds of the Lincoln Tomb. and a bugler to perform taps at the close of the ceremony.

17. Prepare and submit to a printer the official program of the Tomb Ceremony and Luncheon. that also includes the listing of the participating organizations presenting memorial wreaths.

PROPOSAL #7

(This proposal is from Past Commander-in-Chief Jim Pahl Aide to the C&R Committee)

Chapter IV, Article IV (See C&R page 122)

Note: This proposed change clarifies the procedure when a brother wants to file charges against his camp commander.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Article 1V. When charges are made by a Brother against a Brother of the same Camp, the charges and specifications shall be submitted in writing to the Commander of that Camp. If the charges are against the Camp Commander, the charges shall be filed with the Senior Vice Camp Commander, who shall in all aspects act as the Camp Commander in this matter.

PROPOSAL #8

(This proposal is from Past Commander-in-Chief Jim Pahl Aide to the C&R Committee)

Chapter IV, Article V (See C&R page 122)

Note: This proposed change clarifies the procedure when a brother wants to file charges against his department commander.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Article V. When charges are made by a Brother against a Brother within the same Department, the charges and specifications shall be submitted in writing to the Department Commander. If the charges are against the Department Commander, the charges shall be filed with the Senior Vice Department Commander, who shall in all aspects act as the Department Commander in this matter.

PROPOSAL #9

(This proposal comes from Senior Vice Commander -in-Chief Bruce Frail as Chairman of the National Headquarters Planning Committee presented on behalf of that committee to make a reference in the C&R to the Records and Retention Policy adopted by the Council of Administration rather than include the entire policy in the C&R. The C&R Committee feels it will be more convenient for the membership to have the entire policy included in the Regulations)

Chapter V, Article V (See C&R page 132)

Note: This change to the Regulations replaces the current language in the C&R regarding Records Retention and inserts new language covering additional records that must be retained and clarifies the period of time the records must be retained.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Article V

Records Retention

(a). All records are the property of the National Organization regardless of the point of origin. As with all real intellectual and other property, Camps and Departments hold records in trust for the National Organization through the authority granted by the corresponding charter from the National Organization.

(b). The United States Secretary of the Treasury, the Director of the Office of Management-

and Budget, the Director of the Congressional Budget Officer and the Comptroller Generalof the United States through the Federal Accounting Standard Advisory Board (FASAB) issue the Statement of Federal Accounting Standards (SFAS). The IRS requires non-profitorganization among others to adhere to these standards.

(c). To comply with the requirement referenced in paragraph (b) of this section the following Records Retention Schedule is hereby adopted and to be followed by all Camps, Departments and the National Order.

(1) Grants Records MUST be retained for a minimum of three (3) years after the grant closes – with final report to the grantor.

(2) Cash Receipts Records MUST be retained for a minimum of five (5) years after the closeof the fiscal year.

(3) Accounts Receivable Records MUST be retained for a minimum of five (5) years afterthe close of the fiscal year.

(4) Canceled Checks MUST be retained for a minimum of seven (7) years after the close of the fiscal year.

(5) Bank Account Statements MUST be retained for a minimum of seven (7) years after the close of the fiscal year. This includes: Checking, Savings, CD's, and any other form of investments.

(6) Records of Stocks, Bonds, and Mutual Funds MUST be retained Permanently.

(7) Fixed Assets MUST be retained permanently.

(8) Ledgers MUST be retained permanently.

(9) Audit Reports MUST be retained permanently.

(10) Contracts MUST be kept permanently.

(11) Any Correspondence with the IRS MUST be retained Permanently.

(12) IRS 990 Income Tax Returns for Tax Exempt Organizations MUST be retained Permanently. (This is a requirement because anyone can ask to see these reports at anytime since the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War Organization is a Non-Profit-Organization. Names of the individuals who make contributions can be redacted, but allelse is public record.)

(13) Minutes and Proceedings MUST be retained permanently. Minutes of committee-

meetings and deliberations do not need to me retained. Only the final report to the Camp, Department or National Order is retained as their reports are part of the minutes or proceedings of the camp, department or National Encampment.

(d). Should a camp cease to exist, it is the responsibility of the camp officers to transfer-

all property and records to the Department or in the case of a Camp-at-Large, the national Organization. Each Department shall determine which officer(s) are authorized to receive such property and records on behalf of the Department.

(e). Should a Department cease to exist; it is the responsibility of the department officers to transfer all property and records to the National Organization. The Commander-in-Chief, the National Secretary, National Treasurer or Executive Director is authorized to receive such property and records on behalf of the National Organization.

Chapter V

Records Retention

All records are the property of the National Organization regardless of the point of origin. As with all real intellectual and other property, Camps and Departments hold records in trust for the National Organization through the authority granted by the corresponding charter from the National Organization.

The United States Secretary of the Treasury, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, the Director of the Congressional Budget Officer, and the Comptroller General of the United States through the Federal Accounting Standard Advisory Board (FASAB) issue the Statement of Federal Accounting Standards (SFAS). The IRS requires non-profit organization among others to adhere to these standards.

To comply with the requirement referenced in the paragraph above the following Records Retention Schedule shall be followed by all Camps, Departments, and the National Order.

Grant Records MUST be retained for at least three (3) years after the grant closes – with final report to the grantor.

Cash Receipts Records MUST be retained for at least three (3) years after the close of the fiscal year.

Accounts Receivable Records MUST be retained for at least three (3) years after the close of the fiscal year.

Canceled Checks MUST be retained for at least three (3) years after the close of the fiscal year.

Bank Account Statements MUST be retained for at least three (3) years after the close of the fiscal year. This includes Checking, Savings, CD's, and any other form of investments.

Records of Stocks, Bonds, and Mutual Funds MUST be retained Permanently.

Fixed Assets MUST be retained permanently.

Signature Logs MUST be retained permanently.

Audit Reports MUST be retained permanently.

Contracts MUST be retained permanently.

Any Correspondence with the IRS MUST be retained Permanently.

IRS 990 Income Tax Returns for Tax Exempt Organizations MUST be retained Permanently. (This is a requirement because anyone can ask to see these reports at any time since the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War Organization is a Non-Profit Organization. Names of the individuals who make contributions can be redacted, but all else is public record.)

Minutes and Proceedings MUST be retained permanently. Minutes of committee meetings and deliberations do not need to me retained. Only the final report to the Camp, Department or National Order is retained as their reports are part of the minutes or proceedings of the camp, department, or National Encampment.

Should a camp cease to exist, it is the responsibility of the camp officers to transfer all property and records to the Department or in the case of a Camp-at-Large, the n-National Organization. Each Department shall determine which officer(s) are authorized to receive such property and records on behalf of the Department.

Should a Department cease to exist; it is the responsibility of the department officers to transfer all property and records to the National Organization. The Commanderin-Chief, the National Secretary, National Treasurer or Executive Director is authorized to receive such property and records on behalf of the National Organization.

This following group deals with the retention of forms, photographs, Charters, correspondence and any other item not otherwise mentioned, (labeled documents within the section) that are delivered to the National Headquarters. All documents mentioned in this policy are to be entered into the Executive Director's database, then digitized into searchable PDFs (if able), electronic copies storied in the digital

archives and hard copies stored in the national headquarters archives for the duration of their retention period. At the end of their retention period, these documents (hard copy only) may be destroyed.

a. Form 1: Quartermaster Supplies – Order forms MUST be retained Permanently.

b. Form 2a: SUVCW Annual Encampment Credential Card, No retention required.

c. Form 3: Membership Application, MUST be retained permanently.

d. Form 4: Transfer Form, Camp Retention Only, Must be retained for no less than three (3) years. National Retains Permanently as part of the Membership History.

e. Form 5: War Medal Application Form, Camp Retention Only, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years, DD-214 or other separation document MUST be redacted.

f. Form 6: Honorable Discharge Form, MUST be retained Permanently as part of the Membership History.

g. Form 7: R.O.T.C. Award Application Form, MUST be retained permanently.

h. Form 8: Military Service Medal Application Form, Camp Retention Only, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years, DD-214 or other separation document MUST be redacted.

i. Form 9: Life Member Application Form, MUST be retained Permanently as part of the Membership History.

j. Form 10: Life Member Reimbursement Form, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

k. Form 11: EIN Reporting Form & Certification Statement, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

l. Form 12: Scholarship Application Form (applications only accepted from January 1 to March 31), MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

m. Form 13: Officer's Expense Report, MUST be retained for no less than three(3) years.

n. Form 17: Meritorious Service Award and MSA with Gold Star Application, MUST be retained Permanently as part of the Membership History.

o. Form 22: Certification of Election and Installation of Camp Officers, MUST be retained for no less than seven (7) years.

p. Form 27: Camp Annual Report, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

q. Form 30: Camp Status Report, MUST be retained Permanently as part of the Membership History.

r. Form 35: Department Annual Report, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

s. Form 40: Camp Patriotic Instructor Annual Report, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

t. Form 41: Department Patriotic Instructor Annual Report, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

u. Form 42: National Patriotic Instructor Annual Report, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

v. Form 49: Certification of Election and Installation of Department Officers, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

w. Form 50: Instructions for Forming a Camp, No retention required.

x. Form 51: Application for Permission to Form a Camp, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

y. Form 52: Camp Organization Authorization, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

z. Form 54: New Camp Data Sheet, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

aa. Form 55: Application for Camp Charter, MUST be retained for no less than

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three (3) years.

bb. Form CWM-61: G.A.R. Monuments/Civil War Memorials Assessment Form, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

cc. Form CWM-62: SUVCW Memorial Grant Application Form & Instructions, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years.

dd. Grave Registration Form and Information Packet, No retention required.

ee. Photographs or videos, MUST be retained permanently.

ff. Charters, Camp or Department, MUST be retained permanently.

gg. Legal Correspondence, MUST be retained until reviewed by a licensed attorney.

hh. Standard Correspondence, MUST be retained for no less than three (3) years and after which time MUST be reviewed by the Executive Director to be determined if needs to be retained longer.

ii. Any item not covered above is at the discretion of the National Executive Director.

PROPOSAL #10

(This proposal is from Past Commander-in-Chief Jim Pahl Aide to the C&R Committee)

Chapter V, Article XXI (See C&R page 151)

Note: This proposed change adds a new Article to Chapter V that will bring our procedure for voting by e-mail and during virtual meetings into conformity to Robert's Rules of Order, 12th Edition.

The C&R Committee recommends adoption of this proposal.

Article XXI, Section 1. Committees at all levels of the Order and the Council of Administration may vote by email pursuant to the provisions of this Article.

Section 2. VOTING BY E-MAIL – E-Vote

1. The chair shall insure all participants have access to the necessary equipment for

participation.

2. A motion may be made by any voting member via email. The chair may not call for a vote on the motion for at least 48 hours of the motion being made.

3. A second is not necessary for the motion to be considered.

4. The motion to lay on the table is not in order. (Other secondary motions are also prohibited.

5. Each new main motion must be made in a separate, new e-mail message with no other message thread included.

6. New motions in a new message thread may be introduced while there is another motion currently being debated. There is no limit on the number of simultaneous threads pending.

Section 3. OPENING A QUESTION FOR CONSIDERATION

The chair shall assign a number to the motion and shall include the number in the subject line.

Section 4. DEBATE

1. Members shall use "Reply All" in all messages.

2. Members may respond at will, that is, without seeking recognition from the chair.

3. Motions to Amend shall be given a letter designation in the subject line by the chair.

4. Multiple incidental motions shall be given succeeding letter designations by the chair. As each motion is disposed of, the corresponding letter in the subject line is removed.

5. In the case of conflicting incidental motions, the chair shall determine preference in recognition. When a higher-ranking motion is made first, the lower-ranking motion is not in order.

6. The chair shall close debate by asking, "Are you ready for the question on Motion 1-a?" in the subject line. The chair must wait at least 24 hours after this message before calling for the vote.

Section 5. VOTE

1. The chair shall put the question to a vote by restating the pending question and requesting the members to vote now. The word "vote" shall be in the subject line.

2. The chair shall include the time frame/deadline for the vote., not less than 48 hours.

3. Members shall state, "I vote yes," or "I vote no" in the first line of the response and use "Reply All".

4. The committee chair or the National Secretary shall tally the votes and report the result of the vote to the participants, including the number of votes cast for and against the motion.

5. The chair shall declare the thread on "Motion (number)" closed.

Section 6 SECRETARY'S RECORDS AND MINUTES (Council of Administration only)

1. The National Secretary shall compile and maintain the complete thread of the motion and its disposition including all incidental motions.

2. The National Secretary shall prepare minutes of the vote and shall send the minutes marked "draft" to all the members, voting and non-voting

3. These minutes shall be approved at the next regular meeting.

4. Any Council of Administration member shall have the right to request a copy of the message thread of a motion.

4.5 National Encampment Site Committee, James Crane, PDC

The 2023 National Encampment will be held at The Event Center at Courtyard Marriott Hotel in Nashua, New Hampshire, 2200 Southward Drive, Nashua N.H. 03063-1802. The dates of the Encampment are 8/02/2023 – 08/07/2023, and the guestroom rate is 129.00. Reservations will be available in December 2022, and additional information will be forthcoming.

We are currently working with the Department of Kentucky to host the National Encampment in 2024 in Lexington, Kentucky and are finishing the contract the next two weeks. We hope to make an announcement at this year's Encampment.

4.6 National Committee on Fraternal Relations, Brian C. Pierson, PCinC

Overall, our relationships with the other Allied Orders are strong at all levels. The Committee has been in regular contact with the Allied Orders.

It must be noted, however, that the LGAR experienced some internal difficulties this past year. These resulted in the suspension of the LGAR Department of Pennsylvania last fall, followed by the dishonorable discharge of a number of the officers of the Department. (One of the discharged officers is a PNP of another Allied Order.) In the spring, the LGAR National HQ informed us that new officers had been appointed for the Department and asked us to provide Dept and National POCs, in order to rebuild the contacts between the organizations. CinC Paquette directed the Fraternal Relations Committee address the issue.

In conversations with National Counselor Mark Day and CinC Mike Paquette, the following guidance was adopted and communicated to the LGAR per CinC Paquette's request:

• The SUVCW is obligated to and will continue to recognize only the legitimate LGAR organizations at the National, Dept, and Circle/Camp levels.

• Only those organizations that had been recognized by the GAR are considered to be Allied Orders. Any new organization would not be considered to be an Allied Order;

• Out of respect for the mutual autonomy of the respective Allied Orders, the SUVCW cannot get involved in any other Allied Order's internal workings or issues, and respectfully requests the same courtesy to be extended to us; however, we fully understand and appreciate that it may be important for vital information to be shared in order to preclude any misunderstandings;

• Out of fraternity, the SUVCW will make only respectful requests of other Allied Orders, and expects the same courtesy in return;

• The appropriate level of contact between the LGAR, DUVCW, WRC, and ASUVCW National HQs and the SUVCW is at the national level, either directly between the NP and the CinC or via the Fraternal Relations Committee;

• It is considered inappropriate for any Allied Order National HQ to contact and/or attempt to provide direction to another Allied Order's subordinate organization and we expect strict observance of this. If a National HQ has an issue with a subordinate organization of another Allied Order, the correct approach is to contact the respective National HQ. This

will ensure that the mutual national leaders are aware of the issue, that it can be addressed appropriately and proactively, and should help preclude any misunderstandings between Allied Orders;

• Same-level contact amongst the Allied Orders remains strongly encouraged in order to facilitate good relationships and cooperation on events and projects that honor the memory of the Boys in Blue (i.e., National-to-National; Dept-to-Dept; Camp-to-Tent/Circle/Local/etc.).

The Committee also sent invitations to the Allied Orders Banquet to all Allied Orders, MOLLUS, and the SCV Commander-in-Chief.

The Committee looks forward to serving the Order and promoting fraternal relations in the upcoming business year.

4.7 National Committee on GAR Post Records, Dean A. Enderlin, PDC

We had an exceptional year this year, with a big uptick in information received relating to the whereabouts of GAR records. The National GAR Records Officer is in the process of inputting the newly reported information into the GAR Records Catalog. One project in particular stands out as being the largest update we have seen in years: Details regarding the holdings of the Indiana State Archives. That update alone will probably take another month to complete. For more details, please see the report of the National GAR Records Officer.

GAR Records Blog: Since December 2019, our committee has been using an invitationonly blog on Blogger as a forum for communication outside of email. Previously, we had been using a group on Yahoo! which was discontinued as a service in 2019.

Department GAR Records Officer: Since the adoption of the revised SUVCW Form 49 in March 2020, we have seen gains in the number of Departments reporting the appointment of a GAR Records Officer. The office is now a line item on the form, even though it has been in existence since 2004. All Departments are now using the updated form. Nineteen Departments (61%) reported the appointment of a Department GAR Records Officer this year, unchanged from last year.

The following table shows the status of Departments who have and have not confirmed their GAR Records Officer (as of July 2022). Our thanks go to all the Departments who have

filled the office!

The National Committee on GAR Records is guided by an action plan, which is approved by the National Encampment every five years. The current GAR Records Project Five-Year Plan (2017-2022) concludes with this Encampment. The National Committee on GAR Records recommends continuing the plan, as worded, for another five years. See the recommendations section below.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Recommendation 1. That a new GAR Records Project Five-Year Plan (2022-2027) be approved as outlined below.

1) Routinely manage the GAR Records website (www.GARrecords.org) and online GAR Records Catalog.

2) Continue to expand the GAR Records website content to include:

a. Separate historical summaries for individual GAR posts, including but not limited to meeting locations, dates of muster and disbandment, details of consolidation with other posts, and any other noteworthy facts.

b. Links to other SUVCW web pages (Camps and Departments) containing GAR Records information.

c. Links to other online resources of interest, such as digitized library collections.

d. Relevant bibliographic references.

3) Continue to encourage and assist SUVCW Departments and Camps in developing and/or expanding their respective GAR Records programs. Support actions to include:

a. Preparation of a handbook to provide guidance in searching for and cataloging GAR records.

b. Providing personal guidance, as needed, to Department GAR Records Officers and other individuals when needed.

4) Expand public awareness and involvement in the GAR Records Program. Actions to include:

a. Creation and/or participation in an online forum or message board that is specific to the topic of GAR records.

b. Encouraging local libraries, museums, genealogical and historical societies, veterans' organizations, and other holders of GAR records collections to index and publish the contents of their collections.

c. Support efforts (both within the SUVCW and external to our organization) to digitize and make publicly available collections of GAR records.

4.12 National Military Affairs Committee, Henry E Shaw, PCC

The Sons of Veterans Reserve (SVR) continues to represent the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War in many ceremonies, monument dedications, parades and community events throughout the nation. Major General Robert E. Grim and his General Staff officers and District Commanders as well as local unit commanders and their members have been very busy this year returning the SVR to its busy pre COVID-19 schedule.

Colonel Andrew M. Johnson, PCinC who served on the General Staff for many years as the SVR Washington D. C. Representative died this year. His dedication and faithful service to the SVR will be greatly missed. Every February he represented the SVR at the Lincoln Memorial wreath laying ceremony commemorating the birthday of President Lincoln and represented the SVR at the Arlington Cemetery Memorial Day wreath laying ceremony.

The 4th Military District continues to post the Colors at the Lincoln Tomb ceremony in April commemorating the death of President Lincoln.

The SVR will continue with our normal Remembrance Day program this year.

(a) SVR Adjutant General Col. Don E. Darby, PCinC will make arrangements for the annual SVR Remembrance Day breakfast at the Wyndham Hotel in Gettysburg.

(b) Lt. Ken L. Freshley, PCinC will be responsible for the SVR wreath laying ceremony at the Albert Woolson GAR memorial located in Ziegler's Grove on the Gettysburg Battlefield.

(c) SVR Provost Marshal Major David K. Hann will conduct the 66th annual Gettysburg Parade, and

(d) SVR Inspector General Col. Stephen A. Michaels, PCinC will conduct the annual Original Civil War Ball. Last year 297 dancers attended the Ball.

Last year (2021) The Borough of Gettysburg Parade permit cost \$6,011.00. Major David Hann collected \$3,500 in donations to help pay for the parade. Col. Stephen A. Michaels, PCinC collected donations valued at over \$1,000 to help pay for the Civil War Ball. The proceeds from the Ball are donated to the Gettysburg Military Park during the Albert Woolson GAR ceremony to help pay for battlefield monument and memorials restoration and preservation. To date we have donated \$88,000.

Our Wyndham Hotel contract expires this year. We will have to make some changes in our Remembrance Day program for 2023; especially regarding the Civil War Ball since the Wyndham Hotel ballroom will not be available for our use. Maj. Gen. Grim and his staff are searching for a new location for the annual military ball.

4.16 National Comm. on Promotion and Marketing, Bruce D. Frail, PDC

It has been my honor to work with this amazing group of Brothers again this year, the members and aides of the National Committee on Promotions & Marketing are always there whenever I ask, they respond. Their thoughtfulness, ideas, and ability to voice their opinions (whether they agree or disagree) is a true blessing. We have been moving ahead with several programs this year including our Blood and Food drives, which we have chosen to continue with and reeducate the Brothers about.

These two drives were begun at the end of the first year of the Covid Pandemic and have lacked the response we were looking to generate. While some Camps and Departments have taken part, the reporting and numbers have not been at the level we estimated, and we have not been able to present a flag streamer. But we would like to mention that two Departments have taken part in the Food drive, they are the Department of Kentucky and the Department of Rhode Island. We would again like to invite all the other Departments to take part and report your drives results.

As for the Blood Drives, this has been very slow during the pandemic conditions, we have

received word that dozens of Brothers are getting out there to donate blood at their local blood center, but there hasn't been any coordinated effort that has gotten back to us. I would like to thank all of those Brothers who have donated and keep up the good work, lets see if we can organize Camps to join each of you the next time you go to donate.

The committee has been working in two specific areas this past year, first that in Memorial University. The Promotion & Marketing committee has been providing monetary support to fund the Classmarker Program which provides the testing platform of SUVCWMU.org, as well as the funding for the WIX.com hosting site to SUVCWMU.org. We believe Memorial University is a very valuable research, training, and marketing tool for inside and outside of the order and for those reasons we have used part of our marketing budget to help them get their feet on the ground.

They have done that and while we wish we could continue to fund these two parts of Memorial University; we find ourselves running short of funding to continue funding them. Therefore, we have a couple recommendations which will assist both of us.

Recommendation #1

Change the status of Memorial University from a C-in-C Appointed Committee to the National Special Committee on Memorial University with a term ending of 30 August 2027 or until made a Standing Committee, whichever comes first.

Recommendation #2

Fund the National Special Committee on Memorial University with a minimum of \$1,000.00 per year.

