Stone Bench and Flags to
Encampment Host.

ELECTION CONTESTS LOOM

Wires to Washington Express
Appreciation for Passage
of Pension Bills.

WABASH, Ind., June 10.—Although the "boys of '61" are occupying the center of the stage at Wabash, "the girls of 1930" today gave the town a number of substantial and interesting gifts so that in years to come the city will not forget that the fifty-first encampment of the G. A. R. was held within its borders.

A red maple tree was planted on the northwest lawn of the Memorial building ground bearing a bronze marker dedicated to the Indiana department of the G. A. R. by the Woman's Relief Corps. Mrs. Ida K. Snyder, department president, South Bend, made the dedicatory address. The corps also presented a bronze tablet, engraved with Lincoln's Gettysburg address, to the Presbyterian church, where its sessions are being held, and a large flag to the Girl and Boy Scouts of the town.

A bronze sundial on an Indiana limestone pedestal bearing the words "To perpetuate the memories of our fathers," a stone bench and a flag were presented by Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, with Mrs. Frances Bilyeu, Indianapolis, department president, assisted by Mrs. Gail Roberts, Terre Haute, patriotic instructor, officiating. Other gifts will be presented later by Ladies of the G. A. R., the Sons of Veterans and its auxiliary.

Following a meeting of the council of administration this afternoon telegrams were sent to President Hoover and to the senate and house expressing appreciation for the passage of the

widows' and veterans' pension bill. The bill raises the veterans' pensions to \$75 and \$100 and the widows' to \$50. Appreciation of the action was enthusiastically expressed by veterans and on convention floors of the Woman's Relief Corps, the Daughters of Union Veterans, the Ladies of the G. A. R. and the Auxiliary to the Sons of Veterans. ©

"It is a great thing for the Grand Army," said David N. Foster, Indiana member of the national council of administration and chairman of rules and regulations of the national encampment, whose duty it was to compose and send the messages that were also signed by Charles E. Hale, department commander, and A. B. Crampton, adjutant.

Business sessions of the allied organizations opened today but only preliminary meetings of the G. A. R. were held. Its first business session will open Wednesday forenoon. The official reception in honor of national and department officers of the G. A. R. and allied organizations will be held tonight.

Interest in the election of the commander is growing by leaps and bounds. F. M. McNair, Martinsville, senior vice-commander, a candidate, distributed ribbons bearing his picture and name. Dr. Isaac B. Austin has hand bills out telling of his war record and of his medical training. He marched with Sherman to the sea. Both men are active in the G. A. R., and have enthusiastic followings. Thomas Ream, Indianapolis, is a new candidate in the field, announcing his candidacy today. Election will be held Thursday.

Competition for department president of the Woman's Relief Corps promises to be lively as three women have been announced as candidates: Miss Ann Schmitz, Lafayette, retiring senior vice-president; Mrs. Kate Taylor, Bedford, and Mrs. Henry Etta Neal, Indianapolis. Election will be Thursday.

National Head Expected.

A note of sadness marked the opening session of the Ladies of the D. A. R. as the department president, Mrs. Laura Critchfield, Princeton, was not present, owing to the death of her husband Saturday. Resolutions of

sympathy were adopted by the body and letters sent to Mrs. Critchfield. Mrs. Amanda E. Jordan, Muncie, senior vice-president, presided. Mrs. Cora Rawlings, Dayton, national president of the organization, is expected to arrive tonight. Mrs. Lida E. Manson, Crawfordsville, past national president, was introduced.

Mrs. Bilyeu gave greetings at the opening meeting of the Daughters of Union Veterans and introduced department officers and past department presidents. Memorial services for members who died in the last year were conducted.

An exchange of greetings was a feature of the Sons of Union Veterans auxiliary meeting. Mrs. Jessie Wise, Valparaiso, president, gave a welcome. Exemplification of the ritual by the Frankfort team was presented. The first general business meeting will be held Wednesday forenoon.

J. H. Hoffman, Ligonier, who hasn't missed a G. A. R. session in forty years, registered Monday. Richard Tyne, age ninety, Newcastle, claims the honor of being the oldest past-commander present, nosing out Foster by only six months. "Colonel" Foster, who is a member of the national council of administration, was in headquarters settling disputes among comrades, and seemed to have his hands full.

Marion Bids for 1931.

Judging from present indications, it appears the encampment might come back next year into this part of the state. Marion is out to get the 1931 meeting. Invitations will be voted on at the last session Thursday. Wabash has given the veterans and other convention visitors a hearty welcome.

"They won't let me walk," said one white-haired, blue-coated comrade. "I like to walk, too, but that Boy Scout just keeps his eye on me and hustles me into an automobile before I know it. I'm afraid my legs will be out of practice when I get back home."

Women at the registration desk were chuckling among themselves because many of the veterans resented being questioned. "What do you want to know where I live for?" one asked. "Ain't you gettin' pretty personal? Not a widow, are you?" Which held his feminine questioner for a while.

"Just like all our encampments," one old chap with a cane remarked to a comrade sitting beside him. "They're all alike."

"I see just one difference," chuckled his companion, as he gazed at a group of women passing him, "the skirts are longer."

Sessions will continue through Wednesday and Thursday with the parade Wednesday afternoon, and the annual camp fire Wednesday night. Great preparations are being made to make the parade the biggest and most elaborate possible. Ft. Benjamin Harrison is sending four gun companies and a band.
