New National Heads . . .

Elected in Des Moines, Iowa



COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF Harold T. Beilby

Elected Commander-in-Chief of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War at the 96th National Encampment held in Des Moines, Iowa, on August 14 - 18, 1977.

Brother Beilby's grandfather, Henry M. Beilby, served in the Civil War as a Private in Co. B, 13th New York Volunteers. He was taken prisoner and was incarcerated at Libby Prison for eleven months. He was discharged at the end of the war.

Harold T. Beilby joined O'Rorke Camp No. 60 in 1922 and was elected Camp Commander in 1927. He served as Camp Secretary from 1928 until he entered military service in the U. S. Air Corps in 1942. Upon discharge in 1944 he resumed his active role in the Order. He served as Department Commander in 1941 and has held numerous Department level offices. He served the Order in the Rochester, New York, area in many ways, including several years on the joint exemplification team made up of the four Camps in the Rochester area. After his Camp consolidated with Abraham Lincoln Camp No. 6 he again served as Camp Commander for two years. He was Secretary-Treasurer of the New York Department Past Commanders and Past Presidents Association for several years, is currently Secretary of the Southern Tier Association in New York and has served as Adjutant of the Memorial and Executive Council of Monroe County.

Brother Beilby has served the National Organization as Personal Aide, Jr. Vice Commander and Sr. Vice Commander. He is retired from the University of Rochester since 1968. He and his wife, Margaret, have three daughters, two sons, twenty three grandchildren and four great grandchildren.



NATIONAL PRESIDENT Marion E. Combs

Elected National President of the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War at the 91st Annual National Encampment held in Des Moines, Iowa, on August 14 - 18, 1977.

Sister Combs joined Auxiliary #18 to General James A. Garfield Camp #4 in Trenton, New Jersey, in 1942, shortly after her marriage to Fred H. Combs, Jr. who has been an active member since his sixteenth birthday. Born in Lawrenceville, Marion has lived in the greater Trenton area all of her life except for a short period during Fred's World War II military service. She was graduated from Princeton High School, was Assistant Clerk of the local Selective Service Board, wrote local social and civic news for Trenton and Princeton newspapers and has many years of experience as an administrative secretary in private and public school systems.

Marion's talents range from poetry to dabbling in arts and crafts. She is an ordained Deacon of the Slackwood Presbyterian Church where she also has served as Director of the Vacation Church School and is a member of the Christian Education Commission. She has served as a leader in Brownie and Girl Scout troops, a volunteer aide at the Mercer Medical Center in Trenton, a member of the Lawrence-ville Volunteer Fire Company Auxiliary, the Lawrence-ville Grange and is a charter member of the Lawrence Historical Society. With Fred she is a patron of the Greater Trenton Area Symphony Orchestra and the Garden State Theatre Organ Society.

Marion served as Department President in 1973 and 1974 and was the first person in New Jersey to serve two consecutive terms. She has held numerous Department Offices.

Marion and Fred have two daughters and two granddaughters, the most recent having been born only last January.

ENCAMPMENT NEWS

The 96th Annual National Encampment of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War and the 91st Annual National Convention of the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans and of the Ladies of the G.A.R. were held on August 14 - 18, 1977 in the Savery Hotel in Des Moines, Iowa. There were 105 members registered for the SUVCW with 74 of these present. The official voting strength of the Encampment was 72 since Camps-at-Large enjoy only one vote regardless of number present. Following a Sunday meeting of the Council of Administration (reported elsewhere in this issue) the Joint Memorial Service of the Sons and Auxiliary was conducted in the Ballroom of the Hotel under the leadership of Richard E. Wyman, National Chaplain of the SUVCW and Mrs. Margaret Beilby, National Chaplain of the Auxiliary. Musical selections, the lighting and extinguishing of candles and special tributes by several Past Commanders-in Chief and Past National Presidents highlighted this beautiful service. Department Commanders and Department Presidents, or their representatives, placed flowers in tribute to those who had passed away during the past year. Tributes were also paid to the memory of the G.A.R. and to all Past commanders-in-Chief and Past National Presidents.