We feel these two recommendations are needed to move this educational and marketing tool further, in it's current design, it will slowly educate our brothers. In the Promotions and Marketing plan of expansion for SUVCWMU.org, it will become the main educational platform for the SUVCW to reach out to all brothers and sister of the Allied Order and to the Public as a whole, education, one of our main missions.

Another area we have been working on for the last couple of years is a fundraising structure and the ability to run fundraising campaigns to increase our Permanent/ Endowment fund. We have developed a funding raising incentive structure which has been approved by the Council of Administration, pending the creation of a committee to administer to the needs of the fundraising campaigns and distribution of incentives throughout the years to come. This committee was at the recommendation of the National Treasurer as in his words, "this is way too big of a job for any one person". The National Committee on Promotion & Marketing has been working with the National Treasurer, the National Quartermaster and Brother Robert and Sister Cher Petrovic with an Ad Hoc Committee to get these recommendations up and running and to get the campaigns started.

Recommendation #3

Create the National Special Committee on Fundraising with a term ending of 30 August 2027 or until made a Standing Committee, whichever comes first.

Job Description for National Special Committee on Fundraising:

1. The National Special Committee on Fundraising would be made up of at least 5 members and as many Aides as needed and requested by the Chairman or Commander-In-Chief. The purpose of this committee is to design, maintain, monitor, and oversee all the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War's fundraising projects and campaigns. This committee would also control the incentive program and provide the incentives as required. This committee would be charged with the maintenance of all records of all fundraising and incentives, which would include updates as requested during the fiscal year with a full year end report to the National Encampment.

2. Design and maintain a SUVCW Signature Fundraising Campaign called "The 1881 Club" details can be found in the National Encampment Program Book or by contacting the National Treasurer.

3. Development of an Annual Capital Fundraising Campaign to support the SUVCW Permanent/Endowment Fund, this would be a mailing campaign where every member of the SUVCW would receive a mailer requesting a one-time or reoccurring donation. This campaign would be targeted to begin within a week after the 2022 National Encampment (if approved), with reporting to take place at the following National Encampment. This campaign would occur every year.

4. Development of a Grant Writing Campaign that would target outside organizations, foundations, and corporations. The type of grant would depend on the grantor as most grants must support a specific project, but some can be requested for operational costs.

5. Development of a Wall of Honor section within the website to honor all of those who support our fundraising.

6. Develop a section within the National Encampment Program Book (2 pages at first) to

give updates on current fundraising programs and campaigns and those involved. This portion is in the development stage with the National Committee on Promotion and Marketing picking up the first year's costs.

7. Not limited to what has been included in this document, all ideas and thoughts are welcome, constructive, with outlines preferred.

4.17 National Comm. on Vision and Planning, Donald D. Palmer, PCinC

The Vision & Planning Committee developed our 2030 vision and strategic plan for the current decade. The strategic plan identifies ways and means needed to achieve our 2030 vision and ensure the long-term growth, relevance, and vitality of the Order which are critical to achieving its end, its purpose stated in the Congressional charter. It recognizes and carefully evaluates the current environment and context in which we must work.

The committee believes the vision established for our 2020 plan should carry forward into this decade. The vision:

To be recognized by Government, academia and the general public as the leading source of information pertaining to: (1) History, genealogy and preservation initiatives associated with the Grand Army of the Republic and the soldiers, sailors, marines and members of the revenue cutter service who fought to preserve the Union; and (2) Patriotism, the duties of citizenship and honoring those that made the supreme sacrifice in defense of this Nation.

This vision captures the essence of our mission as defined by our Federal Charter and brings forward the educational element, which now has added importance since we achieved a 501c3 tax determination by the Internal Revenue Service.

A strategic plan requires consideration of ways, means, and ends within the strategic environment (which provides the **context**). The **ways** are the methods that the organization uses to achieve those ends. The **means** are the resources used to accomplish the ways. And the **ends** are the goals...ultimately the purpose or mission of the organization. The following is a summary of the goals associated with the 2030 plan. Some of the elements of the 2020 plan have carried forward in some capacity as they are considering enduring and continue to address the key components of our mission.

Notes:

1. The membership growth goal established in the Vision 2020 plan of 10,000 members turned out to be too aggressive. It was largely based membership growth momentum gained in the 1990's (110%) and the 2000's (15%) and on potential leverage that might have been gained by the Civil War sesquicentennial from 2011-2015. None of this materialized as the growth in the 2010's was relatively flat. One positive was a 31% reduction in drops between 2011 and 2020.

2. The organizational expansion goals in the Vision 2020 plan were achieved with 56% membership growth in the South and West, as well as new Departments of the Columbia (northwest) and Southwest, Alabama, and significant progress towards a Department of Arkansas. This focus should continue in the 2030 plan. However, for the 2030 plan, an additional growth goal should be established for legacy regions of our Order, primarily in the New England, Mid-Atlantic and Midwestern regions where some areas sustained a 30-40% drop in membership.

3. A youth programs goal of establishing an Allied Orders youth program similar to successful programs such as Children of the American Revolution and Children of the Confederacy. This was a goal in the 2020 plan, but little to no progress was made.

The committee anticipates release of a membership survey shortly after the upcoming National Encampment to help fine tune the 2030 strategic plan very similar to how a similar survey released 10 years ago was used to finalize the 2020 plan.

Also, it should be noted that the elements of the 2030 plan are not etched in stone. This plan will be subjected to an annual review to determine the impact of internal and external events that may impact the goals established and identify any recommended changes.

Recommendation 1:

That the goals associated with the 2030 strategic plan be adopted subject to changes based on membership feedback and/or changes recommended by the committee based on annual review.

Recommendation 2:

That the incoming Commander-in-Chief appoint a special committee on education with an end date of the 2025 National Encampment to develop the education-related strategies as

defined in the education element of the 2030 plan. The purpose is to have a group focused on this specific element as the effort envisioned is too great to add to the plate of an existing officer or committee.

Recommendation 3:

That the incoming Commander-in-Chief appoint a special committee on battlefield preservation with an end date of the 2026 National Encampment to develop the strategy for SUVCW participation in battlefield preservation as defined in the preservation element of the 2030 plan. The purpose is to have a group focused on this specific element as the effort envisioned is too great to add to the plate of an existing officer or committee.

4.18 National Committee on Real Sons and Daughters, Jerome Orton, PDC

At the present time there is only one known real son. He is William Pool of Missouri. His father, Charles Pool served in Company D, 6th WV Volunteers.

John Oliver, Jr., of the Tenessee Department died November 15, 2021. His father, John Oliver Sr., served in Co. F, 4th TN Vols.

His sister, Florence Pool Wilson died August 31, 2021.

The DUVCW has two real daughters, Mary Ella Reed Lewis and Emogene Cassell.

The UDC has a few real daughters as members.

The last known son of a Confederate veteran was a WW II veteran Calvin Crane, 102, of Roanoke, VA who died September 15, 2019. He was born February 27, 1917. His father, James Anthony Crane served in Ringgold Battery, Co. B., 13th Battalion, Virginia Light Artillery. Calvin was the last of his father's 21 children which were born between 2 wives.

The committee requests that its life be extended until the last of all known children of Civil War veterans, Union and Confederate, have passed on.

4.19 National Committee on Encampment Credentials, Joseph S. Hall, PDC

National Encampment Pre-Registration

This year's Pre-Registration has been fairly uneventful. There are 174 Brother's preregistered for the National Encampment to be held in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

As with any year, one main stumbling block is a matter of the Departments getting their Form 49 submitted in a timely fashion after their individual Department Encampments. This year, four Departments came very close to being recommended for suspension. It is the Department Commander's duty to oversee their departments. Neither the Executive Director or the Chairman of the Credentials Committee should have to chase after the departments to ensure they get their forms in to prevent suspension.

It is therefore recommended that a meeting be set up to discuss such issues with the Department Commanders and Department Secretaries concerning timely submissions of forms and reports.

5.0 SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS

5.1 National Special Committee on Social Media Management (Signals Corps) (2021), Timothy S. McCoy, PDC

5.2 National Special Committee on Website Redesign, Timothy S. McCoy, PDC

Since the last National Encampment, considerable progress has been made across all aspects of designing and developing a new SUVCW National website.

In mid-September 2021, the Council of Administration approved a contract with website design company Drupal Connect after our previous website design company, New Valley, informed me that it did not have the capacity to move forward with the project. The CofA action opened the way for a series of weekly meetings each of which lasted 2-3 hours and during which I worked directly with Drupal Connect to familiarize their two-person team with the existing SUVCW National website. Quickly following was another months-long process of co-creating wireframes for the new National website homepage and "mega menus" that capture the main headings of content that exists on the current website that would also likely appear on the new National website. The results of this work were presented at the Council of Administration meeting in Gettysburg in November 2021 and received positive feedback.

Since November, work focused on the process of fleshing out the wireframe with images and graphics, appropriate sections, etc. More recently, transfer of content from the current site to the new site has been taking place. Despite being slightly behind schedule compared to where I hoped we would be at this time, the new site is largely fleshed out and I am confident that, when launched in the next few months, it will present a positive and userfriendly interface for Brothers and members of the public at large.

During the process, I engaged with Brother Walt Busch to keep him informed and seek his feedback about progress toward creating a section on the new website that will house the National Monuments & Memorials Database, as provided for by the 2021 National Encampment. I also liaised with Brs. Dean Enderlin, Ken Freshley, Keith Harrison, and Bob Wolz to determine whether significant archives exist that were not transitioned from the 2008 website to our current site when it was built in 2013. A big thanks to Brother Enderlin for sharing the locations for extensive biographical information for the CinCs of the Grand Army of the Republic that was not migrated to our current site.

I am grateful to the support and expert feedback provided by Committee members over the past year.

There are no recommendations.

5.3 National Special Committee on Veterans of Wars of the United States, Dexter Bishop, PDC

A permanent veterans committee will insure the SUVCW will be visible to Veterans and their families. Meet the needs of the SUVCW in providing a service to all veterans their Families and organizations. This visibility will open the door to recruit new members.

Monitor and update, keep the issues of veteran affairs before the SUVCW's Departments and camps. Provide a steady stream of information and make recommendations to SUVCW to develop policies that deal with veteran services.

Develop and maintain an information base that can be used by SUVCW'S departments and camps.

Examples: Lists of available State and Federal Veterans services

Programing available via zoom type platforms

Programs used during visits to senior veteran facilities.

Lists of foundations that provide assistance to Veterans in need.

Assist SUVCW departments and their camps to set up a network of Brothers (liaisons) responsible for keeping veteran affairs visible in their departments and camps by providing information and programs.

Provide video programming to be used by department or camps in their outreach to individual veterans or to the local veterans' organizations. (May be used as requiting tools)

2) What currently needs to be addressed/fixed? (people providing services, out of date

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applications, security vulnerabilities, contracts, stove-piped approach to services, etc.)

The committee has identified several key areas common across our websites.

We lack a common design, development, and integration approach.

We lack the expertise to keep abreast of new technological trends in the field.

We lack support depth i.e., too few people with depth of knowledge in specific areas.

We lack the ability, and sometimes the expertise, to react to problems quickly and nimbly or take advantage of improvements in technology.

Hosting outside the US (Graves Reg.)

The Graves Registration system needs a complete redesign and upgrade to make the system easier to use and less error prone.

All appropriate site pages need to be secured (HTTPS).

3) What are the committee's **recommendations** to address #2?

Recognizing that our web sites and social media pages are vital, not only to our continued growth but to our long-term viability as an organization, the committee make the following **recommendations**:

18.Both the near-term and far-term technology needs of the SUVCW can be addressed by hiring professional consultants to map out a strategy for both our current configuration as well as our future needs.

19.Professional designers and developers will also address the need to have all the SUVCW web sites utilize the same technology to facilitate quick responses to changes in technology and required maintenance as well as new developments in security and backup and recovery.

20.The best approach to bringing the satellite web sites (SVR, Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Memorial University, GAR Records and the Quartermaster Store) in line with SUVCW.org is to use professional web services. This allows a continuity and a responsiveness to changes that cannot be achieved using volunteer workers.

21.Many of our web systems have been recently rewritten or upgraded. At least a minimum level of consistency is needed across all platforms so that we project a unified and coherent message about who we are and what we do. This is best achieved by utilizing a professional staff.

22.To better reach new members under 40 years of age it is vital that we develop iOS and Android applications to bring our message and services directly to hand-held devises.

23.This committee or one of similar configuration should be established for the 2022-2023 term to review and outline each of our IT platforms for viability over the next 3-5 years to facilitate the cost analysis needed to implement the recommendations listed above.

5.7 National Special Committee on the 250th Anniversary of the USA, Brian C. Pierson, PcinC

I have the honor to submit the following report:

The kick off meeting was held in Nov 2021. The topics included the theme which must tie USA Independence with Civil War, a possible logo which must relate to the theme, partnerships with other Patriotic & Veterans Organizations and local, state and federal governments. Event participation and guidance was discussed as well.

Following the meeting, committee members developed some options for all of the above, which were discussed at the April Committee meeting. There is still some work to be done.

The Committee expects to present its concepts at the pre-Encampment or post-Encampment C of A meeting and is looking forward to celebrating our nation's 250th.

5.8 CinC Appointed Committee on Chaplain Affairs, Jerome K. Kowalski

5.9 CinC Appointed Committee on Memorial University, Stephen A. Michaels, PCinC

The committee's work has been two-fold:

(1) Establish, refine, and maintain a new Memorial University webpage.

A new page was established at: https://www.suvcwmu.org/ This page has been linked seamlessly to the national website. The old link was removed.

The new Introduction course and other additions to the course catalog and reference library were made.

The Introduction's learning objectives and test material are awaiting incorporation.

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The committee adopted a framework of three learning levels (Camp, Department, National), each with its own program of study. Textual modifications, additional FAQs, power point voice overs, and a syllabus/program of study will be developed, following a tasking roadmap with deadlines.

(2) Develop a basic leadership course, re: SUVCW's 2020 Vision statement

The course will enhance leadership and team building, recruiting and retention, techniques for acclimating members, recognizing and solving problems, and understanding group dynamics. This objective is moving forward slowly. Modules in Recruiting and Parliamentary Procedure are being completed.

Thanks to all committee members and aides for their selfless service to developing the SUVCW's professional development program and its accessibility. Despite our members taking time to handle family issues, the committee has been able to move forward with its agenda.

Recommendation:

That the current Memorial University Special Committee be made a Standing Committee and the Committee on Constitution and Regulations be directed to make the changes to our organizational documents as necessary to reflect this change without further action by a future Encampment.

Purpose: to ensure continuity in the management of the Memorial University website and the development and maintenance of curriculum offerings.

5.10 National Special Committee on Headquarters Planning, Bruce D. Frail, SVCinC

It is my honor to be able to report that the National Special Committee on Headquarters Planning while getting a late start this past year was able to set in place several items that will be coming up for a vote during this National Encampment.

First, working with the members of this committee and the Council of Administration we were able to iron out the new Records Retention Policy which we will be asking the Encampment to pass so we can forward for use with our records digitization project at the National Headquarters.

Second, we were able to ensure that we had an Intern at the National Headquarters thru

the end of July 2022. This Intern has been digitizing and organizing the records archives at the National Headquarters over the past year and quarter and has done an excellent job. She has also taken part in an educational trip to the National Archives in Washington DC to learn how to work with the archivists to locate and pull the proper records for our research projects and how to use a different set of digitation equipment other than what is at the National Headquarters.

She should now understand the reference finding aides, books and indexes, staff, the forms involved in records recovery, the microfilm/fiche room and its indexes, storage, recovery, and replication equipment. She was also given a tour of the Innovative Hub and its replication equipment. Lastly, she has been instructed on the proper and improper handling of original records, dating back to 1860.

Third, we have worked with the National Treasurer and the Council of Administration to create a position of Assistant Executive Director and their job description. This position was approved during last year's National Encampment in St. Louis, Missouri. While the position was approved the Job Description was not nor was it funded until further research could be provided. That research has been completed and the National Treasurer was able to locate the funding so we would not need to raise the per capita amount, this will be coming up for a vote during this National Encampment, please consider voting yes so, we can stabilize our National Headquarters. You will also see the Job Description for both the Executive Director and the Assistant Executive Director coming up for a vote, again we ask that you consider voting yes to this as well.

Recommendation #1

Approve a \$12,000.00 per year budget for the purpose of hiring a subcontractor to fill the position of Assistant Executive Director.

Recommendation #2

Approve the term of the above contract for a period of up to 3 years, (this would ensure that we have someone qualified to perform the duties of the National Executive Director under contract if something should happen to whomever is in that office.)

5.11 CinC Appointed Committee to Develop a Virtual Meeting Policy, Loran A. Bures, PDC

The committee has nothing to report.

5.12 CinC Appointed Committee to Review Membership Qualifications, John R. Conrad, PDC

Per General Order #8, Series 2021-2022, the three original members (Donald Shaw, PC-in-C, Timothy Kolb, and me) of the committee met monthly by Zoom in March, April, and June to organize, divide research responsibilities, and establish regular monthly meetings. (We did not meet in July and August because of schedule conflicts). We also secured the assistance of Brother Ben Block Jones, PDC, who the C-in-C appointed as an Aide to the Committee. Brother Don Shaw stepped down from the committee in July.

A summary of some of our activities and deliberations is:

We first reviewed the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations to understand the exact wording and application of qualification for membership in the Order. We note that there is not consistency in wording of membership requirements between regular, associate, junior, and honorary members, but not is such a way that affects the focus of this committee. (Regular members must be "male blood relatives," junior and associate members need only be "males," while honorary members do not have a requirement to be male.)

General dictionary definitions of who is "male" are generally not helpful.

Examples of the confusion in application:

• A person is assigned as male at birth and now identifies as other than male. Can that person join the SUVCW?

• A person is assigned as female at birth and now identifies as male. Can that person join the SUVCW?

• A person is assigned as a hermaphrodite/intersex at birth. Can that person join the SUVCW?

• A person joined the SUVCW as a male but now identifies their gender as other than male; does that change in self-identification affect their eligibility to continue as a member of the SUVCW?

• A person has had a sex-change operation. How does that affect their status as eligible or not for membership?

We divided our workload to review Federal law and policy, state laws and policies, and the

approach of other hereditary organizations toward the determination of membership qualification based on sex.

• We quickly realized that there is no consistency in Federal or state laws and policies as to the definition of "male."

• A review of legal analyses also distinguishes between sex (commonly assigned at the time of birth and indicating whether an individual would be able to give birth to a child or not) and gender (the strongly-held self-identification of societal norms). Here again, there is little consistency. For example, different departments of the Federal government treat gender identification differently, and some states allow a person to change the sex designation on a birth certificate.

• Our limited contact to a few other sex-based hereditary organizations was inconclusive; it seems that most other organizations have not addressed the issue.

• A thorough review of Federal and state laws and policies will take a great deal of time and analysis.

We recommend that the committee be expanded to 5 members to spread the workload and be authorized through the 2024 National Encampment.

Our current target is to present a report for consideration by the National Encampment in 2023. However, given the immense scope of the research effort, we may not be able to finish by then. We would in that case present an update of our activities to the 2023 National Encampment.

5.13 2022 National Encampment Host Committee, James B. Pahl, PCinC

Welcome to Grand Rapids! The host committee and a score of brothers from the SUVCW and sisters of the Auxiliary have worked hard to bring each of you a memorable National Encampment. The host committee members are wearing special badges to help you identify them should you have any questions.

6.0 DEPARTMENT REPORTS

6.1 Department of Alabama, Eric D. Alford DC

The Department of Alabama continues with positive momentum into the middle of the

year. Camps showed outstanding devotion to our traditions of honoring the Boys in Blue during the Memorial Day holiday weekend.

In a continuing effort to support quality programming for Camps, the Department is facilitating the broadcast via Zoom in August of a program by Professor Bob Davis on Federal Pension and Service Records. Additionally, the Department is promoting a "road trip" following the route of Streight's Raid across Alabama in September. These events have been promoted to interested members of the community as well and may help leverage some leads for new Brothers.

6.3 Department of the Chesapeake, Brian W. Horgan, DC

The Department of the Chesapeake includes 13 Camps and a total membership of 408 Brothers. Since our last report camps, within the Department have sponsored and participated in a wide-range of activities, all designed to honor the service of our ancestors who fought to preserve the Union.

Additionally, (and rather than focusing on individual, Camp-related activities), this narrative highlights actions on the Department level for this reporting period:

1. Since our last encampment, the Department has responded and provided assistance to 14 new members.

2. The Department conducted its 135th Encampment in Fredericksburg, VA, on April 23, 2022.

3. The Department sponsored the "U.S. Grant Bicentennial Week", in conjunction with General Grant's 200th birthday. Observances were conducted at The Wilderness, City Point, Appomattox, and the US Grant Monument in DC, with the assistance and support of the local camps.

4. The Department represented the Order regarding the Military Base Naming Commission. The commission suggested changing the name of Virginia's Fort A.P. Hill to Fort Walker. Dr. Mary Walker served as a surgeon and was ultimately awarded the Medal of Honor for her service during the Civil War.

5. The Department continues to represent the Order regarding the disposition of Union remains found at Manassas/Bull Run National Battlefield.

6. Pursuant to Department Order No. 3, the Department and the Camps are working to highlight the service of the United States Colored Troops this year.

7. Department Brothers continue to develop inter-Camp programs where multiple Camps join forces to take advantage of special talents and opportunities.

8. Camps continue to maintain 100% compliance with Camp-to-Department reporting requirements, on time.

9. The Department is in the process of facilitating the closure of the George G. Meade Camp No. 5.

10. The Department is working to assist Camps with leadership development programs.

11. The Department is currently making preparations for the "Antietam 160 Rendezvous", which will include a memorial service, as well as a fraternal gathering and participation in events at Antietam National Battlefield, on the 160th anniversary of the battle. Should other Departments wish additional information on the practices and approaches

being used by the Department of the Chesapeake to recruit and retain members, please feel free to contact us.

6.4 Department of Colorado & Wyoming (with Idaho, Montana and Utah), Lorraine Eugene Cheney, DC

Department members continue to do great things from up in Montana, over to Idaho, down to Utah and over to Wyoming, and finally down to Colorado. We are pleased to be adding a new Camp in Canon City, Colorado and are working to re-establish the camp in Idaho. Efforts in Utah include ongoing appeals to the state government to restore recognition of the GAR Highway (US 6) in that state with appropriate signage. In spite of recent difficulties and challenges we have continued to perpetuate and honor the memory of our ancestors and their accomplishments in restoring the Glorious Union that is our United States of America.

