The call of fife and drums marked the opening of the 19th annual ceremony conducted at the tomb of Abraham Lincoln in Oak Ridge Cemetery, Springfield, Illinois, on Tuesday, April 15, 1975, the 110th anniversary of the Emancipator's death. Present were wreathbearers representing some 67 patriotic and veterans organizations for the rites sponsored by the National Organization of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War as assisted by The Military Order of the Loyal Legion.

Speaking at the wreath-laying were Commander-in-Chief John H. Stark of the Sons of Union Veterans; Charles Allen Brady, Jr., Commander-in-Chief of The Military Order of the Loyal Legion; and CDR. William C. Duval, USNR (Ret), the last surviving founder of the ceremony and a Past Commander-in-Chief of the Loyal Legion. Co-

chairman Thomas L. W. Johnson presided at the outdoor exercises. At the luncheon following the ceremony, the Hon. Harlington Wood, Jr., judge of the Federal District Court at Springfield spoke on the heritage left by Mr. Lincoln and concluded with the hope that our country will "never run out of New Salems" as a training ground for leadership. Dr. Wayne C. Temple, co-chairman, served as toastmaster. Again this year music for the rites was provided by the Men's Chorus from Concordia Theological Seminary,

Springfield under the inspired direction of Professor Daniel G. Reuning. The Men sang "America the Beautiful" and "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." At the luncheon, Professor Reuning accompanied soloist George Williams who sang "When Johnny Comes Marching Home Again" and "The Battle Hymn."

Under the precise leadership of Captain Robert M. Graham, elements of the 114th Regt., Ill. Vol. Infantry, Springfield acted as an honor guard and provided escorts for the wreathbearers. Captain Graham also served as a co-chairman for the ceremony. Elements of the 74th Regt., Ill. Vol. Infantry, Rockford, provided the fife and drums and added color to the ceremony as did Battery "G" of the 7th Ill. Artillery. At the close of the ceremony the troops fired a memorial salute and Taps was sounded by J. Stephen Hall of the 114th Regt.

Despite a light rain and chilling winds on the day preceding the ceremony, the participants were blessed with a sunny, calm, and reasonably warm day on the 15th. Of the 19 ceremonies conducted to date, rain has fallen on only one of them.

Departments and/or Auxiliaries of the Sons of Union Veterans represented by wreaths were Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Missouri, Ohio, and Wisconsin. In addition, two Camps and one local Auxiliary from the Illinois Department

Commanderies of the Loyal Legion represented were Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, and Pennsylvania.

March 4, 1865, has been referred to as the outstanding state paper of the 19th Century. While it promised victory in the North, its last lines assured charity to all and envisioned an era of peace:

CAMP 200 PLANS RESTORATION OF GEN. HANCOCK BURIAL CRYPT

On July 1st, 1863 when General Meade learned that General John Reynolds had been killed, he placed General Winfield S. Hancock in general command of the Gettysburg area to see whether it was a suitable place for the all out fight with General Robert E. Lee and his Army of Northern Virginia.

This burly resourceful man established his own authority and malded together the fragments of the I and XI Corps and held the area until the rest of the Union Army arrived. Small wonder that the newspaper writers of the time recognized this General as one of the dominant field officers of the Union Army's greatest victory and dubbed him "Hancock, the Superb."

Winfield Scott Hancock was born February 14th, 1824 in Montgomery Square, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. He graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1844 and served in the Mexican War. Following the Civil War, he was an unsuccessful Democratic nominee for President. He died in New York City on the 9th of February, 1886. Apparently his only heir was an unmarried daughter. Today the remains of General Winfield Scott Hancock lie in Montgomery Cemetery on the western side of Norristown, Pennsylvania. At the time that he was placed in his crypt it probably was a clear cold mid-February day with the rolling hills of the Schuylkill River of Pennsylvania adding even more beauty to that solemn occasion. It undoubtedly was witnessed by many of his comrades in arms and who could doubt that those comrades who attended recalled those gloriously horrible days of early July, 1863.

On a mid February day in 1974, two members of Camp 200, Philadelphia, Penna., Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. travelled to this crypt and found it desecrated. The rolling hills to the east and north had been replaced with rows of homes, the northern ones no more than inches from his crypt, and a few feet in front of the entrance is an above ground swimming pool enclosed with a storm fence. While one can understandably concede that civilization must move forward, it was discouraging to note the general lack of care of the cemetery and particularly of this crypt.

The iron gate had been torn from the doorway. All of the bronze plaques had been torn from their fittings in the crypt and evidence of break-in noted. One wonders how long it will be before vandals attempt to break in and remove the bones of one who helped to "preserve the Union".

form a fund to restore this crypt to a secure state. If at least the environment cannot be improved, certainly the security can be maintained.

REST IN PEACE

Past Commander-in-Chief Harold Arnold died in his sleep on June 19th. Funeral services were held on June 21st. Harold (better known as Duke) joined the Order in 1927 and served in many capacities, including Department Commander and Department Secretary-Treasurer. He was elected to the office of Commander-in-Chief in 1959 at the Long Beach, Calif. Encampment.

