HIS TRUTH IS MARCHING ON



An outstanding event of the Encampment in Washington was the Camp Fire Program held in the Ballroom of the Hotel Mayflower on Sunday evening, August 19th. The program started at 7:30 P. M. at which time a concert was played by the United States Marine Band. After the colors were escorted in by the Harrisburg Fife and Drum Corps, the group was welcomed by General Chairman, U. S. Grant 3rd. Outstanding addresses were delivered by Congressman William H. Ayres of Ohio and Congressman Wm. J. B. Dorn of South Carolina. Civil War songs were sung by the nationally famous "Singing Sergeants" of the U. S. Air Force. Each National President was called upon, and several representatives of visiting organizations were presented. "Taps" were sounded by a bugler from the Marine Corps Band, and the Colors were retired by the Field Music, S.V.R.

D. C. ENCAMPMENT REPORT

Through the efforts of Gen. U. S. Grant 3rd and his committee, the Washington, D. C. Encampment was one of the finest ever conducted. The planning and execution of the many fine features were greatly appreciated by all present.

On Saturday, August 18th through Thursday, August 23rd, the officers, delegates, members and friends were treated to a splendid program at the S1st National Encampment, along with the 76th National Encampment of the Auxiliary and the 76th National Convention of the Ladies of the G. A. R. All three organizations were housed at the Mayflower Hotel, where all business and social functions were held. Registration was as follows: SUVCW 111, Auxiliary 203, Ladies of the G. A. R. 155. Each organization also had non-voting members and guests in attendance.

Delegates attended the church of their choice on Sunday morning. In the afternoon each organization registered delegates and at 3 P. M. the three organizations conducted a Joint Memorial Service under direction of their National Chaplains in the Ballroom. The entire program will be printed in the proceedings.

On Monday morning there was a courtesy breakfast for National Officers and Past National Presiding Officers, which was followed by a Joint Opening of the Sons and Auxiliary in the East Room. Business sessions were held on Monday. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. On Monday evening the annual hanguet of the Past Commanders-in-Chief and the Past National Presidents was held in the Virginia Room. A thoroughly enjoyable Banquet and Reception honoring the National Officers of the Sons and Aux, was held on Tuesday evening in the Ballroom. Another feature of the week was the bus tour of Washington which was held from 1 P. M. to 5 P. M. on Wednesday.

BUSINESS SESSIONS

Were held in the Chinese Room. The first session was called to order at 10:30 A. M. on Monday.

Commander-in-Chief Shriver announced the following appointments: Guide. Clark Mellor of Mass.; Color Bearer, James Ledwith of Conn.; Guard, Eugene Patten of New Jersey. The following committee chairmen were appointed: Credentials, Herbert Bogue of Mass.; Press, Arthur Glenum of D. C.: Officers Reports, Thomas Chadwick of Vermont; Resolutions, Wm. M. Coffin of Ohio; Constitution & Regulations, Albert DeHaven of Maine: Ritual & Ceremonies, Fred Howe of New York; Restoration of Rank, Earl Riggs of Calif.: Fraternal Greetings, Wm. M. Coffin of Ohio; and 1964 Encampment City, C. Leroy Stoudt of Penna. The entire SUVCW convention accompanied the Fraternal Relations Committee to the Auxiliary and the Ladies of the GAR

The following Resolution was adopted by all three organizations at their opening session:

- 1. We favor all appropriations that are needful for the National Defense and our country's security.
- 2. We favor the reduction of the expenses of government with a view to balancing the annual budget, and gradually liquidating the National Debt.
- 3. We strongly urge reduction of the Income Tax; elimination of Foreign Aid to all but declared friendly nations: and the strict curtailment of all welfare programs, without which our Country has been prosperous and successful in the past.
- 4. We favor a firmer stand in foreign relations and believe that history shows appeasement only leads to war.
- 5. We favor more strict observance of the rights reserved to the states and the people, as provided in the 10th amendment of our Constitution, and the balanced distribution of responsibilities and authority among the three branches of our Federal Government, as set forth in the Constitution.

Other resolutions adopted recommended that "In the name of patriotism and Americanism, we deplore any move to weaken our National Guard either through repeated internal reorganization or through a cutback in strength"; and "immediate construction of the Fort Boulevard in the Nation's Capital" and also the following:

A resolution was adopted favoring a prayer to be used in public schools, provided that it not be dictated in form or content by public authority.

A new office of National Recorder was created. His duties will be to assist those desiring to trace their ancestry and establish eligibility to membership.

It was decided to purchase a bench to be placed nearby the Albert Woolson monument in Ziegler's Grove at Gettysburg. The Auxiliary also will provide a bench for the same purposé.

By unanimous action of the Encampment, the title of Past Commander in Chief was conferred on Brother Charles L. Messer, who died in office. Members present then contributed a fund to provide a Past Commander-in-Chief's Badge to be mounted on a silver tray to be presented to Mrs. Messer.

His Great Grandfather, Lewis P. Shriver served in Company B, 21st Pennsylvania Cavalry.

