NATIONAL HEADS OF ALL ALLIED ORDERS JOIN IN HONORING G.A.R. AT 23rd ANNUAL REMEMBRANCE DAY

Pictured above are Commander-in-Chief Elton P. Koch, in his S.V.R. uniform, along with the National President Nellie H. Hawley of the Auxiliary (next to C.-in-C. Koch) and the National Presidents of the remaining Allied Orders. The five Allied Heads were gathered in front of the statue of Comrad Albert Wollson at Zeigler's Grove on the Gettysburg Battlefield last November 17th in order to lay wreaths and take part in the services which honor the memory of the Grand Army of the Republic. Comrad Woolson of Duluth, Minn. was the last survivor of the Grand Army of the Republic. He died at the age of 109 on August 2, 1956. His statue commemorates all of the men of G.A.R. and of all those who wore the Union uniforms during 1861-1865. The annual Remembrance Day event saw another beautiful November weekend and a record attendance of an estimated 1,700 at the wreath laying services. Past Commander-in-Chief Fred H. Combs, Jr. was Master of Ceremonies for the afternoon program at the Woolson Monument. P.C.-in-C. Combs also served as Master of Ceremonies at the Program of Tributes held in the Visitors Center at the battlefield immediately following the wreath laying services. The Rev. Dr. Robert A. MacAskill, Pastor of Gettysburg Presbyterian Church, gave the address of Tribute and the Lancaster Fencibles Fifes and Drums provided Civil War Era music for both afternoon events. Greetings were received from all five National Heads as well as the Department Heads of all five Allied Orders in the Department of Pennsylvania.

MONITOR EFFORTS CONTINUE

The year 1979 was a critical one for the Monitor Recovery and Research Foundation and for those devoted individuals who have worked many years to locate the Monitor on the ocean floor o... North Carolina and to raise that noble ship so that it might be permanently enshrined. During the year, the government has decided against trying to raise the Civil War ironclad because of its extremely fragile condition. A series of dives to the wreck over a number of weeks yielded evidence that the ship has deteriorated seriously after 117 years under water and may have suffered further damage from depth charges dropped during World War II. However in Norfolk the Foundation and its founder, marine impresario John G. Newton, scoff at the idea that salvaging the Monitor might be impossible and with little encouragement from Federal or State officials cling to the notion that the skeleton of the Civil War vessel will someday grace Norfolk's downtown waterfront. In the meantime divers continue to reclaim many important artifacts from the sunken ship. Archeologists have made almost daily dives to the 172 foot ship since the current series began. They have been methodical in vacuuming away the sand and locating the treasures which went to the bottom with the famous ironclad that stormy night of December 31, 1862.

We will continue to report progress on this important and vital Civil War project as news is received. In the appointments announced in Commander-in-Chief Koch's General Order printed in the last issue, you will note that PDC John B. Davis has been reappointed Chairman of the SUVCW's standing committee on this project. From past articles in The Banner you will recall that Brother Davis is responsible for keeping us well informed on this issue as well as for a renewal of SUVCW activity in the Norfolk

100th ANNIVERSARY SONS OF UNION VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR SEPTEMBER 29, 1979

September 29, 1879, the first Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War Camp was instituted in Philadelphia, known as Anna M. Ross Camp No.1, sponsored by Anna M. Ross Post No. 94, G.A.R. That occasion was marked by a banquet held at D. F. McCallister on September 29, 1979. Pictured above at the Anniversary Banquet are (from left to right) the senior Past Commander-in-Chief, C. LeRoy Stoudt, and the present Commander-in-Chief Elton P. Koch.

A few words of welcome were given by the Commander of Camp No. 1, J. Edward Atkinson, who then introduced the Toastmaster for the evening, Past Commander-in-Chief Frank M. Heacock. After singing the Star Spangled Banner, Salute to the Flag, and the invocation, we enjoyed a full course delicious Roast Sirloin of Beef dinner with all the trimmings.

A Sing-a-long was led by Larry Ferrarí, a most popular organist of the Channel 6 Television in Philadelphía. He also played several selections of organ music during the evening. Unfortunately the Governor could not be with us.

The speaker of the evening was the Honorable Judge James T. McDermott, who gave a very inspiring talk and reminded us of how fortunate we are to have such a background and to be associated with such a fine organization and to be so active after all the years.

Herman A. Poehler gave a few remarks on the activities of Anna M. Ross Camp No. 1. He was then presented with a plaque as being the oldest living active member of Camp No. 1.

For the closing, P.C.-in-C. Frank Heacock recited the Lincoln's Gettysburg Address while Larry Ferrari played the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" very softly. All lights were out with the exception of the candles and a breeze kept the flag moving on the stage. Following this the entire assembly joined in singing "God Bless America" and the Pennsylvania Closing.

All in all a most enjoyable evening—good food—good music and singing—wonderful speeches and Fraternity.

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S.V.R. NEWS By GEORGE SHADMAN NATIONAL MEETING IN GETTYSBURG

Pictured above is the annual SVR meeting held at Howard Johnson's in the Shrine Room at 10:00 a.m. on November 17, 1979. The 15th New Jersey Volunteers presented the colors commencing the occasion. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, Chaplain Norm Bowens offered a Blessing.

Lt. Col. Charles Lilienthal opened the meeting with a very appropriate statement: "Remembrance Day is 'OUR DAY, all of ours, no matter what reenactment army you belong to."

Present for the meeting were representatives from five Civil War reenactment organizations including the SVR, North/South Brigade, NCWRA, ANV, and the GAR.

