

VOICES OF PATRIOTISM

A creed can be defined as a set of fundamental guiding principles or beliefs. The following creeds are closely associated with the SUVCW.

The American's Creed

The American's Creed is the title of a resolution passed by the U.S. House of Representatives on April 3, 1918. It is a statement written in 1917 by William Tyler Page as an entry into a patriotic contest that he won. This creed is part of the SUVCW's Ritual and Ceremonials and is often recited at Camp meetings:

I believe in the United States of America, as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes. I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its Constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies.

Sons of Veterans Creed

This creed was adopted by the 38th National Encampment of the Sons of Veterans at Columbus, Ohio on September 11, 1919. Although it is no longer a formal part of the Ritual and Ceremonials, its sentiments endure to this day and link us to the GAR.

To be a true American and a good citizen.

To discountenance disloyalty in any form.

To revere the name of my ancestor who gave his service and made his sacrifices for the maintenance of the Republic.

To assist the Grand Army of the Republic and to perpetuate the patriotic teachings of that organization.

To be loyal to my Camp and the Order and faithful to my fellow members that we may work in brotherhood for these ends.

Use these creeds to help guide you in your daily conduct as Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War!

- OBITUARY -

ROBERT M. PETROVIC, PDC 1940 – 2024

With sorrow, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War reports the passing of Brother Robert (Bob) Petrovic on 28 November 2024.



Brother Bob was a Past Camp Commander of William T. Sherman/Billy Yank Camp #65, charter member of Ulysses S Grant Camp #68, Past Department Commander of the Department of Missouri, past elected member of the National Council of Administration, Chairman of the SUVCW Charitable Foundation, Chairman of the National Committee on Lincoln Tomb Observance, and Colonel and Chief of Staff for the Sons of Veteran Reserve. Bob was also National President of Logan's Brigade, the men's auxiliary to the Women's Relief Corp. He was instrumental in the re-charter of the Department of Missouri in 1996 serving as the first Department Commander. He organized the 2001 Springfield, 2007 St. Louis, and 2021 St. Louis National Encampments. He also authored the first edition of the National Encampment Handbook. Brother Bob received two National Meritorious Service Awards with Gold Stars, two Department of Missouri Meritorious Service Awards, and the Missouri Department's Francis Blair Award. Bob is survived by his wife, Cher, National President of the Women's Relief Corp, Auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic.

The Department of the Chesapeake and its Auxiliary played host to a large gathering of the Allied Orders, guests and friends to pay tribute to both Commander-in-Chief Kevin L. Martin and National Auxiliary President Rosemary S. Martin on Saturday, October 26. Held at a local Frederick landmark, Dutch's Daughter Restaurant, the testimonial luncheon was organized and co-emceed by the National Chiefs-of-Staff; Department Auxiliary President Denise Thompson and Brian W. Horgan, PDC.

A host of individuals and National officers, both past and present, representing groups comprising the Allied Orders, recounted many stories that chronicled the rise of the honorees to the highest office of their respective

organizations. Of note, two Department Camps made special presentations to the Martins' – Washington, DC-based Lincoln-Cushing Camp 2 gifted a framed photograph from the personal collection of PCinC Andrew Johnson depicting the

last gathering of the Grand Army of the Republic from Indianapolis, IN in 1949. Baltimore's Garfield Camp 1 surprised the crowd with a "Big Check" symbolizing their donation of three-hundred dollars to help offset the Martin's out-of-pocket expenses during the coming year.

At the completion of the testimonials, the guests of honor took to the lectern and in typical gracious fashion proceeded to give attribution for their ascension to many individuals who were instrumental in guiding their path to the top. In recognizing the rarity of a husband-wife team occupying these honored posts, the couple again credited others with helping to motivate their ever-increasing involvement and instilling in them an unswerving devotion to the tenets of their respective Orders.





CHAPLAIN'S CORNER



Worship looked different in congregations during the Civil War period. Most certainly it was very different among the troops. Providing care for men and women facing death requires attention to details and questions which might not arise in an ordinary parish. As the North and the South faced a continuing conflict, how did clergymen choose the themes of their sermons? What biblical passages inspired them? How did they use the scriptures to support their messages?

