COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF GEORGE L. CASHMAN

Elected Commander-in-Chief of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War at the 89th National Encampment held in Miami Beach, Florida on August 27th.

He is presently the Curator of the Lincoln Tomb in Springfield, Ill., and is a mechanical engineer by profession. A veteran of World War I, he also served as an instructor in the Army Air Force Technical Training Command during World War II.

Cashman served as Illinois Department Commander in 1961-62 and is presently Secretary-Treasurer of Gen. John A. McClernand Camp 4 of Springfield. An avid Lincoln and Civil War student, he has devoted much time during the past twenty years in research and is considered to be an authority on Lincoln and Civil War history. He is married to the former Dorothy Moline of Keene, New Hampshire, who is in her own right, an authority on Lincoln history.

He has been awarded honorary membership in several patriotic societies including the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States; Springfield Civil War Round Table, which he founded in 1956; Decatur Civil War Round Table and the Ancient Order of Kentucky Colonels. He is a member of St. Paul's Lodge 500, a member of Springfield Consistory 32 degree; a noble of Ansar Shrine and a member of Ansar Legion of Honor. He is a member of Bahar Grotto and of Elwood Commandery, Knights Templar. He is associate editor of the Lincoln Herald, a magazine devoted to Lincoln history. He has resided in Springfield since 1945.

NATIONAL PRESIDENT MRS. EILEEN R. COOMBS

Elected National President at the 84th National Encampment of the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War in Miami Beach. August 23-27th She served as Auxiliary President in 1946, and as Department President in 1962. In 1965 she served as National Chaplain, in 1968 as National Patriotic Instructor, in 1969 as National Council Member, and in 1970 as National Chief of Staff.

She is doubly eligible as her Grandfather, Pvt. Martin V. Renell served in Company C, 1st Vermont Cavalry, and her Great Grandfather John Dennison served with the 1st Maine Volunteers, 1861-65.

Sister Coombs is also a member of Annie A. Gould Tent No. 1, Daughters of Union Veterans in Portland, Maine, where she has served as President. She attended schools in Portland, Maine, and is married to P.D.C. Dexter H. Coombs of Rhode Island, where she attends the Friendship Baptist Church in Warwick.



She is the daughter of P.D.P. Susic Renell, and the late P.D.C. Clarence Renell of Portland, Maine. She has one son, George Mason, who is a member of Shepley Camp No. 4 of Portland, Maine, and one grand-daughter, Michelle Mason.

JOINT OPENING - SONS AND AUXILIARY

Monday, August 24, 1970

The joint opening of the Sons and Auxiliary Encampment was held in the beautiful Napoleon Room of the Deauville Hotel, under the direction of the Auxiliary Chief of Staff, Mrs. Eileen Coombs and Sons National Chief of Staff, C. Leroy Stoudt.

The National Aides entered in a double line, holding Gold Ribbon that extended the length of the room. Through this line National President Florence Jansson, escorted by Personal Aide Dorothy Klunck and Commander in-Chief Fred H. Combs Jr. escorted by Acting Personal Aide Fred H. Combs Sr. proceeded to a position of honor facing the audience. Then National Officers of both organizations were escorted in, each bearing a small State Flag of their own State, which were placed in standards on each side of the President and Commander-in-Chief.

All of the Past National Presidents and Past Commandersin-Chief present were escorted in and introduced. These were followed by all the Department Commanders and Department Presidents in attendance. The entire group formed a huge semi-circle, at which time P.D.P. Henrietta Satterthwaite sang "America the Beautiful".

After National President Jansson and Commander-in-Chief Combs extended their greetings, the Sons retired to their meeting room to begin their official business meetings.

Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday were devoted to business sessions. On Tuesday evening an impressive banquet was held in the Napoleon Room followed by a reception to National Officers held in the Charlemagne Room, under direction of Chief of Staff Eileen Coombs. Toastmaster at the banquet P. C. in C. Stoudt. Wednesday was a free day, when delegates enjoyed the many attractions offered at Miami Beach. On Wednesday evening, a complimentary show and dance was enjoyed by all three organizations in the Cavalier Room.

