

HONORING FORGOTTEN VETERANS

Civil War veteran John Heimrich sat in storage at a Portland, Oregon funeral home for 111 years. When Heimrich, who had served with the 180th Ohio Infantry, died in 1913 at age 67, his body was cremated. But for unknown reasons, the ashes were never claimed by his family and eventually were placed in a non-public storage area and forgotten.

Carolyn Arntson, a Portland woman took an interest in the forgotten dead and began to build internet memorials for the now some 2,300 cremains. Along with two other women, Arntson formed Friends of Forgotten Veterans and then contacted the Baker Camp, to help research and document the service of veterans within the group of unclaimed dead.

The process led to 33 veterans and one dependant, with requests to the V.A. for interment at Willamette National Cemetery. This included four Civil War vets, eight from the Spanish-American War, seventeen from World War I, four World War II vets, and the infant son of a Navy WWII veteran. There was one woman among the veterans, an Army nurse who served in France during World War I.

The final hurdle for the team was gaining the release of the cremains. After a couple of terse emails and tense phone calls with the funeral home's attorney, Baker Camp won the release of the cremains provided they go to a national cemetery. The date of June 1, 2024 was chosen to coincide with the Department of the Columbia Encampment in Portland. A local military vehicle collectors club provided a restored WWII Army ambulance to transport the cremains the seven miles from the funeral home to the cemetery. Two Portland motorcycle police officers led the motorcade which included the ambulance, a restored WWII Jeep, and members of the Patriot Guard Riders veterans' motorcycle club. Color guards were provided by the Sons of Veterans Reserve, the Sons of the American Revolution, and the Portland Fire Bureau. The Portland Firefighters Pipe & Drum band was on hand to pipe in the cremains.

A crowd of over two hundred spectators watched as the boxes were unloaded. The SVR provided four uniformed men for the Civil War cremains, the other thirty boxes were carried by a mixed honor guard of U.S. Army, Navy, and Marine Corps personnel and reenactors representing soldiers and a nurse from WWI. After an invocation, Carolyn Arntson gave the eulogy. The names and service branch of those intered was read and floral tributes placed by the ladies of Mary Ann Lee Baker Auxiliary to the SUVCW while the pipers played Amazing Grace. After the benediction, thirty-four white doves were released, one for each of the deceased. Three musket volleys rang out and Taps sounded. Among the attendees at the ceremony were distinguished members of the state legislature, county commissioners, and the Director of the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs.

EUGENE MORTORFF, PCINC 1954 – 2024



Commander-in-Chief Eugene G. Mortorff was born in 1954 near Gettysburg, PA. He joined the SUVCW in 1997 with the Department of the Chesapeake and was elected Commander-in-Chief at the 134th Annual National Encampment at Richmond, Virginia on August 22, 2015. Gene passed from this world May 25, 2024.

He has been a member of four Camps in two SUVCW Departments (Chesapeake and Pennsylvania). He co-organized one of the Camps and remains active with the three others. Garfield Camp #1 of Baltimore, Maryland is his primary SUVCW Camp, which he commanded. He was also Commander, Secretary-Treasurer (3 Years), Councilman, Patriotic Instructor, Webmaster and Newsletter Editor for the Department of the Chesapeake. Commander-in-Chief Mortorff is also a member of the Sons of Veterans Reserve, the military branch of the Sons of Union Veterans. He has been an active member of the Gettysburg Blues for ten years. He was also a member of two other units, and served as Commander of the 2nd Military District for two years.

Commander-in-Chief Mortorff honors nine ancestors who served under as Union Volunteers. Gene was also elected and served as National Secretary for three years and was appointed to the position of National Chief of Staff. He is a graduate of the SUVCW's Memorial University. Commander-in-Chief is a graduate of Columbia College (MO), University of San Francisco (CA), and Goucher College (MD). He has degrees in Psychology, Business and Education. He also attended the University of Maryland where he earned his Maryland State Teacher Certifications and Monmouth University (NJ) for postgraduate study in Business Management.



