STATUS OF THE SONS OF UNION VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR

When the Grand Army of the Republic ceased to function as an active organization, our Order, as their sons, automatically became not only "heirs" but the leader of the family group, except in so far as Comrade Woolson himself can exercise that leadership. We are not only the oldest organization organized on a national basis, but, regardless of that fact, we have a further title to primacy.

Our ancestors brought to this country the English law and customs regarding succession and inheritance, which still prevail except in so far as they have been motified by statute or usage. Under these, when the head of a family passes away it is the son (or the eldest son, if there be more than one) who automatically becomes the titular head of the family, not the wife or daughter, for matriarchy has never existed in this country. Even when the head of the family is still alive, yet if for any reason he is unable to shoulder and discharge his full responsibilities, the son as heir apparent usually takes over such of these duties as may be necessary. We as "son" and, as Comrade Woolson calls us in his deed of 13 February 1954, the "natural heirs of the Grand Army of the Republic" have succeeded in the leadership of the Grand Army group, subject only to the primacy of Comrade Woolson himself, and we owe it to the candor which should exist between our own and the other allied organizations to state that we will neither abdicate from this position nor allow any other organization to usurp it.

SURVEY OF G. A. R. PROPERTY

Early in December an official letter was sent to each Department Commander requesting that he contact all Camps in his Department and direct them to make a survey of the territory covered by their respective Camps and locate any G.A.R. property in such territory or of which any member has knowledge or information. This includes real estate, cash in banks, bonds, stocks, records, Civil War mementoes, Post equipment and all other property, tangible or intangible. We have no intention to interfere with any property legally disposed of by the Grand Army, but in many, if not most cases, this property was never legally disposed of by the Grand Army, but was attempted to be disposed of by individuals without authority and in violation of the rules of the Grand Army. We have no desire to take over this property for our own benefit but desire and are bound by our resolution passed at the 1955 Encampment to have it placed in proper custody to perpetuate the memory of the Grand Army of the Republic and to be available for historical and genealogical research. Any question as to legal title to such property should be submitted to me for advice of the National Counselor.

It is the patriotic duty and responsibility of every member of our Order from Past Commanderin-Chief down to and including every Camp member on the side lines to help discharge this responsibility.

I have been placed in charge of this work and with the help of our members we shall make a success of it. Without such help it will be a failure. I desire a report from each Department, regardless of results obtained. If each Department acts promptly, it will save the necessity of a series of follow-up letters.

GENERAL ORDER No. 2

Ridgewood, New Jersey 1 January 1956

1. It is my sad duty to announce the death on 30 November at Traverse City, Mich., of our National Patriotic Instructor, Brother Oliver S. Larkby. Brother Larkby joined U. S. Grant Camp No. 100 of Cincinnati, Ohio, on 15 January 1930, deriving his eligibility from his grandfather, James John Larkby, who served in Co. A, 181st Ohio Volunteer Infantry. Though never holding office until his appointment as National Patriotic Instructor, he was always ready to answer any call to serve the Order and acted as Chairman of the Finance Committee for our 1955 Encampment, the success of which was due in substantial measure to his efficient handling of the finances. His long and deep interest in Lincoln Memorial University led to his appointment as National Patriotic Instructor. Although he hesitated about taking the office on account of lack of familiarity with its duties, he at once set about acquiring all possible information to enable him to perform them efficiently, and, had he lived, his administration of the office would undoubtedly have been an outstanding one.

At his death he was owner and President of the Cincinnati Die Cutting Co., an officer of several other business firms, a member of the Masonic Order and of several Cincinnati clubs and societies.

Funeral services were held on 1 December at the Church of the Redeemer, Cincinnati, at which our Order was represented by Past Commander-in-Chief William M. Coffin, a long time friend, who acted as one of the honorary pall bearers and took part in the Scottish Rite service.

The sympathy of our Order is extended to his family. We with them feel a great loss.

2. To fill the vacancy caused by the death of Brother Larkby, Brother Ernest G. Wells, who has done outstanding work as Patriotic Instructor of the Massachusetts Department, is hereby appointed National Patriotic Instructor, and will be respected accordingly.

3. Attention is directed to the statement herewith published with reference to the other allied Orders. This will govern all Departments and Camps in their relations with such other organizations. On all joint committees the chairmanship of right belongs to the representative of our Order, and in all published lists of such organizations the name of our Order should be placed first, unless for reasons of sentiment the name of the Grand Army of the Republic is listed, in which case the name of our Order should follow that of the Grand Army.

4. In view of the approaching centennial anni-versaries of the events of the Civil War all Camps and Departments are urged to commemorate, in such form as local conditions may make practical, such events. It has been customary for us to commemorate not only Lincoln's birthday (Union Defenders Day), but also Memorial Day, Dedication Day and Appomattox Day, and special attention should be given to these days. The commemoration of Lincoln's birthday was started by the Military Order of the Loyal Legion, the founders of which were the Guard of Honor at President Lincoln's funeral. In communities where no Commandery of the Loval Legion exists, our Camps and other bodies should sponsor proper observance of the day. In cities where a Commandery of the Loyal Legion exists care should be taken that our own observance does not in any way conflict with that of the older organization, and, if invited, our Camps, rather than conduct an independent observance, should cooperate in the Loyal Legion observance, as is done in the District of Columbia and perhaps elsewhere.

5. A member has recently made a gift of \$500.00 to the Permanent Fund of the Order. As other members may desire to perpetuate their own name or that of an ancestor and assure the carrying on of our work in perpetuity, through a gift or bequest, the following form is suggested:

I give and bequeath to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, a corporation created by Act of Congress, the sum of ______ dollars. The donor or testator may designate the purpose for which his gift or the income thereof shall be used. All gifts and bequests become a part of the Permanent Fund unless otherwise specified.

Such bequests and gifts are exempt from Federal estate, gift and Income taxes, and in most if not all cases are exempt from such State taxes.

He was a state delegate to the national meetings on many occasions. He also had been general chairman of the observance of Memorial Day by patriotic organizations for 15 years.