In a recent book, Holy Baptism of Fire and Blood, from Oxford University Press, the author, James Byrd, explores data from newspapers, sermons, books and other sources which identify the most cited Bible verses from sources in the North and the South during the Civil War. I am quoting the top three verses in each region. The Confederate sources most frequently cite verses that dwell on acceptance of the hand of providence. God is at work in all things always appears to be the overarching theme. The most utilized Union verses all deal with subjects related to slavery and freedom. Acts 17:26 states that all people are of one blood. Isaiah 58:6 demands that the oppressed go free. And Leviticus 25:10 says that "you shall proclaim liberty throughout all the land."

Top Three Union Bible Verses

Acts 17:26 "And hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth, and hath determined the times before appointed, and the bounds of their habitation..."

Isaiah 58:6 "Is not this the fast that I have chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the heavy burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break every yoke?"

Leviticus 25:10 "And ye shall hallow the fiftieth year, and proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof: it shall be a jubilee unto you; and ye shall return every man unto his possession, and ye shall return every man unto his family."

Top Three Confederate Bible Verses

Job 1:21 "Naked came I out of my mother's womb, and naked shall I return thither: the Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord."

Matthew 25:21, 25:23 "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord."

Romans 8:28 "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose."

I invite you to consider the impact these various verses would have had upon the heart, mind and soul as one faced battle, struggled with hunger and bad weather, or buried a fellow soldier. They still have meaning for us today. As we begin a new year, what do these verses say to you? Do you find inspiration, comfort, hope? While the world around us may look different, human beings still have the same struggles, needs and joys. God spoke to them. God continues to speak to us.

Life Membership

Below are the new Life member rates as approved at the 143rd National Encampment in Lexington, Kentucky and were effective immediately. Brothers may use form 9 from the National Website to apply for life membership.

Not less than one-third of the total fee shall accompany this application and the remainder shall be paid at the convenience of the Member within three (3) years from the date of the application. A Member is not considered to be a Life Member until the required fees are paid in full. If the full payment has not been received within three (3) years, the amount of payment submitted shall be designated as a donation to the Permanent Fund of the Order.

Life membership in the SUVCW excuses a Brother from paying annual National per capita dues. Life Members are required to pay annual Department and Camp level dues. A Department may waive annual Department dues for Life Members, but the Department must make this decision. Likewise, a Camp may waive annual Camp dues, or a portion thereof, for Life Members, but the Camp must make this determination. Examples of each of these three dues conditions can be found within the Order.

GENERAL ORDER #7

Rescinds Sections 1 and 3 of General Order #22, Series 2023-2024, which rescindes the National Policy regarding the loan and/or deposit of artifacts to outside persons/agencies. MINUTES OF COUNCIL OF ADMINISTATION MEETING November 17, 2024 Gettysburg, Pennsylvania

(Note from the Editor) This is a synopsis of the minutes as edited by the Banner Editor. The full minutes, when approved, will be posted on the Order's website and is the official version)

Several email votes were reviewed and approved.

Several product licenses were approved which were not able to be voted upon in August,

2024-006: SUVCW License Plate (Department of Pennsylvania).

2024-008: SUVCW or GAR Address Labels (Grant Camp 68, Department of Missouri).

2024-009: SUVCW Name Badges (Grant Camp 68, Department of Missouri).

2024-010: Brass Membership Card (Grant Camp 68, Department of Missouri)

Two new License Applications approved.

Pocket Slide-In Nametag (Grant Camp 68, Department of Missouri).

Memory Box (Col. Kinsman Camp 23, Department of Iowa).

The resignation of Susan Mitchell as Assistant Executive Director was discussed.

Approved motion to allow P & P Committee make minor changes to any form without CofA approval.

Three certificates from the National Quartermaster were approved, specifically, the updated Ancestor Certificate, updated Eagle Scout Certificate, and updated Death Certificate.

Approved new special order Membership Certificate with design based on the original 1890's design and size.

Discussed the need for someone to transport the National Charter to Houston for 2025 National Encampment and then return it to Harrisburg.

Progam and Policy to develop a graphic example of the CinC seal, department seal, and camp seal to be put in the C&R.

CofA discussed a proposal from Grouper, where membership dues could be covered by health insurance for senior citizens. A CinC appointed committee will explore this and present at the Springfield CofA meeting.

Officer Report Recommendations. (Numbering is from the consolidated officer reports.)