At our 93rd Department Encampment in June 2021, we conducted a combination of virtual and live encampment. It worked out well and Brothers were able to participate who could not make the journey to be there in person. We intended to do the same at the 94th Encampment this year but due to technical difficulties preclude the use of video. However, Brothers had the opportunity to participate via phone. We would like to continue the use of blended meetings in the future so that home bound brothers who otherwise could not be present with us and those who cannot make the trip due to large geographical nature of our Department will finally have the opportunity to participate from their own homes. All of our camps are maintaining enthusiastic patriotic participation in projects and public events. We have gladly welcomed some new Brothers and former members that have reactivated their memberships. It is always a positive thing to see our Camps increase and continue to do great things in their home states. I have seen brethren step up to positions of leadership and responsibility, and stand in the gap where others were not currently able.

RECOMMENDATION: Form 27, Camp Annual Report, should be revised in the following manner: Line 43 (Brothers Subject to Department Per Capita (Subtract Lines 42 from Line 41)) does not allow manual editing. It draws its number from line 30 (Total Number of Brothers Subject to National Per Capita (Subtract Lines 28 and 29 from Line 27)). Brothers who are exempt from national per capita are not necessarily exempt from department per capita. For example, the number of Life Members need to be added back to line 43 (unless exempted by Department By-Laws). This results in an incorrect amount due the Department.

6.5 Department of the Columbia, York J. Barrett, DC

The Department of Columbia has a new Department Commander assigned in the last few months. (myself).

GOVERNOR Isaac Stevens Camp #1 Fort Steilacoom, Washington

1. I will describe here the activities over the past 6 months. One annual activity that the Camp Governor Isaac Stevens has taken care of over the last few years is: JROTC/ROTC Support. Brother Edwin Dierdorf is the new Coordinator, and has continued the tradition of the Camp, to participate in numerous schools and colleges JROTC and ROTC graduation ceremonies. Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War Medals and Award Certificates were issued at each event. I believe the number of such schools in the Puget Sound area to be around 32. The COVID Virus altered our attendance, but is back to normal.

This has been one of our core strengths over the last three or four years.

2. Camp Governor Isaac Stevens has decided to split the Camp into a Northern and Southern Division. The Northern Camp would still report to Camp Isaac Stevens but, would have a Division Commander who reports to the Camp Commander. This has been created and Division Commander and several other positions were staffed for the Northern Division. The split of the Camp was designed as there are great distances between cities in the North and cities in the South. 3. July 30, 2022 in Kent, WA will be a Memorial Ceremony conducted for a deceased Iron Brigade Soldier. It will be attended by Camp members from Gov Isaac Stevens Camp # 1 (Host) and Oregon Baker Camp will be providing an SVR unit to conduct a ceremony which will include volley fire and taps played. The demonstration will also be observed by potential Washington State Camp members who may want to join the SVR.

4. Baker Camp has been active with an SVR Company and participating in uniformed memorial ceremonies. They have been conducting uniformed ceremonies for several years and have a good program in place.

5. Washington State has been behind in this area, but I (Commander Barrett) am trying to raise an SVR Company in this state. I have an additional duty as a Camp Organizer.

6. Both the Northern and Southern Division of Camp #1 has SUVCW members who have visited cemeteries in each of their prospective cities. We seem to have a good staffing of graves registration, monumental officers, historians, genealogists and others at the Department and Camp levels who are aware and leaning forward in their prospective areas. Our Camp Historian Brother Jim Dimond estimates that around 8,000 Union Army Veterans are buried in the state.

BAKER Camp, Oregon

1. On June 22 a replacement headstone was installed for John Sam Moore, Co. G, 23rd Illinois Infantry.

He is buried in Hilltop Cemetery in Independence, Polk County, Oregon. His original marble headstone was broken off at the base. Tim O'Neal from Col. Edward D. Baker Camp No. 6, along with his wife, Kathy Jo O'Neal, Mary Ann Lee Baker Auxiliary No. 6 performed the installation.

2. Baker camp has 2 more headstones to install in Fircrest Cemetery in Monmouth, Oregon.

The installation of the replacement marker for Lewis S. Fuller, Weaver's Co, PA Cavalry has been stalled due to needing to chip out a section of enclosed concrete. Brother Tim O'Neal has made contact with the Director of the Monmouth Public Works Dept. who has offered to help us with their city equipment to jackhammer the small section of concrete out. Work will proceed before the end of July 2022.

3. A new headstone was installed in the Eugene Pioneer Cemetery in Eugene on May 4, 2022 for Pvt. Daugherty White. His grave had been unmarked since his passing on 15 Mar

1919.

a) On Memorial Day, 2021, Brothers of Jeremiah Smith Camp #1 assisted the Sisters of Sallie Peacheater Tent #18 with a Flag Honor Guard, a reading of the Gettysburg Address, a musket salute, and the playing of Taps at the Oklahoma Veterans Cemetery in Oklahoma City.

b) Brothers from Camp #1, along with Brothers from Camp Numbers 3 and 4, provided an Honor Guard Detail and assisted in the placement of Civil War Veterans headstone to honor Pvt. William Lacey, Sr., 1st Kansas Colored Infantry at the Thomas Smith Cemetery. This was a Preservation Project by the Muscogee Creek Indian Freedman Band (MCIFB) in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma on August 14th of 2021.

c) Camp #1 Brothers and Mrs. Wilma Handley of the DUV Sallie Peacheater Tent #18 completed the cleaning and restoration of 25 Union Veterans headstones and made repairs/painting to the cemetery entry gate and front fence at the Frisco Cemetery, Yukon, Oklahoma on October 2th of 2021.

d) Camp #1 Brothers participated at Oklahoma History Center (OHC) Folklife Festival. This was a free event open to the public which offered a wide range of entertainment, crafts, exhibitions, and food. The SUVCW was invited to host a booth, in which we used for recruitment and information in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 16th of 2021.

e) Camp #1 Brothers participated in the Massing of Colors at the 45th Infantry Division for the Veterans Day Ceremony in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, November 11th of 2021.

f) Camp #1 Brothers have participated in Gun Show Recruitment on a quarterly basis in Oklahoma City. This is an effort to reach out to the community to get more exposure and encourage membership applications.

g) Camp #1 Brothers honored their ancestors and all Civil War Veterans on Remembrance Day on November 20th of 2021, in collaboration with Sisters of the DUVCW Tent #18.

h) Contributions and pledges were received to restore the Soldiers and Sailors Monument in Fairlawn Cemetery in Oklahoma City to its original condition. This monument was originally named the GAR Monument and has needed restoration of four granite pedestals topped by cannonball stacks. This project was completed in November. A ceremony was held in conjunction with the Remembrance Day Ceremony in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on November 20th of 2021. i) Brothers of Camp #1 served as guides for along with members of the Oklahoma City Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 8706, to escort members of the Regents Council of the Oklahoma State Society of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) to present wreaths for each of the military service branches, veterans of WWII, Korea, and Vietnam Wars, and POWs at the Veterans Monument at the Oklahoma Veterans Cemetery in Oklahoma City as part of the Wreaths Across America Ceremony hosted by the DAR on December 18th of 2021.

 j) Brothers of Camp #1 participated in the Birthday Card Campaign for the last remaining Real Son Brother William Pool whose birthday was on 13th of January of 1925. Brother Pool is Life Member #825 and belongs to the Col. John Bynum Camp of Illinois. A card was sent on behalf of the Oklahoma Department on January 8th of 2022.

k) Brothers of Co. L, 3rd Indian Home Guard SVR unit participated in the 89r's Parade with members of the Marine Corps League in Guthrie, Oklahoma, on April 23 of 2022.

I) Indian Nations Camp 3 set up at Honey Springs Battlefield during their reenactment program. We visited with a great number of people with the intent of promoting the SUVCW and the Indian Nations Camp by being visible near the museum. A few of the members that were able to attend and help at the booth were Brian Barton, Steven Tolbert, Carl Fallen, Scott Preston and Clint Anderson.

m) Indian Nations Camp #3 hosted a table at the Wannemacher Gun Show the weekend of the 13th of November. We spoke to a large number of people, many already members of other Departments and Camps of the SUVCW.

n) We awarded seven Eagle Scouts their award from the SUVCW from the Indian Nations Camp, these Eagle Scouts belong to Troop 26 and their Court of Honor was hosted on October 4th. JVC Scott Preston is plugged into the Scout program and did a great job putting this program in motion.

o) On Sunday, October 31st, a free movie on the Battle of Honey Springs was viewed in Tulsa by several members of the Indian Nations Camp #3. The movie was produced by the Oklahoma Historical Society. New member Brian Barton was instrumental in setting up the opportunity.

p) Indian Nations Camp #3 placed 52 flags on Union Civil War Veterans graves during Memorial Day and had a grand Memorial Day Program at Rose Hill cemetery. Terri Walker of the Rachel Cormany Auxiliary did an outstanding job of organizing the placement of the flags on the Veterans graves.

q) Jacob Overturf Camp #4, Brother Rex Griffin presented the JROTC ribbon and medal to Cadet Grant DiGiacomo of the Broken Arrow High School Air Force program on May 4th of 2021, at that school's awards ceremony.

r) As part of his observance of Memorial Day, Department Commander Clint Anderson traveled to Kansas to decorate family graves. He placed a metal GAR marker for his 3rd Great Grandfather, George David Sears, who served with Companies C and A of the 6th Kansas Cavalry. George is buried in Oak Grove, Chautauqua County, Kansas, and belonged to the Chautauqua Springs GAR Post 218. In 1891 he was the Post Commander, according to their records, and Chaplain in 1883.

s) On July 16th of 2022, members of Co. L 3rd Indian Home Guard engaged in the dedication Ceremony at the Honey Springs Battlefield Site. We transported approximately 121 miles from OKC to the battle site. The Ceremony was held on the grounds of the Oklahoma History Center interpretative site. The dedication started with a firing from a 12-pound Napoleon cannon that had been provided from members of the National Park Service out of Ft. Smith AR. We then marched in with the Colors, a 35 Star US flag, which is what would have been current at the time of the original battle. We also had a current Oklahoma State flag. The rifle salute was called with remarkable accuracy, there were 3 volleys. After the salute the Colors were retrieved, and the color line joined up with the rifle line in two lines again. The lines moved out to a safe distance from the cannon and the 12-pounder roared to life again! Taps was played by the bugler and the ceremony ended.

t) Department Commander Anderson presented a JROTC award to the worthy Cadet of the Bixby/Glenpool Marine Unit on the 13th of May 2022.

In conclusion I will report with pride the Department of Oklahoma, be it a smaller Department, is a very active and cohesive Department. The Camps all work very well with one another and continue growth. Several activities are scheduled in the coming months. Eugene to do the installation.

4. May 14, 2022, was the Polk County Museum open house family day. Brothers of the Col. Edward D. Baker Camp No. 6 and Kathy Jo O'Neal of the Mary Ann Lee Baker Auxiliary No. 6 set up an information table to display SUVCW and ASUVCW work, answer the publics questions, and work on recruiting.

5. Baker Camps SVR unit currently has 3 volunteers to attend the Headstone Dedication in

Kent, WA on the 30th of July.

6. Baker Camps SVR unit was in attendance at the May 30, 2022, Memorial Day Ceremony in full strength.

6.6 Department of Connecticut, Frank H. Niederwerfer, DC

6.10 Department of Indiana, James M Floyd, Jr., DC

Fraternal Greetings from the Department of Indiana and the Boyhood Home of our Great Civil War President, Abraham Lincoln!

It is my pleasure to submit to you this report of Department of Indiana activities over the last year (July 2021 through June 2022). I was honored and humbled to have been elected Department Commander during the 136th Annual Encampment conducted on June 4, 2022. This year marked the 74th Memorial Encampment held since the last surviving Indiana G.A.R. comrade John C. Adams of Jonesboro, Indiana joined his comrades in the Grand Army above.

The Department of Indiana includes eight camps with a total membership of two-hundred twenty-seven brothers. This is a net increase of ten brothers from the year 2021. Member retention remains an issue. The net increase of ten is a result of the loss of thirteen members and the addition of twenty-three new memberships for the year 2021.

PROJECTS:

Last Union Veteran Project: The Department of Indiana identified and located Last Union Veteran burials in ninety-one of ninety-two Indiana Counties. Last Union Veteran memorial services and plaques have been conducted and placed in nineteen Counties. Several more memorials are planned in 2022. **Coliseum GAR Farragut Post #27 Records:** The G.A.R. records previously stored at the Evansville IN, Coliseum have now been removed to the University of Southern Indiana and all records of the Farragut Post #27 have been microfilmed and are due to be uploaded to the University of Southern Indiana archive's website soon. Yet to be completed are the Women's Relief Corps and the Daughters of the Union Records. Our goal is to have these records accessible from the National SUVCW website.

Union Soldier Monuments: The John B. Anderson Camp #223 is heavily involved in collecting funds for the placement of Civil War monuments to honor Civil War veterans on the Courthouse lawns of Bartholomew and Jennings Counties in Indiana.

• November 11th, 2021 –

6.11 Department of Iowa, Dennis L. Sasse, DC

Membership in the Department of Iowa is currently 107 Members, however only 91 are in good standing since the suspension of Twombly Camp #2 this past May.

Department Commander Dennis Sasse and his wife Denise (Kinsman Camp ASUVCW) just celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary. Department Commander Sasse has participated in several events this year including laying a wreath for the G.A.R. at the Atlantic, Iowa, Memorial Day Service; the aforementioned "Last Soldier" ceremony for James Martin; Kinsman Circle gravestone dedications in Council Bluffs; gravestone dedication for Joseph Porter in Avoca; and several other parades, programs and events with the Kinsman Camp Guard, of which he is a member.

6.15 Department of Massachusetts, John Dupre, DC

The Department of Massachusetts now reports 11 active camps and 165 members in good standing. All camps have made their yearly reports.

In the past year, most every camp has resumed in person meetings or a mix of in person and virtual meetings.

The Department newsletter, The Clarion Call continues to be distributed electronically on a quarterly basis. Clarion Call editor Rod Fraser has created a YouTube channel called "What Makes Us Sons" where brothers of the order share the history of their ancestors.

All camps have resumed their traditional Memorial Day observances and are pursuing meaningful events in fulfilling their duties as brothers of the order.

In October, 2021, department members, along with brothers of Col. Major General Phillip Kearny Camp#20 was busy distributing Eagle scout certificates in person as well as drafting a resolution to be permitted to issue recognition certificates to Venture Scouts and Sea Scouts. Br. Chris Sands placed a wreath at the Civil War Soldiers Monument in Fairmount Cemetery, Newark, NJ.

James S. Stratton Camp #82 has an ongoing historical project involving the recovery and restoration and revival of Civil War Band Books of the 19th Va. Heavy Artillery Battalion. The participated in multiple Memorial Day services at Philadelphia's historic Laurel Hill

Cemetery, honoring the graves of General George Meade and other Civil War soldiers and sailors and they participated in the Memorial Day Parade in Glassboro, NJ.

Winfield Scott Camp 73 Held a Memorial Day service at Rose Hill Cemetery in Matawan New Jersey and Johnson Street Cemetery in Matawan New Jersey. In attendance were brothers of Scott Camp, A Town Councilman and residents of the town of Matawan.

New Jersey Brothers participated in a ceremonial unveiling of 5 Civil War flags at the New Jersey State Museum on July16th 2022. Attendees included Department Commander Jay Godin, Department JVC Bruce Sirak, Gary DeSiver PDC, And several brothers of Lincoln Camp 100. The event was hosted by Department Secretary-Treasurer David Martin PDC. The New Jersey State House Flag Collection includes 132 Civil War related flags. They are put on display for approximately six months, with 5 different flags unveiled in rotation each June/July and December. This rotation included regimental colors of the 11th, 7th, and 22nd New Jersey Volunteers as well as the 3rd brigade ,3rd division II Corps HQ flag and a 2nd New Jersey Brigade HQ flag.

A resolution was passed by the Department concerning Scouting Certificates and sent to National SUVCW. Normal business was conducted with a lunch break and some fraternal time with Brothers of the Department and guests. Awards and gifts were exchanged and new officers for 2022 were sworn in.

6.21 Department of New York, Jeffrey I. French, DC

PDC Brian Castler was Department Commander for part of this annual report. The Department accomplishments under his tenure is the first four paragraphs. In May 2022 I, Jeffrey French was elected Department Commander for NY.

At the 127th Annual Encampment of the Department of New York in 2010 it was resolved that the Grave of Major General George H. Thomas (The rock of Chickamauga) in Oakwood Cemetery in Troy, NY be maintained by the Department. These efforts were headed by the Col. George L. Willard Camp, #154. The work of restoring the monument and reconstructing the ornamental cast-iron fence, replacing the broken and stolen finials, removal of a large Beech tree that towered dangerously over the Kellogg Family Plot, raising a descriptive bronze tablet of General Thomas off the ground, and placing directional Signage to the grave site is now 100% complete. On 31st July 2021 (the anniversary of Thomas's birth in 1816) there was a re-dedication of the gravesite by the

Willard Camp, the Cemetery Association, and Friends of Oakwood Cemetery.

Since the Annual Encampment in May, quite a few Camps have held various activities from dedicating headstones, installing, and dedicating new headstones on unmarked graves, repair and cleaning existing headstones, dedication of graves, dedicating markers of Civil War Markers of Metal of Honor Winners, presentations (Civil War, GAR, SUVCW, etc.), and participated in the National Ceremony of commemorating the birth of President Chester B. Arthur, just to name a few.

In September the Commander in Chief started to conduct Quarterly Zoom meeting to update Department Commanders on subjects discussed at the Quarterly Council of Administration Meetings.

On 24 April 2022, the Department participated in ceremonies at Grant's Tomb for the 200th Anniversary of U. S. Grants Birth and on 27 April 2022 participated in the in-Remembrance Day of Grant's birthday and dedication of Grants Cottage as a National Historical Landmark and the raising of a new Civil War flag over the Cottage donated by Colonel George L. Willard Camp #154, SUVCW. The Camp and the Department will return to the cottage on the 23 July 2022 to remember his death.

Memorial Day Weekend the Camps did numerous cemetery ceremonies honoring the Boys in Blue. The Walter H. French Camp #17 procured a headstone for Pvt Caleb Barrett and conducted a ceremony with Dorothy Prentice, PNP from the DUVCW and Hope Parke, PDP from the ASUVCW along with living descendants. Camps also participated in Memorial Day Parades in their communities. As Department Commander I joined the ASUVCW in their parade in Jordan, NY.

At the 139th Department Encampment; it was voted by the brothers to have a National Host Committee for 2026. The committee have procured two requests for proposals and working on the third location. As soon as that is received a letter of intent will be sent to the CinC and the National Site Committee for consideration.

Lee Richards contacted me to turn over GAR and SUVCW archives to me. The Department of NY archivists Leo McGuire, PDC and Brian Castler, PDC have done an exceptional job of inventorying the archives and procuring a place to store the items. In the coming days Brother McGuire recommendation to actively raise funds to have a Department Museum will be proposed at the 140th NY Department Encampment.

Preserving history is one of our many missions. NYS has roughly 1800 battle flags requiring

preservation. CinC Paquette gave the Department approval to lobby for the preservation of these battle flags. To date one State Assemblyman expressed interest in this endeavor. More work on this front is in work. The Department is exploring a plan of action on fundraising efforts from corporations and businesses. This will be an ongoing project for the next few years until all have been successfully preserved.

The DUVCW and ASUVCW in NY have been working closely with our Department of NY in our effort to Host National in 2026, Department Encampments, and events honoring the Boys in Blue. We greatly appreciate their help and support.

6.22 Department of North Carolina, Kenneth T. Masters, DC

Two Sisters of the Auxiliary also attended, and the guest speaker was historian Earnest Dollar. The Camp is named in honor of the Union cavalry commander Major General Judson Kilpatrick.

6.23 Department of Ohio, Donald E. Darby, PCinC, DC

To the Officers, men and members of the SUVCW National Encampment

Greetings from the Department of Ohio.

This has been a busy year for the Department with our work "remembering the Boys in Blue" gaining State-wide recognition for the Order.

As you probably read in the Spring edition of the BANNER , the 5-year trek to protect Ohio War Monuments was finally passed by the 133rd Ohio General Assembly and the "Ohio Veterans Heritage Protection Act was signed into law on 22 December 2021. This Act protects ALL war memorials from the French and Indian Wars and through all future armed conflicts that the United States may be engaged. It forbids the sale, purchase of said monuments, it prevents their destruction or movement, for other than repair. It further places a \$10,000 fine to those who discrete those monuments and requires those fines to be used to repair like monuments.

Enderlin Camp 73, in Chillicothe, Ohio was awarded the Annual Ross County Historical Society Award for the work it has done on two Civil War Monuments in Ross County. PCinC David R. Medert was the driving force in both of these restorations. He single-handedly did all the work to gain funds to replace the Civil War Memorial in Grandview Cemetery. He met with the County Commissioners to get over \$30,000.00 to repair the monument along with money from the SUVCW and the Department of Ohio SUVCW. Prior to his death 6 years ago, PCinC Medert tasked the Enderlin Camp with restoring the General Sill monument also at Granview Cemetery. It took almost 5 years to acquire the \$26,000.00 for the restoration of the monument but it was completed in October of 2021. One Enderlin member, Garrett Dill, contributed \$10,000.00 toward the restoration.

Enderlin Camp is now looking toward assisting the City of Frankfort, Ohio in restoring their Civil War Monument. This monument is the First Civil War Monument in the County and is dedicated to the citizens of Frankfort that lost their lives at the Battle of Stone's River and one who died at Andersonville Prison Camp. It has been called "The Penny Monument" because the children of that era contributed their pennies to pay for it.

Townsend Camp 108, Frost Ohio, was able to secure State capital Improvement Funds for the repair of the Grand Army of the Republic Hall in Frost, Ohio in the amount of \$50,000.00. Camp Commander Carl Denbow working with Representative Jay Edwards, Republican from Nelsonville, Ohio. This lobbying was done under General Order 14, 14 April 2021, issued by then-CinC Brian Pierson. The money will be used to re-paint the Hall, windows, and leveling of the foundation.

The Ohio Genealogical Society Quarterly Report, Volume 60, No. 2, 2020 contained a 9-page article on the Last Soldier Project of the SUVCW, specifically Ohio. The article describes the Project as starting in the Department of Ohio and then being picked up by the Order and covering the United States. It speaks of how the Project is funded and then list all of the Ohio counties where the Last Soldier has been located. Another kudo for Ohio and the SUVCW!

The membership of the Department of Ohio stood at 429 members as of the Department Encampment. That Encampment felt that in order to continue the business of the Department we would need to raise our dues. After much discussion, the Encampment raised the Department Dues to \$10 a year. We also changed how we would fund the Monuments and Memorials Fund to permit more funds to be available.

As I said in my very short acceptance speech "Let's do this of what was said in our obligation."

6.24 Department of Oklahoma, Clint A. Anderson DC

On Memorial Day, 2021, Brothers of Jeremiah Smith Camp #1 assisted the Sisters of Sallie Peacheater Tent #18 with a Flag Honor Guard, a reading of the Gettysburg Address, a musket salute, and the playing of Taps at the Oklahoma Veterans Cemetery in Oklahoma City.

