More Than 500 Markers Along Kentucky Roads Remind Motorists Of State's History

More than 500 markers along Kentucky highways remind motorists of the state's history. At the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1964, there were 478 historical highway markers in Kentucky. Since then, 36 have been placed, bringing the overall total to 514.

The latest marker placed is No. 795, the "Duke of Paducah" at Paducah.

The No. 1 marker was erected at the Henry Clay Home in Lexington.

The difference in the numbers of 514 markers erected and No. 795 placed recently at Paducah is accounted for by a change in the numbering system.

W. A. Wentworth, chairman of the Kentucky Highway Marker Program, said the markers were first made by the Engineering Department of the University of Kentucky. Later they were made by independent contractors who were awarded the jobs on a bid basis.

When the bid basis was adopted the numbering of the markers began at 500. Thus, all markers with numbers under 500 were made at UK. Markers with numbers 500 and over were made by independent firms on a bid basis. Sewah Studios, Marietta, Ohio, has the current contract for making the markers.

The markers are erected by the Kentucky Historical Society in cooperation with the Kentucky Department of Highways. The program was started about 1950.

None of the state's 120 counties is without a historical highway marker.

Fayette County has the largest number of highway markers, with 29. Next is Jefferson County, with 21.

The highway markers to be erected in 1965 are not officially listed. The legislative appropriation will permit the erection of about 100 markers. In the 1964 calendar year 138 markers will be placed in 91 counties.

In the past few years some of the markers have been supplemented with large map markers that deal with incidents which occur at the particular localities where the markers are placed. These supplemental markers number about 60.

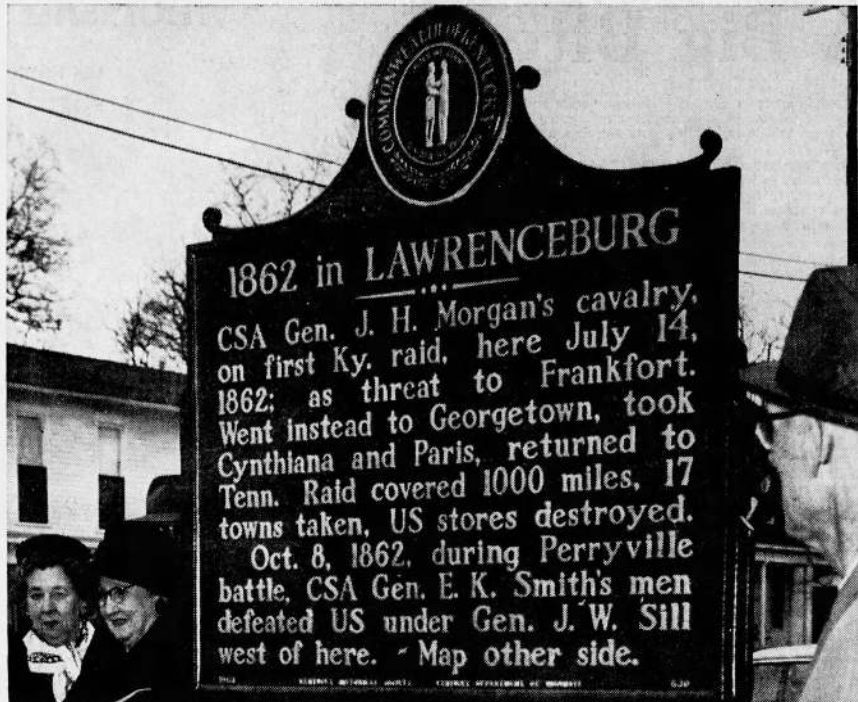