THE LEGISLATIVE REPORT

On March 13 the Senate unanimously passed S-331, a bill designed to return the federal observance of Veterans Day to November 11. Sponsored by Sen, Roman Hruska of Neb., the measure is now in the House of Representatives. Its principal sponsor in the House is Rep. David Henderson of North Carolina. chairman of the Post Office and Civil Service Committee, the group that will consider the bill. Favorable action is expected when Congress returns from its Memorial Day recess. Forty-five States at last count had returned their observance of Veterans Day to its traditional date of November 11, a factor that has made an impression in Congress.

Revision of the U. S. Flag Code has again become a subject of interest in Congress. Sponsors of Senate Jt. Res. 49 are Senators Strom Thurmond of South Carolina and Birch Bayh of Indiana. In the House of Representatives, an identical measure, House Jt. Res. 321, is sponsored by Rep. Walter Flowers of Alabama and Rep. James Mann of South Carolina. First enacted in 1942, the Flag Code has been subject to much misinterpretation even by well-meaning groups and individuals. Supporters of revision hope that a commission can be appointed to draft a revised code to be ready for congressional consideration in time for the Bicentennial in 1976.

Concern is mounting in Congress for the future of the Canal Zone. In February of 1974. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger signed a preliminary "agreement on principles" with the Panamanian Foreign Minister that would call for the negotiation of a new treaty to replace the 1904 treaty that created the Canal Zone and gave the United States exclusive control over it. According to the "preliminary agreement," this country would agree to recognize Panamanian sovereignty over the C. Z. and would begin to phase in Panamanian administration, operation, and protection of the canal in consideration of eventual U.S. termination of its control over the vital inter-ocean link.

An influential Senate group is beginning to form that would have as its goal the defeat of any treaty designed to abrogate U. S. rights in the Canal Zone. Leaders in this effort are Senators Barry Goldwater, John McClellan, Herman Talmadge, James Eastland, John Tower, Strom Thurmond, Carl Curtis, Paul Fannin, and Roman Hruska. One-third of the Senate membership, 34 senators, can block a treaty from becoming law. The new treaty will be ready for Senate consideration soon.

Natural outgrowth of comradeship THE NEW HAMPSHIRE VETERANS ASSOCIATION

The New Hampshire Veterans Association is the natural outgrowth of the comradeship which binds men together in time of war, and of the desire to perpetuate that comradeship in days of peace. The idea of forming this unique body grew out of regimental organizations formed after the Civil War.

The Association was formed in 1875 and incorporated by act of the General Court of New Hampshire on July 7, 1881, When organized, the membership of the Association consisted of men who had served in the armed forces of the Union on land and sea during the Civil War. All veterans resident in New Hampshire who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States in any war since then are eligible for membership.

The site chosen as a home for the Association would be hard to duplicate in this or any other state. The 7.7 acres of land now occupied by the Association at The Weirs and within the city limits of Laconia, slope upward from Lake Winnipesaukee and offer a beautiful view of both lake and the White Mountains hevond. This property belonged to the B. & M. Railroad when first occupied by the Association, and was leased to it for 43 years. Then the General Court, by making adequate appropriations for it, enabled the Association to buy the entire tract of land from the Railroad. This it did in 1924 for the sum of \$4,000. This property now belongs to the New Hampshire Veterans Association and has only one proviso attached, namely: "That whenever said corporation, from any cause, shall become extinct and cease to exist as a corporation, then all the property, real, personal or mixed, shall be and become the property of the State of New Hampshire to be used and expended by said State for charitable purposes and none other."

There was formed in 1944 an auxiliary to be known as the New Hampshire Veterans Association Auxiliary. A section of the N.H.V.A. By-Laws reads as follows: "There shall be an Auxiliary to the N.H.V.A. known as the N.H.V.A. Auxiliary, made up of wives, mothers, daughters, and sisters of veterans who have faithfully served in the aforementioned services of the United States, and who have received an honorable discharge therefrom, and of the Sons of Veterans organizations in the N.H.V.A., also members of Auxiliary bodies of organizations participating in the N.H.V.A. . . . "

Although the Association was formed to foster the comradeship which began during days of armed service to our country, its purpose is not confined to the fraternity of its members, but extends in days of peace to our relationship as citizens of the republic and as guardians of the colors under which we fought and the preservation of all that those colors represent.

ASPEN NAMED TO U.S. ASSAY COMMISSION

Dr. Nelson P. Aspen, Commander of Camp 200, Philadelphia, Pa., is one of twenty-six persons selected by President Gerald F. Ford to participate in a traditional ritual of checking the quality of coins after they are minted. The U.S. Assay Commission, to which Dr. Aspen has been named, is the oldest Presidential appointment required by the United States Constitution.


OREGON-WASHINGTON