Brothers from Camp #1, along with Brothers from Camp Numbers 3 and 4, provided an Honor Guard Detail and assisted in the placement of Civil War Veterans headstone to honor Pvt. William Lacey, Sr., 1st Kansas Colored Infantry at the Thomas Smith Cemetery. This was a Preservation Project by the Muscogee Creek Indian Freedman Band (MCIFB) in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma on August 14th of 2021.

Camp #1 Brothers and Mrs. Wilma Handley of the DUV Sallie Peacheater Tent #18 completed the cleaning and restoration of 25 Union Veterans headstones and made repairs/painting to the cemetery entry gate and front fence at the Frisco Cemetery, Yukon, Oklahoma on October 2th of 2021.

Camp #1 Brothers participated at Oklahoma History Center (OHC) Folklife Festival. This was a free event open to the public which offered a wide range of entertainment, crafts,

exhibitions, and food. The SUVCW was invited to host a booth, in which we used for recruitment and information in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 16th of 2021.

Camp #1 Brothers participated in the Massing of Colors at the 45th Infantry Division for the Veterans Day Ceremony in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, November 11th of 2021.

Camp #1 Brothers have participated in Gun Show Recruitment on a quarterly basis in Oklahoma City. This is an effort to reach out to the community to get more exposure and encourage membership applications.

Camp #1 Brothers honored their ancestors and all Civil War Veterans on Remembrance Day on November 20th of 2021, in collaboration with Sisters of the DUVCW Tent #18.

Contributions and pledges were received to restore the Soldiers and Sailors Monument in Fairlawn Cemetery in Oklahoma City to its original condition. This monument was originally named the GAR Monument and has needed restoration of four granite pedestals topped by cannonball stacks. This project was completed in November. A ceremony was held in conjunction with the Remembrance Day Ceremony in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on November 20th of 2021.

Brothers of Camp #1 served as guides for along with members of the Oklahoma City Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 8706, to escort members of the Regents Council of the Oklahoma State Society of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) to present wreaths for each of the military service branches, veterans of WWII, Korea, and Vietnam Wars, and POWs at the Veterans Monument at the Oklahoma Veterans Cemetery in Oklahoma City as part of the Wreaths Across America Ceremony hosted by the DAR on December 18th of 2021.

Brothers of Camp #1 participated in the Birthday Card Campaign for the last remaining Real Son Brother William Pool whose birthday was on 13th of January of 1925. Brother Pool is Life Member #825 and belongs to the Col. John Bryner Camp of Illinois. A card was sent on behalf of the Oklahoma Department on January 8th of 2022.

Brothers of Co. L, 3rd Indian Home Guard SVR unit participated in the 89r's Parade with members of the Marine Corps League in Guthrie, Oklahoma, on April 23 of 2022.

Indian Nations Camp 3 set up at Honey Springs Battlefield during their reenactment program. We visited with a great number of people with the intent of promoting the SUVCW and the Indian Nations Camp by being visible near the museum. A few of the members that were able to attend and help at the booth were Brian Barton, Steven Tolbert, Carl Fallen, Scott Preston and Clint Anderson.

Indian Nations Camp #3 hosted a table at the Wannemacher Gun Show the weekend of the 13th of November. We spoke to a large number of people, many already members of other Departments and Camps of the SUVCW.

We awarded seven Eagle Scouts their award from the SUVCW from the Indian Nations Camp, these Eagle Scouts belong to Troop 26 and their Court of Honor was hosted on October 4th. JVC Scott Preston is plugged into the Scout program and did a great job putting this program in motion.

On Sunday, October 31st, a free movie on the Battle of Honey Springs was viewed in Tulsa by several members of the Indian Nations Camp #3. The movie was produced by the Oklahoma Historical Society. New member Brian Barton was instrumental in setting up the opportunity.

Indian Nations Camp #3 placed 52 flags on Union Civil War Veterans graves during Memorial Day and had a grand Memorial Day Program at Rose Hill cemetery. Terri Walker of the Rachel Cormany Auxiliary did an outstanding job of organizing the placement of the flags on the Veterans graves.

Jacob Overturf Camp #4, Brother Rex Griffin presented the JROTC ribbon and medal to Cadet Grant DiGiacomo of the Broken Arrow High School Air Force program on May 4th of 2021, at that school's awards ceremony.

As part of his observance of Memorial Day, Department Commander Clint Anderson traveled to Kansas to decorate family graves. He placed a metal GAR marker for his 3rd Great Grandfather, George David Sears, who served with Companies C and A of the 6th Kansas Cavalry. George is buried in Oak Grove, Chautauqua County, Kansas, and belonged to the Chautauqua Springs GAR Post 218. In 1891 he was the Post Commander, according to their records, and Chaplain in 1883.

On July 16th of 2022, members of Co. L 3rd Indian Home Guard engaged in the dedication Ceremony at the Honey Springs Battlefield Site. We transported approximately 121 miles from OKC to the battle site. The Ceremony was held on the grounds of the Oklahoma History Center interpretative site. The dedication started with a firing from a 12-pound Napoleon cannon that had been provided from members of the National Park Service out of Ft. Smith AR. We then marched in with the Colors, a 35 Star US flag, which is what would have been current at the time of the original battle. We also had a current Oklahoma State flag. The rifle salute was called with remarkable accuracy, there were 3 volleys. After the salute the Colors were retrieved, and the color line joined up with the rifle line in two lines again. The lines moved out to a safe distance from the cannon and the 12-pounder roared to life again! Taps was played by the bugler and the ceremony ended.

Department Commander Anderson presented a JROTC award to the worthy Cadet of the Bixby/Glenpool Marine Unit on the 13th of May 2022.

In conclusion I will report with pride the Department of Oklahoma, be it a smaller Department, is a very active and cohesive Department. The Camps all work very well with one another and continue growth. Several activities are scheduled in the coming months.

6.25 Department of Pennsylvania, Dane A. DiFebo, DC

Greetings Brothers! Although I was only recently elected Commander of the Pennsylvania Department on June 18 in Williamsport, PA, I am happy to offer this report on behalf of the Department.

We had an excellent in person department encampment and were honored to have Commander-in-Chief Paquette as our guest. The Brothers of the Department in attendance at the encampment were grateful that C-in-C Paquette informed us of some of the matters that would be addressed at this National Encampment.

I have re-appointed the Pennsylvania Department Education Committee. This Committee held its first meeting of the year on July 7 and has put some excellent plans in place for the coming year. I will be providing further details about the doings of the Education Committee as they become available.

Our 2023 Department Encampment is planned to be held in Altoona, PA in June. More details will be forthcoming.

6.26 Department of Rhode Island, Benjamin J. Frail, PDC

This year has been a busy year for the Brothers of the Department of Rhode Island. For the first time since Covid our Annual Awards Dinner and Annual Appomattox Day Encampment were held in person and we had the honor of Commander in Chief Mike Paquette in attendance for both, we thank him for his kind words and guidance during both events. We continued to host our monthly Department Officers Meetings via Zoom, we utilize these meetings to receive updates from Department Committees and on Camp

activities.

One of the projects that the Department has continued to work on this year is our States Parks Project. In the State of Rhode Island there are two (2) State Parks, Goddard & Haines Parks, that have links to men who served for the Union during the Civil War. We have continued talks with the Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management, the agency that runs these two parks. They have listed their requirements and the RI State Parks Committee has been tasked with meeting them. We have started the process of researching Dr. Haines and Lt. Col. Goddard service to the Union as the RIDEM requires citation for any signs that are put up in the parks.

We continued our efforts to ascertain more information from the Friends of Vicksburg regarding the rededication of the 7th Rhode Island Monument that was damaged during storms two years ago. After multiple attempts this past year, the Friends of Vicksburg replied stating that the monument reinstallation was completed last week. We have asked that we be kept in the loop for any rededication plans so that the Department can attend.

We have also reached out to the Narragansett Indian Tribe in Rhode Island to work with them to honor their warriors that served in the Union forces during the Civil War. In talks with their Tribal Historian, no such ceremony to honor these men has ever occurred. We are working with tribal leadership to plan a ceremony for next year. We are also continuing to work with the City of Providence to get the Soldiers and Sailors Monument, located across from City Hall in Kennedy Plaza, refurbished. The Soldiers and Sailors Monument lists all the men from Rhode Island that were killed during the war.

I am proud to report that all four (4) camps took hosted Memorial Day Ceremonies this past year. Finally, this year we have added seventeen (17) new Brothers and lost three (3) for a net gain of fourteen (14) Brothers. It is an honor to serve as the Commander of the Department of Rhode Island.

6.27 Department of Southwest, Robert D. McCord DC

6.28 Department of Tennessee, George A. Huttick, DC

The Department of Tennessee consists of four (4) Camps within our defined geographic boundary of the state of Tennessee and the state of Mississippi. This is a 33% reduction in Camps over the past two years. We have undertaken efforts to retain the Brothers from the

most recent Camp to close, yet we will not retain all of those Brothers. Our geographic area is large. We have no Camps in Mississippi. The remaining Camps are spread across the 500 miles between Memphis TN and Bristol TN and the 200 miles between Chattanooga TN and Clarksville TN. Currently, the biggest need for a presence is in East Tennessee resulting from the closure of the two Camps in that area. We know of individuals who are seeking Camps in that area, yet no one is committed to taking leadership.

We are getting interest in membership in the Order. One Camp is attempting to form in West Tennessee. We look forward to Captain Asa N. "Black Hawk " Hays SUVCW #81 joining the Department soon. The Camp is planned for Lexington TN, which is near the site of the battle of Parker's Crossroads. Additionally, interest is being gauged for a Camp in Murfreesboro, TN. I feel confident that both of these Camps are being established so that they can be sustainable.

The Department is partnering with a group that is starting an Auxiliary to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. We understand that the group will affiliate with the Department yet support the local Camps. By having a Department presence, it will allow for Camp level ASUVCW groups to eventually form.

Br. Darrell Ball was awarded the Br. Charles Henry Engle, Jr. Award of Appreciation for his diligent efforts in locating Union graves in the Department of Tennessee and for his participation and support of Civil War observances throughout the Department. Br. Mike Downs, PDC, was awarded the Department Commander Award for his willingness to serve the Department of Tennessee and for his advice and support of the Department Commander and his dedicated commitment to our Order.

We are saddened to report that two of our Past Department Commanders, Br. Geoffrey Hintze and Br. John Anderson passed away in the last year. Br. Hintze had transferred to the Department of Alabama, yet served our Department with distinction for years. Br. Anderson was one of our earliest Commanders, and was less involved in recent years. Camps continue to have a presence in their communities. They are active with living history, hosting speakers, Eagle Scout certificates, ROTC certificates, "Little Patriot Parades", Independence Day Activities and other programs that further the order. Some Brothers continue to identify graves and restore headstones. Several intentionally have booths or activities at Civil War shows. We do have two (2) Sons of Veterans Reserve Units that are within our Department boundaries that have some activities.

The focus of the Department is currently:

• Development and Training of Department and Camp leaders to strengthen the Department.

- Improvement of communication between the Department and the Camps
- Intentionally improving the health of our Camps

6.29 Department of Texas (with Louisiana), Michael L Lance, DC

The following is a report of the actions and activities of the Department of Texas, and the individual camps of the same, since the 27th Department Encampment in 2021. The past year has again, been a very productive one for the Department of Texas.

The Department of Texas reported on March 31, 2022 a total strength of 194 Brothers in good standing, from four Camps; Gen. James J. Byrne Camp #1 reported 25 members, Lt. Cmdr. Edward Lea, USN Camp #2 reported 114 members, Brig. Gen. Joseph Bailey Camp #5 reported 23 members, and Col. Elmer E. Ellsworth Camp #18 reported 32 members. The Department boasts 15 Life members, an increase of one from 2021.

In addition, I am pleased to report that all Camps have updated their EIN information and the Department Secretary completed Form 11 which was certified by Past Department Commander Tony Vets and forwarded to the National Treasurer, as required, by March 15, 2019.

Recruiting remains our highest priority and focus. The Department is always actively seeking to interact with the public and identify potential new members. The Department is also promoting best practices to retain current members and to reconnect with past members. We all know too well how difficult the past couple of years have been. COVID-19, and our human response to it, wreaked havoc across the world, and to our own sublime Order, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. We have been affected adversely, as has every other lineage society. Indeed, COVID-19 affected the Department of Texas in a very particular way, as we lost our own Brother Bill Pollard, who was cut down by the virus at the beginning of his 2021 term as Department Commander.

Yet, like our ancestors who knew of and experienced loss and defeat in ways we will never fully comprehend, we mourn our losses, but then set our eyes on the future. We strategize new goals, we regroup, and we march on. I am happy to report that the Department of Texas is indeed marching on. During the past year, our camps have resumed many of their activities that had been postponed by COVID-19. Those activities include the Veterans Day Commemoration at Oakwood Cemetery in Fort Worth, Texas conducted by Byrne Camp No. 1, for which an article was published in the Department News section of the Autumn 2021 edition of The Banner.

Lea Camp #2 in Houston, Texas, along with National Chaplain Jerry Kowalski, the Sarah Emma Seeyle Auxiliary #1, and members of the Byrne Camp, Bailey Camp, Ellsworth Camp, and Co. K, 1st US Infantry, SVR, participated in the graveside service for Past Department Commander Pollard at the Hayes Memorial Park Cemetery in Hitchcock, Texas. The Lea Camp also participated in a program entitled Voices of South Texas, commemorating the gravesite of Maj. James Downing of the 35th USCT at Old Bayview Cemetery in Corpus Christi, Texas. A 1917 version of the Grand Army of the Republic Memorial Service was conducted there by the brothers. On Memorial Day, brothers of the Lea Camp participated in an Honor Guard and fired musket volleys at the National Cemetery in Houston, Texas. Lea Camp #2 also conducted their signature annual event, Battle of Galveston Commemoration ceremonies honoring the federal casualties - soldiers and sailors - of the January 1, 1863 battle for Galveston, Texas. Brothers of the Lea Camp were joined at the event by PDC John E. Schneider, representing both Mollus and Ellsworth Camp #18. Also in attendance were members of Sarah Emma Seelve Auxiliary No. 1, Sarah Emma Edmonds, Texas Tent No. 4, DUVCW, Co. A, 13th Regiment, U.S. Infantry, and Mr. Dick Gray, Chaplain of Harmony Masonic Lodge #6 of Galveston, Texas. The Lea Camp also provided twenty ROTC awards and six Eagle Scout presentations.

Bailey Camp #5 presented Cadet Major Kaitlyn M. Hawk, a member of AFROTC Unit AK-941 in North Pole, Alaska, with a certificate honoring her accomplishments. Cadet Hawk's unit won the Alaska Color Corp drill team competition and the Air Gun Alaska competition. She was the team leader for both. The Bailey Camp also presented an award to Cadet PFC Brenden C. Campbell of the Army ROTC detachment of Northwestern State University of Louisiana. In addition, Brother William Nichols and Camp Commander John Prime participated in a ceremony for the respectful burial of the remains of unclaimed U.S. military veterans at the Northwest Louisiana Veterans Cemetery near Keithville, Louisiana.

On Memorial Day, brothers of Ellsworth Camp #18 gathered to conduct a memorial service at the Boyd gravesite in the Pecan Grove Cemetery in McKinney Texas.

Other steps successfully undertaken in efforts to improve the operations and outreach of

the Department of Texas include: reinstating our Department newsletter, *The Unionist*, which now has an improved design with a public-facing focus; the revamping of our Department website by our very talented Brother Larry Joe Reynolds - a work of skill and beauty; and the development of our internal and external-facing Department Facebook pages by Signals Officer, Brother John Vander Meulen. All these measures were focused on improving communication throughout the department, to serve as potential sources of recruitment, and to provide information about our Order to the public.

The Department of Texas has also established a Zoom account, with which regular Zoom staff meetings have been utilized to enhance and coordinate Department operations.

By reinstituting an in-person 2021-2022 Department Encampment in Jefferson, Texas, we have taken one more step in marching on. It will not be the last step - just one in a series - as we continue in our perpetual duty of preserving the history and legacy of the men who fought and worked to preserve the Union.

There is still a lot of work to be done. We need to work on creating more camps within the department, and then dedicate the time and effort necessary to assist those new camps in engaging in this perpetual duty. We also need to continue to work to educate our youth about the Civil War.

Lastly, we need to address a bigger, and important picture within our Order so as to not detail us out of existence. We stand today to lose outstanding current brothers from our Order, and miss the opportunity of attracting new potential brothers as the result of a seemingly anachronistic road block to membership. Therefore, the Department of Texas recommends the following amendment to the Charter, Constitution and Regulations:

The Department of Texas concurs with the opinion issued by the National Counselor on June 10, 2022, that during the period from 2014 through 2022, the definition of direct blood relative was omitted from our Charter, Constitution and Regulations.

This omission left Brothers of the Order with no specific guidance that defines the direct blood relative requirement and likely contributed to Brothers not being fully cognizant of the multiple and somewhat disjointed notes that are contained in the footnotes of our documents, and as a result, some members were admitted under a blood relative that was a cousin.

Given the precedent established at the 118th National Encampment to grandfather the memberships of brothers who did not meet the criteria for full membership as a direct

blood relative, the Department of Texas withdraws the amendment we previously submitted and recommends a substitute amendment in its place.

The Department of Texas recommends that the following amendment to the Regulations be made:

Amend the last sentence of definition (a), now proposed for reinstatement in the National Regulations, by the Special Committee for the Reorganization of the National Regulations, and found in Chapter V, Article I, Section 3 of the 2013 Constitution and Regulations, to read: "This definition section shall not apply to any Brother admitted to membership prior to August 21, 1999 or between August 16, 2014 and August 13, 2022."

6.30 Department of Vermont, Maurice Cerutti, DC

The 137th Department of Vermont Annual Encampment was held on May 21, 2022 at St. Johnsbury, Vermont. Brother Bruce Frail Senior Vice Commander in Chief was the national representative.

On June 1st, 2022, some members of the William Scott Camp 302 from Barre, VT did a cleaning of the William Scott Monument at the turn off on 302 in West Groton, VT. Along with that monument, the group also cleaned 6 smaller monuments of Civil War Veterans in a small cemetery just 100 yards west of the William Scott Monument. The group also replaced the flags of those Civil War Veterans.

The members of the group that participated were Brothers Wade Johnson SR, Mark Morse and Dan Whitcher.

Notes to Financial Statements

June 30, 2021

1. Description of Organization

The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Inc. (SUVCW) is a nonprofit corporation founded in 1881. SUVCW was incorporated by an Act of Congress on August 20, 1954.

The purpose of SUVCW is to perpetuate the memory of the Grand Army of The Republic and the men who saved the Union between 1861 and 1865; to assist in every practicable way in the preservation of and availability of documents and records pertaining to the Grand Army of The Republic and its members; to cooperate in doing honor to all who have patriotically served our country in any war; to teach patriotism and the duties of citizenship, the true history of our Country, and the love and honor of our flag; to oppose every tendency or movement that would weaken loyalty to, or make for the destruction or impairment of our constitutional union; and to inculcate and broadly sustain the American principles of representative government, of equal rights, and of impartial justice for all.

Membership in SUVCW is limited by an act of Congress to male, blood relatives of persons who served between April 12, 1861 and April 9, 1865, as soldiers or sailors of The United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Revenue Cutter Service, and of such state requirements as were called into active service, and were subject to orders of United States General Officers between those dates, and were honorably discharged from such service or who died in service.

SUVCW consists of Camps, Departments, and the National Organization. The National Encampment of the National Organization has the supreme power and authority of the Order of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. These financial statements include only the activities of the National Organization. SUVCW is classified as an organization exempt from income tax under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) as a public charity. SUVCW has a group exemption that covers its Camps and Departments. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been included in the accompanying financial statements.

SUVCW is governed by a twelve (12) member Council of Administration. The National Encampment elects all Council of Administration members to oversee and administer the day-today operations of SUVCW.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Presentation

SUVCW reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to the following classes of net assets:

<u>Net assets without donor restrictions</u> - Includes revenue and contributions received without donorimposed restrictions.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Basis of Presentation (continued)

Net assets with donor restrictions – Includes revenue and contributions, if any, subject to donorimposed stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets and where the restriction is not met within the same fiscal year. When a donor restriction expires in a subsequent fiscal year, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statement of Activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donor restricted gifts are classified as unrestricted if the restriction expires in the same fiscal year.

Basis of Accounting

SUVCW uses the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Fund Accounting

The accounts of SUVCW are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Under fund accounting, resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purpose. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, fund balances and activity are classified as net assets with or without donor restrictions in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

The following funds are used by SUVCW:

General Fund

This fund is used to collect revenues and disburse funds for expenses related to the normal, dayto-day operations of SUVCW.

National Headquarters Fund

This fund is used to account for funds to establish a National Headquarters. The National Headquarters is located within the National Civil War Museum in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. The Headquarters will be used for the National Executive Director's office and to store records. Annual rent is \$10,200. As of June 30, 2021, the Council of Administration designated \$49,982 for these purposes.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Fund Accounting (continued)

Preservation Fund

This fund was created by action of the Council of Administration in 1999 to assist Departments and Camps of the Order in the preservation, maintenance, and defense of Civil War monuments and memorials. As of June 30, 2021, the Council of Administration designated \$38,178 for these purposes.

Permanent Fund

This fund was established by vote of the National Encampment of SUVCW and is authorized by Article VIII of SUVCW's Constitution. This fund accounts for Life Membership fees received prior to August 15, 1996. The fund also accounts for monies that have been given or bequeathed to the National Organization in memory of a Civil War veteran, monies given or bequeathed to the National Organization that have not been designated for a specific purpose by the donor, and such other monies as may be added thereto by vote of the National Encampment or the Council of Administration. The Permanent Fund may annually distribute, for each Life Member, \$18 to the National General Fund; there were no such distributions during 2021. The annual reimbursement sent to each member's camp upon application is set by the Council of Administration. The Council of Administration sets the amount based upon the earnings of the Permanent Fund in the previous fiscal year. Earnings on the monies may be transferred to the National General Fund and used for the operations of the National Organization. Except as may be provided by the donor, no portion of the principal may be disbursed without a vote by the National Encampment. As of June 30, 2021, the Council of Administration designated \$284,140 for these purposes.

Lincoln Tomb Observance Fund

This fund was established by the vote of the National Encampment of SUVCW in 2007 to account for monies designated for the annual ceremony held to honor Abraham Lincoln at the Lincoln Tomb in Springfield, Illinois. As of June 30, 2021, there were no net assets designated by the Council of Administration to be used for this purpose.