- From National Civil War Memorials Officer. Currently about 25GB of monument files that need to be moved to a cloud or FTP service that can serve as a backup to what is currently online. The estimated cost is to be checked on by Brother Payne. CinC Martin assigned this matter to Comm & Tech Committee.

- National GAR Records Officer. CofA discussed items 1 and 3 of General Order No. 22, Series 2023-2024, the "Loan/Deposit Policy" and Form 80) CofA voted to suspend the Loan/Deposit Policy CinC Martin will issue General Order No. 7, which will also clarify that any existing Forms 80 remain in effect.
- National Washington DC Representative. CofA approved purchase of 4x6 US Flag and matching pole for CinC flag, along with 2 baldrics/flag carrier harnesses, to be in the possession of the DC Representative for use by SUVCW.

CofA approved to send out a fund-raising form for further distribution by the National Secretary to Departments, for the Departments to further distribute the form to all Camps and all Brothers.

Other New Business.

Camp Secretary Handbook. Small discrepancy in the handbook concerning the distribution of the application fee. This will be corrected by the Secretary. The National Councilor is to provide an opinion on this matter.

CofA approved Natinoal Quartermaster acquire a 10 ft. x10 ft. storage unit for Quartermaster use at \$104 for the first 3 months, then about \$205 per month after. This will be through August 2025.

Good of the Order.

Entertained recommendation that G.O. 4 be amended to allow any member of our Order in good standing to attend and observe in person CofA meetings only. CinC Martin will consider revising G.O. 4 for in-person meetings.

68TH REMEMBRANCE DAY 2024

WORLD-WIDE LINCOLN

After seeing PCinC Andrew Johnson's article on the statue of Abraham Lincoln in a cemetery in Edinburgh, Scotland, and creating a form 61 for it, I started to ponder just how many other Lincoln monuments are there outside the United States. I knew that there were Regan and Clinton monuments in Europe, but since ones of Lincoln might qualify as Civil War monuments to retain in our records, the existence of them had me curious. So, after an internet search, these are the ones that I found. A couple of locations may surprise you.

Edinburgh has the Lincoln statue in Old Calton Cemetery in honor of Scottish-American Soldiers and in Manchester, England, is a statue by George Grey Barnard that commemorates the impact the American Civil War had on the cotton cloth-producing region of England. Dedicated in 1920, another Lincoln statue created by Saint Gaudens stands in the area of Westminster Abbey, London.

Mexico has two statues to our president. The first one dedicated in 1964 was a copy of the Saint Gaudens' statue and is in Parque Lincoln in Mexico City. The other is one of the few monuments already in our files and stands in Tijuana.

Oslo's Lincoln bust became a symbol of resistance to the Nazis during Norway's occupation in World War II. People would gather around the monument created by the Norwegian-American sculptor Paul Fjelde every fourth of July for a ceremony. The monument dedicated in 1914 was in honor of Norwegians who came to North Dakota.

Surprisingly, Cuba has three statues of Lincoln. All of them are in Havana. The first is in the Parque de La Fraterndad next to the Capitol. The next is at the Museum of the Revolution, while the last one is a miniature sculpture on the Avenue of Presidents in the Vedado neighborhood.

The overseas campus at the University of Chicago Center in Paris, France, has our next memorial to Lincoln. Probably the most interesting statue is one showing a meeting that never took place! To mark the 150th anniversary of the freeing of Russia's serfs by Czar Alexander II in 2011 a statue of the Czar shaking hands (pre-Covid 19 days – remember?) with President Lincoln. The sculpture created by A. Burganov stands in front of the Russian National Archives in Moscow. Both the Czar and the President freed enslaved people, the Czar sent the Russian fleet to the US to support the Lincoln and the US against foreign moves in the Civil War, and both leaders were assassinated.

A Standing Lincoln overlooks a grape orchard at the Bacalhoa Estate in Azeitão, Portugal. Apparently, the owner is a big fan of the president. Parkview Square in Singapore has a standing one also. But there are two that are now gone.

A terracotta Lincoln statue from Centennial Park in Sidney, Australia, had to be dumped due to decay; Benjamin Disraeli's terracotta statue from the park is also missing for the same reason. Finally, there is supposed to be a Lincoln statue in Japan, but the only reference I could find of one was one built of snow of a seated Lincoln. It was built in Sapporo, Japan, by members of the Japanese Ground Defense Forces in 1992.