Bro, Shriver joined Camp 112, Gettysburg in 1947 where he has served in all offices, and has served on the Memorial Day Committee for twelve years, and as General Chairman of the Joint Veterans Memorial Day committee for ten years. He was elected Department Commander of Pennsylvania in 1956 and has served as Department Secretary-Treasurer since 1957. He has served in many National Offices and

Committees. including Sr. Vice Commander in 1961. He was born in Adams County at the edge of the Gettysburg Battlefield in 1924, graduated from Gettysburg High School and at present is a representative of the Home Mutual Life Insurance Co. Along with his wife Ruba and daughter Donna, he attends Mt. Joy Lutheran Church, and is active in many civic and athletic groups. He is a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee for Gettysburg College and Honorary Chairman of Adams County Civil War Centennial Commission. Auxiliary Convention News

Headquarters for the National Convention held in Washington, D. C., August 19-23, 1962 were established at the Hotel Mayflower where all meetings and social affairs took place. Delegates began arriving as early as Saturday morning and by Sunday noon practically every Department in the National Organization was represented. This is really one of the nicest times of the convention. Before the pressure of business meetings and the anticipation of social affairs really takes over, the time can be spent in renewing old acquaintances. Friends who haven't met in a year's time can spend some time getting caught up on all that has happened since they last met.

On Sunday morning many of the members went to the Church of their choice returning to the Hotel around noon. Registration opened at 1:00 P. M. for the registration of delegates and the distribution of convention programs. National Council met at 2:00 P. M. and at 3:00 P. M. the Joint Memorial Service for all three Organizations was held in the Ballroom of the Hotel. This was a most impressive service and tributes were given in memory of the deceased members of all Organizations.

Monday morning saw the opening of the business sessions of the Convention. The opening ceremonies under the direc-tion of Auxiliary Chief of Staff Ethel Jones and Chief of Staff of the Sons C. Leroy Stoudt were very nice. National President Dorothy Hilyard and Commander in Chief Chester Shriver were received, along with their respective officers, with all the pomp and ceremony due them as presiding Following the joint opening the Sons retired to officers their meeting room and everyone settled down to the serious business of the convention. Sister Hilyard called the meeting to order following which all National Officers, Past National Presidents, Department Presidents and immediate Past Department Presidents were introduced and presented with a remembrance from the National President. Convention appointments were then made and the business was under way.

Sister Hilyard gave a complete and concise report of heryear's activities, an interesting report that was well received. Immediately following the reading of this report the testimonial presented by the National Organization was given to the National President and was most graciously received by her. After the noon recess reports of National Officers were taken up starting with the National Vice President. These reports were interrupted briefly in order that we might receive a greetings committee from the Sons. The entire delegation in attendance at the Sons Convention marched into the room headed by the Commander in Chief.

The Scholarship was given this year to George Riddell of Wilmington, Delaware who will use it toward his expenses in studying for the ministry. We were delighted to receive Mr. Riddell into our meeting and to witness the actual presentation by our National President. This very fine young man was accompanied by his Father and Mother and younger Brother and all expressed their delight and pride that one of their family had been so honored.

Tuesday morning session was a continuation of the reading of Officers Reports and Committee reports. On Tuesday afternoon the first order of business was nomination of Officers. A complete listing of the officers elected appears in another part of THE BANNER and need not be repeated here. The highlight of the afternoon session was the presentation by the National Patriotic Instructor. This year the Memorial to the G. A. R. was a \$250.00 check to be used toward the purchase of two TV sets for the patients of Mt. Alto Veteran Hospital. This was received by Mr. C. Sam Fox, Director of Voluntary Service of the Hospital. Mr. Fox told of some of the activities of the Hospital and expressed appreciation for the much needed gift.

Wednesday morning was devoted to the reading of more reports. Action was taken to place a bench at the site of the Woolson Monument in Gettysburg. The Sons in their convention voted to place a bench also. These benches will be dedicated at the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg in July 1963. Favorable action was also taken to replace the 48 star flag now at Ft. Monroe with a new 50 star flag.

Wednesday afternoon a bus trip was planned for the delegates. This was a most delightful four hour trip starting at 1:00 P. M. After a tour of Washington proper, with a stop at the Lincoln Museum and the House Where Lincoln Died, the busses headed out toward Arlington Cemetery. Stops were made at the Custis-Lee Mansion (The Robert E. Lee Memorial) then on to the Unknown Civil War Monument where wreaths were placed by the Heads of the three Organizations. We reached the Tomb of the Unknowns just at the time of the changing of the Guard which was most impressive. Wreaths were placed here also by Commander in Chief Shriver, Natl. Pres. Hilyard and Natl. Pres. Ure. On the way out of the Cemetery a brief stop was made at the Confederate Soldiers Monument where a wreath was placed. Some of the busses made a brief stop at the U. S. Marine Memorial. This monument depicting the raising of the flag at Iwo Jima is very beautiful—a

Thursday morning we received the reports of our two money officers. The National Patriotic Instructor reported a fund of \$1,219.15 and the National Chief of Staff reported \$1,567.85 after expenses. Both of these reports were received with enthusiasm. There being no further business Installation of the new Officers was held. P.N.P. Katherine Joyce and P.N.P. Margaret McKinney, both of Pennsylvania Department, installed the officers jointly in a most impressive mauner. Gifts were presented to several of the officers and remarks were made by guests present after which the Convention was formally closed with the singing of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again" and "Blest Be The Tie That Binds." The Old and New Council met on Thursday afternoon to audit the books of the Secretary and Treasurer and the business of the convention was over.

Nothing has been said so far about the social affairs of which there were many. Banquets, State Dinners, Receptions, Club Breakfasts and Luncheons, along with a Courtesy Hour and entertainment, all helped to fill in the time and were enjoyed by all. Space will not permit the separate listing in detail of all these affairs—suffice to say they provided just the right amount of relaxation necessary to make a perfect week. By Friday noon most of the members had departed for their homes each promising that they would start saving for the trip to Miami Beach next August.