Life Membership Fund

This fund was established by the vote of the National Encampment of SUVCW in 2012 to account for the life membership fees. As of June 30, 2021, the Council of Administration designated net assets of \$51,913 for this purpose.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Cash and Cash Equivalents

SUVCW considers highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. Cash on deposit at financial institutions is federally insured to certain limits. SUVCW routinely has cash on deposit with financial institutions with these limits, and balances in excess of these limits are subject to the risk that the financial institution will not pay upon demand.

Inventory

Inventory consists of items for sale to members and is charged as an expense at the time of sale. Inventory is stated at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost is determined using the average cost method.

Fixed Assets

Furniture and equipment over \$500 is capitalized and stated at cost, if purchased, or at fair value, if donated. Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets, which range from three to ten years. The costs of normal maintenance that do not add to the value of assets or materially extend asset lives are not capitalized.

Investments

The investment portfolios are held and managed by investment advisors and stated at fair value (Note 3). Investment income, including unrealized gains and losses, is reported as an increase in net assets, depending upon donor restrictions, if any.

Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue consists of per capita dues and encampment registration revenue applicable to the subsequent fiscal year. Per capita dues and encampment registration revenue dues are reported as deferred revenue when received and then recognized as revenue over the period of membership or at the time of the encampment. Other revenues for which SUVCW has been contracted to render services are recognized upon the transfer of the goods or services to the customer.

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Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Contributions

All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Contributions subject to donor-imposed stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets, and for which the restriction is not met within the same fiscal year, are classified as net assets with donor restrictions. When a donor restriction expires in a subsequent fiscal year, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donor restricted gifts are classified as net assets without donor restrictions if the restriction expires in the same fiscal year.

Donated Materials and Service

The amount of donated materials and services is not considered to be significant by management. Accordingly, no values have been recorded in the financial statements.

Liquidity and Availability of Resources

SUVCW has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations come due.

As of June 30, 2021, SUVCW has approximately \$1,299,000 of financial assets, including approximately \$195,000 of cash and cash equivalents and \$1,104,000 of investments available to meet cash needs for general expenditures that will be available within one year of the statement of financial position date. None of these financial assets are subject to donor or other contractual restrictions that make them unavailable for general expenditure within one year of the statement of financial position date.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and related disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events

In preparation of the accompanying financial statements, management has evaluated subsequent events through September 23, 2021, the date the financial statements were available for issuance.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Recently Issued Accounting Standards

In February 2016, the FASB issued ASU 2016-02, Leases (Topic 842), which supersedes FASB ASC 840, Leases, and makes conforming amendments to U.S. GAAP. ASU 2016-02 requires, among other changes to the lease accounting guidance, lessees to recognize most leases on balance sheet via a right of use asset and lease liability, and additional qualitative and quantitative disclosures. ASU 2016-02 is effective for SUVCW for the 2023 fiscal year. SUVCW is currently evaluating the effect this new standard will have on its financial statements.

3. Investments

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

- Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that SUVCW has the ability to access.
- Level 2 Inputs to the methodology include:
 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
 - Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;

 - Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.
- Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The fair value measurement level of the asset or liability within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for investments measured at fair value:

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by SUVCW are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by SUVCW are deemed to be actively traded.

U.S. savings bonds: Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

3. Investments (continued)

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although SUVCW believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. Leases

6. Endowment

SUVCW's endowment consists of internally designated funds established for perpetual support of life memberships. As required by U.S. GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law – SUVCW classifies the original and subsequent value of funds designated for the endowment as net assets without donor restrictions. The Council of Administration of SUVCW has determined that the long-term preservation of the real value of the assets is the current goal of the endowment. As such, SUVCW has not chosen to be governed by the spending rate as permitted by the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act.

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters – SUVCW has adopted an investment policy for endowment assets that attempt to achieve a real total return, resulting from income and capital appreciation, which will assist SUVCW in achieving its long-term funding objectives. Under this policy, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that, after examining the historical relationships of risk and return among asset classes, is designed to provide the highest probability of meeting or exceeding the return objectives at the lowest possible risk.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives – To satisfy its long-term rate of return objectives, SUVCW relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). SUVCW targets a diversified asset allocation to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy – Currently, the Council of Administration of SUVCW has determined that the long-term preservation of the real value of the assets is the current goal of the permanent endowment. As such, there has been no approved spending policy, as the current objective of the endowment is to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity. Current period interest and dividends may be considered to be payment of life membership reimbursements.

Minutes of the Virtual Council of Administration Meeting

18 September 2021

Meeting opened at 1400 ET by CinC Paquette

Pledge of Allegiance was recited

Excused: COA member Kevin Tucker

Absent: National Quartermaster James Lyon

Discussion Topics:

- CinC Paquette shared that he had attended the memorial service for PCinC Richard Orr on 11 September in Pittsburgh, PA. The service was conducted by the Pennsylvania Department and was very well done. CinC Paquette also attended a rededication ceremony at the A.P. Davis mausoleum on 12 September by the Davis * Camp in Pittsburgh.
- A document to the DUVCW regarding the "Little Brown Button" and copyright infringement to the SUVCW was drafted by the Assistant National Counselor and reviewed by the National Counselor. CinC Paquette signed the document and sent it to the National President of the DUVCW.
- 3. CinC Paquette indicated although he had been informed that he would be invited to the Nathan Bedford Forest re-interment ceremony, he had received no formal invitation form the Sons of Confederate Veterans Commander-in-Chief. The ceremony was occurring today 18 September. If an invitation had been sent shortly after the National Encampment, it would have been too late for CinC Paquette to make travel arrangements.
 - a. PCinC Pierson offered that he had been in contact with SCV PCinC Paul Glamring a week ago, who stated that the current SCV CinC Larry McCluney had sent an invitation. PCinC Pierson conveyed his regrets that CinC Paquette would not be able to attend as he had other commitments on 18 September.
- CinC Paquette indicated he had received correspondence from the Civil War Memorials Officer from the Department of the Southwest, Brother Avery Frantz, regarding the Kit

Carson Monument. The CinC had also been in contact with the Department Commander, John Conrad and the National Counselor and Assistant National Counselor on this topic.

- a. The General Services Administration (GSA) had sent a letter to the National Civil War Monuments Officer, Walt Busch 18 months ago expressing the GSA's belief that the SUVCW owned the Kit Carson Monument based on our Deed of Conveyance from the GAR. The monument was boarded up by the GSA to prevent further vandalism to it. The monument had been erected by the local GAR post on Federal property.
- b. The City of Sante Fe, NM wants monument removed, however since it is on Federal property, this can't occur. Additionally, the monument and the property on which it is located is designated as a historical landmark.
- c. Department Commander John Conrad is conducting a title search to see if the GAR post had deeded other property to any other organizations when the post folded.
- d. The CinC had a discussion with PCinC James Pahl who had expressed some concern that there may be financial liabilities for the SUVCW if we claim the monument.
- e. Brother Chris Workman, Department of Kentucky, indicated that his Department Commander had discovered there was interest in the Kit Carson monument by the City of Richmond Kentucky, if the monument was to be moved. Kit Carson was born in this area of Kentucky.
- f. SVCinC Frail asked if a determination was made that the Deed of Conveyance did not apply to the monument how that ruling would impact the cemetery plots already claimed by the SUVCW using the Deed of Conveyance. CinC Paquette recommended a follow-up discussion on this topic occur with PCinC Pahl.
- g. PCinC Pierson noted that the SUVCW has been asserting the Deed of Conveyance on a case-by-case basis. There was not a pattern or blanket use of the Deed of Conveyance one way or another. SVCinC Frail indicated the use or failure to use the Deed of Conveyance to claim the Kit Carson monument could set a precedence.
- h. There was discussion regarding potential relocation of the monument and who would make the determination to do so. It was concluded that the SUVCW would not be making the decision to move the monument.
- i. Brother Walt Busch had replied to the GSA that he did not have the authority to speak for the SUVCW and that the response to their letter would have to be discussed during a National Encampment. This did not occur in 2020 as the National Encampment was conducted virtually and limited in scope. The

discussion did not occur during the National Encampment in 2021 as it was not included in the agenda.

- 5. CinC Paquette asked for a motion to discuss the National website.
 - a. Brother Harry Reinecke moved that we accept the Master Service Agreement with Drupal Connect pending the incorporation of the Website Requirements document and that we also approve that document on the same vote. Seconded by Kevin Martin.
 - b. The National Signals Officer, Timothy McCoy thanked everyone for enabling him to participate in spite of the time zone difference with him calling from Switzerland. He also thanked COA members for their input to the Website Goals and Requirements document. The questions raised helped to further clarify what the COA would like to do and what would be included in the effort.
 - c. Two documents were being considered in the motion; the Master Service Agreement (MSA) from Drupal Connect which had been discussed briefly in the post encampment COA meeting in St. Louis. It was noted that there were no tangible deliverables indicated in the MSA and the major deliverable had to be identified for the project. Deliverables were identified in the second document, Website Goals and Requirements, which had been shared with the COA. Several COA members had provided feedback to the Website Goals and Requirements document.
 - d. All questions regarding the MSA had been assembled and responded to in version 2.0 of the Website Goals and Requirements document. Significant questions asked were when the contract with New Valley had been signed (and who signed it) and a second question asking if we had confirmation of a zero balance from New Valley had been asked during the COA meeting in St. Louis. The contract with New Valley was signed on 10 June 2019 by PCinC Don Shaw. A written statement from New Valley had been received from New Valley indicating a zero balance.
 - e. As the MSA and version 2.0 of the Website Goals and Requirements document had been provided prior to the meeting, Brother McCoy suggested the COA move into discussion. CinC Paquette asked if there were questions on either of the documents.
 - f. SVCinC Frail stated he agreed with the wording in the Website Goals and Requirements document which he had reviewed in detail with Brother McCoy. He asked for clarification as to whether we would be voting on a contract during the meeting. CinC Paquette explained that the contract would be a combination of the MSA amended with the SUVCW the Website Goals and Requirements document as it existed today. Drupal would have to approve the inclusion of the Website Goals and Requirements document but if the MSA and the Website Goals and

Requirements document were accepted by Drupal with no changes then the vote taken today would be to approve the contact and the CinC would sign it. SVCinC Frail asked if a final dollar amount was available. Brother McCoy stated we know what Drupal's hourly rate is \$100/hour. He stated the total amount of time would be in the 50-75 hour range. Drupal estimated maintenance to address security patch updates for example would be \$1500 - \$2000. Updates to content would be the responsibility of the SUVCW.

- g. SVCinC Frail asked if there was a length of time identified on the maintenance contract. Brother McCoy explained that the maintenance contract with Drupal would be a future effort, and the contract being discussed today was only for the development of the website. SVCinC Frail asked if the maintenance contract would be separate and signable later. Brother McCoy indicated that this was correct, and that Drupal would propose "buckets" of hours to perform maintenance over the course of a year. The number of hours in the buckets would be flexible.
- h. SVCinC Frail asked if \$25,000 had been approved towards this effort in the budget. National Treasurer Michael Beard confirmed there was \$25,000 in the budget for this purpose. SVCinC Frail stated that he had no issues.
- CinC Paquette asked when the \$25,000 had been approved. Brother Beard indicated it have been approved during the most recent COA meeting in St. Louis.
- j. PCinC Ed Norris asked about "clear messages" that it was indicated the SUVCW had to provide the content and if this was this correct. Brother McCoy confirmed this was correct. PCinC Norris asked if we were going to have someone go through the content to make sure the information was still valid. Brother McCoy stated the Committee on Website Redesign would be responsible for coordinating with the Brothers and committees responsible for the content of the various portions of the website. PCinC Norris suggested it would be important for the committee to start doing this work as soon as possible.
- k. PCinC Norris asked about the section on visually impaired persons and accessibility - should we reference being in compliance with the ADA or just visually impaired. Brother Beard noted that we would have to have someone familiar with ADA requirements go through the site to make sure that we were in compliance, and it was not an easy law to comply with.
- CinC Paquette asked based on a conversation with Brother McCoy prior to the National Encampment if this contract was not going to be a complete migration of the current website. CinC Paquette mentioned the term "critical mass" in reference to the effort. Brother McCoy indicated the effort was to do the entire National website. It would not include satellite websites such as GAR, Memorial University, Quartermaster Store, etc.

- m. CinC Paquette asked what the estimate in hours was going to be. Brother McCoy replied 50 75 hours. PCinC Norris replied that estimate was very low. SVCinC Frail agreed that it was, which was why the COA had identified the \$20,000 and the additional \$5,000 for Brother Busch's request for the monument registration portion of the website. CinC Paquette said he recalled hearing an estimate of 150-200 hours. SVCinC Frail confirmed this was the reason the COA increased the amount based on our estimate. Brother McCoy corrected himself and indicated the estimate of 150-200 hours was the range that had been discussed. SVCinC Frail added if we completed the project in less time the better for us.
- n. National Secretary, Jonathan Davis indicated he needed a copy of the final notice from New Valley that the balance was paid off and he would also need a copy of the contract with Drupal once it was signed. The Executive Director stated he need a copy of the contracts at the National Headquarters as well.
- o. Brother McCoy pointed out that a couple Brothers, Joseph Hall being one of them, had asked in the Question and Answers portion of the Website Goals and Requirements document about the ability to complete forms, such as registration for the National Encampment, electronically on the website. Brother McCoy indicated this would be a wish-list item for a future effort. This wasn't included as part of the current effort and additional discussion would be needed. Brother Hall requested the priority for this ability be increased if it was possible. CinC Paquette stated would be an increase in scope for the current project and would likely need to wait for the future.
- p. The CinC stated he was appointing a committee to investigate Information Technology resources throughout the Order. A discussion ensued regarding the use of PayPal to pay for National Encampment registration and overseas camp per capita. The possibility of increasing the National Encampment registration fee also occurred.
- q. PCinC Ed Norris asked how the pages that needed to be migrated would be identified. There were a number of outdated pages on the website that shouldn't be migrated. The MSA didn't identify what content we wanted to be migrated. Brother McCoy stated this was correct. It would be addressed during the wire-framing and building out of the website's content. CinC Paquette asked if the website re-design committee would determine which content would be migrated. Brother McCoy replied it was something that would have to be worked through. There was content that was more familiar to Brothers responsible for it who are not on the website redesign committee. Those Brothers would be better able to determine if the content should be migrated or not. CinC Paquette requested that if there was questionable content to be migrated that it be referred to the COA. SVCinC Frail added that the recommendation should also be vetted through the various committees responsible for the content.

- r. Brother McCoy brought up the Monuments and Memorials website content that had been introduced on the floor of the National Encampment by Brother Walt Busch and discussed in the post-Encampment COA meeting. Brother Busch had identified his desired updates to the website. Brother McCoy had discussed this with Drupal Connect and was assured that the changes could be accommodated without significant impact to the cost or time to complete the project.
- s. There was no more discussion on the contract with Drupal Connect. CinC Paquette requested that the National Secretary conduct a roll call vote on the motion.
 - i. SVCinC Bruce Frail: Approve
 - ii. JVCinC Peter Hritsko: Agreed / approve
 - iii. National Secretary Jonathan Davis: Approve
 - iv. National Treasurer D. Michael Beard: Approve
 - v. COA Member Harry Reinecke IV: Approve

 - vii. COA Member Shane Milburn: Approve
 - viii. COA Member Joseph Hall: Approve

 - x. Total 9 in approval of the motion, 0 against.
- t. CinC Paquette reiterated that if there were any changes to the MSA or the Website Goals and Requirements document that another COA vote would be required and that he wouldn't sign the contract. Brother McCoy requested that the questions and answers section currently in the Website Goals and Requirements version 2.0 document not be attached to the MSA. After discussion it was agreed not to include the questions and answers.
- CinC Paquette requested that Brother McCoy provide the current version of Website Goals and Requirements document (minus the questions and answeres) and that he would notify the COA if he signed the contract or not once it had been reviewed by Drupal Connect.
- 7. CinC Paquette notified the COA that he had received a request to lobby by the Department of Colorado and Wyoming regarding the placement of GAR highway markers in Utah. The rules regarding what information should be placed on highway signs had changed since the Department had the signs made and the signs were no longer in compliance. The state of Utah would allow the Department to place the signs that have been made in rest areas. The Department requested to lobby with the state of Utah specifically in this matter. Brother Beard requested a copy of the request to lobby as he

tracks these in case it comes up in a discussion with the IRS. PCinC Pierson indicated that copies were to go to the National Treasurer and the Executive Director. JVCinC Hritsko asked if it included other roads within the Department's boundaries. CinC Paquette stated it only applied to the portions of the GAR highway in the state of Utah.

- 8. CinC Paquette informed the COA that there were two camps being formed in Canada and that these two camps would function in a similar manner to the camp in England. One of the camps would be in Ottawa, Ontario. Brother Demmy asked where the second camp was forming. The CinC replied that he didn't remember the city. Brother Davis asked Brother Demmy if postage to ship the charters to Canada would be a concern. Brother Demmy replied that he didn't believe so. Brother Davis indicated he would leave the shipping fee at \$25.00, which was the camp for camps in the United States. Brother Davis indicated he had a charter ready for the newest camp in the Department of Alabama, the Spanish Fort Camp, which he would be sending to the CinC shortly. Brother Davis also indicated that a charter was close to being ready for a new camp in North Carolina.
- 9. CinC Paquette discussed the passing of Department Commander Bill Pollard of the Department of Texas and that the family did not desire a SUVCW presence at his funeral. The Department was in process of planning a memorial service as a separate SUVCW event on 30 October. SVCinC Frail and National Chaplain Kowalski would attend. The CinC indicated he would publish a Special Order to pass condolences to the DC Pollard's family once all preparations were in place for the SUVCW memorial service. SVCinC Frail added that DC Pollard's family were completely in support of the SUVCW memorial service. PCinC Pierson indicated he might also be able to attend.
- 10. PCinC Norris asked if our National Insurance covered the two new camps in Canada and the camp in England. PCinC Pierson stated he didn't believe it was a problem due to how these camps were associated with the Order. PCinC Norris stated that in looking at the web page of the camp in England that there was not any indication that they weren't fully associated with us. CinC Paquette asked if PCinC Norris's question was if something happened with the camp in England or one of the camps in Canada could someone from those countries sue the National Organization. PCinC Norris agreed that was the question. CinC Paquette said we should ask our insurance company. SVCinC Frail said he believed our insurance company should cover us. PCinC Pierson stated he believed the ability to sue us would be based on those camps legal structure with the National Organization.
- PCinC Pierson asked if the CinC would have a travel schedule for Department Encampments in place for the COA meeting in Gettysburg. The CinC replied he would.
- 12. JVCinC Hritsko indicated a problem with a dead link to the membership application form on the new members section of the National website. National Webmaster, Harry Reinecke, stated he would correct the problem.

13. Brother Beard indicated he would be moving to Florida and staying in a Residence Inn while construction on his new home was being completed. Any mail sent to him by US mail might take additional time to reach him.

There were no items for the Good of the Order.

A closing prayer was provided by National Chaplain Kowalski.

The meeting closed at 1509 ET.

2) We should add advertisement banners to some of our database pages, i.e. search page and results page. These banners would be controlled by the SUVCW and the profit from them would go to the upkeep of the database (up to the yearly amount that has been budgeted) any additional funds could go into the General or Permanent Funds. The upgraded database and our new server location give us the ability to add banners, collect and track revenues. We should take advantage of this.

[ACTION: Motion by Brother Day that we allow the Technology and Graves Registration Committees to work on developing the program or plan on how this would be implemented by 2019 Gettysburg, seconded. Passed. CONTINUED ACTION: Report deferred action till web site updated.]

3) We should create and market a line of lineage items that can be personalized and sold thru a database web store to people who learn of their relatives or are helping with our project. Some ideas are certificates that identify American Civil War Service, t-shirts or polo shirts that submitters or admin users can purchase that would identify them as working and/or supporting our project. These items would be dual purpose; they would generate revenue and promote our database, which in turn promotes the SUVCW. The revenue would pay for the expenses generated in this product line, go towards the budget for upkeep of the database and lastly any additional could go into the General or Permanent Funds. This line would not interfere at all with the Quartermaster store or the Charitable Foundation as it is targeting a different group of buyers. As this three year

plan is a base to my ideas for the future, we should discuss these before I submit a complete five or ten year plan.

Agenda

1. National Document Retention Policy Updates. Submitted by Brother Frail. CinC deferred discussion until a future date when Brother Frail is available to discuss them.

2. Kit Carson Monument, Santa Fe, NM.

Background: GSA contacted Brother Walt Busch two years ago asking if the SUVCW claims ownership of the monument. He responded that a National Encampment would have to decide.

The local GAR Post erected the monument on United States Government (USG) property and kept possession of the monument itself. There is no documentation that shows the transfer of the monument from the Post to the Dept of NM GAR, or subsequent transfer to the Dept of the Southwest. Therefore, could it be considered abandoned property?

The monument is not popular with the local tribes or city government and has been vandalized on occasion for the past 50 years. It is located on federal property, not city property.

The monument is a sandstone obelisk on a base with engraved inscriptions. USG restored it in the 1970s; however, it would likely require further restoration.

A lengthy discussion proceeded and included the following points:

- Possible options (1) SUVCW claims ownership; (2) SUVCW does not claim ownership, thus allowing GSA to attend to its disposition as they see fit
 - There will be Brothers on each side of this issue who will advocate for one option or the other.
 It is expected that a notable percentage of our membership will demand we claim it.
- Question: If we don't claim it, would this violate the monument protection policy? PCinC Day
 stated the intent of the policy was to allow flexibility to deal with a variety of situations, including
 those that are financially outside of our capability

- Question: Does the Deed of Conveyance apply in this case?
 - PCinC Pahl explained that the only thing a Post passed on per the Deed of Conveyance were GAR
 records, not real property or monuments.
 - It was noted that we have never gone to a National Encampment on issues regarding the Deed
 of Conveyance. There are other monuments on federal property to which we don't lay claim.
- Question: What precedent are we setting WRT Deed of Conveyance if we lay no claim?
- PCinC Pahl stated that anything we do will set precedent.
- Question: Who has the authority to decide whether the Order claims the monument or not?
 - Not resolved whether that would be CinC, COA, or National Encampment
 - CinC will therefore remain noncommittal in any discussions with outside agencies in order to
 preclude inadvertently usurping a National Encampment decision.
- Question: What is GSA's intent?
 - Could GSA be trying to prevent getting sued by SUVCW if they do something?
 - If we claim it, what would GSA do or direct us to do? What should we communicate to GSA?
- Best / worst case results for SUVCW:
 - Worst case bankruptcy if the Order is forced to respond to any lawsuits.
 - Most likely case GSA directs SUVCW to move it or to pay for its restoration and maintenance.
 Possible \$100K+ in cost
 - Best case no consensus
 - CinC Paquette noted that the City of Richmond KY is building a park to Kit Carson's honor and would like to have the monument. Question: Can we see if Richmond would want it, and if so would they be willing/able to defray moving costs?

