Tree, Tablets and Sundial, Stone Bench and Flags to Encampment Host.

ELECTION CONTESTS LOOM

Wires to Washington Express Appreciation for Passage of Pension Bills.

WABASH, Ind., June 10.—Although the "boys of '61" are occupying the center of the stage at Wabash, "the girls of 1930" today gave the town a number of substantial and interesting gifts so that in years to come the city will not forget that the fifty-first encampment of the G. A. R. was neld within its borders.

A red maple tree was planted on the northwest lawn of the Memorial building ground bearing a bronze marker dedicated to the Indiana department of the G. A. R. by the Woman's Relief Corps. Mrs. Ida K. Snyder, department president, Sou'h Bend, made the dedicatory address. The corps also presented a bronze tablet, engraved with Lincoln's Gettysburg address, to the Presbyterian church, where its sessions are being held, and a large flag to the Girl and Boy Scouts of the town.

A bronze sundial on an Indiana limestone pedestal bearing the words "To perpetuate the memories of our fathers," a stone bench and a flag were presented by Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, with Mrs. Frances Bilyeu, Indianapolis, department president, assisted by Mrs. Gail Roberts, Terre Haute, patriotic instructor, officiating. Other gifts will be presented later by Ladies of the G. A. R., the Sons of Veterans and its auxiliary.

Following a meeting of the council of administration this afternoon telegrams were sent to President Hoover and to the senate and house expressing appreciation for the passage of the