BUSINESS SESSIONS

Were held in the Cavalier Room of the Hotel Deauville, starting at 10:30 A.M. Monday. Following were the convention appointments: Guide John C. Yocum of Penna.; Color Bearer James Ledwith of Conn.; Guard Kenneth Wheeler of New Hamp. The following committee chairmen were appointed: Credentials Chas. A. Brady Jr. of Illinois; Officers Reports, C. Leroy Stoudt of Penna.; Constitution and Regulations, Jos. S. Rippey of New York; Ritual, Wm. Haskell of Mass.; Resolutions, Harold Arnold of Rhode Island; Fraternal Relations, Roy Stoudt and Jos. Rippey.

A beautiful basket of flowers in each of the three meeting rooms were the gift of the Convention Committee, who also placed flowers in the suites of the three National Heads. Telegrams and letters were read from President Richard Nixon; Florida Governor Claude Kirk; Wm. Coffin; Frank Heacock, Benj. Edge; Thos. Johnson, Fayette Bell; Burt Kannenberg, and the National Commander of the Disabled American Veterans.

Excellent reports were given by National Officers which were referred to the Officers Reports Committee for consideration.

National Patriotic Instructor Edward Kramer reported the outstanding sum of \$1,251.35 raised for patriotic work. From this fund a scholarship award will be given a worthy student at Gettysburg College, and the annual ceremony at Lincoln Monument in Washington D. C. as well as the annual ceremony at the Lincoln Tomb in Springfield, Ill., and the Remembrance Day ceremony at Gettysburg will be subsidized.

Visiting committees were received from the Auxiliary and the Ladies of the G. A. R. The Auxiliary committee Chairlady was P.N.P. Anne O. Clayton, who was accompanied by Natl. Pres. Florence Jansson and the entire New Jersey Auxiliary delegation, including Mrs. Marion Combs, wife of the Commander-in-Chief and Mrs. Laura Combs, his mother. The Ladies of the G. A. R. group consisted of all of the Past National Presidents in attendance.

On Thursday the newly elected officers were installed by Past Commander-in-Chief Joseph S. Rippey of New York. The Past Commander-in-Chief badge was presented to Bro. Fred H. Combs Jr., by his father, P.D.C. Fred H. Combs Sr. A gold Past Commander-in-Chief lapel button was presented to outgoing Commander Combs by Natl. Secy Treas. Shriver.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

- Approval of a "Burning of the Flag Ceremony" and printing of leaflet of instruction for inclusion in the Ritual.
- Appreciation to the New Jersey Department for arranging the 1970 Encampment, also to the Miami Beach Convention Bureau, the Hotel, and to Hon. Arthur Vater the Camp Fire speaker.
- 3. WHEREAS, today we find enemies at home and abroad who boldly propose to do away with our form of government; are upsetting our economy and the rights of individuals that are guaranteed by the Constitution:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War meeting in their 89th National Convention:

- a. We believe that our leaders detest war, and that they will get us out of the unpopular Vietnam situation as soon as it is safe for America, but in the meantime we believe that we should support our fighting men and not support our enemies by attacking our own government.
- b. It is time to call a halt to wild and irresponsible actions of the campus radicals, who are utterly without the benefit of having lived long enough to have either judgment or wisdom. Their tactics are childish but brutal, naive but dangerous, and completely arrogant. We owe the younger generation love and respect when they deserve it. We do not owe them our souls, our privacy, our whole lives and above all, we do not owe them immunity for their mistakes. The blame for violence lies with those who created it and those permissive administrators and faculty members that allowed it to happen.
- c. We believe that the spreading of drug addiction is a prime danger encouraged by our country's enemies in an effort to undermine the health and morals of our people. We ask that the Courts stop being lenient, and that pushers and addicts both be controlled by whatever means is necessary.
- d. We believe that as a government of law, not of men, we should insist upon complete enforcement of the law. We urge that police not be hampered, and that offenders be punished by the courts to the full extent of the law. We fervently hope that it is not already too late. A continued and increased defiance of responsible behavior will cause damage too great to contemplate.
- e. Whereas all fifty states and the Congress have enacted legislation making it a crime to publicly mutilate, deface, defile or defy, trample upon or cast contempt upon either by words or act, the American Flag, we insist that disrespect for our flag must not be tolerated. Unfortunately the United States Supreme Court in a decision on April 1, 1969 side-stepped an opportunity to rule on the constitutionality of the law. It is hoped that the Court will soon have an opportunity to decide the matter on its merits.
- f. We protest the political activities and lobbying of some churches and some members of the Clergy, which is a clear violation of the historic principals of the separation of church and state. We urge them to stop using the mantle of religion to promote ultra-liberal causes such as giving reparation payments to radical blacks, recognition of Communist Cuba, and also for giving aid and comfort to draft dodgers and those who burn draft board records.

THE VIEW FROM HERE

Don't be a mature drop out. Being cynical never accomplished anything. Don't think negative, and feel that nothing can be done. Destructive forces are at work in our Country, trying to break down the moral fiber of individuals and the people as a whole. Get the undiluted facts behind the stories in the news. We who are interested in America of yester-

day, of today, and of tomorrow must be leaders in recovery of confidence in our country.

We, who have inherited from our forefathers the Constitution and institutions best fitted to secure the national welfare and to preserve the individual rights and initiative of our citizens and cognizant that under these institutions our country achieved prosperty and became the leader of the free world, feel deep concern over the threat to our economy and our prestige abroad. Also by the constant step by step domination, both at home and abroad of Soviet Cummunism, by which term we mean the viciously and cunningly distorted and deliberately false ideas of the American concept of popular. representative government. They use the medium of distorted and false political, economic and social philosophies, giving lip service to such words as democracy, freedom, liberty and equality. Then they proceed by their acts and deceptive arguments to demonstrate a purpose and intention precisely opposite - namely the autocratic domination of the world, including the United States of America.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

Forty five states have passed legislation to bring the observance of certain patriotic holidays into line with provisions of the federal Uniform Holiday Act of 1968. (Starting Jan. 1971 Federal employee holidays will be observed: New Year's Day, Jan. 1; Washington's Birthday, third Monday in February; Memorial Day, last Monday in May; Independence Day, July 4: Labor Day, first Monday in September; Columbus Day, second Monday in October; Veterans' Day fourth Monday in October: Thanksgiving Day, fourth Thursday in November; Christmas, December 25 — Editor)

The Cooper-Church Amendment — Emotions aroused by the current controversy make the real issue - that of balancing the war-making power of Congress with the awesome responsibility of the President to protect our country from attack, Armed conflict is a way of life in much of our world. Twentyfive years of cold and hot war psychology could not have been foreseen by the Founding Fathers much less predicted a generation ago. Perhaps legislation is needed to define more clearly the responsibilities of the Congress and the President under present-day conditions. The President must have ample authority to repel attack upon our shores and to protect our armed forces and citizens wherever they may be - (Since this was written the Cooper-Church Amendment has been defeated in the Senate - Editor)

Subversive Activities - Fifteen years ago it was generally agreed that the Government should not have in its employ a citizen "disloyal" to his country. Admittedly, how that disloyalty was to be defined and the measure taken to remove such a person from Government service were subject to interpretation and question. But the basic premise seemed to be well accepted. Over the years there has been agreement that advocacy of violent overthrow of our form of government constituted overt disloyalty. But overthrow can also be accomplished by other means - deceit, treachery, or even indifference. Individuals who wish to present their views on these matters are invited to communicate with Rep. Richard H. Ichord of Missouri, chairman of the Committee on Internal Security.