Actions:

- CinC will open a careful dialogue with GSA.
- CinC will reach out to Richmond KY.
- CinC will keep Dept Commanders of SW and KY involved.

3. Directed Fund Raising.

Background: Should the National Organization establish guidelines on directed fundraising or allow Depts to do it on their own? A brief discussion

A brief discussion included the following points:

- Question: Would a National Policy directed at the National Organization only, or would it apply to Departments and Camps?
- How a Dept raises funds is up to Depts and Camps as long as they don't break the law.
- There is some desire to put a framework in place that allows flexibility at the Dept level.
- Most other organizations have policies in place that set limits and caps.
- PCinC Pahl remarked that some directed donations may not be tax deductible, due to telling a charitable organization what to do with the funds.
- It was noted that a national policy is not prescriptive as is a National Regulation

There was no consensus reached on this; however, the discussion served to make COA members aware of the complexities of such a policy.

Further discussion was deferred until Brother Frail is available to present the proposal he's working on

4. DUVCW Little Brown Buttons (follow up).

Background: CinC Paquette recently received a letter from the LGAR National President demanding that the SUVCW have a third party destroy any remaining buttons in our possession.

There was a brief discussion on this topic.

Motion by PCinC Pierson: COA authorize CinC to destroy the LBBs in a manner at his discretion and document it appropriately. Seconded by Brother Reineke. Vote: Passed 7 yea - 0 nay.

5. Document Retention Schedule.

Brother Frail submitted a proposal, structured as a proposed amendment to National Regulations, not National Policy, therefore it needs to go to C&R Committee, not COA.

Further discussion was deferred until Brother Frail is available to discuss the topic.

6. Computer and Backup Capability at National HQ.

CinC Paquette reported on behalf of Brother Demmy that the hard drove of the backup computer is failing. This has the impact that the intern who has been using it to scan in documents will soon be unable to continue scanning.

In addition, it was reported that Brother Demmy's primary computer is running very slowly. An examination revealed that this computer is getting backups pushed to it from the second computer.

One or two new computers may be needed. CinC Paquette had confirmed with Brother Beard that there are contingency National HQ funds available (\$4,000).

PCinC Freshley suggested that HQ consider utilizing Network Accessible Storage (NAS) to preserve the data vs backing up between the devices.

Action: CinC to direct the Comm & Tech Committee to evaluate the computers and make a recommendation on replacement or refurbishment.

Motion by Brother Hall: Allocate up to \$4,000 for new computers. Seconded by Brother Millburn. Vote: Passed 7 yea -0 nay.

7. Dept Encampment Schedule

The Department Encampment schedule was reviewed to fill current vacancies. There are still a few open Encampments.

8. Special Order. Board of Inquiry Dept of CO & WY.

CinC explained that reason for the special order is that he has received complaints from multiple camps within the Department. In good conscience the CinC could no longer ignore the situation or depend upon the Department to resolve the matter. The Board of Inquiry will determine if the complaints can be substantiated or not. PCinC Darby is the Chairman of the Board of Inquiry.

9. Good of the Order

PCinC Pahl reported that Michigan's National Encampment Website is up and the hotel is open for reservations.

PCinC Pierson provided a brief update on the National Encampment Streamers and polled the COA on a few design elements. Further report to come at the Springfield COA meeting in April.

PCinC Day reported that he had drafted a "Draping of the Charter Ceremony" for departed brothers based upon one used in the Department of the Chesapeake and other organizations and will send it to P&P for consideration whether to incorporate it into the Ritual & Ceremonies.

CinC Paquette stated that he will conduct one more virtual COA meeting before Springfield COA meeting

National Chaplain Jerry Kowalski provided a Closing Benediction

CinC Paquette closed the meeting at 2005.

Discussion Topics:

- 1. Recap of Department Encampment coverage (CinC Paquette)
- 2. Lincoln Memorial 100th Anniversary 22 May 2022 in Washington, D.C. (CinC Paquette)
 - a. Brother Kevin Martin volunteered to be the SUVCW National representative.
- Travel Reimbursement Discussion. (CinC Paquette) It was noted that travel costs are rising to the point where the current reimbursement cap is not adequate for air travel. There is a \$750 cap for each travel event to represent the CinC. It was noted that the cap is set by the COA and therefore can change by a vote.
 - a. In the annual budget, \$15K is set for CinC travel, \$5K set for National Secretary, National Treasurer, National QM, and Banner Editor travel, and \$6K set for other Brothers' travel.
 - b. ACTION: Brother Beard to provide data on past travel expenses to be presented at the Springfield COA meeting.
 - c. CinC tasked COA members to consider this topic for further discussion at the Springfield COA meeting. The COA will determine if a change is needed so that it can be included in next year's budget.

4. P&P Topics (Brother Frail)

a. The "About the SUVCW" information document was recommended for adoption. PCinC Day read the text. Numerous minor administrative amendments were offered. As this was a committee recommendation no motion was required. Vote: Passed, 10 for – 0 against.

- b. Records Retention guidance was recommended to C&R for review. This would require a change to the CC&R, most notably adding a new section 6 to include records not previously addressed for retention. The topic was discussed in detail, including how the period for retaining certain records was determined (rationale was to comply with the US Tax Code). No action was taken on this recommendation, and it was deferred to the Springfield COA meeting.
 - i. Of note, Retention guidance for Form 2A and the annual Credentials Report was discussed in great detail. Currently, obsolete credentials cards are stored at the National HQ, taking up space. It was offered that the cards themselves do not need to be retained. It was observed that the annual credentials report is included in the proceedings of the National Encampment and should only be retained until the proceedings are published.
- c. The Electronic Meeting policy was recommended for adoption. Electronic meetings were approved at the 2021 National Encampment; this policy was drafted in order to comply with the newly adopted Regulations to provide key guidance on how electronic meetings are to be publicized and conducted. CinC Paquette noted that it was imperative to publish guidance so it would be available for upcoming Department Encampments. It was noted there was one typo to be corrected. Vote: Passed, 9 for 1 against.
- d. The Treasurer's Handbook was recommended for adoption (specifically that P&P had no objection to it). Brother Beard had revised the handbook and had thought it is within his authority to publish. Brother PCinC Day, acting in his capacity as National Counselor, offered his opinion that in past practice, this has not gone before the COA for approval; and that it is within the purview of the National Treasurer to provide guidance to Departments and Camps. CinC Paquette ruled that Brother Beard is cleared to publish the handbook.
- e. Fundraising Campaign Structure request (follow-up discussion from the last COA meeting). Brother Frail asked for the COA to decide whether to adopt a "Corps" or "Rank" naming construct. PCinC Pierson moved for a rank structure; seconded by Brother Hall. Vote: Passed, 10 for 0 against.
- f. Assistant National Executive Director (ANED) position was presented. CinC Paquette noted up front that this will be discussed at the Springfield COA meeting but that some discussion was needed at this time to clarify the topic. The topic was closely coupled with the intern position at the National HQ, and at times the two were apparently conflated during the discussion.
 - ANED. Brother Frail stated that this position would manage the intern. PCinC Pahl's email concerns were read, (1) that the position would not be a member of the Order, and (2) there is a fiscal concern about paying anything other than reimbursement.

- ii. Intern. The intern contract expires at the end of May 2022, two months prior to the next fiscal year, thus leaving a funding gap. At the Springfield COA meeting, it must be decided whether to continue the position next year and if so, include funding for the position in next year's budget.
 - It was also observed that the intern was funded by a directed donation, and that a decision needs to be made in that regard (to include developing a policy on directed donations for the SUVCW, which has been in discussion for a couple of years).
 - 2. Clarification was needed regarding the terms of the directed donation currently being used to fund the intern: specifically, if remaining funds could be used to pay the intern past May and until the new budget was approved. ACTION: SVCinC Frail was tasked to retrieve the email received from the intern's position anonymous donor to determine if payment terms had been specified in the email.

5. New Business:

- a. Capital Campaign. CinC Paquette asked when it will be launched. Brother Beard replied at the next National Encampment. PCinC Day asked that a proposal be presented at the Springfield COA meeting. ACTION to Brother Frail to draft the proposal.
- b. Upcoming National Encampments:
 - i. 2023, Nashua NH
 - ii. 2024, KY has a bid
- c. Promotion & Marketing Committee asked for funding to place an insert in the Banner to update the membership on fundraising. The cost is \$1K per issue. There are funds set aside in the committee's budget. CinC Paquette determined the committee did not need to request funding as sufficient funding existed in the committee's budget.
- Banner Editor, PCinC Pahl, reminded all that the deadline for the next issue of the Banner is 15 March.
- 6. Good of the Order
 - The National Signals Officer obtained the password for the QM website and multiple updates to the website.
 - b. Drupal Connect continues to make progress on the new National website. The goal is to launch it by the National Encampment.
 - c. The cost of integrating the QM website into the National website is being investigated.
 - d. Brother Lyon informed the COA of the new Department of Illinois Stephenson Memorial Committee and the work they are doing.
 - e. PCinC Day is working on the 2023 National Encampment contract with the ASUVCW.

- CinC Paquette announced the establishment of a CinC appointed special committee to investigate membership qualifications.
- g. CinC Paquette announced that he has received the materials from the Board of Inquiry regarding the Dept of CO & WY.

Benediction was given by Chaplain Jerry.

Conversation and history of Springfield Events by Robert M Petrovic, PDC, Committee Chairman

- We started with the Death Day Association, whose event was always on April 15, no matter which day of the week that fell on which caused low attendance on weekdays
- In 2007, when Jim Pahl was Commander-in-Chief, the 15th fell on a Sunday. He informed the Chairman of the Death Day Association that Sunday violates national policy, but the Chairman refused to move it to Saturday. Commander-in-Chief Pahl then dissolved the association, recontacted MOLLUS, and put us back in charge.
- Bob took over organizing the event in 2010. The job description for the Lincoln Tomb Chairman was updated and we completed a Memorandum of Understanding between the SUVCW and MOLLUS.
- During Bob's first 3 years, a bus was supplied for a roundtrip to the tomb and back to the hotel for the luncheon, followed by a roundtrip to Petersburg. Due to Extremely low ridership, the cost (\$700-\$800) could not be justified and this was discontinued.
- Starting 2021, due to Covid-19 concerns, we were not allowed to use the steps in front of Lincoln's Tomb for the wreath laying event. That is why we now allow an individual one at a time to present of a wreath with a photo opportunity.
- This year, there were several issues with the President Abraham Lincoln Springfield DoubleTree Hotel. Since we may owe the hotel
 additional funds, the CinC asked Bob to attend the meeting. Bob shared some details:
 - a. Our last hotel contact made themselves available throughout our event just in case we needed anything. Our new hotel contact is not responsive to our questions and concerns and left on Friday afternoon, never to be seen again.
 - b. When we received our contract, the three (3) luncheon options (all with different rates) were now all being charged at the highest rate.
 - c. Multiple people were told there were no more rooms available. No one contacted Bob to inform him we did not have any more rooms (which was not true). A few people were also told that the room rate would not be honored. [We ended up one (1) room short of the 80% minimum room requirement]. Bob will work with the hotel to eliminate any additional fees.
 - d. Commander-in-Chief Paquette did indicate that we did meet our food and beverage quotas.
 - e. We have two (2) more years on our contract with this hotel. To prevent these issues in the future, we need to do the following three (3) things:
 - [ACTION: Update the Job Description for this committee in the C&R for to include a change that when this event falls on Easter, that the committee can change the date to either one week prior to or one week after Easter]. **Commander-in-Chief Paquette has already informed MOLLUS of this change to which they had no objection**
 - 2. [ACTION: Update the language in our agreement with MOLLUS to reflect the change above].
 - The committee is exploring the possibility of selecting a new hotel after the current contract expires. A new Ramada Hotel with a Banquet Center is offering better room rates.
- This year, there was an abundance of last-minute requests to present wreaths. Bob did not have assistance to register them. [ACTION: Motion 1 by Sr. Vice Commander-in-Chief Bruce Frail to charge a late fee for unregistered wreaths, seconded by Brother Beard. Amended to remove the fees and allow all Organizations to register wreaths on the day of the event. Passed, S for -0 against].

Executive Session started 7:40 pm, closed 8:27 pm

Recommendation by Brother Bobby Welch to approve changes to the Form 5

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- The document handed out contains the same information that was presented at the Gettysburg CofA meeting, just better organized
- PCinC Don Darby has an issue with the "Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal"
- Will create an Email Tree to the membership that an updated version of this document is available
- No vote was taken. Will have one more meeting with an electronic vote prior to the Encampment.
- Medals received prior to these changes are grandfathered. Qualified people are also eligible to receive them now if requested.

- Commander-in-Chief Michael Paquette appointed Kevin L. Martin, PDC for the purpose of this meeting of capturing the minutes and other responsibilities normally performed by the National Secretary.

[ACTION: Motion 3 by CofA member Harry Reineke - The Commander-in-Chief requests the CofA to grant permission to exercise summary discipline pursuant National Regulations Chapter 5, Article 6, Section 17a, that upon the approval of the CofA, the complaint stands as formally filed and the Sr. Vice Commander-in-Chief is to proceed by the National Regulations Chapter 5, Article 6, Section 17b, it is ordered that the membership of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) that Eric D. Richhart, PDC of the Department of Colorado/Wyoming is hereby suspended and is not to be present at or participate in any function of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War at any level; 2) Disobedience of the Constitution, Bylaws, Rules & Regulations and Policies or other lawful orders of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War; 3) Conduct unbecoming of a Brother and his relation to the Order; 4) Conduct prejudicial to good order and discipline per the of the Board of Inquiry report. Seconded by Brother Hall. Passed, 7 for - 1 abstained (SVCinC Frail)].

Add jj for Disciplinary Proceedings which must be retained until a licensed attorney reviews it and not less than the Statute limitations. Form 7 does not need to be retained. Change j (Form 10), k (Form 11), and m (Form 13) to three (3) years. Change n (Form 17) to

Recommendations

- I would like to see Space Cadet added to the Form 7. [ACTION: Change "Space Cadet" to Space Force Cadet" and add the Form 7]
- On the Department Patriotic instructors report (Form 41) Line 17 says did you actively support the JROTC/ROTC Cadet program...the last two
 boxes are blacked out for Hours and amount. I would like to see these two boxes opened so camps can report the hours invested and then
 calculate the amount equivalent to dollars as demonstrated above. These forms turned in to be forwarded to the ROTC chairman each year
 to be tallied and written into the ROTC officer yearly report for National Records in case we are ever audited by the IRS for our tax-exempt
 status. [ACTION: Un-blackout the boxes. Ask to not fill in the amount]
- I received a request for medals from previous years. [ACTION: Motion 5 by Council Member Joe Hall to not provide ROTC medals for
 past years, seconded by Brother Lyon. Passed, 8 for 0 against]

6.27 Department of Southwest, John R. Conrad, DC

Recommendation

We recommend that Form 30 Line 5 (Change of Status) be amended to include a box to check for of Dual Status; currently, that has to be written in by hand. Camp Annual Report Form 27 has such a line (14) for noting loss by Termination of Dual Status. [ACTION: P&P approved - Commander-in-Chief Paquette will add it to the Form 27]

PCinC Mark Day brought up discussion on Scholarship donation

The deadline has passed and they have four (4) people. Unless there is a recommendation from the committee that all four (4) are qualified, we are not going to give away four (4) this year. Hopefully we get at least two (2). The guidance from the Commander-in-Chief to the committee is, since there is additional money this year, the committee has the option to awarding none, one (1), two (2), three (3), or four (4). Normally they can go from zero (0) up to two (2). The criteria are to not give away four (4) just because we have the money, rather have the committee determine, based on the quality of the applications this year as compared with other past years, we have a standard for providing the award. If we do not have at least two (2), we will need to go back to the donor to see if they are willing to extend it another year. Otherwise, we will need to return it.

Directed Fund Raising

Background: Should the National Organization establish guidelines on directed fundraising or allow Depts to do it on their own?

A brief discussion included the following points:

- Question: Would a National Policy directed at the National Organization only, or would it apply to Departments and Camps?
- How a Dept raises funds is up to Depts and Camps as long as they don't break the law.
- There is some desire to put a framework in place that allows flexibility at the Dept level.
- Most other organizations have policies in place that set limits and caps.
- PCinC Pahl remarked that some directed donations may not be tax deductible, due to telling a charitable organization what to do with the funds.
- It was noted that a national policy is not prescriptive as is a National Regulation

[ACTION: The P&P committee is working with Brothers Jim Pahl and Mike Beard]

Draping of the Charter Ceremony

PCinC Day reported that he had drafted a "Draping of the Charter Ceremony" for departed brothers based upon one used in the Department of the Chesapeake and other organizations and will send it to P&P for consideration whether to incorporate it into the Ritual & Ceremonies.

[ACTION: Deferred to the National Encampment]

Travel Reimbursement Discussion (CinC Paquette)

It was noted that travel costs are rising to the point where the current reimbursement cap is not adequate for air travel. There is a \$750 cap for each travel event to represent the CinC. Brother Beard provided the following data on past travel expenses from page 6 of the Report packet:

- Issues to consider:
 - Is the per trip ceiling of \$750 sufficient?
 - Is the \$6,000 budget sufficient?
 - What happens if we exceed the budget?
- a. For trips exceeding \$750 for a representative to travel, the CinC has the option to cover the overage from his own budget that does not have a ceiling
- b. In the annual budget, \$15K is set for CinC travel, \$5K set for National Secretary, National Treasurer, National QM, and Banner Editor travel, and \$6K set for other Brothers' travel.

[NO ACTION REQUIRED]

P&P Topics (Brother Frail)

- a. The "About the SUVCW" information document was recommended for adoption. PCinC Day read the text. Numerous minor administrative amendments were offered. As this was a committee recommendation no motion was required. Vote: Passed, 10 for - 0 against.
- [ACTION: Closed] b. The Electronic Meeting policy was recommended for adoption. Electronic meetings were approved at the 2021 National Encampment; this policy was drafted in order to comply with the newly adopted Regulations to provide key guidance on how electronic meetings are to be publicized and conducted. CinC Paquette noted that it was imperative to publish guidance so it would be available for upcoming Department Encampments. It was noted there was one typo to be corrected.
- Vote: Passed, 9 for 1 against. [ACTION: Need input from Virtual Meetings committee] c. The Treasurer's Handbook was recommended for adoption (specifically that P&P had no objection to it). Brother Beard had revised the handbook and had thought it is within his authority to publish. Brother PCinC Day, acting in his capacity as National Counselor, offered his opinion that in past practice, this has not gone before the COA for approval; and that it is within the purview of the National Treasurer to provide guidance to Departments and Camps. [ACTION: Closed]
- CinC Paquette ruled that Brother Beard is cleared to publish the handbook. d. Fundraising Campaign Structure request (follow-up discussion from the last COA meeting). Brother Frail asked for the COA to decide whether to adopt a "Corps" or "Rank" naming construct. PCinC Pierson moved for a rank structure; seconded by Brother Hall
- Vote: Passed, 10 for 0 against. [ACTION: Closed] e. Assistant National Executive Director (ANED) position was offered to volunteers of the Organization none came forward. The intern contract expires at the end of May 2022, two priors prior to the next fiscal year, thus leaving a funding gap. At the Springfield COA meeting, it must be decided whether to continue the position next year and if so, include funding for the position in next year's budget
 - 1. It was also observed that the intern was funded by a directed donation, and that a decision needs to be made in that regard (to include developing a policy on directed donations for the SUVCW, which has been in discussion for a couple of years).
 - 2. Clarification was needed regarding the terms of the directed donation currently being used to fund the intern: specifically, if remaining funds could be used to pay the intern past May and until the new budget was approved. Most interns are not paid.
 - 3. Where do we get the money other than raising the per capita (\$2) or suspending the Preservation fund? [ACTION: SVCinC Frail was tasked to retrieve the email received from the intern's position anonymous donor to determine if payment terms had been specified in the email. Followup – no terms were specified in the email.] [<u>ACTION</u>: Need to advertise the sub-contractor position of Assistant Executive Director or give Susan 1" chance] [<u>ACTION</u>: Need a virtual meeting to continue the budgeting discussion]
- f. Capital Campaign. CinC Paquette asked when it will be launched. Brother Beard replied at the next National Encampment. ACTION: Brother Frail to draft the proposal [NO ACTION TAKEN]

2022 SPRING CofA REPORTS

- 1. 3.6 National Civil War Memorials Officer, Walter E. Busch, PDC, pages 9-10
 - RECOMMENDATION 1: We need information left on the monument files so we contact people. Letterheads, bid estimates, photos, etc. are all information needed by us and should be left. So too are e-mail addresses to a general contact for an organization. However, we need to redact information on the old forms that contain contact information for members. [Personally, my information is so out there on the web, I really don't care about redacting mine, but I know a story about a monument to start this off. It's short. Louisiana, Missouri, use to have a monument to Senator/Major General Frank Blair in front of their hospital. They have a large GAR monument in Riverview Cemetery to the 6 men of the area who were executed during the Civil War. Apparently 2 Union monuments aren't allowed in the town. I have been checking into if there ever was a Blair monument in Louisiana and if there was, what happened to it. This March I found out. I was speaking to a man who use to be journalist in the town. He reported to me that it had been cut down and thrown into the Mississippi River. Such vandalism is why we need good documentation of monuments.
- RECOMMENDATION 2: We need information left on the monument files so we contact people. Letterheads, bid estimates, photos, etc. are all information needed by us and should be left. So too are e-mail addresses to others are concerned.] Therefore, I recor that, if we must reduct, only 1 method of contacting a member be left on forms previously submitted. Normally, the form has Name, Address, E-Mail and Phone No. I recommend that all information except name and address be redacted; unless the only information provided is an e-mail or phone number. We must have some way to contact the person filling out the form in case there are questions by other researchers. Name and address would be the least hacked. All they can do with that is send someone junk snail-mail. Once a decision is made as to what information is to be redacted. I will amend the forms and submit them for approval. Also, several hundred ready to go on-site once I know if we are going to redact or not, and if so what will we redact. [ACTION: Assigned to Communications and Technology]
- 2. 4.16 National Committee on Scholarships, Donald L. Martin, PCinC, pages 25-26 RECOMMENDATION 1: Scholarships: Change C&R Section 15, 2c: to read:

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The committee shall evaluate, the applications and select and recommend to the Commander-in-Chief the applicant or applicants (consistent with the number of scholarships available) for the scholarship awarding. of the scholarships, providing supporting information. Recommendations shall be determined by the number of individuals with distinctive records of performance as demonstrated in the committee's evaluation criteria and the number of available scholarships. Recommendations need not match the number of available scholarships, but cannot exceed that number.