A Military Veteran, he retired from the United States Coast. His 20 years of service included three years in Japan, five years on Coast Guard Cutters, Instructor duties and numerous detached duties such as the Valdez Oil Spill. He served as Military Training Officer at the Coast Guard's only Recruit Training Center, and at Coast Guard Headquarters, was a Training Manager for the Coast Guard's operations programs. He earned the Coast Guard Achievement Medal, the Coast Guard Humanitarian Service Medal, Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal, Expert Pistol and Rifle Medals and 19 other Military Medals and Ribbons.

His second career was as a Secondary Public School Teacher in Carroll and Anne Arundel Counties in the state of Maryland. He taught in four schools and after retiring in 2012, he continued to work in the schools when called for long and short term periods. Gene was also active with the Boy Scouts of America, volunteering many years of service. He has provided leadership and guidance at the Troop, District and National level. He has served many years as Scoutmaster, and District Training Manager.

Gene met in college, and was happily married for 40 years to, Linda Austin-Mortorff of Ocean City, New Jersey. She served for six (6) years in the Coast Guard Active Reserves. They lived in East Berlin, PA and have two sons, Christopher Lee of Wisconsin and George Robert of Pennsylvania. Commander-in-Chief Mortorff also belonged to the Lincoln Fellowship of Pennsylvania (Member, Board of Directors); Good Samaritan Masonic Lodge, Gettysburg, PA, Coast Guard Chef Petty Officer Association and New Birth of Freedom Council.

When Gene was not doing SUVCW duties, or working in the schools, he could be found driving a live steam engine or diesel trolley at City Island Railroad in Harrisburg, PA.



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

VOICES OF PATRIOTISM

In this summer season of Patriotism, let us contemplate the following short historical essays about Old Glory, penned by contemporaries of our Union ancestors:

THE MEANING OF THE AMERICAN FLAG.

The American flag means, then, all that the fathers meant in the Revolutionary war; it means all that the Declaration of Independence meant; it means all that the Constitution of a people, organizing for justice, for liberty, and for happiness, meant.

The American flag carries American ideas, American history, and American feelings.

Beginning with the colonies and coming down to our time, in its sacred heraldry, in its glorious insignia, it has gathered and stored chiefly this supreme idea: *divine right of liberty in man*.

Every color means liberty, every thread means liberty, every form of star and beam of light means liberty—liberty through law, and laws for liberty. Accept it, then, in all its fullness of meaning. It is not a painted rag. It is a whole national history. It is the Constitution. It is the government. It is the emblem of the sovereignty of the people. It is the nation.

— Henry Ward Beecher (1813-1887)

Our flag is the symbol of sovereignty, the emblem of the love of country. It ought to float wherever the spirit of this great country is at work; in its halls at Washington, in its city halls, in its public buildings — everywhere. Our youth ought to be taught that we have a government built up on sacrifices as that of no other nation is. We take these other nations into our own, but not before they have renounced all allegiance elsewhere. This is the land of freedom, of equal rights; and the guarantee of it is the flag which floats over our common city.

The United States flag is amongst our most cherished emblems, for the reasons explained above, and more. The founders of our Order thought so too! How to show proper respect to the flag is one of the core instructions in our Ritual given into new members upon their initiation. ENSIGN JOHN DAVIS CAMP No. 10 (AT LARGE)

LONDON, ENGLAND

On May 30 the Camp performed its annual Memorial Day ceremony of laying a wreath at Abraham Lincoln's monument in Parliament Square, London. The guest speaker was the Revd. Canon Dr. Stephen Evans, Rector of St. Marylebone Parish Church, London, who served as a Seaman Officer in the Royal Navy. The photograph was taken by two young ladies from Texas, who were in the Square at the time and were fascinated to learn that an event connected with the Civil War was taking place.

On May 18 the Camp manned a display at the Heritage Day event run by Nunhead Cemetery, one of London's largest and most historic cemeteries, where eight Union veterans are buried. We are working with the Friends of the Cemetery to secure US Veterans Administration Markers for the graves, most of which are unmarked, and to devise an educational project.

Though we were opposite a paddock of Nubian Goats for the children, that did not seem to distract people from us! We had a large display and gave away copies of early SUV postcards. The event was well-attended and we had a fairly continual stream of people visiting - so standing and talking almost continually for six hours was quite a test of our stamina and our voice boxes!