Lt. Col. Lilienthal reviewed General Order #5-series 1979 which stated: 1] Lt. Col. Thomas O'Dea was transferred from the inactive roster to active duty to serve as Executive Officer, SVR with the rank of Colonel; 2) Captain Richard Greenwalt was transferred from the inactive roster to active duty, serving as Quartermaster General with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel; 3) Major Harrington was relieved as commander of the First Military District and transferred in grade to the inactive roster. Major Hoskell is temporarily assigned as acting commander of that district until a permanent assignment is announced.

It was announced by General Shriver that Andrew Brunett, famous for his portrayal of Abraham Lincoln, has pledged his total support to all Civil War units. The General also stated that patriotism across the United States is upswinging and Civil War Reenactment groups are playing a vital role in this area. New geographical areas are opening up continuously and are welcoming organizations such as the SVR.

Col. O'Dea ws introduced. He will be serving also as Training Officer for the SVR. The Colonel spoke of the need to strive for authenticity in the SVR. "We must dress the part...commanders in the SVR must start instigating this." He also stated that regardless of some outside opinions, the SVR is not dragging their feet concerning reenactments. O'Dea also listed some of the qualifications needed in being a unit commander in the SVR and concluded with a promise of "... a good working program in the SVR in the near future."

Major William Warne, retired from the SVR was presented with a Letter of Commendation by General Shriver for serving as a "highly respected officer and leader in the SVR."

Major Harlod Goodman presented Sgt. Carl McCann of the 19th New York Heavy Artillery with a commission to the rank of Second Lieutenant.

General Shriver announced that the 10th Annual SVR National Encampment would be held at Port Huron, Michigan, hosted by the 10th Michigan Regiment (which boasts a membership of 182 members). The event will be held July 4, 5, 6, 1980, and the Battle of Buzzards Roost will be reenacted. More information will follow.

S.U.V. Commander-in-Chief Koch extended his best wishes to the SVR, calling the SVR "The show-piece of the S.U.V."

Chairman of the National Military Affairs Committee, Colonel John Stark was introduced and he offered his very best wishes for a successful upcoming year for the SVR.

Captain Simmons of the Key Stone Brigade was presented with a 50 year badge for a half a century of service in the S.U.V.

The meeting ended with a closing prayer by Col. Bowen.

Previous issues of The BANNER have recounted the progress of his programs well as the successful drive to present the State of Tennessee with an official Indiana Stepping Stone Memorial to be placed at the monument.

Brother Hendley has now officially stepped down as Chairman of the Indiana Division of the Tennessee Monument Commission and has been replaced by Mrs. Melanie T. Petroskey of Hammond, Indiana. Upon his leaving that post he was honored by an official commendation from the Governor of the State of Indiana. Otis R. Bowen, M.D., and by having bestowed on him the title of Honorary Lieutenant Governor by appointment and commission of Lieutenant Governor Robert D. Orr.

CALIFORNIAN OFFERS RESEARCH HELP FOR PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS

The Rev. Don Van Winkle is a Minister in the Los Angeles area and is an active Civil War buff who belongs to a number of Civil War related organizations including the SUVCW. LEGISLATIVE REPORT

The House of Representatives on December 5, approved a bill to commemorate the birth of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., on the third Sunday in January by a vote of 207 to 191. Despite passage of the measure, several members of the Congressional Black Caucus were reported to be very unhappy that the House was unwilling to support a move to make the observance a weekday holiday on the third Monday in January. Advocates of the Sunday observance cited the costs associated with the creation of another weekday holiday. Fourteen states already observe Dr. King's birthday, January 15, as a holiday.

The Michigan House of Representatives passed a measure to return the observance of Memorial Day to May 30 in the Wolverine State. Prospects for its enactment into law are dim, however, because the bill must be considered by the Senate which on four previous occasions rejected similar proposals.

Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd has announced that floor debate on the SALT II Treaty will not begin until Congress returns from its Christmas recess in January. This means that the debate will be conducted during a time when Presidential politics will be assuming center stage. At present, prospects for ratification of the Treaty are uncertain. In early November, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee recommended approval but did so on a split vote of 9 to 6, a division unusual for that panel. More recently, the Armed Services Committee was reported to be preparing a report critical of the Treaty's provisions dealing with deployment of new and large missile systems by the Soviet Union and the lack of adequate control over the Soviet's new Backfire bomber. These developments indicate that the debate on SALT II will be a long and difficult one.

In a drama reminiscent of "The Perils of Pauline," the Senate and House enacted legislation to implement the Panama Canal Treaty less than a week before the Panamanians were scheduled to assume jursidiction over what had been the Canal Zone. In the process of delay and negotiation, opponents of the Treaty succeeded in adding some safeguards for U.S. interests in the area of the former Canal Zone. For example, the Panama Canal Commission which will operate the Canal until the year 2000 will be a federal agency subject to congressional funding and oversight rather than be only a quasi-governmental body. Funds needed to support cost of fully implementing the Treaty must come from tolls collected before payments to Panama from the U.S. Treasury will be authorized. Finally, American property not required by the Treaty to be given to Panama until December 31, 1999, cannot be transferred before that date. Under terms of the Treaty, the former Canal Zone came under Panamanian control on October 1, 1979.

In September, the House of Representatives turned down a proposal to require all 18 year olds to register for the military draft with registration to begin January 2, 1981. The vote was 252 to 163 against the legislation sponsored by Rep. "Sonny" Montgomery of Miss. The House did direct the President to make a further study of the need for a draft law.

On July 10, the Senate rejected a proposed Amendment to the Constitution which would have abolished the Electoral College and provided for the direct election of the President and Vice President. Sponsored by Sen. Birch Bayh of Ind., the measure received 51 votes but needed 66 votes or two-thirds for passage. There were 48 "no" votes cast.