Following an hour long band concert by the 34th Army Band, Iowa Army National Guard (CWO Ronald Prill, directing) the annual Campfire Program was held at 8:00 P.M. on Sunday in the Ballroom of the Hotel, the 34th Army Band remained to play for the Campfire also and was loudly applauded for an outstanding performance. The Campfire was opened with the posting of the colors by cadets of the Iowa Military Academy, Iowa Army National Guard, and by a contingent from the Sons of Veterans Reserve. Following the National Anthem and the Pledge of Allegiance, the program was opened with an invocation from National Chaplain Richard E. Wyman. Iowa Department Commander Richard McCoy welcomed the delegates to Des Moines. There were brief remarks by Kenneth T. Wheeler of New Hampshire. Commander-in-Chief of the SUVCW, Minnie E. Madeiros

of Massachusetts, National President of the Auxiliary to SUVCW and Elizabeth B. Koch of Pennsylvania, National President of the Ladies of the G.A.R. Following a selection of Civil War Tunes by the 34th Army Band, the principal address was given by Brigadier General Ronald Woodin, Deputy Adjutant General of the State of Iowa. Following General Woodin's address, the band played The Battle Hymn of the Republic and a Benediction was offered by Mrs Margaret Beilby, National Chaplain of the Auxiliary. The colors were retired by the Cadets of the Iowa Military Academy and by the contingent from the Sons of Veterans Reserve and taps were played by the 34th Army Band. The entire Campfire was presided over by Major General Joseph Flatt, also of the Iowa Army National Guard. The Sons and Auxiliary Encampments opened with a joint session

on Monday, August 15th, at 9:30 A.M. with P. C. in C. John C. Yocum and Mrs. Lelia Turner, National Chiefs of Staff of the Sons and Auxiliary respectively, in charge. The joint opening was held in the Ballroom of the Hotel which also was the site of the Auxiliary meetings. Following the formal opening, the Sons retired to the Des Moines room where their business sessions were held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Commander-in-Chief Wheeler appointed the following floor officers for this Encampment: Guide, Richard C. Schlenker of Maryland; Color Bearer, James Ledwith, PDC, of Connecticut; and Guard, Eugene Russell, PDC, of Massachusetts. In addition to the standing committees already appointed, Commander-in-Chief Wheeler appointed the following chairmen for committees to serve this Encampment:



The above Chairmen and their committees served effectively during the Encampment and were discharged with appreciation prior



to the closing of the sessions. Highlights of actions by these committees as well as by the standing committees and the general Encampment follow. The registration of 105 members of the Encampment consisted of one Commander-in-Chief, 13 Past Commanders-in-Chief, nine Department Commanders, 54 Past Department Commanders, 26 Delegates and two members-at-large. The Past Commanders-in-Chief present were:

Actions taken at the Encampment included the following:

- ... Adopted a Resolution for the amendment of Article III of the Constitution, entitled Eligibility to Membership, to read that all male descendants, whether through lineal or collateral line, not less than fourteen years of age, etc. This resolution, which would allow collateral as well as lineal descendency, must be approved by a majority of all Departments and all Camps At Large before becoming effective.
- ... Adopted a Resolution for the amendment of Article VII of the Constitution, entitled Membership, to provide that the total number of Associate Members in any Camp shall not exceed one-third, that no Camp, Department or National meeting may proceed if Associate Members exceed forty-nine per cent of the total attendance, that Associates must be ineligible for full membership due to lack of lineal or collateral descent from a Union Veteran and that such Associate members are not eligible to hold the office of Commander-in-Chief. This resolution must be approved by a majority of all Departments and all Camps At Large before becoming effective.
- ... Adopted a Resolution urging that the eternal flame of the Eternal Peace Memorial on Oak Hill, scene of the first day's clash in the Battle of Gettysburg, be rekindled so that it will burn eternally in memory of those many fighting men who struggled and died in that fierce battle. This Resolution noted that a reduced flame will not consume any volume of energy and further noted that other eternal flames under the control of the U. S. Government have never been extinguished nor reduced.
- ... Adopted a Resolution denouncing and condemning the recent pardoning of draft evaders by the President of the United States, any further pardoning or amnesty for deserters from the Armed Forces and the upgrading of any discharge which was, when granted, less than Honorable to the status of Honorable and the qualification of those individuals so upgraded to all the benefits accorded to veterans who have served and been discharged Honorably.
- ... Adopted a Resolution condemning the common practice of desecrating Memorial Day by commercial exploitation of the Holiday by retail sales organizations, etc.
- ... Adopted a Resolution rejecting movements currently being considered to replace the STAR SPANGLED BANNER as our National Anthem and firmly supporting the retaining of our present National Anthem.
- ... Adopted a Resolution opposing the recognition of Cuba, the placing of women in combat jobs, the relinquishing of American sovereignty over the "United States Canal" located on the Isthmus of Panama and the unionization of the Military Service. Also pledging support to the C.I.A., to the F.B.I., to the Republic of Korea and pledging to never forget Americans who remain officially Missing in Action.
- ... Adopted Resolutions opposing the concept of amnesty for illegal immigrants and in favor of bills to control this situation such as H.R. 982, H.R. 257 and H.R. 3737. Also requesting the District of Columbia and the National Capital Regional Park Service to better recognize and care for the site of the Battle of Fort Stevens, the only Civil War battle fought within the District of Columbia and the only one at which a President was present.
- ... Adopted a Resolution requesting closer security be maintained at the National Archives and the Library of Congress both to

prevent vandalism and to stop the loss of stolen records.

... Instructed the incoming Encampment Site Committee to report as quickly as possible on the selection of a 1978 Encampment site. This selection was not finalized at this Encampment due to considerable debate regarding possible sites and the late receipt of some invitations which are now under consideration.

The full text of all Resolutions and the full proceedings of this Encampment will be published in the official proceedings thereof. The business sessions adjourned late on Wednesday afternoon and Thursday was devoted to sightseeing and a ceremony dedicating the Soldiers and Sailors monument on the State Capital grounds in Des Moines.

Included among the social and entertainment events that took place during the Encampment were the Past Commanders-in-Chief and Past National Presidents banquet on Monday evening and an enjoyable Sons and Auxiliary banquet on Tuesday evening. P. C. in C. Jack Yocum from Pennsylvania served as Toastmaster for the Tuesday banquet which was followed by a reception honoring National Officers of the Sons and Auxiliary. There were numerous State delegation luncheons, dinners and parties.

AUXILIARY CONVENTION NEWS

The 91st annual National Encampment of the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War was held the week of August 14th at Des Moines, Iowa. Headquarters was the Savery Hotel where all business and social events took place.

On Sunday, delegates went to the church of their choice and for those who did not want to leave the Hotel a service was conducted by the Rev. Richard Pardington of the Pennsylvania Department.

During the afternoon the Registration of delegates took place and this was followed by a beautiful Memorial Service for the Sons and Auxiliary. At 7:00 P.M. an enjoyable Band Concert was provided for members of all three Organizations. A well planned Camp Fire program followed the concert. In another part of this issue of THE BANNER you will find a more detailed account of these events.

On Monday morning the Official joint opening of the Sons and Auxiliary was held under the direction of National Chief of Staff of the Auxiliary Lelia Turner and National Chief of Staff of the Sons John Yocum. this opening was held in the Ballroom of the hotel which was the Auxiliary meeting room for the rest of the encampment.

