

Legislative Report By Thomas L W. Johnson


Status of Civil War Battle Site Legislation— We regret to report that S. 1770, the Shenandoah Valley Civil War Sites Study Act, did not emerge from the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee to which the measure was assigned after its passage by the Senate last August. The bill, as amended. would have established a commission to study all Civil War battle

In a previous issue, we reported that S. 2437, a bill to acquire additional land for the Vicksburg National Military Park, had passed both houses of Congress. We can now report that President Bush signed the measure into law as PL 101-442 on October 18, 1990.

S. 1559 designed to expand the boundaries of the Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania County Battlefields Memorial National Military Park was not acted upon during the 101st Congress.

Status of Holiday Legislation-On February 8, 1991, Gov. Stan Stephens of Montana signed legislation to designate the third Monday in January as a state holiday to honor Martin Luther King, Jr. That action leaves only New Hampshire and Arizona without legislation establishing a paid holiday honoring Dr. King. Last November, voters in Arizona rejected a King holiday proposal that had been placed on the ballot by petition. It is expected that the Arizona Legislature will take up the issue again during the 1991-92 session.

Lincoln Memorial 1991 By Elmer Atkinson, Jr. Vice C-in-C

On a clear, very cold February 12th morning, as members of the Allied Orders and other Civil War and patriotic organizations gathered at the Lincoln Memorial, they were pleased to learn that Vice President Quayle was to be present.

After a music prelude by the U.S. Air Force Ceremonial Brass Band, the program commenced with the Presentation of Colors by the Joint Armed Service Color Guard.

The Lancaster Fencibles formed a Color Guard with Headquarters Company, fifteen men from the 28th PA SVR augmented by members of the SVR from West Virginia Brigade and other units serving as escorts for the wreath bearers.

After prayer and recitation of the Gettysburg Address by Jack Kemp, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, Vice President Quayle presented the Presidential Wreath, followed by the wreaths of the Diplomatic Corps, U.S. Dept. of

Interior, and District of Columbia.

The parade of organizational wreaths was begun by the Military Order of the Loyal Legion, followed by C-in-C George Long, SUVCW escorted by Brig. General Charles Corfman, SVR. National Auxiliary Patriotic Instructor Margaret Atkinson, escorted by Jr. Vice C-inC Elmer Atkinson, SUVCW presented the wreath for the National President of the Auxiliary.
