

THE LEGISLATIVE REPORT by Thomas L. W. Johnson

Battlefield Preservation— H.R. 3248, a bill to revise the boundaries of the Gettysburg National Military Park, was approved by President Bush as PL 101-377 on August 17, 1990. On June 14, 1990, S. 2437, a measure to acquire additional land for the Vicksburg National Military Park, passed the Senate and is now in the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee.

On August 2, 1990, the Senate passed S. 1770 as amended. The measure would establish a commission to (Please turn to Page 8)

(Continued from Page 7) study all Civil War battlefield sites and their prospects for preservation as national military parks or commemorative sites. In a hearing before the House Interior Committee on September 5th, officials from Virginia including the mayor of Winchester and Reps. Jim Olin (D-VA) and D. French Slaughter, Jr., (R-VA), urged the approval of the Senate passed measure as a help to shield a number of sites from development as suburbs of the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area.

In a related matter, Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan announced in July his support for the "American Battlefield Protection Plan" designed to give priority to (25) Civil War battle sites either by outright purchase or protection through zoning ordinances or easements intended to curtail development of sensitive areas. Secretary Lujan will seek \$15 million in "seed money" but wants to involve foundations and other private sources as well.

During the summer the Richard King Mellon Foundation announced that it was donating 100,000 acres of sought-after property to the Federal Government, including the "Cornfield" at Antietam National Military Park and lands adjacent to the Gettysburg and Fredericksburg-Spotsylvania National Military Parks.

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
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