When travelling to these monuments, take a lot of pictures and send them to your Civil War Monuments Officer.



BOSCOBEL GAR HALL NEWS

The Boscobel GAR Hall as had another phase of work completed with more plastering done in the upstairs. The plastering is an expensive and labor-intensive project due to the scarcity of competent contractors in the area that are skilled in original plastering, as the GAR Hall is on the National Register of Historic Places. UV film has been procured and ready to install on the windows protecting the artifacts within the hall.

The GAR Hall raffle was a great success and over \$4000 was made to help benefit restoration work on the hall, Commander Dan Chroninger would like to thank Rod Dary for spearheading this event, and also the others that sold and bought tickets.

A local Baptist congregation built the building in 1871 as the First Baptist Church. The congregation left the building vacant in 1879. A few pews and the organ remain from that first incarnation as a church.

In 1896 the building was bought by the Grand Army of the Republic's local chapter, John McDermott Post #101 and Women's Relief Corps #32. They remodeled the building, splitting the nave into two floors, with a kitchen and other rooms on the first floor and with a meeting hall on the second floor – the current layout. The hall remained a meeting place for the G.A.R. until 1942. Since then, The Woman's Relief Corps has actively preserved the GAR Hall as a memorial to Civil War veterans and for the benefit of future generations. In 2003, L.G. Armstrong Camp #49 of the SUVCW was re-chartered in Boscobel and uses the Hall as it's meeting site. The Sons actively assist the WRC with Hall maintenance and fund raising efforts.





OUR HERITAGE

GRAND DIVISION COMMANDER: A SHORT-LIVED OFFICE

In 1882, when our Order was quickly developing into a potentially national organization, it was desired to have capable men in charge of regions to help organize the several Divisions (Departments) that would eventually come on line. Many of those men were prominent members of the G.A.R. The country was divided into five Grand Divisions. However, within three years it was found that the Grand Division structure was more of a hinderance. Divisions could be organized faster if they reported directly to the Commandery-in-Chief. (National Organization). At the 1885 National Encampment, the Grand Divisions were abolished. Within that short time period, there were only ten men who held the title Grand Division Commander. They were:

1st Grand Division: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut.

Isaac S. Bangs of Waterville, Maine. Bvt. Brigadier General, 20th Maine Infantry and 88th USCT.

Frank A. Challis of Manchester, New Hampshire. Son of Major Timothy W. Challis, 4th NH Infantry.

Lucian F. Burpee of Rockville, Connecticut. Lt. Col. of the CT National Guard, and son of Col. Thomas F. Burpee, 21st CT Infantry.

2nd Grand Division: New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia, Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia.

William Edward Wyatt Ross of Baltimore, Maryland. Bvt. Brigadier General, 31st USCT and Sr. Vice Commander-in-Chief, G.A.R.

Charles Milton Cott of Columbus, Ohio. Son of Pvt. Christopher Cott, McLaughlin's Independent Cavalry and Co. C, 5th Ohio Cavalry. Killed in 1864.

Hon. Raphael Tobias of New York City. Judge of New York Court. Son of Lieut. Julius Tobias, Co. H, 13th Connecticut Infantry.

3rd Grand Division: Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Kentucky, Missouri, Nebraska, Dakota Territory.

William J. Maskell of Chicago, Illinois. Pvt., Chicago Board of Trade Battery. (Served as William J. Mescall.) Leland J. Webb of Topeka, Kansas. Drummer, 16th Wisconsin Infantry, and son of Lt. William C. Webb, 37th Wisconsin Infantry. Commander-in-Chief, Sons of Veterans 1890 – 1891.

Elliott Howard Gilkey of Columbus, Ohio. Son of Pvt. Elliott S. Gilkey, 57th Pennsylvania Infantry who was killed at the Wilderness. Elliott Howard Gilkey was Assistant Clerk in the Ohio State Senate.

4th Grand Division: California, Oregon, Washington Territory, Montana, Wyoming, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico.

Ahiman Valentine Bohn of Leadville, Colorado. Bvt. Major, 15th Ohio Infantry. Colorado State Senator and Commander of Department of Colorado and Wyoming, G.A.R.

5th Grand Division: North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Indian Territory and Texas.

Under the supervision of Gen. William E.W. Ross.

The last surviving Past Grand Division Commander was Elliott Howard Gilkey. He died in 1948 at the age of 91 years.