National President Minnie Madeiros and Commander in Chief Kenneth Wheeler were escorted into the room by their Personal Aides and were placed in the front of the room where they could receive their National Officers and Past National Presidents and Commanders. After brief remarks by Sr. Madeiros and Bro. Wheeler the Sons retired to the Des Moines room where their meetings were to be held

The business meeting of the Auxiliary was called to order by the National President at 10:30 A.M. Convention floor officers were appointed by Sr. Madeiros as well as Encampment committees and other committees.

The convention committee was then escorted into the room, extended their greetings to the National President and delegates and presented a lovely basket of flowers to the National President which was placed in front of her station.

The alter was arranged and the Guides and Color Guards checked all I.D. cards to ascertain that all present were entitled to remain. Position was taken at the alter for the singing of the Star Spangled Banner, the pledge to the flag, the singing of America and the recitation of the American Creed.

Roll call of National Officers found all officers in attendance except the National Press Correspondent. Roll Call of Past National Presidents found sixteen present and each received a gift as did the Sitting Department Presidents of which there were nine who answered the roll call. Department Presidents for 1976-1977 were introduced and eight responded. This group as well as all convention appointees received a gift from the National President who expressed her sincere thanks for all the help she had received during the year.

National President Madeiros then read a most interesting and inspiring report of her years work. Following the reading of this report a rising vote of appreciation was afforded the National President. P.N.P. Ursula Shepardson, speaking on behalf of the National Organization, presented Sr. Madeiros with her testimonial - a check in the amount of \$200.00. The meeting was then recessed until 1:30 P.M.

Monday afternoon session reconvened at 1:45 P.M. National Officers reports were received and turned over to the committee on Officers reports for action. These were followed by the reports of standing committees. Department reports were interspersed between committee reports. The reports of Departments revealed a varied number of patriotic things done in the name of the Organization during the year and it was most gratifying to note the successful efforts of our members in the various Departments. At 3:30 P.M. we received into our meeting Mr. Robert Langdien who was present representing the Smouse Opportunity School who was to receive our check in the amount of \$350.00 presented in the name of the Grand Army of the Republic, National Patriotic Instructor Florence Forbey made the presentation. This school takes care of physically handicapped children who are unable to attend public school. During Mr. Langdien's talk he told us that the money would be used toward the purchase of therapy equipment to be used in the school. It was also announced that labels from Campbell soup cans were also being solicited since these were a source of income for the school, Anyone desiring to save these labels can send them either to the school: Smouse Opportunity School, 28th and Center, Des Moines, Iowa or to Sr. Florence Forbey, 4231/2 15th St., Moline, Illinois 61265. P.N.P. Caroline Riddell responded to Mr. Langdien. Correspondence was then read after which the meeting recessed to reconvene at 9:00 A.M. Tuesday morning.

On Monday evening the Past National Presidents and Past Commanders in Chief held their annual Banquet simultaneous with an exemplification of the Ritual by both the Sons and Auxiliary. This was followed by an enjoyable Courtesy Hour for National President Madeiros and Commander in Chief Wheeler under the direction of National Chief of Staff Lelia Turner.

Tuesday morning meeting convened at 9:30 A.M. The alter was arranged, minutes of the Monday meetings were read and approved. Reports of National Officers and standing committees continued through the morning. After a recess at 12:00 noon the meeting reconvened at 1:30 P.M. The first order of business on Tuesday afternoon was nomination of National Officers for the coming year. A listing of the newly elected officers appears in another part of this BANNER and all are requested to refer to that listing for the names and addresses of the newly elected officers. Committee reports were continued until it was time to receive greetings committees from other Organizations. During the visit of the Sons P.C. in C. Frank Heacock spoke of the importance of contacting your representatives in Washington, D.C. relative to House Bill 7232 having to do with returning the observance of Memorial Day back to May 30th -- the day designated by the G.A.R. He urged all members to send many cards to their representatives in Washington as a protest to the present day practice of celebrating this very important day in our Organization on the fourth Monday of May regardless of what that date might be. It is to be hoped that all our members will do all in their power to have this date changed back to its rightful place on our calendars.

