ROBINSON MOUNTAIN, FORMERLY MAY MOUNTAIN, WAS RENAMED TO HONOR PRIVATE GEORGE F. ROBINSON OF THE EIGHTH REGIMENT OF MAINE INFANTRY IN THE CIVIL WAR

PRIVATE ROBINSON, A MAINE HERO, WAS CREDITED WITH SAVING THE LIFE OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN'S SECRETARY OF STATE, WILLIAM H. SEWARD, FOLLOWING AN ASSASSINATION PLOT APRIL, 1865.

PLACED DECEMBER 18, 1965 BY THE MAINE CIVIL WAR CENTENNIAL COMMISSION AND THE COMMISSIONERS OF AROOSTOOK COUNTY.

DEDICATORY CEREMONY HONORS MAINE CIVIL WAR SOLDIER

Scenic Robinson Mountain - formerly known as May Mountain-overlooking Mattawamkeag Lake at Island Falls, Me., was the setting for what was probably one of the last official Civil War Centennial events. There on October 28, 1966, a plaque honoring Pvt. George Foster Robinson of Company B, 8th Maine Volunteers, was unveiled during a ceremony made possible through the cooperative efforts of the Maine Civil War Centennial Commission and the Commissioners of Aroostook County, the ones presenting the plaque, and the State Highway Department, which provided the site for the boulder to which the plaque is affixed. A presentation ceremony had been held in December of the previous year in the State House at Augusta, Me., but the formal dedication had been delayed for 10 months while arrangements for placement of the boulder were being completed.

The story behind the naming of a mountain in honor of Pvt. Robinson is an interesting one. It seems that, at the time the Civil War was drawing to a close, Robinson was serving as an orderly for William H. Seward, who was then Secretary of State and a member of Pres. Lincoln's cabinet. On April 14, 1865 the night the President was shot at Ford's Theater in Washington, D.C. — an attempt was also made on Secretary Seward's life, and both he and Robinson were wounded but recovered. Robinson returned to Island Falls afterward and died there years later. It was for his heroism in saving the life of Secretary Seward that this Civil War veteran was so honored. This was accomplished through passage of a resolution by the 102nd Maine Legislature, and with the consent of the property owner, Mr. Jack Shur.

On hand to witness the dedication of the plaque were two of Pvt. Robinson's four grandnephews, George Thorne and Clarence Thorne, and one of his two grandnieces, Mrs. Ethel Donham. There were many school children in the crowd, too, for the school authorities had thought the occasion of sufficient significance to grant the pupils a half-day off to attend the ceremony. Members of the 152nd Artillery formed the color guard escort, and Rev. Edwin Haysradt, Jr., delivered the invocation. Following the pledge of allegiance to the flag by the assembly, two state representatives participated in the program; Rep. Arnold Storm gave the welcoming remarks and Rep. James T. Dudley acted as master of ceremonies. The greetings of Gov. John H. Reed were brought

CENTRAL REGION CONFERENCE FOCUSES ATTENTION ON FLAG

The Central Region Conference, held October 8 and 9, 1966, at the Mansfield Leland Hotel in Mansfield, Ohio, attracted a sizable representation of SUVCW and ASUV members from six of the 11 departments in the region. Regional Commander Thomas J. Lock (Ind.) was in charge of the conference, and the conference theme was "Courtesy to the Flag." The discussion groups gave enthusiastic attention to the topics assigned them, and their leaders presented many constructive ideas at the report session which followed. A very moving tribute to the Flag - entitled "What is a Flag?" --- was read by P.D.C. George L. Cashman (Ill.). P.C.-in-C. W. Earl Corbin (Ohio) served as master of ceremonies for the banquet on Saturday night. Greetings of the National Organization were extended by Natl. Pres. Flora D. Bates of ASUV and the late James L. High, the Jr. Vice C.-in-C. of SUVCW. The evening's address was delivered by a local clergyman, and dealt with problems in working with, and understanding, today's youth. Musical entertainment was provided by a chapter of the Sweet Adelines.

At Sunday morning's session, P.D.C. Thomas L. W. Johnson (Wis.) presented a resolution which was subsequently passed. It read:

WHEREAS the discussions relating to the Flag were in-structive and inspirational for those attending the Central Region Conference, and

Region Conference, and WHEREAS it is important that the youth of our country be imbued with knowledge and respect for our Flag. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Central Region Conference allow the sum of \$15.60 annually to be presented to the host department — Sons and Auxiliary — with the understanding that a Flag will be purchased and awarded to a recognized youth group within their State.

As the conference drew to a close, appreciation was expressed by the assembly to P.N.P. Anita Selby (Ohio), who had served as arrangements chairman. The final item of business was the election of officers, with Sis. Dora Johnson (Mich.) being chosen Regional Commander for 1966-67. The 1967 conference is scheduled for October in Lafayette, Ind.

Principal speaker at the ceremony was Maurice J. Warner, who had served throughout the centennial years as chairman of the Maine Civil War Centennial Commission. He noted in his address that Pvt. Robinson, by his act of heroism, unknowingly aided the United States in securing what eventually became our 49th state - Alaska. During the Civil War the general public had referred to Seward's desire to have the United States purchase Alaska as "Seward's Folly," Had Seward died, his support of this project would have ceased and Russia might own that area today, Warner pointed out.

Unveiling of the plaque was performed by Maj. Genl. Heywood and by Bruce Warner, 6-year-old son of the speaker and a great-grandson of a Civil War veteran.