Doing so shall ensure that there is no ambiguity regarding NSCC cadets/midshipmen being eligible for receiving the SUVCW ROTC/JROTC Award. [See attached Army Form 3126_1 (contract) demonstrating that NSCC must meet the same rigorous standards as JROTC] [ACTION: Assigned to P&P]

The way we use to conduct business of exchanging discussions, making motions, and other things via email is supposedly in conflict now with needing to be simultaneous. When doing a Zoom session, everyone is participating in the dialog at the same time and according to both John and Loran, Roberts Rules of Order now with the addition of virtual, doesn't comply. The issue is you can't follow half the time the conversation of an email chain that is bouncing on and then someone starts another email chain over here and you lose track of who is responding to what part of the conversation. Whereas, if you are doing a Zoom meeting, you are participating in the live meeting and everyone is following the same conversation. [ACTION: Assigned to Jim Pahl]

4. Prior to the meeting, Treasurer Beard had submitted the following motion, along with his discussion of it, to be considered by the CofA. At this time Brother Beard offically made the motion, which was seconded by Brother Frail. The motion read as follows:

I move the Council of Administration fund the proposed Assistant Executive Director position using dividends and interest from the General Fund's Brokerage Account for the next three years starting when an Assistant is contracted and ending three budget years hence. At such time the Treasurer will report to the Council the status of the budget and recommend how to go forward with funding the Assistant Executive Director position.

Brother Russ: Moved to extend current licenses until Gettysburg CofA Meeting. Seconded by Pierson. Vote: For 11, opposed 0. Motion carried.

Brother Tucker stated he will be candidate for JVCinC at Nashua.

CofA was informed that Mark Hale, GA&SC will be candidate for CofA in 2023.

Brother McCoy would like the new Social Media distributed as soon as possible.

CinC Paquette. Kit Carson monument will be addressed to encampment.

3. **Computer and Backup Capability at National HQ**. Motion by Brother Hall, seconded by Brother Millburn: Allocate up to \$4,000 for new computers. **Vote**: Passed 7 yea -0 nay.

March 5, 2022, Meeting

4. **"About the SUVCW"** The "About the SUVCW" information document was recommended for adoption by the P&P Committee. Numerous minor administrative amendments were offered. As this was a committee recommendation no motion was required. Vote: Passed, 10 for -0 against.

5. Electronic Meeting Policy. The Electronic Meeting policy was recommended for adoption by the P&P Committee. Electronic meetings were approved at the 2021 National Encampment; this policy was drafted in order to comply with the newly adopted Regulations to provide key guidance on how electronic meetings are to be publicized and conducted. CinC Paquette noted that it was imperative to publish guidance so it would be available for upcoming Department Encampments. It was noted there was one typo to be corrected. Vote: Passed, 9 for – 1 against.

[NOTE: At the Springfield, Illinois, CofA meeting on April 16, 2022, it was moved by SVCinC Bruce Frail to undo the prior vote from the March Virtual Meeting, seconded by Brother Tucker. Vote: Passed, 8 for – 0 against.]

6. **Treasurer's Handbook**. The Treasurer's Handbook was recommended for adoption (specifically that P&P had no objection to it). At such time the Treasurer will report to the Council the status of the budget and recommend how to go forward with funding the Assistant Executive Director position." Motion was discussed by the CofA and voted upon. Vote: Passed, 10 for – 0 against.

9. Filling the Assistant Executive Director Position. The Council next addressed how best to fill the position. After much discussion, Brother Kevin Tucker moved the following motion which was seconded by Brother Hall. "Advertise the position to the brothers of the Order with a cutoff date of June 15. Position is to be filled by the National Encampment. Mike Beard to prepare input for special message to go out. Interview by CinC, SVCinC, and Executive Director with recommendation to CofA. The council is to approve the hiring of the Assistant Executive Director." Motion was discussed and voted upon. Vote: Passed, 8 for – 1 opposed.

10. Revised Forms for Approval. The following forms were submitted for approval by the P&P Committee.

a. Forms 40, 41, and 42: Un-blackened and added a field for Brothers to enter the number of hours spent supporting the JROTC program as requested by Daryl Ver Streate. This is row 17 on Forms 40, 41, and 42.

c. Form 30: Added a check box to line 5 to check when a Brother terminates his dual status, as requested by John Conrad.

Vote: All of the above forms passed, 10 for - 0 opposed.

It was moved by Brother Tucker to change the words "Department or Camp" to read "Department and Camp". Brother Pierson seconded the motion. The vote was 8 votes for the motion, and 0 votes opposed. Motion passed and is effective immediately.

Whereas, Lt. General Grant was a key player in the ultimate victory which saved the Union, and, Whereas, it is only proper that the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War support the proposed elevation in rank to General of the Army.

Therefore, the following is Ordered:

1. Department Commanders are hereby authorized under the provisions stated withing the SUVCW Lobbying Policy as found in General Order #14 Series 2020-2021, issued by PCinC Brian Pierson, to forward letters of support for the proposed Resolutions to the members of the House of Representatives and Senators from those states within their Departments.

2. This authority to Lobby is granted only to the Department Commander, who will speak as the representative of the SUVCW in his Department. Department Commanders are encouraged to consult with their membership on this matter, but the decision to support the Resolutions is solely at his discretion.

3. In accordance with GO #14 Series 2020-2021 (Lobbying) Department Commanders will file a report to the Commander-in-Chief in accordance with Paragraph 7 sub-paragraph b. This Order does not preclude the rights of Brothers acting as private citizens to communicate with their members of the House of Representatives and Senators, however they must not represent themselves as speaking for their SUVCW Camp, Department, or the National Organization. Additionally, in doing so as an individual, Brothers must not express their

connection by membership to the SUVCW.

4. It is Ordered that the following statement be noted on the Official Programs for all SUVCW events, ceremonies, and meetings, along with posting on any SUVCW website homepage and photo galleries: "Individuals attending events hosted by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, by virtue of their attendance, agree to the usage of their likeness in the Banner, any Camp or Department Newsletter, any SUVCW website and/or on any SUVCW Social Media outlet, promotional brochures, or any other SUVCW material".

5. It is further Ordered that no one shall post to any Social Media outlet and/or web site, or any other means of communication, any live or video recordings or selected video clips from any business sessions (including committee meetings) of a Camp, Department, or National Encampment, with an explicit exception of the presentation of awards or special recognitions. There shall be no prohibition against the posting of still photography during or after any such meeting. Addendum to General Order 11

NATIONAL ORGANIZATION SONS OF UNION VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR

IN RE Eric D. Richhart, PDC

Findings of the Hearing Council September 12, 2022

On or about June 10, 2022, a Hearing Council was duly convened by Brother Bruce D. Frail, PDC, under his authority as then Senior Vice Commander-In-Chief, pursuant to the order of then Commander-In-Chief Michael Paquette, in accordance with Chapter IV of the National Regulations, to hear evidence and make recommendations as the result of a complaint duly filed by CinC Paquette against Brother Eric D. Richhart, PDC, Department of Colorado/Wyoming. Brother Joe Hall, Department of Rhode Island, was appointed chairman of the council.

The Complaint

On April 22, 2022, CinC Paquette charged Brother Eric D. Richhart, PDC, Department of Colorado/Wyoming, with the following:

Count I

DISOBEDIENCE OF POLICIES OR LAWFUL ORDERS OF THE SUVCW, EMANATING FROM PROPER AUTHORITY

Specification 1: Fraudulently modifying the Thomas D. Osborne Camp 43, Department of Colorado and Wyoming Bylaws after they had been signed by the Camp's officers.

Specification 2: Using a signature page of a previous signed version of the Thomas D. Osborne Camp 43, as the signature page for a fraudulently modified version of the camp's Bylaws.

Specification 3: Attesting the signature of an individual not authorized to sign the modified Thomas D. Osborne Camp 43 Bylaws in violation of CC&R Article XIV, Bylaws Section 1.

Count II

CONDUCT UNBECOMING A BROTHER IN HIS RELATION TO THE ORDER

Specification 1: Repeated uncharitable correspondence with Brothers at the Camp level.

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Count III

CONDUCT PREJUDICIAL TO GOOD ORDER AND DISCIPLINE

Specification 1: Demeaning behavior with Camp Chapman Compliment #2 camp members resulting in the resignation of four camp officers.

Specification 2: Demeaning behavior with Camp Chapman Compliment #2 Camp members resulting in multiple members of the Camp terminating their membership in the SUVCW.

Specification 3: Intentionally misleading Brothers of the Camp Chapman Compliment #2 in stating that members residing within the confines of the Department could not belong to another Department.

The Hearing

Chairman Hall convened an organizational meeting of the council via Zoom on June 20, 2022. Thereafter, the council met via Zoom with the parties in attendance for the purpose of receiving additional evidence and in-person testimony of witnesses on July 11 th , July 25th , and August 8 th.

The council noted that, in accordance with commonly understood adjudication procedures throughout the nation, the burden of proving each of the charges fell to CinC Paquette as the complaining party.

CinC Paquette first presented the case against Brother Richhart, referring to various documents filed with the council which included national, departmental and camp policies, bylaws and other governance documents. He also directed the council's attention to various emails and written correspondence likewise filed with the council. Brother Richhart was given the opportunity to cross-examine and question the evidence placed before the council by CinC Paquette. The council asked questions and received answers to its satisfaction from the CinC.

Brother Richhart then presented his case, which included the testimony via Zoom of several brothers from the Department of Colorado/Wyoming. CinC Paquette was permitted to cross-examine the witnesses and the evidence placed before the council by Brother Richhart. The council asked questions and received answers to its satisfaction from the witnesses and Brother Richhart. Brother Richhart concluded his portion of the case at the council meeting on August 8, 2022. The council then took the case under advisement.

The council also reviewed Chapter IV of the National Regulations and Article XIV of the National Charter, Constitution and Regulations.

The council met to discuss and make a determination of each of the charges of the complaint via Zoom on September 12, 2022.

The Council's Findings

Count I, Specification 1:

Held: Not guilty. The council believed Brother Richhart's unrefuted testimony that his department commander had directed him to make the modifications that were made, so could not find that his actions were fraudulent.

Count I, Specification 2:

Held: Not guilty. The council believed Brother Richhart's unrefuted testimony that his department commander had directed him to make the modifications that were made, so could not find that his actions were fraudulent.

Count I, Specification 3:

Held: Guilty. The council found that Brother Richhart—who was serving as the Department Secretary at the time—technically did not attest to any signature, because he admitted in his testimony that he "attested to" an unsigned approval form [Exhibit 5, p. 9]. Further, Article XIV of the CC&R did not require him to attest to the department commander's signature approving any camp bylaws. However, since he chose to attest to the approval, his execution of the unsigned bylaws approval form was a violation of the spirit of the regulation, because his attestation served as a verification in writing to a reader that the commander actually did sign the form confirming that he had approved the camp bylaws and found them to be in compliance with department bylaws and the National Constitution and Regulations—which he clearly did not do.

Count II, Specification 1:

Held: Not guilty. The council saw only one piece of correspondence that it agrees was "uncharitable". [Exhibit 22] While Brother Richhart testified that Exhibit 22 was a personal letter sent in response to an uncharitable and personal accusation and argued that it was, therefore, not relevant, the fact that he used the title PDC after his name in that letter tended to make it department business. However, since this was the only correspondence presented to the council, and since the word "repeated" is used in the specification, the council could not find that his actions violated the regulation.

Count III, Specification 1:

Held: Not guilty. The council heard no testimony concerning Brother Richhart's behavior that showed that his behavior ever sank to the level of "demeaning." Further, his department commander testified that he was unaware of any such behavior that sank to that level.

Count III, Specification 2:

Held: Not guilty. The council heard no testimony concerning Brother Richhart's behavior that showed that his behavior ever sank to the level of "demeaning." Further, his department commander testified that he was unaware of any such behavior that sank to that level.

Count III, Specification 3:

Held: Not guilty. The council believed Brother Richhart's testimony that he never intentionally misled any brother about dual membership across two departments. After hearing

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the testimony and reviewing the exhibits, the council was convinced this was a simple misunderstanding.

The Council's Recommendation

Having found Brother Richhart guilty on only one specification of one count, it recommends that his administrative suspension be immediately lifted and he be given a reprimand for attesting a blank form without witnessing the Department Commander's signature, as it was his duty as Department Secretary to do so, having chosen to so attest.

You may appeal this decision in writing within 30 days of receipt of this notice. The appeal must be filed in writing with the Commander-in-Chief. Failure to appeal within the 30 days will terminate your right to appeal.

Reactivation of the Special Committee to Reorganize the National Regulations

It has recently been discovered that Chapter V, Article I, Section 3 of the 2013 National Regulations, containing six definitions, was not transferred into the reorganized 2014 National Regulations. The Reorganization of the National Regulations was approved during the 133rd National Encampment in 2014.

After the Reorganization to the National Regulations was approved, PCinC James Pahl moved "that the Special Committee be discharged with the provision that in the event that it's discovered that items existing in the National Regulations did not get transferred into the reorganized format, the Commander-in-Chief be empowered to reactivate the Committee for the sole purpose of incorporating such language into the reorganized format that upon approval of the National Counselor and the National Committee on Constitution and Regulations such language can be inserted into the published Constitution and Regulations". The motion carried.

Therefore, pursuant to the authority granted me by the 133rd National Encampment, the Special Committee to Reorganize the National Regulations is hereby reactivated for the sole purpose of incorporating Chapter V, Article I, Section 3 of the 2013 National Regulations into the current reorganized format and upon approval of the National Counselor and the National Committee on Constitution and Regulations the language be inserted into the currently published Charter, Constitution and Regulations of the Order.

The committee will consist of the original chairman, James Pahl, PCinC, with the following original committee members: Don Darby, PCinC; Don Martin, PCinC; Alan Russ, PDC; and Bob Wolz, PDC.

Attendance at SUVCW Camp, Department, and National Organization Meetings

By the authority vested in me as Commander-in-Chief of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, the National Charter, Constitution and Regulations, and National Policies, and supported by a formal opinion issued by the National Counselor; who reviewed the language contained in Chapter I Article IV Section 3, Chapter II Article III Section 3, and Chapter III Article III Section 6 of the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations found that further direction regarding actions to be taken in the case of the suspension or dishonorable removal of a member from an Allied Order who remains in good standing in another Allied Order was warranted. Therefore, the following is hereby ordered:

A member of the Woman's Relief Corps, Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War 1861-1865, or the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War who has been suspended or dishonorably removed from that Order shall not be allowed to attend Camp, Department, or National Organization meetings of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War while representing themselves as a member of the Order which has suspended or dishonorably removed them. Conversely, that person shall be allowed to attend Camp, Department, or National Organization meetings of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, if they represent themselves as a member of another Allied Order in which they are a member in good standing.

Age Qualification for Candidates Seeking Election as National Officers

A Brother of the Order requested a formal opinion from the National Counselor regarding the eligibility of a member, who is currently 15 years of age and therefore a minor in all 50 states of the Union, to run for the office of National Quartermaster.

After consulting the Charter, Constitution and Regulations of the Order Chapter III Article VIII (Officer Job Descriptions & Duties) Section 7, Chapter III Article IX (Finances) Section 9, Sub section (c), Chapter V (General Regulations) Article III (Bonds), General Order #22 series 2013-2014, Proceedings of the 2014 National Encampment pages 86-88, the current Sons of Union Veterans or the Civil War Policy regarding Minors, and the Federal Fair Labor Act, the National Counselor determined that "as an organization it is incumbent on us to ensure the proper stewardship and leadership expected by the brothers of the Order. As the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations are silent on the matter of an age requirement for National Officer; it is within the power of the Commander-in-Chief to provide clarification and direction in this matter. Based on the research and findings herein, any petitioner desiring to candidacy as a National Officer should be disqualified unless the individual has met the age of 21 years at the time the petition for candidacy is presented."

Therefore, by the authority vested in me as Commander-in-Chief of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War and supported by a formal opinion issued by the National Counselor the following is hereby ordered:

Any Brother seeking election as a National Officer shall be disqualified if he has not met the age of 21 years at the time the of his election.

Dress Code for National Encampments

Per Chapter III, Article III, Section 1 footnote 67 of the National Charter, Constitution and Regulations "Brothers should take care to ensure their dress is appropriate to the occasion, such as business attire. This particularly applies to officers at their stations and those seated adjacent to and in front of the Altar during business meetings of National Encampments. This means jacket, tie, long pants and (membership) medal. Jackets may be removed to prevent over heating but should be present. The Guide, Color Bearer and Guard may wear uniforms."

By the authority vested in me as Commander-in-Chief of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, the National Charter, Constitution and Regulations the following is hereby ordered:

While attending any business session of the National Encampment all Brothers in attendance shall be in appropriate male business attire. This attire shall be as stipulated by General Order #3, Series 2016-2017 to include jacket, tie, long pants and membership badge. Jackets may be removed to prevent over heating but should be present. Brothers may optionally wear uniforms patterned after United States Armed Forces uniforms 1861-1865 or the current National Encampment polo shirt and long pants if a polo shirt is made available by the National Encampment Host Committee. Membership badges shall also be worn on uniforms and the National Encampment polo shirt regardless of what may be embroidered on the polo shirt.

Meritorious Service Award with Gold Star Awarded to Roderick Fraser

The Commander in Chief and Council of Administration, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, take great pleasure in presenting the Meritorious Service Award with Gold Star to Brother Roderick Fraser, of the Department of Massachusetts.

For Meritorious Achievement in the superior performance in the accomplishment of the Ideals and Principles of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War during the period of 9 September 2016 until 18 May 2022, Brother Roderick Fraser of the Department of Massachusetts. Since becoming a member of the SUVCW in September of 2016, Brother Fraser, a retired Naval Surface Warfare Officer, Commander of the USS Underwood during Operation Iraqi Freedom, and former City of Boston Fire Commissioner from 2006 to 2014, has dedicated himself to this organization, and has gone above and beyond his duty as a member to strengthen and improve the Order.

In his first year as a member, Brother Fraser revived the Department of Massachusetts newsletter, The Clarion Call, which he continues to edit and publish. He also maintains the Department electronic mailing list and conducts mass mailing for the Department facilitating communication within the Department.

Brother Fraser initiated and coordinated the Department's sponsorship of the Massachusetts History Bowl State Championship for high school students, advancing recruiting and branding for the Order.

He was a member of the Encampment Host Committee for the 2018 National Encampment in Framingham, Massachusetts, where, as some may remember, he provided the gigantic federal flag used as background at the head table. This added greatly to the patriotic atmosphere at the 2018 National Encampment. This flag was a gift from his men upon his retirement from military service.

Brother Fraser initiated and continues to coordinate and raise funds for a major ongoing project to restore the General Charles Russell Lowell GAR Post No. 7 burial plot at Mount Hope

538 Copyright 2023 Sons Of Union Veterans Of The Civil War, A Congressionally Chartered Corporation Cemetery in Boston. The project includes the straightening and cleaning of federal headstones, repairing vandalism on the plot's granite curbing and decorations, restoring two artillery pieces and their bases, which are on static display. This project has given Brother Fraser, his Camp and the SUVCW great recognition among Boston city officials, local Veterans groups and the local community.

Brother Fraser has referred 10 Brothers for Membership in the SUVCW, in both Massachusetts and Rhode Island, where he is a dual Member. He continues recruiting efforts among members of military and hereditary groups to which he belongs, such as the Sons of the American Revolution and Massachusetts Military Society.

Brother Rod is a graduate of the SUVCW's Memorial University and has authored a Camp Secretary's Handbook for the National Organization, which is under review by the National Secretary. In this way, he uses his education and communication skills to lead and teach others within the Order.

He is the cofounder and current Camp Commander of the Col. Robert Gould Shaw Camp No. 54 in Boston, Massachusetts, and was also the author of the Camp's initial By-laws. His organizational and communication skills are of great benefit to expanding the membership and conducting of the business of SUVCW.

Brother Rod found that the first African American Union Army Nurse was buried in Boston without any notation of her name and accomplishments. He conceived of, planned for, raised funding (through grant requests and lobbying for matching funds), procured and coordinated the erection and engraving of a monument for Susie Baker King Taylor, the Union Army's first African American Nurse, and had her name engraved on the headstone of the grave she shares with her husband. This work furthers the mission of the SUVCW, to honor all veterans and especially those who served from 1861 to 1865.

Brother Rod currently serves as the Department of Massachusetts Department Senior Vice Commander and is appointed to the National Promotions and Marketing Committee, where, among his other achievements, he initiated and maintains the SUVCW's YouTube Channel.

Brother Fraser is a member of the 1st Military District, Sons of Veterans Reserve, and serves as the District's Public Information Officer. His leadership and technical skills are a great asset to the Order and promotes the order on the internet.

This past year, Brother Fraser organized a dedication ceremony for the Susie Baker King Taylor monument, which included speeches by Commander-in-Chief Michael Paquette, Boston Mayor Kim Janey and Historian Rebecca Byrd. For the public, the ceremony is as important as the monument, as public recognition of those who served, regardless of race or sex, and inspires the current generation to do the same. And, with a good deal of media coverage, both on television and in print, it reinforces the SUVCW name and brand in the public's mind.

Brother Fraser is currently conducting video interviews with SUVCW members for the Order's,

"What Makes Us Brothers" video series on the SUVCW's YouTube channel. He is using his technical skill to promote Fraternity and inspire others to join our order.

Brother Fraser is coordinating 1st Military District SVR participation in the rededication of the Robert Gould Shaw 54th Massachusetts Monument in Boston, Massachusetts on June 1, which will include 54th Massachusetts Infantry reenactors, the Boston Children's Choir, and noted VIPs and speakers, such as US Vice President Harris and US Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III. This will be an historic event, and Brother Fraser is determined to include the SUVCW in the public celebration.

Mary Walker Award Presented to Sister Fran Hanchett, ASUVCW

The Commander in Chief, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, takes great pleasure in presenting the Dr. Mary Edwards Walker Award to Sister Fran Hanchett, Department of New England, Auxiliary to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.

Sister Hanchett discovered there were 100 Civil War veterans in New Hampshire cemeteries with no military information on their gravestones. After being informed that the federal government would not provide metal markers for these veterans, in 2013 Sister Hanchett initiated the Adopt a Civil War Veteran project in Lebanon, New Hampshire to raise the funds needed to the procure markers. She reached out to local communities and offered the opportunity to adopt specific graves. The SUVCW and ASUVCW also solicited donations towards this project by offering hot dogs, cider, and cookie bars at the rest area on I-91 at White River Junction allowing them to procure an additional 3 – 4 markers per year. As of 2018 only 25 gravesites remained to be marked.

Michael Shklar, PDC of the Department of New Hampshire stated the following: "Fran has been an inspiration to the SUVCW. She has worked tirelessly... Fran has done an amazing amount of work and is an inspiration to the organization. She has really given us the kind of public visibility we need to be able to increase our membership, increase our level of activity and form a bond in the community and surrounding areas. Thank you, Fran."