The Tuesday afternoon session recessed at 3:45 P.M. Tuesday evening a delightful banquet and reception was held honoring our National President and Commander-in-Chief. This affair was under the direction of National Chief of Staff Turner with P.C. in C. Yocum acting as Toastmaster. A reception and dancing followed the banquet and was thoroughly enjoyed by all in attendance. All present were invited to visit the suite of the National President to see the many lovely gifts she received at her Courtesy Hour.

Wednesday morning the meeting reconvened at 9:30 A.M. Minutes of Tuesday's session were read and approved. Communications were read and ordered filed. The Committee on Officers Reports gave their report on their findings and actions. All approved recommendations will appear in the National President's first order. The National Patriotic Instructor gave her financial report which netted \$1472.92 to be turned over to the National Treasurer for Patriotic work. This report was enthusiastically received by all the delegates who gave Sr. Forbey a rising vote of thanks and a round of applause. National Chief of Staff Lelia Turner then gave her report which totaled \$2529.22 after expenses. Sr. Turner was afforded the same splendid

overion by the delegates as was given Sr. Forbey. Both of these officers are to be congratulated on the success of their efforts and commended for their loyalty to the Organization.

This being the last order of business before Installation of Officers. an announcement was made as to the time and place for the final meeting of the Council, Newly elected National President Marion E Combs of N. J. was installed by P.N.P. Anne O Clayton of N. J. who was assisted by a staff of officers comprised of members of the New Jersey Department. We were delighted the Sons recessed their meeting long enough to be present at our Installation. Following the Installation, the Chaplain attended the altar and the 91st Annual National Encampment was officially closed with the Ritualistic

The 1978 National Encampment site has not yet been determined. As soon as a place and time has been decided on by the Sons, the information will be forwarded to the various Departments.

On Thursday a conducted tour of Des Moines was sponsored by the Department of Iowa. This was a carefully planned day and one that everyone enjoyed. All who went on the tour are agreed it was a day well spent and congratulations are in order to those who were responsible for the plans made.

COUNCIL OF ADMINISTRATION ACTIONS

The following actions were taken by the Council of Administration during its meetings on August 14, 1977 and August 17, 1977 in Des

- 1. Appointed P. C. in C. Joseph S. Rippey, P. C. in C. Fred H. Combs. Jr. and P.D.C. William C. Rule as a sub-committee to prepare a budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1978.
- 2. Appointed P. C. in C. Clarence J. Riddell and P.D.C. Richard Greenwalt to serve as an Audit Committee to review the report of the outside auditor for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1977.
- 3. Reappointed P.D.C. Albert W. Lambert as Editor of THE BANNER for the coming year and continued the subscription rate at \$2.00 per year.
- 4. Recommended to the Budget Committee that the allowance per issue of THE BANNER be increased to \$750.00 per issue. This increase of \$50.00 or 7.1% being due to increased costs. Also approved the recommendations of the Editor that the quality of paper and printing and the method of distribution of THE BANNER remain unchanged.
- 5. Continued for 1977-78 the annual payment of \$6.00 to Camps on life memberships.
- 6. Established a goal of \$1,700.00 for the National Patriotic Instructor to raise during 1977-78 for the G.A.R. Memorial Fund.
- 7. Ordered a formal reply to an inquiry from Gettysburg College regarding the selection criteria for the person to receive the annual Scholarship. This reply to clearly affirm that there are no restrictions whatsoever based upon the sex of the candidate for this scholarship.
- 8. Granted authority to the National Secretary-Treasurer to adjust the price list of supplies as might become necessary to meet rising costs of supplies and of postage.
- 9. Ordered that the recommendation of the outgoing National Patriotic Instructor for the establishment of a G.A.R. Memorial Medal be tabled until next year pending investigation of costs and further ordered that the incoming Patriotic Instructor shall conduct such an investigation and report to the Council of Administration in August of 1978. This report to containe full disclosure of costs and recommendations as to distribution, etc.
- 10. Voted to drop the presentation of a lapel button for outgoing Commanders-in-Chief, presently presented annually in addition to the P. C. in C. Badge, due to the unreasonable high costs of purchasing this button in qualities of one per year. This practice to be discontinued after the 1977-78 fiscal year.
- 11. Voted to instruct the incoming Fraternal Relations Committee to prepare detailed instructions for this standing committee (I.E.: purposes, function and mode of operation) and to report same to the National Encampment in August of 1978.
- 12. Approved placement of dividends earned on the Wellington Fund and the interest earned on the special savings accounts in the General Fund for 1977-78.

