

Hecker, Frederich - A German Revolutionist who came to St. Louis in the forties. Hecker commanded the German, 24th Illinois Infantry ("Hecker Regiment") and the 82nd Illinois Infantry. Hecker resided near Belleville. Illinois but



The memorial is a shaft of gray stone. On two sides are circular medallions with the dates 1848 (German Revolution) in one, and 1861 (Civil War) in the other. There is a third medallion with a bronze portrait of Hecker, in high relief, set in on the North side. The sculptor was Charles Stubenraugh. On the opposite side is a bronze wreath of oak leaves. On four sides of the base of the shaft, above the medallions, are four torches carved in full relief in the stone, and above these are four stars in high relief. Ernest C. Janssen was the Architect, and the memorial was erected in 1882 before a crowd of 15,000.





Close to the southern entrance of the park is a granite obelisk monument to the memory of Colonel Friedrich Karl Franz Hecker, who raised a regiment of local German-Americans during the Civil War, serving first under Fremont and later commanding his own brigade in the Union Army. The shaft, designed by architect Ernest C. Janssen, was dedicated in 1882.

In recent years, Benton Park has been completely remodeled and attractively landscaped with the city's neighborhood rehabilitation funds derived from the sale of City property, as part of the Cherokee Pilot Rehabilitation Area. The large playground is provided with new and modern equipment and an excellent storage and shelter building was erected overlooking the lake.

Thanks to Greg Stock, we now have some very nice pictures of Benton Park from the late 1800's.

any political refugees arrived in America in the late 1840s after the failed republican revolutions in tral Europe, but few were as prominent as drich Franz Karl Hecker.

lecker arrived in New York City on ober 4, 1848, to a welcome that he cribed as the greatest reception for a opean since the arrival of Lafayette. As a minent lawyer in Germany, Hecker had n a fiery and outspoken champion of the ple, and he came to America determined continue the fight for republican reforms is native land. He moved west and settled a farm near Belleville, Illinois, becoming a der in the St. Louis area German munity. He was an active supporter of the presidential candidate of the Republican ty, John C. Frémont, and enthusiastically ed German support for Abraham Lincoln's didacy four years later.21

When war broke out, the fifty-year-old ker enlisted as a private in a Union threenth regiment in St. Louis. He was soon moned by friends to Chicago to command 24th Illinois Infantry, a German regiment aed "the Hecker Regiment" in his honor. His ure with the 24th Illinois was stormy. cker's orders dismissing undesirable cers—and potential political rivals—were bealed all the way to Secretary of War ion Cameron before an unsatisfactory apromise was worked out in November

51. Hecker took sick leave in protest. 22 Another German regiment, the 82d Illinois intry, was mustered into service in October 52, and Colonel Hecker was appointed to immand it. After moving to the Eastern eater of the war, the regiment was made t of Major General Carl Schurz' division, XI

Corps, Army of the Potomac. On the afternoon of May 2, 1863, at Chancellorsville, Virginia, the 82d Illinois had the misfortune to be directly in the path of General Thomas J. Jackson's flank attack. Hecker grabbed the regimental colors and ordered his men forward, but Confederate fire brought him down almost immediately. After his recovery, he led a brigade in Schurz' division in the Chattanooga campaign, but he retired from military service in early 1864.²³

Hecker returned to active participation in politics, his patriotism heightened by his combat experience. In a Fourth of July oration in Trenton, Illinois, in 1871, Hecker boldly proclaimed his view of his new fatherland: "I am the destiny of the old world-I am America, and I will plant the banner of the deliverance of humanity in every land." On a similar occasion in Stuttgart, Germany, Hecker praised the "three miracles of America" that he had seen in his lifetime: the abolition of slavery, the return of huge armies to civilian pursuits, and the decision of the victorious not to bestow medals on their generals. Hecker died on March 24, 1881, and was buried near Summerfield, Illinois. 24


Benton Park was created by city ordinance on June 25, 1866, converting a graveyard of seventeen acres to a city park. The land had been used for burials from 1840 until 1865, at which time the bodies were removed to Arsenal Island. The park's original acreage has been slowly reduced by the encroachment of the surrounding streets. On Sunday, October 1, 1882, a crowd of fifteen thousand gathered

to witness the unveiling of the monument. Dr. Emil Prectorius, edit Westliebe Post, opened the ceremon included orations in German and songs, and instrumental music. M Hecker, a granddaughter, then unmonument.





I fully support your efforts as the Department's Memorials Office to request funding from the SUVCW Civil War Memorials-Monuments Fund to restore these two monuments.

Assume you are familiar with the SUVCW Form 62, but if not enclosed is the application Westport Camp used for the GAR historical marker. This could also be a Grant Camp request, unless you feel the Department name will carry more weight with the committee. I suggest two separate applications, one for each monument, in the hope of obtaining \$2,000 per restoration --\$2,000 being the grant maximum. The committee's encampment report was that they distributed their full \$12,000 budget for this fiscal year with three applications that were unfunded, but part of the discussion revealed there was an approximately \$22,000 reserve that the committee had not used.

You may want to consider a grant request to the SUVCW Charitable Foundation. If Westport Camp can get a \$500 pledge for a new GAR marker, I'm thinking restoring existing monuments would easily qualify.

If you need a donation from the Department, then we might want to discuss at the October business meeting, and weight these restorations along with the two proposed GAR historical markers --I think all four need the Department's support. I'm excited that Missouri is moving from documenting the 543 Missouri Civil War monuments to restoring and caring for the 543 markers (by the way, I slipped that into our Department's oral report and the CinC stated to the encampment his gratitude to Walter Busch on the accomplishment). Thanks.

Can I get department OK to pursue funding to repair two monuments in St. Louis. One is to General Lyons and is missing his bronze high-relief bust. The other is Col. Friedrich Hecker, GAR member, who is missing his bronze high-relief bust and a bronze laurel wreath on the back. Otherwise both are in good shape. A German group is trying to raise funds for the Hecker monument and they've priced repairs at \$17,000. I would like to pursue some SUVCW funding at the national level (probably around \$2,000) to be used on this project.

We would need to keep track of money taken in for this project and would probably be turning it over to the German Group and the Artist.

Lyon is longer range as I need to generate interest in it.

Attached is an application for assisting in the restoration of the Hecker Monument in St. Louis. Colonel Friedrich Hecker was a famous freedom fighter in the 1848 Revolutions who fled to America and later joined the US Army as a private to assist in the capture of Camp Jackson, MO. He was later Colonel of two Illinois regiments. Two of the medallions on the monument are missing. Both were bronze about 24 inches diameter. One is a high relief portrait of Hecker and the other is a laurel wreath. It will take about \$17,000 to restore the medallions.

The work is being done by Vlad Zhitomirsky who recently created the Dred Scott Monument at the St. Louis Courthouse.

Additional funding for restoring the monument are being worked on by the Missouri German Consortium, who has been "promised" some funding by the German government. Our department is also meeting in October and hopefully will vote some additional funds.