It is pleasing to report that people of all ages were absolutely fascinated to learn that there were American Civil War veterans buried in the cemetery. It had, perhaps understandably, never occurred to them previously. They were intrigued that so many Englishmen went to fight for the Union, and that a number were buried in their local cemetery. It gave them a new perspective on what the cemetery has to offer and an insight into what our Camp is doing to raise awareness of the Civil War and of veterans buried in the UK, as well as about our SUV camp and its mission. There were of course varying levels of awareness of the War itself among Londoners, but no-one was entirely ignorant of it and all seemed to recognise what an important period of modern history it was. We are confident that it augurs well for our efforts to locate veterans graves in the UK and to promote knowledge of this pivotal period of history.

The Camp is also working with Leeds Local and Family History Library in Yorkshire to mount a display for their Armed Forces Day commemoration during June 2024. We have identified eight Union Veterans buried in Leeds and have provided them with a large amount of information on the veterans and our Camp, which has generated considerable enthusiasm at the University. A report will appear in the following Banner.

(This notice provides a brief synopsis of the General Orders. Please consult the published General Orders for complete substantive information.)

GENERAL ORDER #11

Confirms Opinions 001-2024 and 002-2024 of the National Counselor, giving these opinions the force and effect of a General Order.

001-2024 A Camp Treasurer must open a separate account in the name of the Camp for Camp funds. There will be no co-mingling of SUVCW, SVR or personal monies in any account.

002-2024 - Life members are required to pay annual Department and Camp level dues. If a life member fails to pay Camp dues by March 1 of every year, he can be dropped from the Order. If the brother is dropped by the Camp, he cannot apply to any other Camp or Membership at Large unless he has received the concurrence of the Camp that dropped him. Repayment of dues can still be required prior to reinstatement in any Camp. If the Camp decides to suspend the brother rather than drop him from the Order, the suspension is Orderwide.

A brother cannot be a member-at-large to National Headquarters if he resides in a state served by a Department. If a life member is dropped from for non payment of Camp or Department dues, he forfeits his Life Membership and fees associated therewith.

GENERAL ORDER #12

Disbandment of Carpenter-Welch Camp 180, Michigan.

GENERAL ORDER #13

Revokes General order #35, Series 2019-2020 and replaces it with this: The National Organziation, Departments, Camps, SVR Districts and units are permitted to undertake a limited amount of lobbying, as long as the lobbying is directly related to one of the six purposes stated in the Congressional charter (36 USC 2003, §200302). Lobbying shall remain nonpartisan. Prior permission of the Commander-in-Chief must be obtained prior to any efforts whatsoever. The Order details further procedures and conduct.

Revocation of charter of the Col Marshall Lefferts Camp 7, New York.

Memorial Day 2024.

Announces the passing of PCinC Gene Mortorff.

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NEW ENGLAND CIVIL WAR MUSEUM

Catch up on New England Civil War Museum's official podcast! Each month, Sons Matt Vallier and Dan Hayden are joined by Collections and Conservation Director Cara Kaminski and Archives Manager Wayne BuckmIr to talk through another facet of the museum's mission - To connect the people of today with the experiences, memories, and humanity of the people of the Civil War era. Whether we're hosting a guest historian, author, or researcher (or even just ranting amongst ourselves), we're always looking for a new angle in telling the story of the Citizen Soldier.

The New England Civil War Museum and Research Center was originally started by local Civil War veterans in 1896. It was not until March 1994 that it was formally established as a museum and opened to the public. It is located within the Memorial Building, inside a former HYPERLINK "https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Grand_Army_of_the_Republic" \o "Grand Army of the Republic" Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) Hall in HYPERLINK "https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Rockville,_Connecticut" \o "Rockville, Connecticut" Rockville, Connecticut. Thomas F. Burpee Post #71 of the Grand Army of the Republic held their meetings in the Grand Hall from 1890 until 1929. Alden Skinner Camp #45 of the HYPERLINK "https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Sons_of_Union_Veterans_of_the_Civil_War" \o "Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, their direct heir, have held their monthly meetings in the hall since 1890, making it the oldest, continuously used GAR Hall in the entire country.