THE LEGISLATIVE REPORT

A major debate is shaping up in the Senate over terms of the Panama Canal treaty. As this column is written, a subcommittee chaired by Sen. James Allen of Ala. is about to examine the terms of the treaty as they relate to constitutional issues. This represents a preliminary skirmish in what promises to be a lively tussle. A twothirds majority - 67 Senators - is needed to ratify a treaty. Opponents of the treaty have promised to "talk it to death" by means of a filibuster should that become necessary. Not since the issue of the League of Nations has the Senate been faced with a more dramatic struggle over the provisions of a proposed treaty.

Despite the introduction of several bills and resolutions to return Memorial Day to May 30 (H.R. 2467, H.R. 7232, Hse. Jt. Res. 100 and Hse. Jt. Res. 356) in the House of Representatives, no hearings have been scheduled by the Subcommittee on Census and Population to which the measures have been referred. This panel is chaired by Rep. William Lehman of Fla., and includes Reps. James J. Howard, N.J., Leo J. Ryan, Calif, Patricia Schroeder, Colo., Stephen J. Solarz, N.Y., John H. Rousselot, Calif., and James A. S. Leach, Iowa.

* * * * * * * * *

Under terms of H.R. 2437, Manasses (Bull Run) National Battlefield Park in Virginia would be enlarged by about 1,800 acres and the site enhanced. The measure passed the House in the 94th Congress on September 29, 1976, but its provisions were deleted from the omnibus parks bill when it reached the Senate late in the session. In the 95th Congress the process must begin new.

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Jefferson Davis, first and only President of the Confederacy, would have full rights of citizenship restored posthumously under terms of several measures introduced in both houses of Congress. Sen. Jt. Res. 16 passed the Senate on April 27, and is presently before the House Judiciary Committee.

The Senate by a 38-aye, 44-nay vote on June 24 refused to delete Section 606 from H.R. 7556, the amendment to the appropriations bill for the Departments of State, Justice, Commerce, and the Judiciary, banning the use of funds for Pres. Carter's program of amnesty for Vietnam draft dodgers. Sponsored by Rep. John Myers of Ind., the amendment passed the House on March 16, as reported in the last issue of THE BANNER.

* * * * * * * * *

Athiest Madalyn Murray O'Hair has indicated that she plans to file suit in federal court to force removal of the phrase "In God We Trust" from United States coins and paper money. Mrs. O'Hair contents that the inscription on U.S. currency compels individuals to subscribe to and affirm a belief "which represents an abridgement of their rights under the free exercise clause and the establishment clause of the First Amendment." One of the guarantees of the First Amendment deals with the free exercise of religion and declares that Congress shall make no law abridging that freedom.

* * * * * * * * * * *

In New Jersey, a federal judge has ruled that the State cannot require public school students to stand during the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance. Federal District Judge H. Curtis Meanor interpreted the New Jersey law which required all students to stand to be evidence of "symbolic speech" and contrary to the free speech guarantee of the First Amendment. Judge Meanor also ruled that another section of the law barring disruptions during the reciting of the Pledge, was constitutional and would remain in force. The case involved a 16 year old high school student from a New York suburb who declared she could not honestly take the Pledge of Allegiance and refused even to stand while it was recited.