Opinions From The National Counselor

Commander-in-Chief Michael A. Paquette requested four Opinions during 2021-2022 from National Counselor Mark R. Day, PCinC.

Opinion #1

In response to a request from the Commander-in-Chief for an opinion regarding the attendance of members of the Allied Orders, who had been suspended or discharged from one Order but remained in good standing with another, at Meetings and Encampments of the SUVCW; the following is provided:

Research:

- 1. The following sections of the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations of the SUVCW were reviewed:
 - a. Chapter I Article IV Section 3, Chapter II Article III Section 3, and Chapter III Article III Section 6 of the Charter.

Findings: The language found in all three of the cited sections of the Constitution and Regulations was generic in nature and lacked any specific direction answering the questions posed by the Commander-in Chief. As the C&R lacked clarity on the issue of attendance by a member of an allied Order who was suspended from one Order but remained in good standing in another further clarification was warranted.

Opinion: It is recommended that the Commander-in-Chief using his authority as granted by the Charter, Constitution, and regulations take action to further delineate and define the regulations regarding the attendance of members of the Allied Order who are under suspension or discharge

from one or more Allied Orders but remains in good standing within another.

Opinion #2

In Response to a request for an opinion originating from Brother Bobby Welch of the Department of Illinois; regarding the following questions

- 1. Are Past Department Commander Honors awarded to a brother who resigned from that office without fully completing his elected term.
- 2. Is it the withing the preview of the Department Council reject the resignation of an elected officer which have bee4n communicated in writing stating that his resignation from that office is to take effect immediately?

Applicable sections of the C,C,&R pertaining to the above question #1

1. Chapter II Article II Membership Section 1(a).

The membership of the Department Encampment shall be constituted as follows: all Past Commanders-in-Chief, Past Department Commanders, and Past Camp Commanders, in good standing, who have served a full term or having been elected to fill a vacancy have served to the end of that term, the sitting Department Commander, and the sitting Camp Commanders. One delegate from each Camp, whatever its membership and one additional delegate for every ten Brothers, or major fraction thereof, based upon the report for the annual report next preceding the Encampment; and its own elective officers (except Aides). Any Brother serving as Camp Secretary or Camp Treasurer continuously in office for a period of ten years may have conferred upon him the rank of Past Camp Commander with its voting privileges at Department.

Opinion for Question #1

The section of the C&R above clearly states the requirements for being an honors delegate holding membership in the Department Encampment . Among those requirements is the completion of a full term of office states that the membership of a department encampment. <u>As</u> the brother resigned prior to the end of his term he clearly is not then entitled to the

Honors afforded a Past Department Commander (PDC) and should not receive either the badge of a PDC or the Honors which go with that rank.

Applicable sections of the C,C,&R pertaining to the above question #2

1. Chapter II Article VII, Section(s) 4 & 5

Section 4. Whenever an elected officer of the Department declares to the Department Council that he is unable to discharge the duties of his office, and until he declares to them the contrary, such duties shall be discharged by the appointment of a temporary officer serving in an Acting capacity, appointed by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Department Council. The temporary appointee shall have full authority and responsibilities of that office during the period served.

Opinion for Question #2

The section of the C&R which deals with the inability of an elected officer to complete his term contains no language that supports any action on the part of the Department Council other than the acceptance of the resignation of this officer in question. Only the person submitting the resignation could rescind it and his statement that the resignation was effective immediately left no doubt as to his desired outcome. The Department Council had no authority under the rules stated in our C,C,R to reject the resignation and should have meet immediately and acted to replace the resigning Department Commander.

Opinion #3

In answer to a letter from the Commander of the Department of Texas, which was forwarded to me by the Commander-in-Chief, regarding membership issues arising from the inadvertent omission of the definition of a blood relative in the 2014 through 2022 published versions of the Charter, Constitution, and Regulation Chapter V, Article 1. Section 3, I provide the following research and opinion.

Research:

- 1.0 Upon first learning of the issues brought forward by the department of Texas, I consulted with the Assistant Counselor for the Blue Book and confirmed that the following language had been omitted from Chapter V, Article I, Section 3: Definitions. "(a) For the purposes of administering Section 5 of the Articles of Incorporation, blood relative is defined as a direct descendant of a brother, sister, half-Brother, or half sister of a veteran. This definition section shall not apply to any brother admitted to membership prior to August 21, 1999"
- 2.0 An opinion by then National Counselor Richard Orr was found on page 162 of the 2008 Proceedings of the 127th National Encampment, which reads as follows:
 - 2.1 Opinion 8 Series 2007-2008

No one may be admitted to the SUVCW on the service of a cousin. The C&R and charter are very clear on this matter. The Regulations define collateral as being a direct descendant of a sibling of a veteran. While it is true that blood relative includes anyone with a common ancestor no matter who that common ancestor is, our charter also gives the Order the right to define membership and further limit it. The SUVCW originally only included the eldest son of a veteran. This was expanded to include all sons circa 1900 and further expanded to include collateral descendants in the early 1950's. (I am not providing exact dates as that material in buried in several boxes of historical data on the Sons.) Chapter V, Article I. Section 3: Definitions. (a) For purposes of administering Section 5 of the Articles of Incorporation, blood relative is defined as a direct descendent, or a direct descendant of a Brother, sister, half-Brother, or half-sister of a veteran." This definition section shall not apply to any Brother admitted to membership prior to August 21, 1999. The definition does not apply prior to adoption because some Brothers had been admitted as cousins preceding the adoption of this provision to clarify the long standing working definition of collateral. Anyone admitted as a cousin since that date is not a Member but an Associate and all restrictions on Associates apply. An error on the part of a camp in admitting a Brother as a member who does not meet these qualifications does not vacate the regulations. The status of such a Brother must be immediately changed and reported on the proper form to the Department and the Executive Director. The number of permitted associates in a camp still applies." Richard D. Orr, PCinC National Counselor 23 September 2007

3.0 A footnote relating to Brother Orr's opinion #8, which is labeled as footnote 21, appears on page 36 of the Charter Constitution and Regulations and is attached to Chapter I (Camps) Article II (Membership) Section 1, which reads as follows "The son of a person who was a cousin of a veteran, not eligible. NC Orr, Op 8, 127th, 162."

4.0 The following is taken from the proceedings of the 108th National; Encampment in 1999 page 29

James Pahl, Constitution and Regulations Committee Under Chapter V, general regulations, article 1, definitions, the definition of a blood relative be included for the purposes of interpreting section V of the Articles of Incorporation, a blood relative is hereby defined as being a direct or collateral descendent of a Union Veteran, as collateral is defined within these Regulations as uncle, not cousin. Moved and seconded Discussion. Richard Orr Proposes a grandfather amendment to this recently passed change, the grandfather clause means it is only operational from this day forward and has no bearing on those brought into the Order before its adoption.

Keith Harrison So moved. It is seconded.

More discussion. Commander-in-Chief Andrew M. Johnson

I call for a vote on the amendment to the Regulations. It passes.

Reasoning: Having reviewed the facts presented in the research of our records, it is evident that the intention of the 108th and 127th National Encampment was to limit full membership to only those with direct decent from a veteran of the Civil War. However, the omission of the definition of blood relative from the Charter Constitution and Regulation during the period from 2014 through 2022 may have created a situation where Brothers of the Order seeing no specific guidance in the regulations defining the blood relative requirement and not being fully cognizant

of the multiple and somewhat disjointed notes that are contained in footnote 21 to Chapter I, Article I, Section 1 could have admitted members who were not fully qualified.

Opinion: As a precedent had been established at the 108th National Encampment to grandfather in members who had not meet the criteria for full membership as a direct blood relative, and with evidence which points out that our Charter, Constitution and Regulations have not included the definition for blood relatives for the past eight (8) years, I believe it would be proper that a motion be made at the upcoming 141st National Encampment to allow anyone who has been brought into the Order after the 133rd Encampment in 2014, where the reorganized National Regulations were adopted, until the 141st National Encampment of 2022; who was admitted under a cousin to be Grandfathered into the Order, and that the definition / requirement of blood relative not be applied to such brothers.

Opinion #4

In response to a request by the Commander-in-Chief regarding the eligibility of a member, who is currently 15 years of age and therefore a minor in all 50 states of the Union, to run for the office of National Quartermaster.

Research:

I. The following sections of the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations are germane to the issue and apply to contractual powers and other fiduciary roles / duties assigned to the office of National Quartermaster

Chapter III Article VIII (officer Job descriptions & duties) Section 7

The National Quartermaster shall have the responsibility of maintaining an inventory of supplies, procuring sufficient inventory to meet the needs of the National Organization, the Departments, the Camps and the brothers and the filling of all orders for supplies. He shall receive payment for inventory sold and shall forward same to the National Treasurer along with the order forms. He shall forward all bills for inventory purchased to the National Treasurer for payment. He shall take an inventory of all supplies on-hand at the close of the fiscal year and provide a written detailed list to the National Treasurer for summary and inclusion in the financial reports. He shall take supply of badges and other supplies to the National Encampment for sale to the membership.

Chapter III Article IX (Finances) Section 9, Sub section (C)

The National Quartermaster, National Proceeding Secretary and Executive Director are authorized to execute contracts on behalf of and in the name of The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (National Organization), with the approval of the Commander-in-Chief.

.Chapter V 9Geneeral Regulations) Article III (Bonds)

Section 1. The bonded officers shall be as follows: The Camp Treasurer (and the Camp Secretary and Camp Council when holding funds of the Camp); Department Secretary, Department Treasurer (Department Secretary-Treasurer); National Secretary, National Treasurer (National Secretary-Treasurer), National MAL Coordinator, National Quartermaster, Jr. Vice Commander-in-Chief, Assistant National Treasurer(s), National Executive Director and National Patriotic Instructor. Also, Department Commanders if so ordered by Department bylaws.

Section 2. The above officers shall be bonded in amounts to be fixed by the various Council of pertaining to child abuse. the respective bodies, in some acceptable surety company, provided that Camp and Department Officers may furnish acceptable personal surety. Bonded officers shall be held liable for the funds remaining in their possessions until payment to their successors who have been properly

2. General Orders that are applicable and provide regulations for the supervision or interaction with members who fall under the various State youth protection laws that exist throughout the Union

CinC Ken Freshly GO #22 Series 2013-14

Here are the initial objectives of the policy that all brothers should use as MINIMUM requirements for having Juniors and Junior Associates in our Camps and at our events.

A. All Brothers under the age of 18 years of age should be accompanied by a parent or person designated as a Guardian (Grandfather, Brother over the age of 18 years, or Uncle) when participating in ANY SUVCW activity.

B. At no time will a non-related Brother be permitted 'one on one' contact with a brother under the age of 18. Any interaction with a brother under the age of 18 must include at least two (2) Brothers over the age 18 at all times.

C. Any Brother who witnesses or suspects in good faith any type of physical, mental or sexual abuse of any member under the age of 18 will immediately report such suspicion to local authorities first and local Camp and Department Commanders immediately.

D. Every Brother over the age of 18 who may have contact with a brother under the age of 18 should complete training related to protecting children from abuse of any type. Free training is available from the Boy Scouts of America at http://www.myscouting.org , You will need to create an account, then select the Training, E-Training, then choose the youth protection training. It takes about 30 minutes to complete. Upon completion, you will be able to print a certificate along with a wallet-size certification card which is good for a period of 2 years. While this training is not a requirement, it is highly suggested that it is completed to be used as a tool to protect our youth and Brothers.

E. Ultimately, all brothers also need to comply with all applicable Local and State laws

3. Other pertinent information as found in the 2014 National Encampment of the Order detailing the discussions of that body on the subject of members who had not reached the status of Maturity and still feel under the youth protection policies of the various states

Thank you. Child Protection. I believe that Committee was dispensed of at Springfield.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer

Commander-in-Chief, I know the Secretary from Pennsylvania didn't send the resolution in. There was supposed to be a resolution from Pennsylvania. Since this would require a change to the amendments, I am going to make this as a motion for Constitution and Regulations. Because of Pennsylvania law, we still find ourselves in Pennsylvania in a quandary, even after the last General Order, that you issued regarding Juniors. Pennsylvania is proposing that the ages for Juniors be changed from six to eighteen 'cause anyone under the age of eighteen still falls under the child protection laws, at least in Pennsylvania. And we feel that we need to have that in order to require that anyone under eighteen be accompanied by a parent because issue's been raised within the Department that as a full member, why are we requiring a parent to accompany them to SUVCW event. So the proposal from the Department was to change the age of Juniors to eighteen. You must be eighteen to be a full senior member. That this be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Regulations to review and develop appropriate language.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief **We have a motion**.

Unknown **Second.**

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief We have a second. Discussion. Brother Danny.

Danny L. Wheeler, Past Commander-in-Chief

Danny Wheeler, Past Commander-in-Chief, Quartermaster. We have a little problem with that in New York also. It's in the wording that they have to be with them at all times. We have no problem with anything else. We have checked out the laws in New York and there isn't a problem with the age. It isn't a problem with them coming to things. You have to have a designated person. It doesn't matter whether it's an uncle, a father, grandfather, as long as it's a designated person. I think what we need to look at here is each Department and what their laws are because they're different in all the States. If we had that taken out that says "all times," we would be okay with it. Thank you.

Michael Paquette, Department of the Chesapeake

Commander, Mike Paquette, Department of the Chesapeake. We also have another issue with full-fledged members that are between the ages of fourteen and eighteen. That proposal from the Department of Pennsylvania does not explain how we're to address those members.

Donald E. Darby, National Counselor

Commander-in-Chief, Don Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief, National Counselor. I would caution putting the age of eighteen there because in some States the age of majority is sixteen. I would suggest that rather than putting a number limit, you say from the age of sixteen to the age of majority within that Department.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer The age of majority is sixteen?

Donald E. Darby, National Counselor **Yes**.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer Age of consent, not age of majority. Where?

Donald E. Darby, National Counselor **South Carolina to be exact.**

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer Okay.

Douglas Fidler, Department of Tennessee

Sir, Doug Fiddler, PDC Tennessee. Just a question. Will present Junior members who are in that gap, would they be grandfathered? Or could they be grandfathered?

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer

Commander-in-Chief, through you to the Brother. It would depend upon what the C&R Committee develops. In the past, when we have done things like this, we have grandfathered existing members.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief Thank you, sir.

James Locke Lyon, I, Department of Illinois Jim Lyon, Department of Illinois. Are we not using The Boy Scouts of America's Youth Protection Certificate or their policy?

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer

Commander-in-Chief, through you to the Brother. It is not a requirement. It is a suggestion, and that's the rub. If we required every Brother who had contact with a child under the age of eighteen to complete that training and keep it up to date and retrain every two years, then it

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would not be the same issue.

James Locke Lyon, I, Department of Illinois

Because the major thing in their policy is that you're not alone. It's either two kids and an adult or two adults and a child together at the same time, and not left alone one on one is the main crux of that training.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer

Right. The Commander-in-Chief's General Order which is now what we're following, they were suggestions. Not requirements.

James Locke Lyon, I, Department of Illinois It would be a good one to look at and use.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief

The whole premise behind that General Order is because there are so many different States with so many different variables. This was a suggested outline for all the different States and Camps to follow using your own local laws. Cause for us to try to write something that encompassed everything, I'm sorry, wasn't going to happen. So, that's why we wrote it, more of a suggested outline.

Just an informational comment. I wasn't the one who brought this up, but Pennsylvania. I'm just delivering the message because I don't think anyone else is back from lunch. There's a way to do this and it's the same as what we did with Juniors. We can empower the Departments to set the age at which a Brother becomes a full member as opposed to a Junior. And by doing that, we let each Department then comply with their individual State laws. If I'm still on the C&R Committee next year, it's certainly what I'd be working towards developing language that would basically say that a department can set the age for a Senior member between fourteen and eighteen. Requiring at eighteen and allowing as you go, as young as fourteen, but that they set it in order that they comply with their own State laws.

George A. Huttick, Department of Tennessee

Commander, George Huttick, Department of Tennessee. Standing next to me is George Michael Huttick. Believe it or not, he's fifteen. He'll be sixteen in a few months While in general we agree with the principle of what's being proposed, he's a little bit shy and he's still learning how to talk in public. But he would prefer to be grandfathered in as he is now currently a full member and is in a National Encampment. He's earned the right to be here. He doesn't want to slip back to being a Junior.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief Okay. Can you re-read the motion just to be clear?

Alan L. Russ, National Secretary

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Move that the following be sent to the Constitution and Regulations Committee: proposed to change the age for Juniors from six to eighteen years. And must be eighteen to be a full senior member.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief Okay.

James B. Pahl, National Regulations Committee Commander-in-Chief, one friendly amendment. That that be the standing committee report back next year as opposed to the Encampment committee to report back today.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief Okay. Ready?

Donald E. Darby, Past Commander-in-Chief

Commander-in-Chief, Past Commander-in-Chief Don Darby. I think there were a couple, if they weren't, I'll make it a friendly amendment to grandfather the youth that are currently in that gap where they become members at fourteen, that they be grandfathered in and allowed to be remain as members and have the full privileges granted to a regular member.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer I'll accept it as a friendly amendment. I had already alluded to that.

Loran Bures, Isaac Stevens Camp #1 at Large Excuse me, Commander.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief Yes, sir.

Loran Bures, Isaac Stevens Camp #1 at Large

The General Order did not deal with a very important point with Juniors and with those under the age of majority. Our current membership applications do not have any place for their parent or legal guardian to give them permission for them to join this organization. We need to create a separate form for application form for those under the age of majority that will require at least one parent or legal guardian's permission for them to join the organization. Some States require both parents or legal guardians even in the case of divorce. We don't have anywhere currently because it's a combined form. And I really think that needs to be developed and part of this policy because that's part of the policy that's used by The Boy Scouts of America to help protect them and that you know the parents have approved their joining the organization or their legal guardians.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer Just refer it to P and P.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief I was going to say let's go ahead and refer that to the P and P so it can be developed.

Loran Bures, Isaac Stevens Camp #1 at Large

That is fine. I just want to make sure we get that in the record that that really needs to be part of our process of members under the age of majority.

Ken L. Freshley, Commander-in-Chief Do the Encampment Committees have their reports done? First one I have is Rituals and Ceremonies.

Richard L. Orr, National Treasurer

Commander-in-Chief, We are almost out of current printing of the Rituals. And there are updates to the Ritual that have never been incorporated in it. Actually, we did propose appointing a National policy on Minor members

4. Current Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War National Policy Regarding Minors

For purposes of this policy, the term "minor" refers to any Brother of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) under 18 years of age, regardless of their membership status within the SUVCW as a Junior, Junior Associate, Associate, or Member. Further, should a federal, state or local statute define a minor as older than this, the SUVCW will observe that older definition, and such statute shall immediately be brought to the attention of the National Counselor. The following are the MINIMUM requirements regarding minor Brothers of the SUVCW:

1. All minors shall be accompanied by a parent or designated guardian (e.g., a family member or friend who is 18 years of age or older) when participating in ANY SUVCW activity.

2. At no time will a non-related Brother be permitted "one-on-one" contact with a minor. Any interaction with a minor must include at least two (2) Brothers over the age of 18 years at all times.

3. Any Brother who, in good faith, witnesses or suspects any type of physical, mental or sexual abuse of any minor shall immediately report such suspicion to local authorities first, and then to the appropriate local Camp and Department Commanders immediately thereafter.

4. All Brothers shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws pertaining to child abuse and the reporting thereof.

5. While not a requirement, it is recommended that every Brother, who is 18 years or older, who may have contact with a minor, complete training related to the protection of children from abuse of any type. Free training is available from the Boy Scouts of America through their website at

http://www.myscouting.org. Local Camps may wish to retain a record of those Brothers who have completed such training.

Adopted by the Council of Administration as a National Policy on July 11, 201

5. Additional factors to consider

a. All States but 3 States have the age of majority set at 18. The exceptions being Alabama and Nebraska (19) and Mississippi (21).

b. the Uniform Transfers to Minor Act UTMA states that a person can't receive a monetary gift without a guardian and applies in every state until the individual reaches the age of 21.

c. Businesses will not execute contracts with minors

d. State laws dealing with work permits for minors vary and as we operate in all fifty states there is no assurance that a minor would be allowed for conduct the Orders business in every state.

e. The Federal Fair Labor Act establishes limits on the use of minors that are in addition to any State Laws.

f. A minor can not be held accountable for the loss or misappropriation of the Orders Quartermaster Store inventory, or the misuse of the income derived from the stores sales. Additionally, many States have laws which shield the Guardians of a minor from being sued to recoup the losses.

g. State and Federal Law set the ages at which a minor can be employed for example in NY you must be 16 years of age to obtain a permit.

h. Both Federal and State Laws restrict work schedules for minors both during the school year and the summer.

i. The Child Labor Laws in the state of Massachusetts state that no one under the age of 16 can be employed.

j. Can a Minor enter into a legal and binding contract? The person signing must have sufficient understanding that he's entering into a contract and the terms he's agreeing to. For most contracts, the general rule is that while it's not illegal to enter into a contract with a minor, the contract is voidable at the discretion of the minor. Voidable contracts are usually valid contracts and are binding unless the child cancels it. Therefore when someone chooses to enter into a contract with a minor or an infant, they are doing so at their own risk. Contract laws provide minors the option to exit a contract as they desire, which is called "voiding a contract." These

Findings and Reasoning:

The Charter Constitution and Regulations do not speak to a specific age requirement for an individual seeking National Office in the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War however it is reasonable to believe that a candidate should meet certain criteria for maturity, experience, ability to carry out the duties expected of an individual holding National Office. The Charter Constitution and Regulation does require that the National Quartermaster shall have the responsibility of maintaining an inventory of supplies, procuring sufficient inventory to meet the needs of the National Organization, the Departments, the Camps, and the brothers. This requirement obviously requires the National Quartermaster to enter into contracts with our vendors for various services. Under the current laws for contracting with minors it is likely that our vendors would refuse to negotiate or engage in contracts originating with or being signed by a Minor. A second area of Concern would be the Orders ability to obtain a bond for the Quartermaster if he was a Minor and that could put the Order at risk. Current Laws around the country fail to hold a Minor accountable for any loses that the Order might incur. Lastly dealing with the various Child Labor Laws at both the State and federal Level could entangle the Order in legal issues related to the employment of Minors for example work hours, work permits, and potentially even compensation.

Opinion:

As an organization it is incumbent on us to ensure the proper stewardship and leadership expected by the brothers of the Order. As the Charter, Constitution, and Regulations are silent on the matter of an age requirement for National Officer; it is within the power of the Commander-in-Chief to provide clarification and direction in this matter. Based on the research and findings herein, any petitioner desiring to candidacy as a National Officer should be disqualified unless the individual has meet the age of 21 years at the time the petition for candidacy is presented.