In season one, we explore the combat experience of the average soldier through their accounts of Gettysburg, Antietam, and Cold Harbor. What did they see? What did they feel? What was life like in camp and on the march? What can we tell about their experiences through the regimental camp newspapers written by soldiers and on display at the museum? What's the science behind Civil War photography, and the Victorian fascination with death rituals?

In season two, we join the Navy to explore life on the rivers and seas and to discover what really happened to the H. L. Hunley. How is the war remembered? We discuss "Living History", reenacting, Civil War monuments, and the preservation of Connecticut's historic regimental flag collection in the first half of this on-going journey from the halls of the New England Civil War Museum.



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ROOTSTECH CONFERENCE

The conference took place from Thursday, February 29 through Saturday, March 2 in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Staffed by brothers from Captain Lot Smith Camp No. 1, traffic at the SUVCW booth was tremendous. On each of the three days, hundreds of conference participants stopped by the booth and engaged in substantive conversations with the volunteers. The brothers put in 94½ man-hours over the whole conference with three to four brothers on duty at any given time to answer questions and dispense information. Several reported being foot sore and dry mouthed by the end of each day.

Almost 60 persons gave their contact information on a sign-up sheet, requesting follow-up contact from the Departments in their home states or the Camp nearest their hometowns. These names were subsequently communicated to the appropriate departments for follow up. The booth organizers have already heard back from the Departments of the Columbia and Wisconsin about follow-up contacts made.

During the three days of RootsTech, in-person daily conference attendance ranged from 5,000 to 10,000 genealogists, hungry for information about their ancestors. In addition, up to 3,000,000 persons will access the RootsTech web site over the next 10 or so months

In addition to the booth, there is potential for a link on RootsTech's web site to bring virtual participants to an SUVCW recruiting site and a recruiting video.

OUR HERITAGE

National Association of Naval Veterans

As many readers may know, at the end of the war, the G.A.R. was not the only game in town when it came to veterans' organizations. Three of the largest competitors were *The Boys in Blue, the Union Veterans' Union and the Union Veterans' Legion*.

The Boys in Blue didn't survive very long. The Union Veterans' Union and Union Veterans' Legion however, did continue for many years, and experienced cross-over membership with, but never attained the number of members as, the Grand Army of the Republic. One organization that did not compete with the G.A.R. was an organization for only those who served in the U.S. Navy.

Organized on January 13, 1887, the National Association of Naval Veterans (NANV) was comprised of several locally-based groups of former sailors residing in different parts of the United States.

Its objects mirrored the G.A.R. with "...to perpetuate the glorious name and deeds of our Navy; strengthening the ties of fraternal fellowship and sympathy; to extend relief to worthy members...and to maintain the honor of the American flag."

The head of the national organization was referred to as the Commodore, and members called each other "Shipmate". Nationally, the membership peaked at just over 9,000 sailors and marines.

The NANV was a completely separate organization from the G.A.R., but held their annual reunions in conjunction with the Grand Army's National Encampments. The former sailors even held their own parades during Encampment week. In 1895, at Louisville, KY, about 10,000 sailors and marines marched through the city on Naval Veteran's Day.

Most of the local associations had created and wore their own distinctive membership badge, and many of these incorporated a fouled anchor in the design. The NANV membership badge consisted of a Union shield with the words *Don't Give Up the Ship*, backed by crossed anchors, and surmounted by an eagle holding a scroll. The scroll contained the words *National Association U.S.*

Naval Veterans. Originally, a red, white and blue striped ribbon hung behind the emblem, but was soon replaced with a light blue ribbon with silver stars, the "Union Jack".

By 1894, 34 individual associations existed from New England to Chicago. These groups had names such as Admiral Farragut Association, The Kearsarge Association, Michigan Naval Veterans, Admiral Dahlgren Association, The Monitor and The Essex Naval Associations

There were within the G.A.R. three posts whose members were all sailors and marines – Naval Post No. 400 of Philadelphia, PA; Farragut Post No. 516 of New York City; and Stevens Naval Post No. 104 of Hoboken, NJ.