CEREMONIES AT GETTYSBURG DRAW ATTENTION TO LINCOLN AND HIS "BOYS IN BLUE"

Saturday, November 19, was a busy day for history-conscious Americans in the Gettysburg, Pa., area. Four events - a luncheon, two outdoor ceremonies and a banquet - were scheduled for that day, and combined to make it a memorable occasion for those attending.

November 19 was, of course, Dedication Day the 103rd anniversary of the Gettysburg National Cemetery's dedication, at which Pres. Lincoln delivered his now-famous Gettysburg Address. Marking the occasion as it does each year, the Lincoln Fellowship of Pennsylvania held its annual luncheon at noon in the Holiday Inn. The luncheon speaker was Dr. David C. Mearns, Chief of the Division of Manuscripts, Library of Congress, who described the confusion that reigned in Gettysburg on November 18, 1863, as thousands descended on the town for the cemetery's dedication. His talk was entitled "Gettysburg on the Eve of an Address."

Presiding at the luncheon was Donald M. Swope, the retiring president, who read a proclamation by Gov. William W. Scranton declaring November 19 as Dedication Day and calling upon the schools and others to mark the day by the recitation of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address and other services. Elected to succeed him as president of the Lincoln Fellowship of Pennsylvania was Dr. Frederic Klein of Franklin and Marshall College, Lancaster, Pa. Three descendants of the man who had invited Lincoln to Gettysburg in 1863 - Judge David Wills - were special guests at the luncheon. There were the Judge's granddaughter, Mrs. Stanley S. Zimmerman, and her daughter and granddaughter.

After the luncheon, the activities moved out of doors for the two ceremonies. The first was at 2:30 p.m. before the Soldiers National Monument, which is said to stand at the approximate site of the platform from which Lincoln made his address 103 years ago. Wreaths were placed at the monument by David Tawney on behalf of Gettysburg Camp 112, SUVCW, and by Dr. Joseph H. Riley for the Lincoln Fellowship of Pennsylvania - the two groups sponsoring the ceremony.

At 3:30 p.m. in Ziegler's Grove on the Gettysburg Battlefield, the ninth annual Grand Army of the Republic Remembrance Day ceremony was held before a crowd estimated at 450 persons. P.C.-in-C. Chester S. Shriver presided at the outdoor portion of this program, held at the statue of Albert Woolson, last survivor of the G.A.R. The speaker was Lt. Col. Oliver D. Coble, U. S. Army Chaplains Corps (Ret.), whose topic was "Spiritual Aid --The Civil War vs. Vietnam." A medley of patriotic numbers was performed by the Gettysburg Senior High School Band, with G. Henry Roth of SUVCW's

Gettysburg camp serving at narrator, while wreaths were being placed at the monument by national and department heads from the G.A.R. Allied Orders. The outdoor exercises closed with the firing of a volley by units of the Sons of Veterans Reserve from Allentown and Reading, under the command of Capt. William K, Fallstick, and the sounding of taps.

The assemblage then moved indoors to the Visitor Center where P.C.-in-C. Thomas A. Chadwick acted as master of ceremonies. It was here that the national and department heads of the G.A.R. Allied Orders were each called upon for remarks appropriate to the occasion. All of the national heads were in attendance except the national president of the Woman's Relief Corps, who had been hospitalized and could not make the trip from her home in Topeka, Kan. "The Star-Spangled Banner" was played by the Gettysburg Senior High School Band. The opening and closing prayers were given by local clergymen.

The 36th annual Dedication Day dinner was held at 6:30 p.m. in the Holiday Inn, under the sponsorship of the Pennsylvania Department's Past Commanders and Past Presidents Assn., with 150 in attendance. Toastmaster at this event was P.C.-in-C. C. LeRoy Stoudt. The speaker was Dr. Woodrow C. Dellinger, a Lincoln student, who extolled Lincoln's virtues and exposed some of the myths about him. Presentation of a check for \$250 from the Commandery-in-Chief was made during the banquet program by Comdr.-in-Chief Frank Woerner to Dr. Charles R. Glatfelter, Professor of History at Gettysburg College, where the organization's annual gift is used to support a scholarship in the field of history.

IN MEMORIAM

JAMES L. HIGH - Deceased November 8, 1966 at Evanston, Ill. Interment Graceland Cemetery, Chicago, Ill. Bro. High had held a variety of offices in the Illinois Department over the years, and had been associated with SUVCW's Lincoln Tomb Ceremony as a member of the committee for the past 10 years and as co-chairman of that committee for a number of those years. He had also been active in the National Organization as a member of the Council of Administration, and was serving as the Junior Vice Commander-in-Chief at the time of his passing. In addition, he was Ex-Commander and Recorder of the Illinois Commandery, MOLLUS, and an Emeritus Member of the Commanderu-in-Chief's Board of Officers of that Order. Bro. High is survived by his wife, Gladys.


OLIVER G. MacPHERSON — Deceased November 21, 1966 at Harrisburg, Pa. Interment Evergreen Cemelery, Gettysburg, Pa. Bro. MacPherson was a Past Commander of the Pennsylvania Department and a Past President of the 60-20 Club (an organization of men who served as Department Commanders in 1960). He was one of the founders of the Gettysburg Civil War Round Table, and had served as its treasurer. He had also been a member of the Adams County Civil War Centennial Commission. At the time of his passing, Bro. Mac-Pherson was serving the National Organization as chairman of the Military Affairs Committee, and as Commander of the National Military Department, Sons of Veterans Reserve. He is survived by his wife, Elsie, 11 children, 21 grandchildren, six great-grandchildren and a sister.

The deepest sympathy of the National Organization is extended to the families of these two brothers, who will be sorely missed in the days ahead.

BLACKMAN NAMED AS JUNIOR VICE COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF


